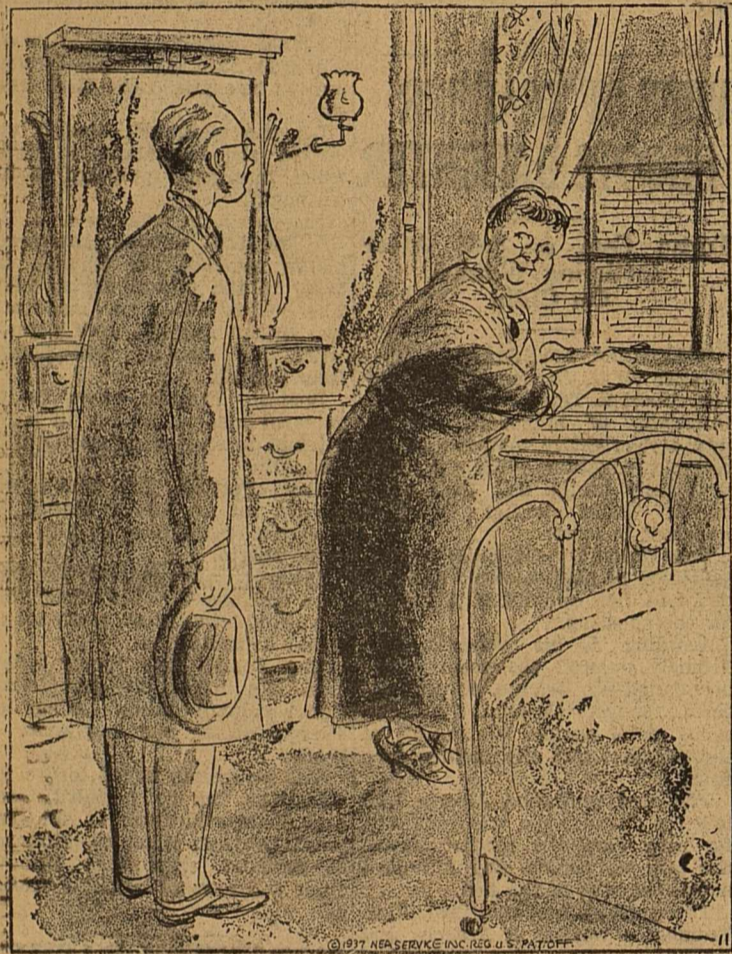
BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11. — The new Congressional Directory usually is considered worth a book review, since it's the bible of Washington correspondents, social secretaries, lobbyists, and nearly everyone else who has to operate in the capital. This is the volume which contains the biographies of members of Congress, of the cabinet and the U. S. Supreme Court justices; names and home addresses of government officials and foreign diplomats, and lists of congressional committees. It also contains the description of functions of all government agencies, from the presidency down to the Alley Dwelling Authority for the District of Columbia, and innumerable other items, which make it an inexhaustible mine of information about what some Wash-

