
Broncos Stumble In Semis

That Celina and Sonora should meet to decide the true State Champion. A year later these two traditions did collide; not to decide a state title; but to decide one of this year's participants of the State 2A Division II Championship. Among all the hype and hoopla, this game may not of had the outcome that the Bronco faithful wanted, but it did live up to all the expectations. A capacity plus crowd was treated to the well oiled machine from Celina and the "never say die" attitude of the homegrown team from Sonora. Being down twenty-one points midway through the second quarter, the men dressed in all red could have easily told the coach to start the bus. What they did, was to tighten their chin straps one more notch and come out with all guns blazing. Gaining respect at every turn; the Broncos, though not victorious were able to leave the football field in Stephenville on Friday with new found respect. Not only from the Bronco faithful, but also from the fans and team dressed in orange and

The Bronco Express led by team captains: Sean Fields, Chance Armke, Stetson Hall, William Renfro, and Thomas Bloodworth; along with the rest of the seniors: James Elliott, Beau Hughes, Byron Williams, Ricky Lumbreras, Brandon Adkins, Tan Cade, Thomas Homra, and Jerimy Brown have nothing to hang their heads about.

After losing two games earlier in the season; many wondered how far this 2001 football team would go in the play-offs. Many never thought that this team would get to the Semi-Final game against the

When two good athletic teams meet; traditionally the one who makes the fewest mistakes comes out the victor. Friday's game in Stephenville proved to be no excep-

The Broncos turning the ball over three times to the Bobcats near perfect game proved to be the ultimate difference.

After winning the toss, the Broncos elected to receive the opening kick-off. An excellent return by

Sean Fields would set the Bronco offense up at their own thirty-four. An overly aggressive Bobcat defense led by Ross Roby would force the Red Hosses to punt the ball after three plays and only gaining eight yards. The Bobcat offense would meet with the same aggressive style on their first possession. Thomas Bloodworth, James Elliott, and Dustin Martin would lead the Broncos in limiting Celina to six yards; thus forcing them to punt. Sonora's first miscue would occur on the first play of their second drive. After gaining seven yards, William Renfro struggling for more was stripped of the football with Celina's defensive end, Landry Scott, coming up with the pigskin at the Bronco thirty-two. After a good gain by Celina's tailback, Adam Harvey, the Bronco defense settled into their "Bend but not Break" mode. At the Sonora eighteen; Celina was faced with a fourth and eight. Going to the play action passing game; Celina quarterback, Jordan Martin, would find one of his halfbacks, Josh Sharrock, all alone at the Bronco six. From that point, Sharrock would stroll into the endzone for the Bobcats first score. Ben May would add the PAT to give the Bobcats a seven point lead with

Starting at their own thirty, Sonora primarily used the running of William Renfro to advance the

ball down the field. Renfro, along with a run by Dustin Martin and a pass from Scottie Moore to James Elliott would move the ball to the Bobcat thirty-eight. Celina's defense led by Ross Roby, Ryan Conner, and Jordan Martin would slow the Bronco progress and force them into a fourth and long situation with only five seconds left in the first quarter. A tremendous rush and excellent secondary coverage by Celina would force the Broncos to turn the ball over on downs. For the next four minutes Celina would use their 215+ lb. halfback, Adam Harvey, as a battering ram to cram the ball down the Broncos throat. As they neared the goal line, Josh Sharrock, a 180+ lb. halfback, took over for Harvey and advanced the ball to the Bronco four. At the four, Martin would go to the air again. This time he would find his tight end, Zach Walsh, unattended for the touchdown. May would add the PAT to give the Bobcats a fourteen point advantage. Celina 14

Sonora 0. Needing something to happen, the Broncos went to the air on their next possession. This happening was not what the Broncos had wanted. A miscommunication between Elliott and Moore resulted in the Broncos second turnover. On the overthrow, Bobcat safety, Ross Roby, easily intercepted the pass at the fifty and returned it to the Bronco thirty-six. Using less than two minutes and five plays; Celina

Drive Safe Over The Holidays

Fortunately, prior thought and planning can alleviate travel stress and avoid potential problems. The DPS offers Texas motorists the following tips.

Drinking and driving don't mix. Never drive after consuming alcohol. Plan for a designated driver, or call for a cab.

Slow down. Driving over the

speed limit was the cause of 562 traffic deaths in 1999 alone. Inclement weather provides enough of a driving challenge without adding speed to the mix.

Increase your awareness. Driving on icy or wet roadways requires even greater caution. Navigate bridges and overpasses with care - they're the first areas to freeze when the temperature drops. Most people forget that ice can be difficult to see.


Always wear your seatbelt, and ensure everyone in the vehicle is buckled in.

