## **Public-Private** Agencies Working Together

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Earlier this month, torrential rains sent area rivers roaring out of their banks, bringing disaster to the Hill Country for the second time in four years.

Thousands of Senate District 25 residents who were forced from their homes and businesses now face massive and expensive clean-up and rebuilding efforts. While nothing can replace a home filled with treasured memories, government agencies are providing help to homeowners, renters and small business owners.

The Texas Division of Emergency Management (DEM) and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) have estab-Disaster Recovery lished Centers throughout the flood ravaged area. Operators are on call seven days a week.

FEMA's toll-free numbers are 800-621-3362 or 800-462-7585 for the hearing impaired Flood victims applying for assistance should leave a telephone number where they may be reached.

Residents may be eligible for federal and state assistance which includes temporary housing, low-interest loans to repair homes and replace property, grants for serious needs, loans for agricultural losses and losses to small businesses, disaster unemployment benefits and other assistance.

In addition to personal loans and grants, state and federal agencies are providing disaster assistance in a variety of areas, including manpower for public assistance programs, such as repairing roads and bridges and removing debris.

State Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander announced that taxpayers in the flooded areas may postpone paying state taxes. For more information, or to request a tax filing extension, you may call the comptroller

# Thursday, July 18, 2002 "Exemplary" Rating Announced At S.I.S.D. Board Meeting

The purchase of a lawn mower, the budget and the student handbooks were the main topics of conversation at Monday's Sonora I.S.D. Board meeting.

Board members present were Tryon Fields, Jesse Bustamante, Tammy Favila, Scott Jacoby, Barbara Jennings and Tom Payton. Other school present officials were Superintendent Brant Myers, Principals Doug Bawcom, John Berry, and Louise Dermody, Jason Herring, Diane Jacoby, and Cynthia Keel.

Current bills in the amount of \$24,4446.76 were paid and the minutes of the June meetings were approved.

Visitor Marlyn Young requested that the Board please be fair to all teachers when considering raises. She commented that any raises would be appreciated, but please keep them fair across the board.

Superintendent Myers reported that June and July have been busy months for maintenance. They have repaired a leak at the field house three times and are still having problems with it. The new bus barn is finished and the sand and dirt around the Elementary School playground have been fertilized. He also reported that the Apartment remodeling was going well and the paint crew had been busy working on school houses and facilities. Other improvements being done include the removal of the cabinets in Mrs. Cole's room that was once a home economics room and the removal of an old wall in the Superintendent's house. Tryon Fields asked if the baseball and softball fields were being maintained because they looked terrible. Myers said that they were mowing the fields, but they would check with the maintenance crews.

motion was made by Tom Payton to purchase a mower, with a spending cap of \$15,000. Scott Jacoby seconded the motion and Bustamante, Fields, and Jennings voted aye. Favila voted no and Hernandez was absent from voting.

The next topic discussed was the possible renovation of the ramp at the High School Ag. Shop. Myers told the Board that Mr. Kissire had requested a larger ramp be made to allow for larger projects to be built in the building. Currently the largest trailer the classes can build and get out of the building, is a 16 footer. The capability of building larger projects would increase the Ag. classes' chances of being more competitive at District shows. After some deliberation on who should build the ramp and where the money would come from, a motion was made by Jacoby, seconded by Bustamante to allow for the renovation of the ramp with a spending cap, not to exceed \$20,000. All members present voted in favor and the motion carried.

The Board approved the distribution of complimentary passes for employees and spouses to local school events and approved the PDAS Appraisal Calendar for 2002-2003.

Upon a motion by Bustamante, seconded by Favila it was approved to ratify changes to the Interlocal Agreement and By Laws for the West Texas School Co-op. These changes are necessary because of the switch to state funded insurance.

The second draft of the budget was reviewed. Myers pointed out the changes that had been made in each area. The Board then set the date of the budget workshop for August 1st at 6:30 p.m. The Public Meeting on Budget and the Proposed Tax Rate will be held in conjunction Myers then informed the with the regular meeting on August 12.

The Office of Rural Community Affairs (ORCA) is administering the state's Disaster Relief/Urgent Need Fund. This fund may be used to repair bridges, culverts, roads and other public infrastructure in rural cities and counties. For Disaster Relief/Urgent Need Fund information call ORCA's toll-free number 800-544-2042.

Other state agencies providing assistance include the Texas Department on Aging, Texas Animal Health Commission, State Bar of Texas, Department of Veterans Affairs, Workforce Commission and the Texas National Guard.

