IF YOU WERE TO fail to pay your income tax, you would be in bad trouble with the government, right? What about the government agencies, who are continually making dumb-bell mistakes costing anywhere from \$50,000 to \$1.5 million? Well, that's probably costing each taxpayer, too, in the long run.

We saw a new list of the goofs by various bureaucracies this week, and as usual, they make you wonder if all bureaucracies should not just be shut down, and perhaps start over--except that the way government runs things, this would just cost more millions.

In financially-troubled New York City, for example, the city wasted a chance to collect \$1.1 million in discounts by not paying certain bills within a specified period. "Poor internal controls and ineffective bureaucratic procedures" were blamed by the city's controller as reasons for the oversight.

Contra Costa County, California school officials were suddenly notified last fall that they had to cut \$400,000 from their school budget. It seems that someone had mistakenly fed enrollment figures into a computer which made it appear that the school system was entitled to more state money than they actually were.

In Illinois, the Department of Children and Family Services is accused of making \$450,000 in foster-care payments to people who no longer have foster children.

One lady continued to receive checks even after she called and advised the officials that she no longer had foster children, and needed to be taken off the list. It almost required court action to stop the check from coming.

In Georgia, a computer error caused an agency to over-pay \$1.5 million in medicaid bills submitted by anesthesiologists in a five-year period.

The medicaid checks were paying the full amount of each bill, instead of just a percentage, as the regulation states.

In North Carolina, someone forgot to put expiration dates on 500,000 license decals for recreation trailers, vans and motorcycles. The cost of reprinting the decals was \$60,000. A "breakdown in communications" was blamed for the error.

The capper of the whole list happened in Pittsburgh, where the city paved a lot next to one of their garages after employees complained of the mud. They later discovered that three-fourths of the lot belonged to a beer distributor across the street.

Not only did the distributor refuse to pay his portion of the cost of paving the lot--he now is charging the city rent for using the lot for parking.

Most of the federal bureaucracies purchase new furniture and equipment whenever they feel they need it, although one commentator pointed out that most of the agencies have warehouses with millions of dollars worth of furniture stored away.

Government agencies need to begin to run their bureaus like they were a business. If they exceed their budget, they should be halted until time for another allotment. Americans should be feeling sick and tired of footing the bill for mismanagement.

This Friday, residents are scheduled to receive their 1980 census forms in the mail. Please take time to fill them out, as the population of the Bovina area will be based on this figure for the next ten years.

Depending on your instructions, you will either mail back the form on April 1, or hold it until a census taker picks it up.

A number of things are affected by the census count, so we need to be sure that every man, woman and child is counted.

Speaker for the banquet was Mike Ditka, coach of receivers and special teams for the Dallas Cowboys.

Clubs Seek Girlstown Aid

The District Lions Clubs, including Dimmitt, Bovina and Friona, are seeking donations of money or needed items for Girlstown U.S.A. located four miles east of Borger, which was damaged by fire recently, according to John Brooks of Dimmitt, Zone Chairman.

Damages from the fire, which broke out in a combination office and storage building early Saturday, have been placed at over \$225,000. Tentative blame has been placed on an electrical short in the ceiling of the building.

Superintendent Robert Wilson said that although replacement needs are many, "What we need right now is money. We could wait for a few weeks or a month for donations of material, but things were destroyed which need replacing immediately."

Wilson said that all of the school supplies for the remainder of the year were destroyed, along with spring and summer clothing for the 17 girls in

residence.

A beef which was being stored in a freezer in the building was also destroyed, as well as a number of hand tools, and virtually all of the girls' personal possessions which weren't in the cottages. Also destroyed were all of the linen supplies, sheets, pillow cases, blankets, towels, office equipment and records.

One of the most immediate needs are school supplies and clothing.

"We have a lot of faith in the people of the Panhandle," Wilson said. "They've come through for us before, and we know they will again."

None of the loss was covered by insurance because of the high premium rates for insurance in a rural area where Girlstown is located.

Patterson Working On Shorter Season

Commissioner Jack Patterson, who also is president of the Parmer County Game Association, has been busy during the past few weeks working to oppose the 30-day pheasant season.

Patterson attended the convention of the West Texas County Judges and Commissioners Assn. in San Angelo, where he had an opportunity to call the problem to the attention of Governor Bill Clements.

Clements told Patterson that he would talk to the Parks and Wildlife Commission members, and ask them to listen to the residents of the Panhandle in regard to the season.

"You as residents of the area know what is best for you, and you as representatives of the people know what they are wanting in regard to the situation," Clements told Patterson.

The Parmer County official also had an opportunity to visit with state Attorney-General Mark White concerning the season.

Patterson plans to meet with the Parks and Wildlife Commission in Austin on April 18 at 9 a.m. "I was told that unless someone went to their meeting, that the tape recordings we made at the hearing in Farwell might just be ignored by the Parks and Wildlife people.

"So, I plan to go to Austin, and hope to take a car-load of county residents with me, to speak against the extended season," Patterson says.

