### City Council **Approves Fire** Marshall



Mayor Hernandez opened the council meeting at 2:00 p.m.



#### Ask the Historical Society

Q. Do you have any information on a former U.S. Marshall of the Western District of Texas named Ware? He supposedly had dealings with Sam Bass

A. Devil's River News, July 5, 1902 - Fort Worth, Texas, June 26 -Richard C. Ware, familiarly known as "Dick" Ware, one of the most prominent citizens of West Texas, died at the hospital here this morning of a complication of diseases. He had been in poor health for the past three or four months and his case was regarded as a hopeless one by the attending physicians some weeks ago. His home was at Colorado City, and had large cattle interests in Mitchell and other counties in the western part of the State.

He was 50 years of age and was born in Georgia. He had been a resident of Texas for over thirty years and was for fourteen years Sheriff of Mitchell County. After resigning from the State Ranger service. He was for five years United States Marshall of the Western District under the Cleveland administration. The deceased distinguished himself as a gallant and fearless officer in his efforts to capture the notorious train robber and desperado, Sam Bass, who operated in Texas in the early days and who was finally killed by Capt. Ware at Round Rock in 1878 in a desperate battle. The deceased leaves a father, B. T. Ware, of Amarillo, and two brothers. B. T. Ware of Amarillo and Charles L. Ware of this city, and a sister, Mrs. Carter, of Colorado

Let's take a look at what else was going on in July of 1902 -Washington, June 30, - Senator Bailey of Texas and Senator

personal encounter in the senate chamber shortly after adjournment this evening. No damage was done, Senator Bailey had his hands around Senator Bevenridge's throat when Assistant Doorkeeper Layton, Senator Spooner and others forced him away. The Indian made no effort to defend himself and remained in his seat smoking a cigar after Senator Bailey left the chamber. Thus, for the present at least, the incident is closed.

From Springs, 300 miles northeast of El Paso, comes the story of a fight between "Bud" Lee, who claims to be a descendant of the Virginia Lees, and a gang of cowboys who sought his life. Eight cowboys attempted to ambush Lee and his companion, a man eighty years old, but the two men heard of the plot. The dispute arose over Lee watering his herd of cattle at the springs, the claim being made that they spoiled the only watering place for miles around. The battle was with long-range repeating rifles and Lee killed five of the cowboys and put the other three to flight. Lee has surrendered to the sheriff.



At Mayfield Mercantile Co there was a huge Sale for Cash in order to reduce their immense stock of dry goods, etc. You could get 35 yards of good calico or 25 yards of better grade or 20 yards of oil calico for \$1. Men and boys \$15 suits were on sale for \$10 and you could get a dress shirt for 50 cents. You could get 100 pounds of high patent flour for \$2.10.

I guess people weren't paying their bills at the Devil's River News because we found the following -We look into a cradle and behold a male child. 

#### EMT Course To Be Offered

An Emergency Medical Technician-Basic (EMT-B) course will be offered in Sonora beginning January 10, 2002 through May 9, 2002. The course will be sponsored by Sutton County EMS.

The EMT course provides emergency medical training in such areas as bleeding and shock, cardiopulmonary resuscitation, emergency childbirth, pediatric care and other emergency illness and trauma.

While attending the course, the student will be required to spend twenty-four (24) hours in the emergency department at San Angelo Community Medical Center. It is also necessary to make five (5) ambulance runs with a certified ambulance provider.

Upon completion of the course, a student will be trained to work for public or private ambulance firms, and in some hospital emergency

departments.

EMT Courses normally cost approximately \$300.00 to \$500.00 per person, but Sutton County EMS will make this course available at \$50.00, which includes the cost of the book. The cost of the course has been reduced due to additional funding from the Concho Valley Regional Advisory Council and from a Critical Access Hospital -Rural EMS Education Grant acquired through Lillian Memorial Hudspeth Hospital.

## Dairy Queen Graduated Driver License Program

The Graduated Driver License Program, created by Senate Bill 577 in 2001, goes into effect January 1, 2002. The program creates two phases of driving requirements for minors under age 18.

**Grandfather Clause** 

Any individual who receives either their instruction permit or provisional license before January 1, 2002 will not be affected by the new graduated system. They are grandfathered out of all phases of the new graduated system.

**Phase One Requirements** Applicants under age 18 must hold an instruction permit or hardship license for a minimum of six months before a provisional license is issued. Once the applicant has completed this phase and meets all other current licensing require-ments, they "graduate" to phase two -a provisional license with restrictions. (See "Phase Two Requirements" below for details). \* The minimum age for the licensed operator required to accompany an instruction permit holder in the front passenger seat increases from 18 to

**Phase One Enforcement** 

\* Street enforcement of phase one will begin in a limited fashion January 1, but only for permits issued after January 1.

