Aside from the good showers, about the best thing to happen lately in Bovina is the construction of the base for the community's forthcoming bull statue. The concrete and rock structure was built by Arnold Hromas, who had ample, we're sure, lip support from various members of Bovina Roping Club.

The stand, which was referred to by one wit as "the bull stool," has drawn words of praise from all who have seen it, as far as we know.

However, the historical marker should now be installed near the stand.

The marker, which tells of Bovina's past, was graciously provided by the Parmer County Historical Society last August. An agreement was made then for the plaque to be erected along with the bull statue.

Strangers and homefolks alike could be enjoying the marker while we wait delivery on the custom-made bull, which is scheduled to be ready to occupy his place of honor on Highway 60 by about July or so.

If we have a tornado season in our great area, and we guess we might as well admit that we do, this is it.

Serious damage has been escaped in Parmer County, in the past decade or so at least, but certainly tornadoes are not foreign to the Plains. Silverton and Hale Center are living examples of small towns which have had serious storm damage.

The same could happen here, even though we'd prefer not to think about it.

The Texas Department of Public Safety's Division of Defense and Disaster Relief has submitted the following set of Tornado Safety Rules along with the warning that "to know what to do when a tornado is approaching may mean the difference between life and death."

I. If you are near a tornado cellar:

When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use, free from water, gas or debris; and preferably equipped with pick and shovel. THERE IS NO UNIVERSAL PROTECTION AGAINST TORNADOES EXCEPT UNDERGROUND EXCAVATIONS.

II. If you are in open country:

1. Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour.  
2. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

III. If in a city or town:

1. Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS!  
2. In homes: The corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the sides of the house away from the tornado may be opened to help reduce damage to the building.  
3. Standing against the inside wall on a lower floor of an office building offers some protection.

IV. If in schools:

1. In city areas; If school building is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. AVOID AUDITORIUMS AND GYMNASIUMS with large, poorly-supported roofs!  
2. In rural schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.  
V. If in factories and industrial plants:  
On receiving a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for moving workers to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

VI. Keep calm. It will not help to get excited. People have

# New Residential Area Construction Begins

A new residential development area for Bovina is underway.

Country Home Sites, located just south of the city limits and west of the Oklahoma Lane Road, is the name of the new residential area.

The land is owned by Bob Estes, president of First State Bank of Bovina, and Bob McLean, Dimmitt banker.

Presently under construction is a home to be owned by Mr. and Mrs. Estes, Contractor is Charlie Hromas.

Planning calls for 15 tracts to be made available for locations for homes. These are situated on 40 acres south of Running Water Draw. They range in size from one to five acres, Estes says.

All utilities are available to

home builders in the development area, with the exception of city sewer.

Utility lines will be underground in the area.

