"He fights the people's fights.  
"And he wins."  
That's the slogan being used by Senator Ralph Yarborough in his 1970 bid for re-election. The big-rich opponents of Yarborough, who has been my senator and yours for the past 13 years, are taking two swipes at him during this election year -- the first with Bentsen in Saturday Democratic primary and the second with Bush, the Republican candidate, in the general election come November. The main purpose of the two groups is, though, to get Yarborough out. Not necessarily to get one of their two men in. The powers-that-be in state politics don't especially cotton to a senator who fights the "people's" fights. They may want him to do some politicking for their own selfish interests and if these don't coincide with the interest of the "people," and they seldom do, then the "people" are supposed to wait until election-time again before they get any attention from the political leaders.

Yarborough has been an important political figure in state politics for two decades now -- not to mention the part he's played on the national level -- and every effort has been made by these aforementioned opponents to blast him from office by whatever means possible. His character and political record have been critically viewed from every angle with the intent to "expose" Yarborough if something could be found.

And while false charges have been manufactured on occasions, nothing substantial can be found to use against the Senator in his bids for re-election.

He's been doing an outstanding job of representing ALL the people of Texas and the above example is just one way of pointing that out.

In our particular area of the state, where we already have a Republican congressman who is sliding back in for a second two-year term without any opposition, and where we already have a Republican senator, who is on our side and has been for the past 13 years, representing us in Washington.

In regard to the people of our area having the proper representation in Washington for the next six years, we quote the following news release from Yarborough's campaign headquarters in Austin:

Senator Ralph W. Yarborough says the Democratic primary election May 2 is especially crucial for Texans in the smaller towns and on the farms. Senator Yarborough says, "With congressional districts being adjusted to fit the one-man, one-vote ruling of the Supreme Court, the rural areas are losing many of their friends in the House of Representatives. "It's with a great belief that rural America is the heart of America that I am a major co-sponsor of the Coalition Farm Bill which is designated to boost farm income. It's because I believe that residents of the rural areas are entitled to all the benefits of our technology that I strongly support the REA and the telephone cooperatives.

"The great tragedy would be if the people in rural areas of Texas did not go to the polls on May 2 and make their choice for United States Senator. The farmers, the small town residents must show that they are concerned about what happens to them in Washington. By casting on May 2, they can elect