\* Initially, the permit will be stamped to better assist patrol officers in determining if the new 21or-over provision for licensees accompanying permit holders applies. This will eventually be replaced by language on the permit itself. If the permit does not specify the 21-or-over provision, the old standard of 18-or-over will still apply and enforcement action may not be applicable.

**Phase Two Requirements** Once the applicant has held a driving permit for six months, completes an approved driver education course and reaches their 16th birthday, they are eligible to progress to phase two—a provisional license. In phase two, driving privileges of provisional licensees are restricted for the first six months of issuance. During that six-month period, the applicant may not:

\* have more than one passenger under 21 years of age who is not a family member, or

\* operate a vehicle after midnight and before 5 a.m., unless driving is necessary for employment, school or school-related activities or a medical emergency.

Please note that the passenger and time limitations in phase two do not apply if the provisional license holder is accompanied by a licensed operator age 21 or older in the front

Phase Two Enforcement

\* Since applicants must have an instruction permit for six months under the new law, patrol enforcephase two restricment of tions will not begin until July 1,

\* Officers must look on the back of the license to determine if enforcement is appropriate. The language under the restriction code will state "TRC 545.424 applies until MMD-DYY." If that date has passed or there is no entry, enforcement action is not necessary.

Miscellaneous: \* A law officer cannot use this law

as probable cause for a traffic stop. \* The legal driving age in Texas remains 16. (An applicant may still apply for an instruction permit at

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#### RRC Set Texas Gas Production Allowables For January\_

(AUSTIN) Railroad Commission Chairman Michael L. Williams, Commissioner Charles R. Matthews, and Commissioner Tony Garza today set January 2002 natural gas production allowables for prorated fields in the state to meet market demand of 31,265,597 Mcf (thousand cubic feet).

For these fields, the January 2002 allowable represents a decrease of 3,069,538 Mcf when compared to actual production of 34,335,135 Mcf in January 2001. In setting the January 2002 allowable, the Commission used historical production figures from January 2001 and producer forecasts for the January 2002 demand, and then adjusted the figures to account for such factors as well capability, new wells in a field, etc.

Texas natural gas storage reported by the Commission for the January 24, 2001 at 9:30 a.m.

month of November is 323,489,004 Mcf compared to 215,729,499 Mcf in November 2000. The December gas storage estimate is 327,107,618

Gas well gas from prorated fields accounts for 8 percent of total gas well production in Texas.

Preliminary statewide production reported for October 2001 is 30,632,320 barrels of crude oil and 375,697,113 Mcf of gas well gas.

The Commission's estimated final production for this month can be obtained by multiplying these preliminary production totals by a production adjustment factor of 1.0316 for crude oil and 1.0891 for gas well gas. (These production totals do not include casinghead gas or condensate.)

NOVEMBER PERMITS TO DRILL

The Commission issued a total of 776 original drilling permits in November 2001 compared to 982 in November 2000.

Total drilling permits for 2001 year to date is 11,530, up from 10,990 recorded during the same period in 2000. The November total included 595 permits to drill new oil and gas wells, 25 to re-enter existing well bores, and 156 for re-completions. Permits issued in November included 181 oil, 248 gas, 326 oil and gas, 9 injection, and 12 other permits.

OCTOBER CRUDE OIL **PRODUCTION** 

Texas preliminary October 2001 crude oil production averaged 988,140 barrels daily, down from the 1,036,485 barrels daily average of October 2000.

The preliminary Texas crude oil production figure for October 2001 is 30,632,330 barrels, a decrease from 32,131,047 barrels reported during October 2000.

NOVEMBER OIL AND GAS COMPLETIONS In November 2001, operators

reported 220 oil, 513 gas, 18 injection, and four other completion, compared to 253 oil, 422 gas, 28 injection and three other completions during November 2000.

Total well completions for 2001 year to date are 8,519 up from 7,347 recorded during the same period in

#### gas wells. Call To Arms Goes Out In Support Of "Texas Brigades"

and youth education may not have much in common, but if a team of Texas wildlife professionals have their way, they soon will.

Dr. Dale Rollins, Texas Cooperative Extension wildlife specialist, along with colleagues from throughout the state, have devised a new way to help fund the successful Texas Brigades wildlife youth leadership programs.

The Texas Brigades are a series of five annual youth camps originally inspired by Rollins. The first three camps were known as the "Bobwhite Brigades." More "Buckskin recently, two Brigades," which focus on whitetailed deer, have been added.