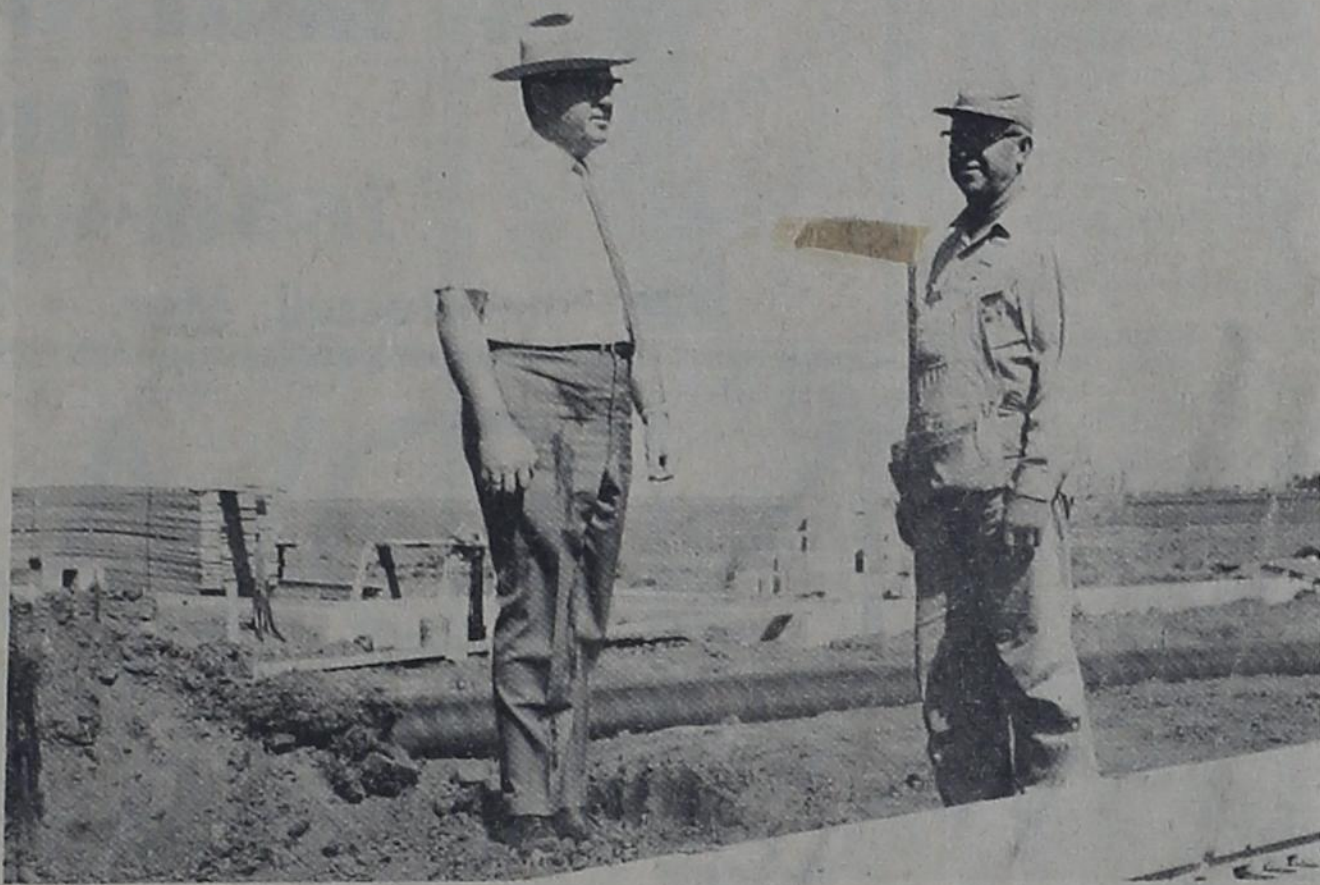
Minimum building requirements specify that homes must be 1500 or more square feet with 60 per cent or more masonry construction and have wood or tile roofs.

This is the second residential building area to be opened in Bovina. Ridgelea Addition was developed several years ago on the southwest side of town.

"As of this week, we don't have any of the tracts sold, except the one we're building on," Estes commented, "but they are available."

A paved road through the area will begin at the Oklahoma Lane Road and go west. The paving is expected to be done in the near future.

Estes expects to develop the area from Running Water Draw north to the city limits as the need arises.

The early change-over will give both coaches a chance to get acquainted with their new positions.

