FOOT-IN-MOUTH department: Last week at the state basketball tournament at Austin, the head coach at Dime Box had some choice quotes before his team played Nazareth for the Class 1A state championship.

Dime Box was eventually no slouch, with a 31-1 record entering the title game. The team liked to run and gun, having averaged 73.5 points per game, scoring 100 points or more in five games enroute to the state tournament.

The Dime Box coach told the media he thought his team would score a lot of points against Nazareth, which had been limiting playoff teams to only 35 points per game.

"I noticed they (Nazareth) shoot the ball well when nobody is on them. I just wonder how they'll do on the way pressure," stated the Dime Box coach, Ben Collins.

Nazareth, which lost five games this season, but four of them were to class 5A teams Lubbock Monterey and Amarillo High, quietly demolished Dime Box in the state finals on Saturday. The final score was 64-37. It was only the third time all season that Dime Box had been held to 50 points or less.

Oh, yes, prior to Saturday's game, Coach Collins also had said: "We play good defense, too." They had caused 15 turnovers in their state semi-final game.

You'd think that the outspoken coach would have been silent following the 27-point loss in the state finals, wouldn't you? Oh, no. He had one more gem: "To be honest, on a good night for us, we could have beaten them. I don't know, maybe we were a little tight..."

Actions, someone once said, speak louder than words. It was the sixth straight title for the Nazareth girls, a new record.

Vital Ag Meeting Is March 11

The Bovina Chamber of Commerce and First State Bank and other lenders in the Bovina area have evaluated the farm sector of the U.S. Economy, and found it teetering on the brink of a depression reminiscent of the 1930's.

"The outlook for farm income and profitability has gone beyond dismal and would have to be termed catastrophic. Net farm income in 1980 fell to about \$20 billion, down sharply from 1978 and 1979, but when this \$20 billion is adjusted for inflation, farmers received less in income than they have at any time since 1934," said one of the agricultural leaders.

The purpose of this meeting is to form an alliance and political force between the American farmer and businessmen in an effort to stimulate influence in Washington and ultimately create a more favorable economic climate for both farmers and businessmen.

A meeting will be held on Thursday, March 11, 1982 in Bovina High School Auditorium at 7 p.m., to discuss the farm situation. Everyone is urged to attend this vitally important meeting.

Although the list of speakers is rather long, this will not be a lengthy meeting.

Speakers for the meeting will be: Ted Godfrey, Pete Laney, state representative; Bill Clayton, Speaker of the House of Representatives and retiring state representative from this district; Dick White, vice president of Martin-Haley Company, and Marvin Meek, president of American Agriculture Movement.

Bond Issue Called For Water Needs

The City of Bovina has called a \$210,000 bond election for Saturday, April 3, for proposed improvements to the city's water system.

The city's water supply has been nip and tuck since the summer of 1980 when severe shortages were noted. Then, this past week one of the city's two main producing wells developed a problem, severely cutting the daily production of water for Bovina residents.

If the bond issue passes, the money will be used to drill a new well, build a 300,000-gallon ground water storage tank, and extend lines so as to form a loop in the water distribution system and improve the pressure throughout the city.

The city well on Eighth Street developed a problem when the casing split below the water level.

"We think the well can be salvaged, to where it will continue to produce, but if it could not be saved, the well on Ninth Street would be our main source of water, and there is no way it could keep the city supplied with water," City Manager Tommy Bonds said this week.

In all, there are four wells supplying water for the city, but two of them, on Santa Fe property, produce less than 100 gallons per minute between them. These wells, which the city leases from Santa Fe for a minimum yearly charge, were drilled during the 1920s.

The well on Eighth Street was drilled in the late 1950s, and has been a good producer. It uses a four-inch submersible pump, and has been an

economical well for the city. The well on Ninth Street was drilled in 1966, and is also considered a good well.

The additional water storage is a vital part of the bond issue. At the present time, the city has 480,000 gallons of storage, including the 80,000-gallon tank it leases from Santa Fe.