Telephone Co-op Meeting Set Mar. 27

The annual meeting of the West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative will be held Thursday, March 27 at 6 p.m. at the Bull Barn in Hereford.

Registration and dinner begins at 6 p.m., with the business session to follow at 7 p.m.

Three directors will be elected to the organization's board of directors. Candidates include (Tharp exchange) Jimmie Cockerham and Gregg Wilson, (Westway) Ernest Brown and Jimmy Bradley and (Milo Center) Carl Straßus and Bobby Veigel.

Patterson has been securing signatures of county residents, stating their preference as to the pheasant season. The petitions are located at First State Bank, Bovina Gin, Agri-Sprayers, Sherley Grain and the Bovina Blade. There is space for the person to sign, and then to check their preference for a 30-day, 16-day or nine-day hunting season.

Patterson said he also was accepting donations to pay for the expenses of the group which will go to Austin. Anyone wishing to contribute to the fund may leave it at First State Bank in Bovina or at Friona State Bank in Friona.

"I have not found a single person who is in favor of the 30-day pheasant season. I'm afraid that this (the extended season) may cause some problems to develop, between the hunters and the farmers.

"It just doesn't make sense that we went from a two-day season 16 years ago to a 30-day season," Patterson concluded.

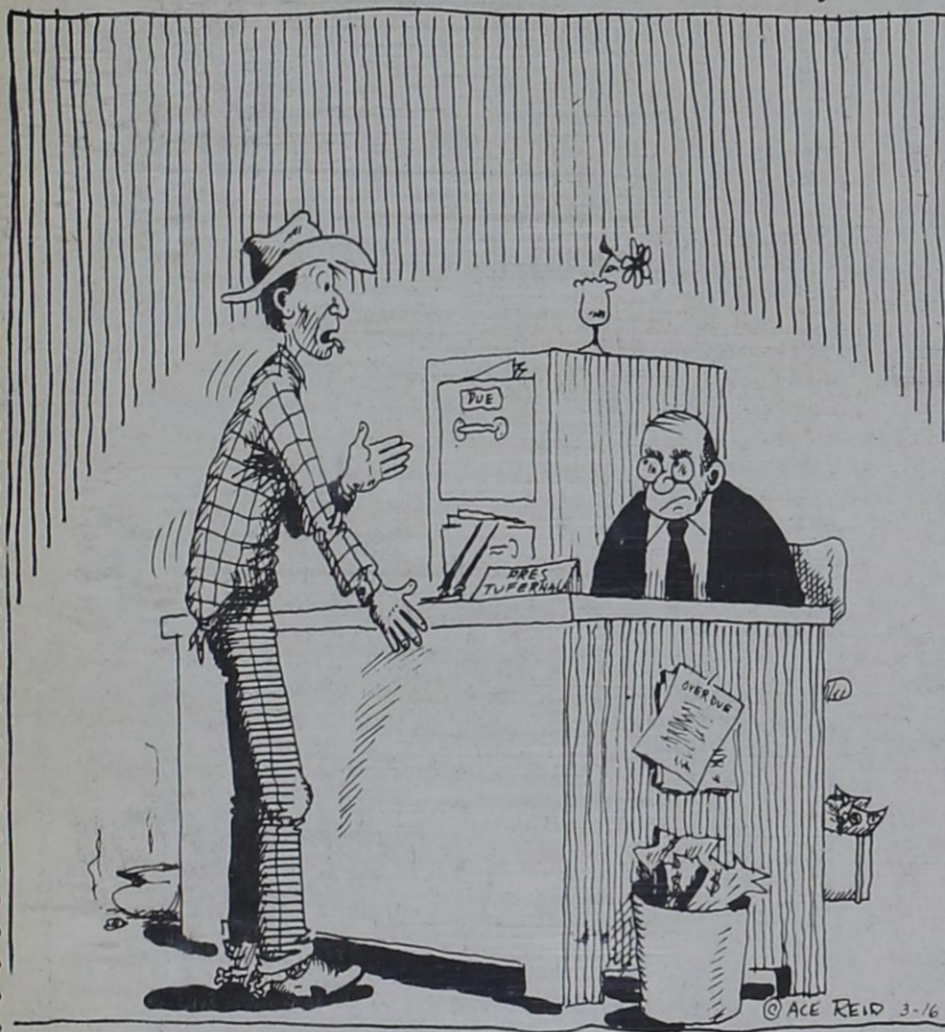

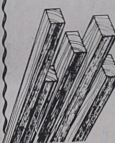


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Scooter's Scoops

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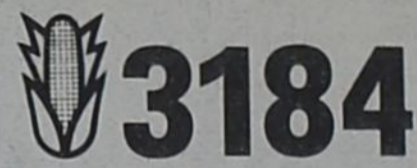
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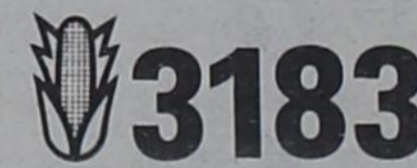