# LL Re-Organized; Play Starts Monday

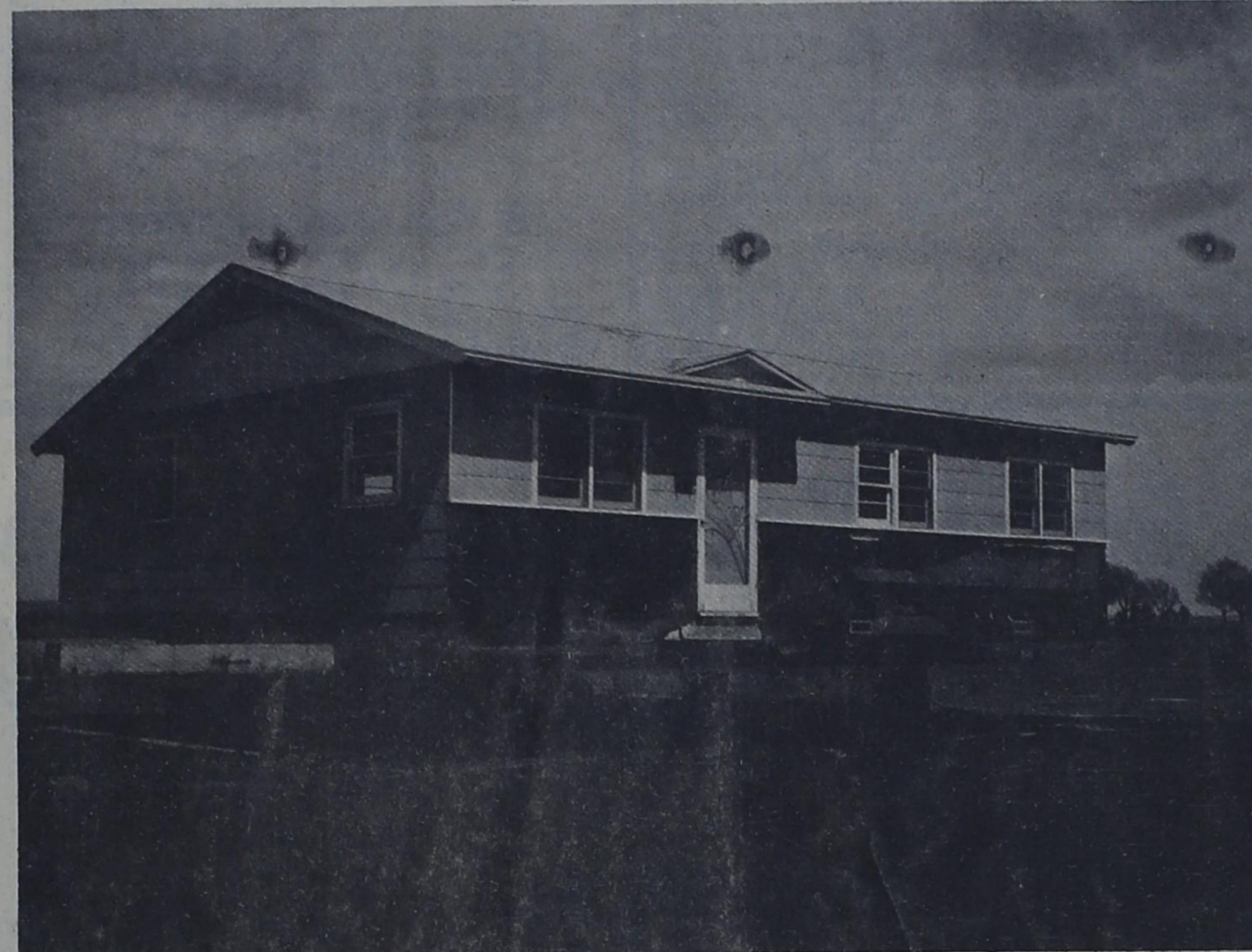
Bovina Little League, in association with the national organization, was formed Thursday night at Lions Club, the sponsoring group here.

Three divisions will play baseball this year, with Little League, Pee Wee and the senior division to begin May 12.

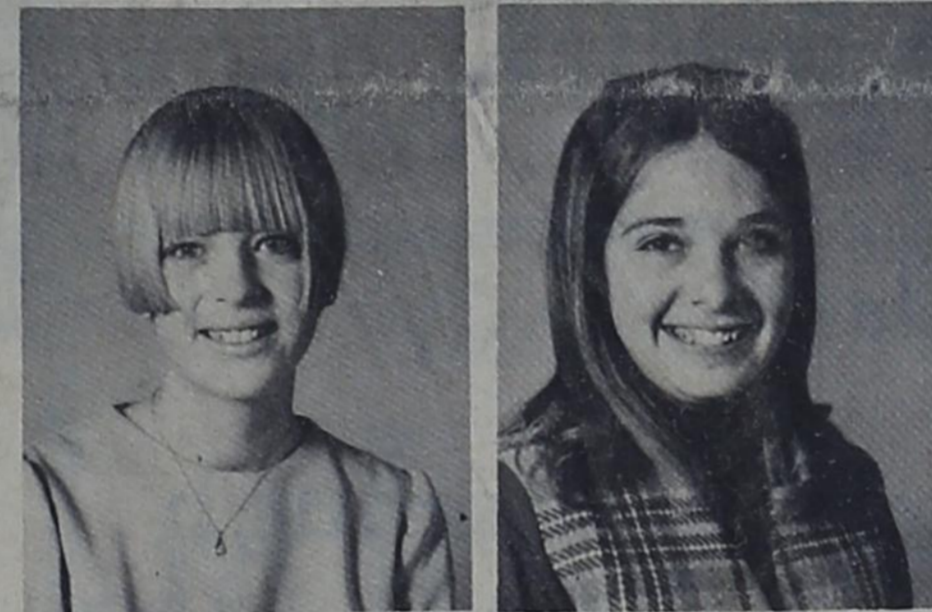
Senior division will be for boys 13, 14 and 15 years of age; Little League, 10, 11 and 12 years; and Pee Wee, seven, eight and nine years.