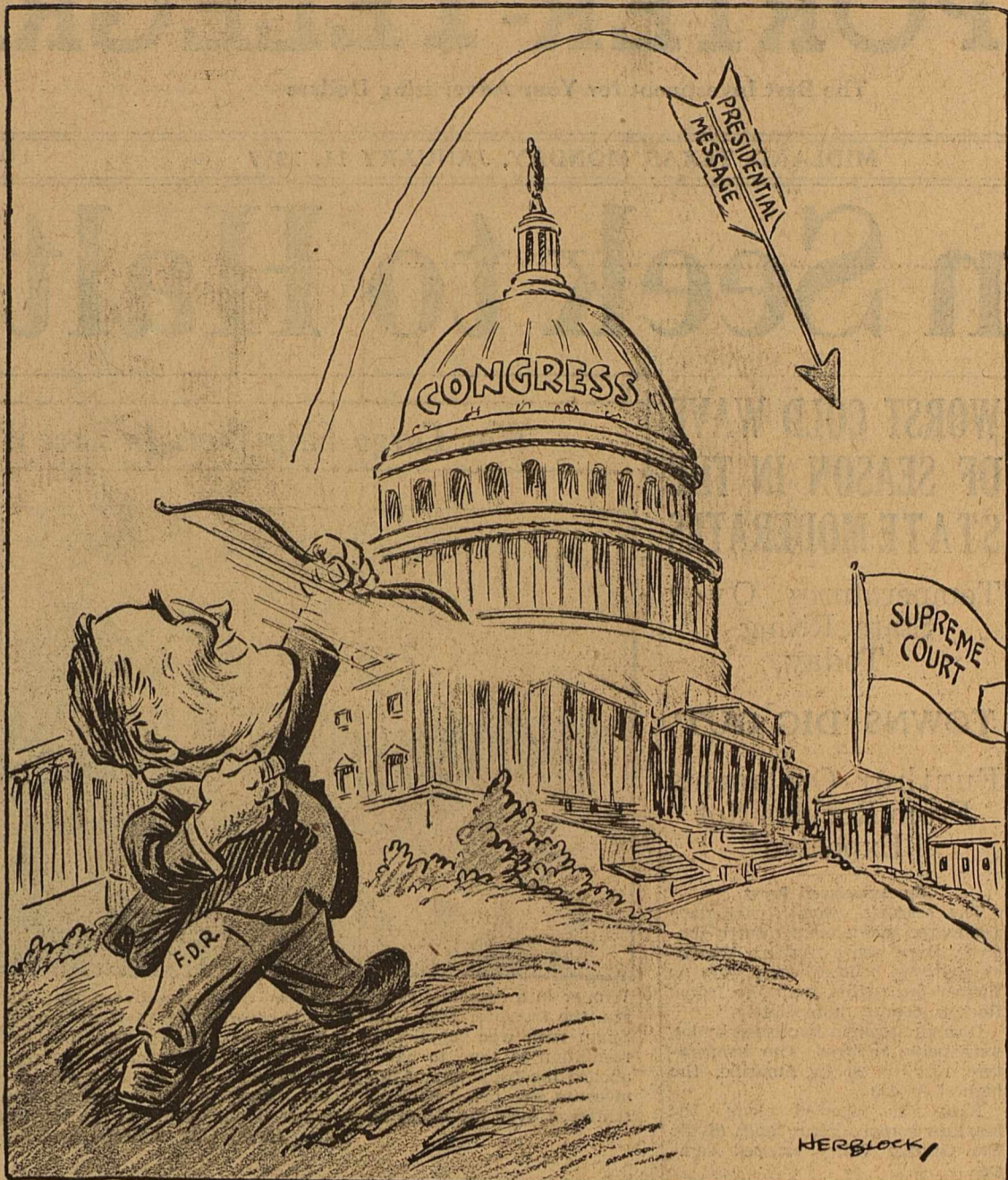

lines. He is closely followed by Senators Jim Ham Lewis of Illinois and William G. McAdoo of California, with 40 lines apiece. Congressman Pulmer needed space to give the names of his various opponents in years past and the pluralities by which he defeated them, not to mention how he got that \$1,300,000 veterans' hospital for Columbia, S. C. Most sensational of all is the congressman's description of himself as "author of the Agricultural Adjustment Act." Dozens of individuals have been accused of authorship of that act—including a Russian, Joe Stalin—but this appears to be the first time anyone ever accused Mr. Pulmer. \*\*\* Some of 'Em Are Mum Members who contributed no information about themselves used to be rarities, but there are several such this year. Rush Dew Holt of West Virginia is the only senator among them. Representative Dewey Short of Ohio is the only Republican. Others who say nothing are Arthur W. Mitchell of Chicago (only Negro member), Leo Koelakowski of Chicago, Paul Maloney of Louisiana, Edward L. O'Neill of New Jersey, Marcellus Evans, Andrew L. Somers, and John J. Delaney—all three from Brooklyn, N. Y.—and James P. Buchanan and Milton H. West of Texas. Failure of members to have their biographies inserted in the directory is variously attributed to modesty, inability to think of anything to say, and plain laziness. The champion joiner of the 75th Congress would appear to be the Hon. Jesse Paine Wolcott, Republican, of Port Huron, Mich., who lets it be known that he belongs to the Masons, Knights of Pythias, Odd Fellows, Moose, Elks, American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars. That seems to be two or three up on Sol Bloom of New York, who lists himself merely as a Shriner, Elk, Moose, Red Man, and I. O. B. B. \*\*\* Maverick Likes Variety On the other hand, there's Maury Maverick of Texas with a somewhat more unorthodox list of affiliations. He declares membership in the Episcopal Church, Circus Fans of America, San Antonio Zoological Society, American Legion, American Civil Liberties Union, Sons of American Revolution, Public Ownership League, and National Popular Government League. Senator Vic Donahey of Ohio stands out as the champion papa, stating that he has 10 children, all of whom but one son and one daughter are married. Cook Pork Well To Save Health

AUSTIN, Jan. 11. — Trichinosis, a disease caused by eating pork which has not been thoroughly cooked is far from an uncommon infection in man, is a warning issued by Dr. George W. Cox, State Health officer.

"During the winter season pork and pork products are more freely used, and a warning against insufficient cooking of them is in order," he said, "as the danger of eating pork that is not thoroughly cooked is indicated by the increasing number of cases of this disease being reported."

"If pork is cooked thoroughly, there is no danger from its use save the danger of eating too much of a meat which is more or less difficult of digestion due to its high fat content. Pork, showing a slight red or pink, is a warning signal that this is dangerous to eat for it may contain trichinae which have escaped destruction by insufficient cooking of the meat and thus give the careless consumer the disease trichinosis."

"No method of meat inspection will invariably discover the presence of these parasites. It is next to impossible to detect infested hog flesh by inspection for two reasons: (1) the cysts are extremely small, (2) they are of the same color as muscle tissue in which they are imbedded. These larvae are encysted in the lean portion of the pork ready to develop in the stomach of the person who eats the meat. Heating the meat to 145 degrees Fahrenheit, the temperature used in the pasteurization of milk, will destroy the parasites. But there is often the danger of not maintaining this temperature inside of the meat. Outer portions of the meat may appear well cooked while the inner part is quite raw and will retain the living parasites. Especially is this true in the piece of pork is quite thick. "To be safe, no pork or pork products should ever be eaten unless it has been thoroughly cooked, and until all color disappears throughout the piece of meat."

Savings, building and loan associations of Texas reported recently that 60.2 per cent of their home mortgages accepted for insurance by the Federal Housing Administration on December 1 were loaned for the construction of new homes.

In the financing of new homes in Texas these associations had 583 loans totalling \$2,147,747 accepted for insurance as of December 1, at an average of \$3,684.

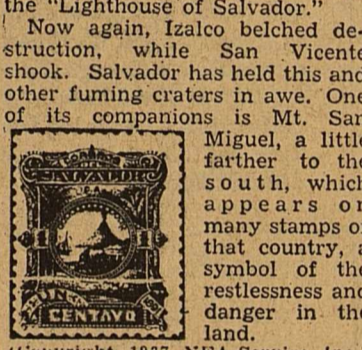