Plan your trip carefully, even if it's to only go to the store. Be sure to allow enough time to make the trip safely. Be prepared for delays. Haste can cause crashes.

Upon a motion by Sherrill Dannheim, seconded by Lewis Allen, the Board approved the regular meeting minutes of November 12, 2001.

DPS Clarifies Roadside Assistance Hotline

The public needs to be aware that an erroneous e-mail is being circulated about the Texas Department of Public Safety Roadside Assistance Hotline.

The toll-free line has been operated by DPS since 1989 for motorists to use when reporting non-life-threatening situations on Texas roads and highways.

DPS then passes the information along to the appropriate local police agency or DPS office. If a tow truck is ultimately dispatched, the motorist is responsible for any costs incurred. Some cities and agencies do have courtesy patrols and roadside trucks to provide nontowing services and they may be dispatched by the local agencies when appropriate. These two points are misrepresented in the widely-circulated e-mail that has led to an increase in inquiries to the Roadside Assistance Hotline.

The number, 1-800-525-5555, is printed on the back of virtually all Texas driver licenses and identification cards. Customers of participating wire-

companies--ALLTEL. less Nextel, Cingular Wireless, Houston Cellular and Verizon Wireless--can dial *DPS (*377) free of airtime charges anywhere in Texas.

Examples of when a motorist should call the Roadside Assistance Hotline include: stranded with car problems, hazardous road conditions, debris in the roadway, suspicious activity at a rest area, and obviously intoxicated or dangerous drivers.

The Roadside Assistance Hotline is not intended to replace 911 as an emergency number; 911 should still be the first option for emergency situations.

To better assist our communications operators please have the following information ready: Your name, cell phone number (and vehicle description

applicable); Highway location (mile marker would be helpful); and County location, or city

location if inside city limits.



Ask the Historical Society

by Jo-Ann E. Palmer, Secretary O. Do you have anything on the death of Gotthold Huber in 1901?

A. Devil's River News, June 29, 1901 - Gotthold Huber, aged 32 years died at San Angelo, Texas, June 26, 1901. Deceased was formerly a sheep raiser on the North Llano and was well known to the people of the Sonora country. Death resulted from an attack of Typhoid fever and an operation for appendicitis. Deceased leaves a wife and two children to mourn his loss. His aged parents live in New York state.

Fairmount Cemetery in San Angelo has records stating that he was born in 1868 and died in 1901 and is buried in Block 81 II, row 2. Devil's River News of July 6, 1901 has a memorial from the Local Camp No 179 of Sonora Texas Woodmen of the World, regarding the passing of Sovereign Gotthold Huber.

In the same issue we found the following: A Great Northern express train was held up on July 3rd by three masked men near Great Falls, Montana, and \$83,000 taken from the express car. The authorities offer \$5,000 reward for the capture of the bandits.

E. R. Jackson, administrator of the estate of Will Carver, sold at public auction to the highest bidder last Saturday the effects of the late out-law. G. W. Morris bought his old dun horse for \$40; R. S. Caruthers the big bay for \$65; Abe Mayer the little sorrel for \$60 and J. C. Hewes the brown horse for \$55. H. G. Sharp bought the silver mounted six shooter for \$32.50; E. R. Jackson the five shooter for \$6; Coleman Whitfield the watch for \$30; Jim Hewes the compass for \$2; E. R. Jackson the diamond ring for \$125; Forest Stewart the saddle and bridle for \$14.50. Lee Aldwell did all the talking and all the articles brought good prices and in most instances more than they were

In Denison, Texas on June 27th Judge Pearson of that city established a precedent which has caused a sensation. All the saloon men arrested for violating the Sunday law were discharged, the judge holding that all are equal under the law and that a saloon man has just as much right to conduct business on Sunday as those in the fruit, drug and other lines of

L. B. Earnest, an old miner, is in Sonora from Llano and has staked out his mining claim in Jo Parkers pasture, about 5 miles west of Sonora. He has had assayed surface specimens of the rock by A. M. Beam of Denver, Colorado and they agree in the assay that the rock contains 64 percent of zinc, some small quantities of gold, silver and copper. Miners at Llano say the specimens from the Sonora country are the finest they have seen and quantity is all that is wanted.