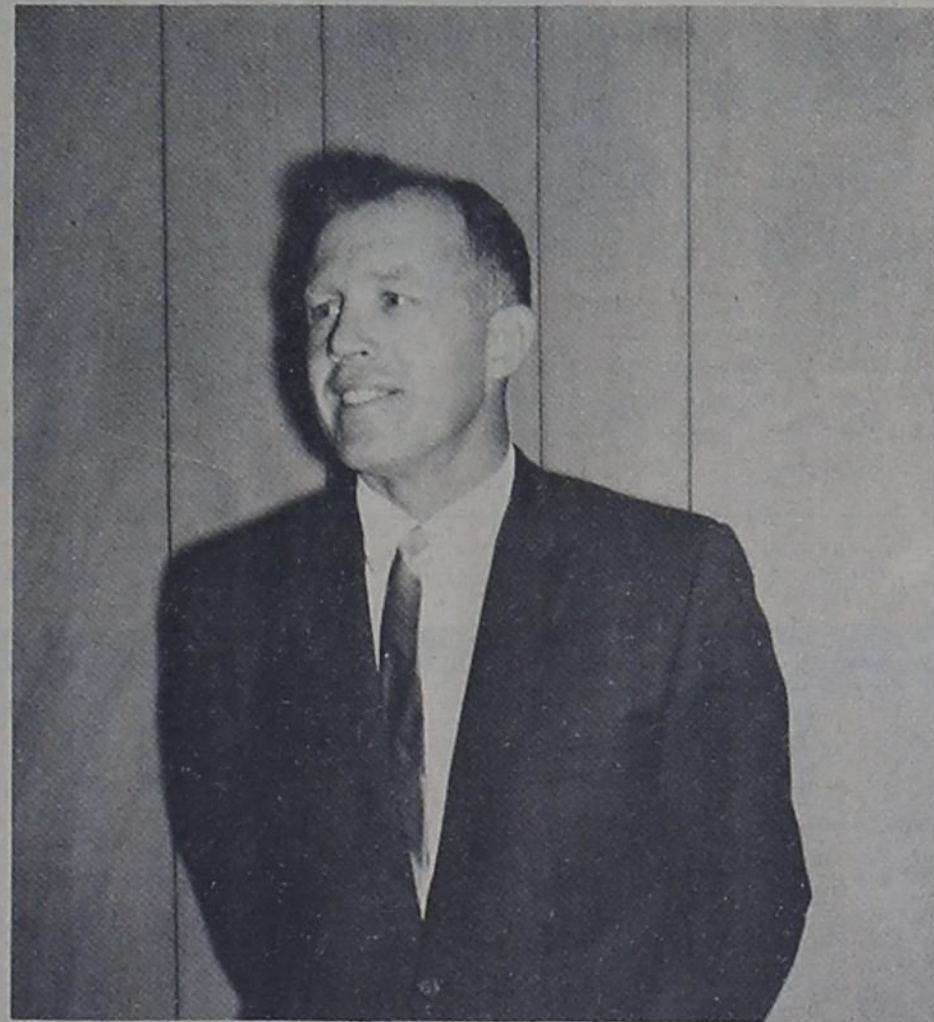
L. F. Jacobs, superintendent, said Hough will begin making plans with the coaching staff for next year and at the same time get acquainted with the boys.