The five camps sprinkled across the state seek to train Texas young people in proper wildlife conservation techniques while teaching them basic life and leadership skills. To date, more than 500 "cadets" have successfully completed the week-long, bootcamp style programs.

The Brigades, co-sponsored by Extension and other conservation groups interested in wildlife, were initiated in 1993. Rollins attributes the program's popularity and growing success to the legion of adult volunteers, agencies, landowners, and increasing community-based support.

"Our board of directors just met, and we've got some exciting new opportunities and partnerships in our sights," said Rollins, adding "we just need additional ammunition (funds)."

One such volunteer leader is Dr. Bill Eikenhorst, a Brenham veterinarian who authored the program's ambitious new fundraising effort, dubbed "Texas Brigades: A Call to Arms."

This fund raiser is attracting attention among Texas feed and seed companies and other wildlife-related businesses that donate a portion of their sales to the Brigades. Some companies provide a percentage of their profit, while others make a donation unrelated to their sales volume.

"We've really just started," said Eikenhorst, "but by mid-October, 19 companies had already signed on. They have bought into the concept to the extent that besides their monetary

assistance, they now want materials of their own to help market the Brigades to their customers and their upper management."

"While talking to company decision-makers about the Brigades," Eikenhorst said, "I found a common recognition of the growing importance of wildlife and outdoor recreation to the Texas economy. These industry leaders overwhelmingly identified the Texas Brigade youth camps as an effort deserving of their support."

Gerald Stewart of Johnny Stewart Wildlife Calls of Waco has long been a volunteer and supporter of the camps. He's now a donor in the Call to Arms campaign. He is also quick to praise the camps and any effort to support them.

"I am gratified and thrilled to be a part of this educational 'magic'," he said. "It's very fulfilling to be involved with an organization that is not only making a difference for the future of wildlife, but also developing our future leaders in agriculture and natural resources. This is truly a win-win-win relationship. The kids win, wildlife wins, and landowners and communities

#### Combs: "Voluntary State Certification Program Available for Controlled Burning"

AUSTIN December 19, 2001 -Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs today announced that the Texas Prescribed Burning Board, an interagency group created in 1999 within the Texas Department of Agriculture, is accepting applications from individuals who want to be certified as prescribed burn managers or prescribed burn instructors.

"With the past drought conditions in our state and potential fire hazards posed by dry brush, everyone realizes the importance of conducting burns in a controlled manner," Combs said. "Prescribed burns are an important tool for Texas landowners who want to enhance ecosystems; recharge springs and aquifers; and prevent catastrophic wildfires that can occur when excessive grass and brush build up."

During the past two years, the Prescribed Burning Board has established minimum educational and professional requirements for prescribed burn instructors and created safety standards for individuals wishing to be certified to conduct prescribed burning activities. To assist in this task, the board enlisted an advisory committee including property owners; agriculture and livestock producers; conservation and environmental interests; and insurance industry representatives.

Texas Prescribed Burning Board Chair Lynn Drawe said, "When done by trained personnel, prescribed burning is an excellent tool for ridding the landscape of noxious vegetation that can cause dangerous wildfires and use valuable water. Now, we have an educational framework and a certification process for people to engage in prescribed burning."

The board has formulated standards for conducting safe and successful prescribed burns by addressing educational needs, personnel issues, public notification requirements and insurance needs, Combs said.

Rep. Jim McReynolds, San Augustine, sponsor of the legislation creating the Prescribed Burning Board said, "With educational and professional standards now in place to certify burn managers, landowners can feel more confident about using prescribed

burns to reduce natural wildfire fuel and enhance their property's value."

The Prescribed Burning Board includes representatives from the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station; the Texas Cooperative Extension; TDA; the Texas Forest Service; the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission; the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department; the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board; and the Texas Tech University Range and Wildlife Department.

What Happens When The Discs Disintegrate? With age or injury, the inner core of

these cushions starts to dry up, causing the tough outer rind to bulge, buckle, separate, or split into layers. Edges of the casing start to pull away from the vertebral bones, and the vertebrae move closer together. There may be a loss in disc height and flexibility. Although this is, to some extent, a natural process of aging and body repair, it can cause serious symptomatic problems. Disc degeneration often produces growth of new bone along the edges of the vertebrae and the facet joints and is sometimes called "arthritis." These bone "spurs" can cause a narrowing of the space available for the spinal nerves and compression of nearby spinal nerves, possibly resulting in pain, numbness, and loss of strength of certain muscles.





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