This present storage represents less than one-half of the daily water usage for the city during the summer months, when daily usage often

reaches 1 1/2 million gallons per day. Even in the winter, the present storage gives the city less than a two-day supply of water, hardly enough of a backlog in case of wet trouble.

Bonds said that the city avoided trouble during the summer of 1981, helped along by more rainfall than the previous summer.

"The wells would catch up by pumping all night, and then the residents would use the supply up during the daytime," the city manager said.

In 1980, although there was no ration program as such, there were times when the school was asked to curtail its watering of lawns and football field. The city also cut back on watering the cemetery and park that summer, and the Highway Department was asked to curtail its water use.

Situation Termed Critical

"Our water situation is extremely critical. We will have to have some luck to get through the coming summer as well as we did last year," said Bonds, who indicated that due to the amount of red tape required to drill a municipal well, it was doubtful that if the bond issue carries, that any of the improvements can be made by this summer.

The passage of the bond issue will not affect ad valorem taxes, but might be reflected in water rates. This has not been ascertained at this time.

City officials have been told by the FHA that money has been set aside for the project in the event that the bond issue carries. City officials were to meet with FHA officials in Amarillo this week to further discuss the situation.

The city proposes to drill the new well on property it owns on First Street, near the cemetery. The water depth is expected to be good in that location, and also would help the water system's pressure.

Project Cost Explained

The city officials pointed out that it costs about twice as much to drill a municipal well as it does to drill an irrigation well, which accounts for the size of the bond issue. When a municipal well is drilled, it has to be gravel-packed, and must meet specifications not required of irrigation wells.

Bonds said city officials are hoping for a six-inch well which would produce in the neighborhood of 550 gallons per minute.

The bond issue was called by the city council at their regular meeting Saturday, March 6. This was the main item of business on the agenda.

In other business, the city's tax rate was set at 55 cents per \$100 evaluation.

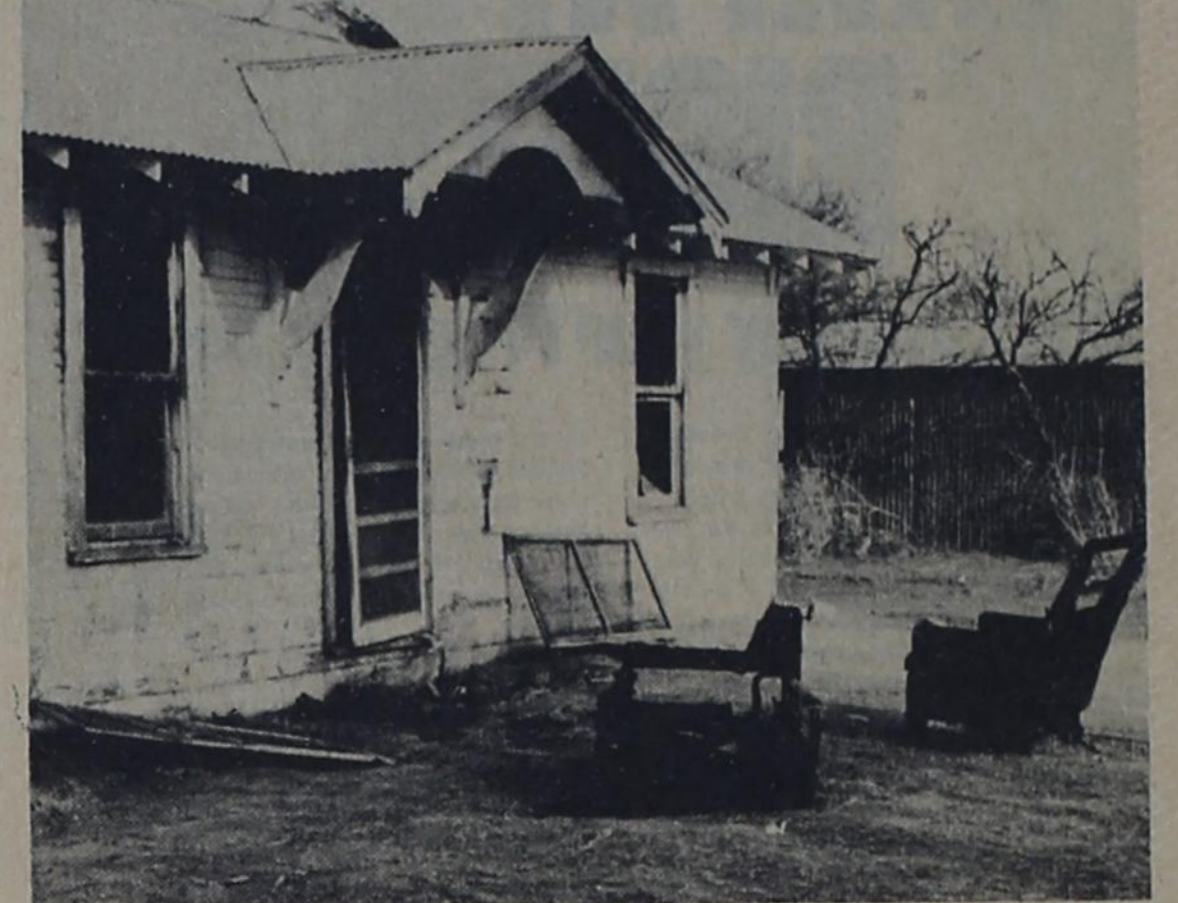
Martin and his wife are the parents of two sons.