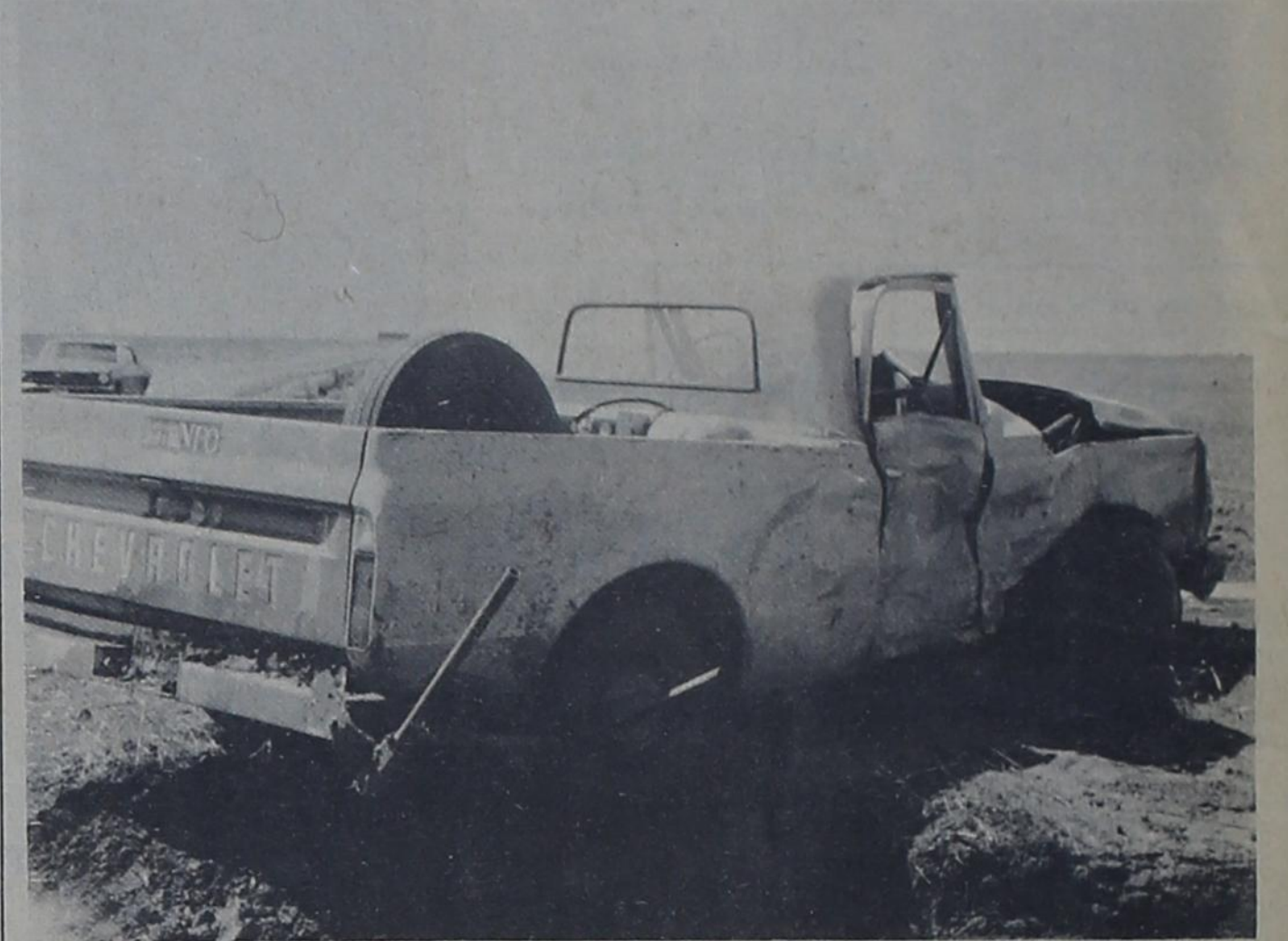

# Pickup Wreck Injures 3 Men

A Farwell man and two Bovina men were injured in an accident on a county road 6.7 miles northeast of Farwell at 9:45 Friday morning.

Injured in the accident, which involved two pickups, were John McFarland of Farwell and Jimmy Lee Parsons and Lloyd E. Johnson, both of Bovina. All of the men were treated at Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona. Johnson, most seriously injured of the trio, has been moved to Hi-Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo for additional treatment. Parsons is still hospitalized in Friona; however, McFarland has been released from the hospital with only minor injuries. Johnson and Parsons suffered extensive internal injuries and also broken bones and severe lacerations.

The accident occurred at a county road intersection, according to Robert Shedd, investigating officer, who stated that both drivers said they were unaware of an approaching vehicle until seconds before the crash. At time of the accident the Parsons vehicle was headed west and the McFarland vehicle was going south. The Parsons

# Second Pool Meeting Set

been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case."

VII. Keep tuned to your radio or television station for latest tornado advisory information. Do not call the Weather Bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may tie up telephone lines urgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio and television stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area.