# Historical Marker Erected At Farwell

An official Texas Historical Marker for "Near Route of Coronado Expedition" was erected April 1 at the roadside park on U. S. 84, one-half mile southeast of Farwell.

Hugh Moseley is chairman of the Farmer County Historical Survey Committee.

The inscription on the 18 by 28 inch marker reads:

"Near Route of Coronado Expedition. One of first explorations of North America by Spain. Began in Mexico, crossing into Texas at or near present Farmer County. The party, led by Francisco Vazquez De Coronado, was sent to investigate reports of great wealth among the Indians. In one city, Quivira, the ruler reputedly ate from gold plates. After entering Texas, Coronado and 36 men separated from the main group and continued north. In August, 1541, on the present Kansas-Nebraska line, he found Quivira, an ordinary Indian village. After the winter of 1541-42, he returned to Mexico."

This is the second Official Texas Historical Marker to be erected in Farmer County. The first now stands in Bovina. The new marker will be dedi-

cated at 3 p.m. Sunday, according to Charles Woodburn of Amarillo, president of the Texas State Historical Survey committee.

This marker and its location will appear in the next edition of the "Guide to Official Tex-

as Historical Markers," in tourist guides and on maps to stimulate tourist interest in this area, to provide interest on historical tours, and to acquaint the people of Farmer County with their own unique historical past.

# McMeans, Caldwell Qualify For State

Two Bovina students will be in Austin May 8-9 for state University Interscholastic League competition after winning first place at the regional meet in Lubbock this weekend.

Stuart McMeans and Bruce Caldwell, track and literary first place region winners, will be accompanied to Austin by Coach Gilbert Hough and L. F. Jacobs, superintendent.

McMeans won the 330-low hurdles in the regional track meet with a time of 39.8. How-

ever, in preliminaries Friday he set a new regional record of 39.1, breaking the old record of 39.5 set by Laney Cook of Sonora in 1967.

No preliminaries apparently will be held in track events at the state meet, which are set to begin at 2 p.m. Saturday, May 9.

Caldwell took first place in regional prose reading at Lubbock. He will compete at the state contest at 8 a.m. Friday, May 8. The prose reading event

will be video taped, according to information received by Bovina Schools.

Both boys are seniors in Bovina High School. McMeans is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob McMeans and will attend Texas Tech next fall on a football scholarship.

Caldwell is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bedford Caldwell. State winners and runners-up in such literary events as he is entering are usually offered scholarships. Bruce is hoping to fall into that category at the state contest.

Cary Moore, freshman student, won third place in regional persuasive speaking, his first high school UIL effort.