The Boys Hunter Safety Camp for 2002, sponsored by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the McPherson 4M Ranch, was held July 8-11, 2002. This camp started out to be a nightmare with 75 yards of flooding water between the gate and the camp. What was I going to do with 23 boys and 6 Game Wardens? All the food and teaching supplies were at the camp, but by noon Monday the water was down to about a foot. This kind of stuff will give an old retired Game Warden plenty of gray hair!

There was quite a mixture of some of the best and most respectful boys we have ever had. I never heard so many "Yes Sirs" and "No Sirs" in twenty years, and it was always "Mr. Rodney". The boys included David Dugan from Maxwell, Cory Wilde, Blair Armstrong, Jaymes Trimble, Chris Ripple, Derek Brest, all from San Angelo, Shane Hopkins and Chad Caver from Midland, Luis Huichapa, Joseph Turnbull, Logan Jones all from Eldorado, Jacob Cooper, Hunter Lawson, Austin Casteneda, Clayton Sahr, all from Sonora, Bryan Munn from Miles, Juan Flores from Del Rio, Alan Lozano from Langtry, Houston Dobbins from Comstock, Scott Henrich from Mason, Clay Craven from White Oak, Andrew Givler from San Antonio, and Tanner Purvis from Mertzon. All the Wardens and Instructors commented on how good this bunch of boys were.

The boys learned gun safety and handling while shooting muzzleloaders, rifles, shotguns, and four different calibers of pistols. They learned the proper techniques and safety of archery. They learned about wildlife management, survival, game care, and hunting ethics. All together they fired almost 2500 rounds of ammunition, including over 900 shotgun shells. We had some of the best shots we have ever seen. We had

two clay pigeons broke with one shot 6 times.

Scott Henrich won the pocketknife. The Game Wardens pick two boys a piece and put their names in a hat. It's the only way possible because there were too many good kids. Scott was one of the biggest boys and really helped us with the smaller ones. Andrew Givler was presented a cap for making the dangdest shot I've ever seen at the camp. He broke two clay pigeons with one shot and then swung and broke the piece of one that went flying by! That boy has some reflexes. Tanner Purvis, the other big boy, was presented a cap for really helping us with the smaller boys and carrying out the trash almost every time "General Maria" needed help.

Except for the skunk under the bunkhouse, nothing really exciting happened until one boy put a live perch down the back of Chad Caver's swimming suit. Chad kept hollering "It won't come out" while doing some of the fanciest dance steps I've ever seen.

The instructors included Game Wardens, Marco Alvizo, J.D. Gould, Will Allison, J.C. Flores, Mark Blount, Doug "the Terminator" Seamands, and District Supervisor Scott Davis. Mary Humphrey taught the wildlife section. Jim Stephen and Preston Love taught the muzzle loading. Gay Dick, retired Game Warden, and

Marvin Shurley taught the archery section. Brent Gesch gave a history of handguns and taught the 45 automatic exercises, and retired Game Warden Rodney Knight taught shotguns.

There are not enough words to thank Sandy and Doug McPherson for their contributions towards these kids. They furnish their Ranch and all the food, and it took a lot of food to fill 23 growing boys.

And then there's "General Maria" Aguilar, the McPerson's Secretary and my right hand, she not only cooks, but also keeps these kids in line better than we can. We were giving Maria a little trouble about some Turkey Bacon she had brought to the Camp. Finally she turned and said "Could I help it if my pig had feathers?" A very special thanks to this lady.

I want to thank my fellow Game Warden and Instructors, Laborde Diagnostics of Lafayette, LA, Rafter W Feeds of Sonora, Sonora Hardware, the U.S. Border Patrol of San Angelo, the Sutton County Sheriff's Office, and Dean Dermody.

These boys were really great, but you never know what is going to come out of their mouths. We were playing around and I grabbed this one twelve year old by the neck, he looked up and yelled "I'm going to die!" and then, a second later he looked up and yelled, "I'm going to die a virgin!'

Softball; Mr. Darin Jackson for Geometry and Ms. Renee Casey for Theater Arts and Speech. Casey will also be the One-Act Play Director and the UIL Coordinator. No action was taken on the salaries for professional personnel.



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

## Ask the Historical Society

Q. Who/what do people ask the most about in Sutton County?

A. #3. How did Sonora get named? #2. How did the Devil's River get named? #1. Do you have any information on Will Carver or his relatives? Children ask a lot of questions about the Miers Home, Cauthorn Memorial (Depot) Building, the Old Jail, Courthouse, Old Rock School, and cowboys and outlaws for school reports locally. We get a lot of requests for information on old Sheriffs of Sutton County and early day lawmen from collectors of their memorabilia. We also get a lot of questions on different families that settled here from people working on their family trees.

