

The Texas Department of Public Safety's Division of Defense and Disaster Relief has submitted the following set of Tornado Safety Rules along with the warning that "to know what to do when a tornado is approaching may mean the difference between life and death." I. If you ar' near, a tornado cellar:

When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave or Stone At Frisco -underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use, free from water, gas or debris; and preferably equipped with pick and shovel. THERE IS NO UNIVERSAL PROTEC-TION AGAINST TORNAD-OES EXCEPT UNDER-GROUND EXCAVATIONS. II. If you are in open coun-

try: 1. Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour.

2. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

III. If in a city or town: 1. Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS! 2. In homes: The corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the sides of the house away from the tornado may be opened to to help reduce damage to the building.

3. Standing against the inside wall on a lower floor of an office building offers some protection. IV. If in schools:

> 1. In city areas; If school building is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. AVOID AUDITORIUMS



A Farwell man and two Bovina men were injured in an accident on a county road 6.7 miles northeast of Farwell at 9:45 hicle. Friday morning.

Injured in the accident, which involved two pickups, were John McFarland of Farwell and Jimmy Lee Parsons and Lloyd E. Johnson, both of Bovina. All of the men were treated at Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona. Johnson, most seriously injured of the trio, has been moved to Hi-Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo for additional treatment. Parsons is still hospitalized in Friona; however. McFarland has been released from the hospital with only minor injuries. Johnson

and Parsons suffered extensive internal injuries and also broken bones and severe lacerations. The accident occurred at a

county road intersection, according to Robert Shedd, investigating officer, who stated that both drivers said they were unaware of an approaching vehicle until seconds before the crash. At time of the accident the Parsons vehicle was headed west and the McFarland vehicle was going south. The Parsons