In the June 29,1901 Devil's River News we found the following of interest: J. T. Gurley, "Uncle Joe" as he was familiarly and affectionately called by most everyone died from

On the June 23 picnic excursion of the Knights of Labor to Las Cruces, N.M. by train, a row started in one of the cars just as the train was ready to start and Perry Greer, a prominent saloon and ranchman of El Paso, was instantly killed. It seems that some differences came up

between the men at the picnic grounds about the union labor strikes in El Paso. When the men reached the cars the row was renewed and a number of pistol shots were fired. A New Mexico Deputy Sheriff fired one shot into the crowd and when the shooting ceased Greer was found dead on the floor and several others were wounded slightly. It is not yet known who fired the shot that killed Greer. The occasion was the annual outing of the Knights of Labor lodge of El Paso and several hundred attended from there. Perry Greer, the dead man, was formerly engaged in the cattle business in Marfa. Seven men were arrested.

Noah Rose, the photo artist, while waiting for materials this week, being without a girl and having no way to pass the time off, got out a pretty little souvenir of his business. The front cover is a half tone of "Genevieve," a picture taken by Noah at Wichita Falls and published in the Professional Photographer of Buffalo, New York. On the back cover is "Child Study" also taken at the Falls and published in the Professional Photographer. These half tones are printed in green, with a purple and gold border and the effect is pretty. Between the covers he gives testimonials and good words spoken by the newspaper fraternity, in a neat little pamphlet.

"Come, Thou long-expected Jesus, Born to set Thy people free; From our fears and sins release us; Let us find our rest in Thee."



When I was growing up, my parents didn't have lot of money. I was nearly twelve before I realized that not all moms and dads hold

down two or three jobs a piece. I know my parents must have dreaded Christmas. When you're little, everybody's quick to tell you that Santa Claus brings toys only to good little boys and girls. If you don't get much under the tree on Christmas morning, you must have done something to get on the wrong

side of Santa. A tree was a luxury we couldn't always afford at Christmas. But, until the year I turned ten, there were always presents.

That year, 1964, things were harder than usual. By then our family had grown to include five children, including me. My dad would stay up late at night, adding, subtracting, and dividing the bills in a crazy kind of math that never gave him the answers he wanted. About two weeks before Christmas, my mom took me aside. "Henry," she said, "you're the oldest, so you should know what's happening. It looks like we're not going to be able to buy any presents this year. I need you to help your brothers and sisters understand." I nodded, but inside I was worried. How do you tell a five year old that Santa won't be coming

The next two weeks went faster than I would have wanted. Suddenly, it was Christmas, Eve. That evening, my mom made her famous tamales and bunellas. Dad read the Christmas story, and we sang a few songs. But I noticed my brothers and sisters weren't as excit-ed as usual. They'd been warned days before that there were lots of

kids in the world, and the North Pole toy factory was having a hard time making all of the toys.

The next morning, as I was just waking up, I heard my brother Nate shout. I ran into the next room. There, in the corner, was a Christmas tree, standing about four feet tall with shiny red, blue and yellow balls on it. But that wasn't what surprised me the most. Under the tree were presents! There were new coats, games, and dolls for my sis-Somehow, my parents had found the money for Santa to come. My throat tightened as I thought about the extra shifts mom must have taken, and the nights when dad could barely sleep before heading off to the next job.

Now, thirty seven Christmases later, my son and daughter have never gone to sleep on Christmas Eve afraid that Santa's forgotten them. But that doesn't mean we haven't tried to show them what it's like for other children who aren't as lucky as they are. Every year, Project ABC (Any Baby Can) here in San Antonio matches us with a family that doesn't have enough money to give their kids the Christmas they deserve. The families that Project ABC helps all have children with expensive medical problems. One year, our family was matched with a family that had a boy my son's age who had muscular dystrophy. Our family goes out and buys presents we think the children (and their parents) will like. We also bring them everyday things like

canned food or pots and pans.

We're not the only family who plays Santa. Today, there are dozens of charities that try to make sure that "all" good girls and boys have a Merry Christmas. They do it not because of some rule or regulation the government has passed. They do it because they care about their fellow Americans. They are what Christmas and our country are all


7th Grade Lady Colts Soar Over Wall



Turner and Legislature Supporting Economic Development

AUSTIN -- Rep. Bob Turner (D-Voss) said that during the legislative session this past spring, Texas lawmakers passed legislation to help provide working families with more job opportunities, pro-mote economic development, and assist workers.

'We took some steps this past session that will allow us to provide more educational and job training programs so we can have a better skilled and qualified workforce," Turner said. "We are also currently working on further reducing unemployment specific to rural areas."

Rep. Turner said that with the current national economic situation, it is important that Texas continue to support business, workers, and economic development. Last session, the legislature worked to give businesses and workers the tools to improve Texas' economy.

To encourage more businesses to open in Texas, the legislature approved the Texas Economic Development Act. The act gives local officials the option to negotiate limitations on property taxes for businesses to compete with economic incentives offered by other states. Businesses are required to meet strict criteria, and the program provides local control so the specific needs of the community are addressed.