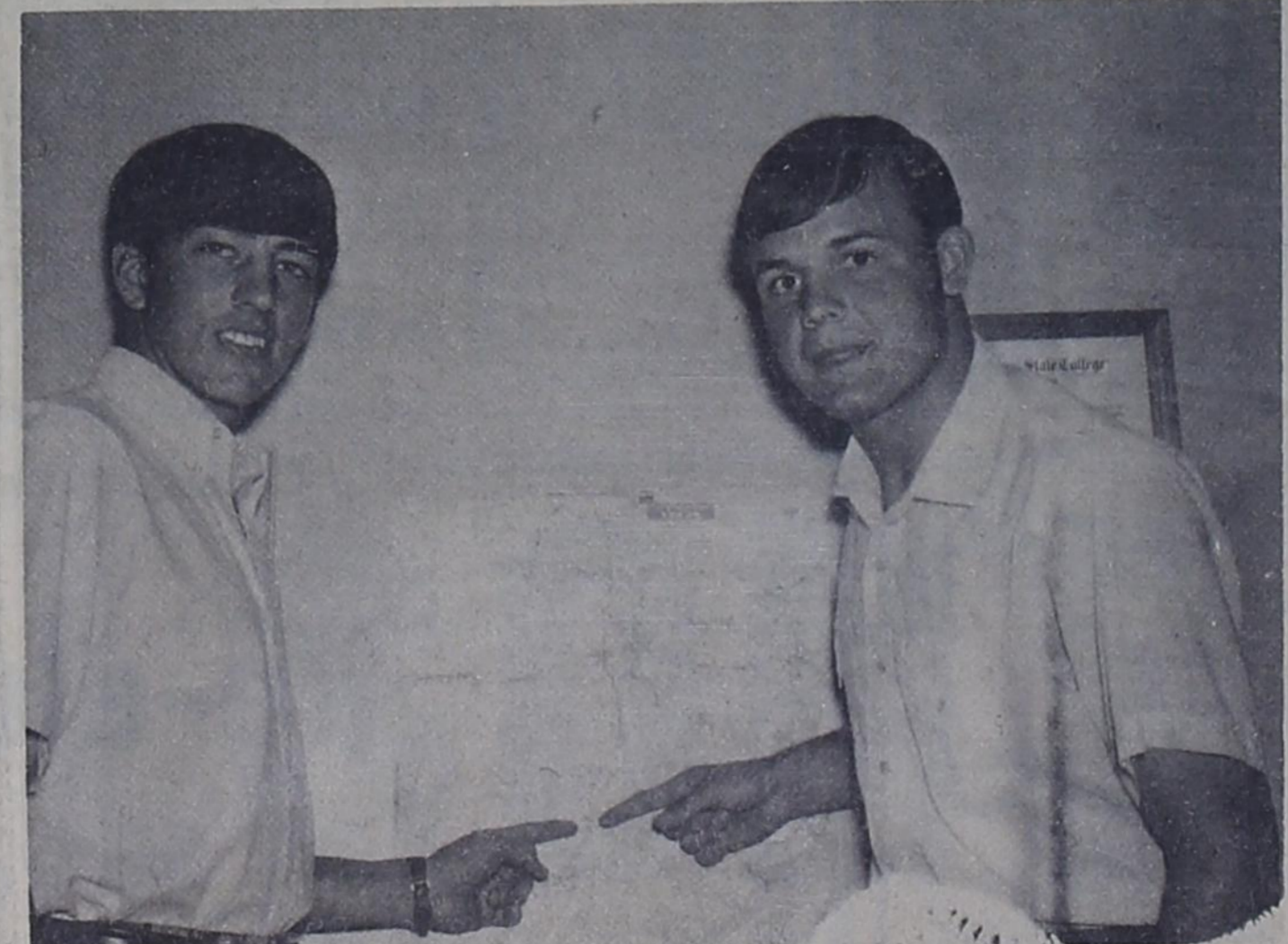

### On The Farm In Farmer County

Timing of irrigations is the key factor for top corn yields. "Irrigating at the proper time will increase corn yields more than either the number or amount of applications," says Leon New, area irrigation specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

During the past growing season, the Extension Service and the Texas Sesame Division of Paris Milling Co. teamed up with seven corn producers in the Muleshoe area to pinpoint irrigation procedures that are most effective in growing high corn yields.

"Plant moisture stress occurring after the 10-leaf stage and through the milk stage of kernel development will limit yields severely," points out New. "In the study, highest yields were produced in fields where three rather than two irrigations were applied during this 30-35 day critical moisture period. Yields were as much as 36 bushels per acre more and averaged 21 bushels more where three irrigations were applied."

The first of the three irrigations in the study was applied by the 10 to 12-leaf stage, the second, during the tasseling and silking and the third, during the blister to milk stage of early grain development. Yields were 150 bushels per acre in four fields that received three irrigations during these periods of plant growth.

"Plant moisture stress prior to the 10-leaf stage and later during dough stages of grain development will also cut yields," according to New, "but normally not as much as during these peak moisture requirement periods." "In years of light early rainfall, an irrigation by the eight-leaf stage has been profitable. An irrigation during the dough stage has generally always been a profitable application as in this test."