Commissioners Okay Radio For Sheriff

The county commissioners, meeting in regular session last

A request from Friona State Bank, asking approval of substitution of securities, was approved. The prior securities, in the amount of \$25,000, was a municipal bond which was maturing.

A bill was approved on insurance coverage on all county vehicles, in the amount of \$9,383.

A motion was approved to approve a contract between the county appraisal district and Perdue, Brandon, Blair and Fielder for the collection of delinquent taxes owed the county.

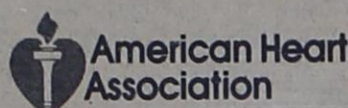

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TAXPAYERS' RIGHTS.

Don't overpay your Property Taxes.

The Texas property tax system provides certain rights and remedies for property owners. The law also offers tax relief measures to qualified taxpayers. But they do not go into effect automatically; you must apply for them by May 1. To help you understand your rights as a taxpayer, the State Property Tax Board has prepared a free pamphlet, *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities*, available from your new county appraisal district or local tax office. The publication will help you understand the types of exemptions that are available and what you must do to obtain them if you qualify.

Rendition
One way to assert your rights as a taxpayer is to render your property. This means filling out a rendition statement at the appraisal district office, telling tax officials what you believe the value of your property should be. When you render, the appraisal district or appraisal review board must officially notify you if the value of your property is increased over the amount you rendered.

General Homestead Exemption
If you qualify for a residence homestead exemption, you are entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the appraised value of your home for school tax purposes, and a \$3,000 exemption for the portion of county taxes levied for farm-to-market roads or flood control. Some jurisdictions may offer an additional exemption of a percentage of the value of your homestead.

Exemptions for the Elderly
If you are 65 or over, you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the appraised value of your residence homestead for school taxes. And, when you apply and qualify for this exemption, the school tax bill cannot increase on your home, unless you make additions or improvements to it.

Disabled
If you are disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption, you are

entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the appraised value of your home for school taxes. Other taxing jurisdictions may offer optional exemptions. All jurisdictions offer an exemption for certain disabled veterans on one designated property.

Farmers and Ranchers
If you qualify, your agricultural or open-space land may be taxed at its productivity value instead of market value. Certain farming implements and machines may also qualify for exemption.

Tax exemptions and special valuations are not effective automatically. Applications should be made this year before May 1 to your new county appraisal district, or to local tax offices in appraisal districts which have postponed implementation. Check with the appraisal district or local tax offices to find out where to apply for tax relief.

While late applications for exemptions may be accepted in some instances, the burden and expense of proving a good reason for filing late rests on the taxpayer. You can avoid any inconvenience and fully protect your rights and access to remedies as a taxpayer by applying for exemptions and rendering your property before May 1.