"Local authorities need to be able to attract large-scale capital investments," Turner said. "The legislation we passed empowers them with the ability to help create more job opportunities.

Rep. Turner said that workers and businesses in Texas will benefit from a substantial legislative overhaul of the workers' compensation insurance system. The changes the Texas allow Workers' Compensation Commission (TWCC) to more effectively regulate the medical care in the system to lower medical costs and time missed from work, as well as increase patient and health care provider satisfaction.

Rep. Turner also said that to help cities and local governments promote economic development, lawmakers created the Better Jobs Act. Under the plan, cities with voter approval are able to use sales tax revenue to fund economic development projects, including job training, early childhood development, after-school programs, literacy classes that provide childcare, and scholarships. Rep. Turner added that any money a city chooses to invest in childcare programs would also be eligible to draw down additional local-match federal childcare funding.

"Achieving long-term economic progress for rural Texas is very important to me and our current House leadership," Turner said. "Being able to coordinate our efforts with those of community and business leaders will help us obtain our goals and ensure future economic success."

RRC: Colder **Temperatures Mean Propane Appliance** Safety Reminders For **Texans**

(Austin)-Texas Commission Chairman Michael L. Williams, Commissioner Charles R. Matthews, and Commissioner Tony Garza today reminded Texans of winter propane safety procedures now that colder temperatures have arrived.

"Most of the state received the season's first blast of winter weather recently," said Chairman Williams. "And while the drasticdrop in the temperature came as a surprise to some, it means now is the perfect time to make sure every member of your family is up to speed on propane safety.'

"An estimated one-half million Texas homes use efficient propane as their primary energy source," Commissioner Matthews said. "Knowing what to do if you smell propane and think you may have a leak will insure reliability and safety for you and your family this win-

"Knowing in advance what to do if you smell a propane leak is critical to ensuring your safety, Garza added. "Texans should familiarize themselves with basic safety guidelines and have their propane equipment regularly inspected by a trained service technician."

If you think you smell propane in your home, camper, RV or the area around any gas equipment, or if a gas alarm signals the presence of propane, the Texas Railroad Commission suggests that you immediately:

* Extinguish all smoking materials and any other open flames or sources of ignition.

* Vacate the building, vehicle or area. Move everyone away without using any electric switches, appliances, thermostats, or telephones.

* Close the supply valve on the propane tank or cylinder. Turn the valve to the right as far as it will go.

* Call your propane supplier and/or your local fire department from a cellular telephone or a neighbor's telephone.

* Even if you do not continue to smell propane, do not open or turn on the propane supply valve. Do not re-enter the building, camper or RV or area. Let a qualified propane service technician and/or emergency personnel check for escaped propane.

Have a properly trained propane service technician repair any leaks detected. The service or emergency technician should determine that the leak situation has been fully resolved. The propane service technician should check all of your gas appliances and re-light any appliance pilots.

* Return to the building, camper, RV or area only when the service or emergency technician indicates it is safe to do so.

To help consumers properly use propane-fueled appliances, the Railroad Commission of Texas offers a free safety brochure entitled "Home Safe Home." Copies are available in both English and Spanish and can be obtained by the Railroad contacting Commission's Alternative Fuels Research and Education Division toll-free at 1-800-64-CLEAR [1-800-642-5327].





Butler reported that the Accounts Receivable was down from October. He advised that at the present time, the Business Office is cleaning up the Accounts Receivable and anything over 120 days is going to the Collection Agency or civil action will be taken. He went on to advised that with the current work being done on the A/R, that it would continue to go down. Butler stated that with the current clean up, that all accounts should not be over 90 days old before col-

lection process begins.

Butler advised that the Hospital Auxiliary had a rummage sale on Friday, with donations of items from the Hospital, Auxiliary members and Community members. The sale had produced over \$1800, which will go towards the purchase of two recliner/sleepers for the patient rooms in the Hospital.

Butler reported that renovation on the lobby and registration area of the Hospital has been completed and re-opened and everyone was given a

Butler advised that when the Hospital became a Critical Access Hospital that the per diem rate per day was set by the data from the 1999 cost report. Data has been submitted to CMS for them to use the 2000 cost report figures, which would increase the per diem rate to approximately \$1100 per day.

Mrs. Knight gave the financial report for October. She reported that the Hospital had \$131,515 in total patient revenues, with \$104,092 in total operating revenue. The operating expenses for October were \$156,202, which was \$52,807.29 under budget. As of October, the Hospital is \$484,126 under budget.

The Board stated to Mr. Butler that the renovation of the lobby and registration office was very nice. With no further business, the meeting was adjourned.