The highest yield of the bushels per acre was produced with five irrigations. Number of irrigations varied from four to seven and yields ranged from 120 to 156 bushels per acre. Both the highest and lowest yields were produced from five irrigations. Time of application was one of the main reasons for the yield difference. One hundred thirty-two bushels were produced using four timely irrigations. This practice produced the highest average yield per irrigation with 33 bushels. Highest yield with seven irrigations was 150 bushels. This averaged 22 bushels per irrigation.

"Using four irrigations, the best yield response was obtained from application at 8 to 10 leaves, tasseling, blister to milk stage and dough stage.

# Announce Wage Rate For Sugarbeet Labor

Louis Welch, chairman of the Parmer County ASCS committee, announced the wage rates and requirements for sugarbeet work performed on or after April 27, 1970.

The rates were determined by the Secretary of Agriculture following public hearings in the sugarbeet producing areas. The general provisions are the same as in the previous regulation. A new hand labor operation of removing weeds following complete machine thinning and use of herbicides has been added.

Eligibility for a Sugar Act payment depends upon the producer's compliance with these wage rates and requirements.

The chairman explained that workers employed on a time basis must be paid not less than \$1.75 per hour for each of the hand labor operations of thinning, hoeing, hoe-trimming, blocking and thinning, weeding, pulling, topping, loading, or gleaning. Special wage and hour provisions cover the employment of workers 14 and 15 years old.

When employment for hand labor operations is on a piecework basis, the following minimum rates per acre apply: Thinning \$12.75; Hoeing \$16.50; Hoe-trimming \$20; Weeding (following thinning, hoeing, or hoe-trimming or removal of weeds after machine thinning and use of herbicides) \$10.50.

The piecework rate for any other hand labor operation involving the removal of beets or weeds and for pulling, topping, loading, or gleaning shall be that agreed upon between the producer and worker, provided the worker's earnings average not less than \$1.75 per hour.

Welch suggests that any question regarding wage and hour requirement of the 1970 sugarbeet program be taken up with the County ASCS office.

Some of you have asked about a Baked Deviled Egg Recipe. I found this one to share with you.

### BAKED DEVILED EGGS

Shell and cut 6 hard-cooked eggs lengthwise. Remove the yolks and set aside whites. Mash yolks and blend in 3 tablespoons sour cream, 2 teaspoons prepared mustard and 1/4 teaspoon salt.

Fill whites with this yolk mixture. (You may want to use your own special recipe for fixing deviled eggs.)

To prepare the sauce saute 1/2 cup chopped green pepper and 1/3 cup chopped onion in 2 tablespoons margarine. Remove from heat and stir in 1/4 cup chopped pimento, 1 can cream of mushroom soup and 1 cup sour cream.

Place half of the sauce in a shallow, 1 1/2 quart casserole. Add eggs, cut-side up, in a single layer. Pour the remaining sauce over the eggs. Sprinkle 1/2 cup grated cheddar cheese over the top.

Bake in a preheated 350 degree F. oven for 20 minutes or until the dish is thoroughly heated. Remove from the oven and allow to stand 5 minutes before serving. This recipe makes 6 servings.

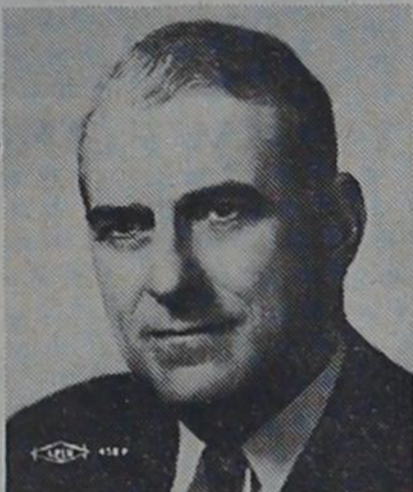

- 3 oranges
- 1 c. pecans
- Small pkg. marshmallows
- 1 carton sour cream

Cover and let set overnight.