But I am quite positive that Will and the Wild Bunch hold the record as #1, followed very closely by travelers that are fascinated by the name of the Devil's River.

Q. You were mentioned as in attendance at the Taylor family reunion. Which Taylor family is that?

A. Robert Eli Taylor (1871-1957), was the son of Henry Hillard and Clarcy Richardson Taylor. He married Mattie Idella Altizer (1881-1927) on the 29th of March 1899 at Llano. They were the parents of 13 children: Damon Taylor born June 8, 1900 and died February 26, 1901 at Cherokee. Verna Mae Taylor born Nov. 12, 1901 in Cherokee married Russell Osborn Reynolds on Sep. 16, 1922 and died on May 2, 1991 in Scottsdale, AZ. Cashes Weuinsch Taylor born Feb. 9, 1904 in Cherokee married Nancy Alzata Wright on July 19, 1929 and died Aug. 15, 1988 in Sonora. Sarah Taylor McKee, a wonderful lady who is still living and tells the neatest stories about the "good old days" in Sutton County. Tom Henry Taylor who was born Oct. 24, 1907 in Cherokee, married Alma Mae Ory on Feb. 17 1932 in Llano and died May 22, 1986 in Del Rio. R. E. Taylor Jr. was born on Oct. 2, 1909 in Sonora,


married Oct. 7, 1929 to Evelyn Edwards, died Feb. 18, 1997 at Aransas Pass and was buried at Ft. Sam Houston Nat'l Cemetery. William Andrew "Pete" Taylor who was born Sept. 9, 1912 at Sonora, married Gladys E. Shawver on March 19, 1946 and died Jan. 1, 1988 at Kerrville. Hattie Marie Taylor was born Aug. 12, 1914 at Sonora and married Dec. 29 1945 to Kirvin Kade Davis at San Angelo. She died on Sept. 1, 1956 in Commerce. John F. Taylor was born July 3, 1916 in Sonora and died Jan. 11, 1925 in San Angelo. Cora Belle Taylor was born Nov. 18, 1918 in Carlsbad, NM, married H. F. Sofge on Dec. 21, 1935 in Ft. Stockton and died on Jan. 17,

2000. Jimmie Manley Taylor was born Dec. 2, 1920 in Carlsbad, NM, married Monica Higgins on May 31, 1944 in England and died Nov. 13, 2000 in Waco. Basil Halbert Taylor married Velma Sworaczyk, he is still living and has the gift of telling stories that make you laugh so hard your side hurts. The last child born to Robert Eli and Mattie Idella Taylor was a baby girl on Feb. 5, 1925 in San Angelo. She died the same day. It would be impossible to

list all the descendants of all these people in this column. They went forth and multiplied as have their children. A two volume book, The Stories of The Taylors and Altizers and "Passing It On," was compiled from contributions from all the family members and sold at the reunion to those who had ordered them. We were fortunate that they allowed the Sutton County Historical Society to purchase a copy for our archives. So if you want to know more details on the family stop by the new building when it is finished and sit down and read for a while.

Q. What ever happened to the man that had the Lewenthal Drug Store?


A. Julius Lewenthal lived southwest of Thorp Laundry and had a row of cottonwoods in front of his house and an iron fountain with a statue of cupid in the center. His home was said to be a garden spot of beauty in the town. His business was located on Main Street where the Sonora City Hall now stands. Mr. Lewenthal had 4 children, 3 boys and 1 girl. On Friday, June 18, 1909, at the age of 57, Mr. Lewenthal died at his home in Sonora from pneumonia. He was buried in the Sonora Cemetery and his funeral was conducted by the Masonic fraternity, of which he was a member. He also belonged to the Woodsmen of the World and carried a \$1,000 insurance policy with them along with another personal policy of \$1,500.

Mrs. Callie Lewenthal moved with her family to Del Rio to be near her relatives. The Devil's River News of Saturday, November 20, 1909 reported that she was found dead at her home and particulars were lacking and that she left 4 orphan children. No further mention of her death was made in the paper. Records show that she was Society and send your dues buried in the Masonic Cemetery

in Del Rio not beside her husband in Sonora. I did find a note in the Devil's River News on September 27, 1919 that Miss Helen Lewenthal accompanied by her brother, Willie, left Saturday for the Masonic Home at Fort Worth to again enter school. She will finish there this term - reprint from the Del Rio Record.

We do know that J. Lewenthal had a patent for "Lewenthals Screw Worm Remedy" which he made and shipped from Sonora to stockmen in all parts of the affected country. It was said to be a very good remedy and he distributed over 360,000 bottles. That is all we have on file on the Lewenthal family. If anyone has more current information they would like to share with us please give me a call.