### Sock It To Me Cake

- 1 box Duncan Hines butter cake mix
- 1/2 c. sugar
- 3/4 c. Wesson oil
- 1/2 pt. sour cream
- 1 c. pecans
- 4 eggs
- 6 T. flour (for high altitudes)

Mix first three ingredients (and flour for high altitudes). Add eggs one at a time. Add sour cream and pecans. Pour one-half of batter in tube pan which has been greased and floured. Mix 2 T. brown sugar and 2 t. cinnamon. Sprinkle mixture over batter in pan. Add remaining batter. Bake one hour at 350 degrees.

### Raised Doughnuts

- 1 cake compressed or 1 pkg. active dry yeast
- 1/4 c. water
- 3/4 c. lukewarm milk
- 1/4 c. sugar
- 1 t. salt
- 1 egg
- 1/4 c. soft shortening
- 3 1/2 to 3 3/4 c. flour

Soften compressed yeast in luke warm water at 85 degrees or active dry yeast in warm water at 110 degrees. Mix luke warm milk, sugar and salt. Add softened yeast mixture. Stir until dissolved. Stir in egg, shortening and half the flour. Add remaining flour. Knead on lightly floured surface. Place in greased bowl, turning once to grease surface. Let rise till double again. Roll out dough 1/3 inch thick. Cut. Let rise until very light (30 to 40 minutes). Leave uncovered so crust will form. Fry in deep hot fat at 375 degrees.

Bake for 30 minutes. Cool slightly then ice with following icing while cake is still in pan, if desired.

Icing

- 1 stick soft oleo and pinch of salt
- 4 T. cocoa
- 1 lb. powdered sugar
- 6 T. milk
- 1 1/2 t. vanilla.

#### A Myth De-Mytholized

Who says the miracles of the Bible are fables? Many do. But Harold Hill, president of Curtis Engine Co. in Baltimore and consultant in the space program, says science has proved at least two of them to be true.

He says space scientists at Green Bolt, Maryland were checking where the sun, moon and planets in space will be 100 years and 1000 years from now. They need this information to plan orbits for satellites to prevent collisions later.

They ran the computer measurement back and fourth over the centuries until it came to a halt. It put up a red signal. Something was wrong. A day was missing in space in elapsed time. There was no answer.

One scientist with a religious background remembered learning in Sunday School of the day the sun stood still. Others laughed, but because no other explanation could be found, the Bible was brought forth. In Joshua they found the words of the Lord, "Fear them not, I have delivered them into thy hand; there shall not a man of them stand before thee." But Joshua was surrounded and the enemy would overpower him if darkness fell. So he asked the Lord to make the sun stand still --- and He did, for "about" a day. But computers showed the elapsed time, as written, was 23 hours, 20 minutes. So 40 minutes were still missing.

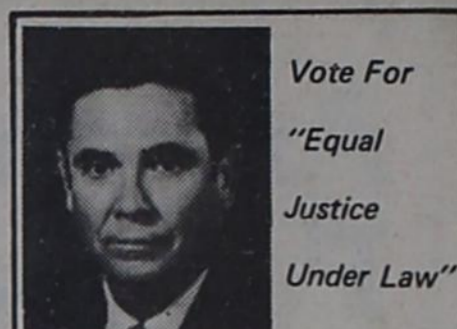
The space scientists were still in trouble. If they couldn't account for the 40 minutes they'd be off their schedule 1,000 years later.

The religious scientist remembered another Bible story. In II Kings, Chapter 20 they found the story of Hezekiah, who was on his deathbed. He was visited by the prophet Isaiah who told him he would die. Hezekiah did not believe the prophet and asked for a sign of proof. Isaiah offered to move the sun forward 10 degrees as proof. But Hezekiah said, "It is nothing for the sun to go ahead 10 degrees, but let the shadow return backwards 10 degrees." Isaiah spoke to the Lord and the sun returned backwards.

The scientists agreed that 10 degrees was 40 minutes. So the 23 hours and 20 minutes in Joshua, plus the 40 minutes in II Kings accounted for the missing day in the universe.

It took the miracles of the Bible to chart the logbook for space travel.
