NEED NATIONAL GUARD TROOP

A general expansion and improvement program for the Texas National Guard is sought by Adjutant General Carl Nesbitt, according to the Associated Press, in which he advocates approximate \$50,000 additional appropriation. Last year the state appropriated \$123,504 and added \$33,789 deficiency appropriation. Funds are needed, he said, for 8,415 officers and men who in April will be increased by 500.

Midland is strategically located for a national guard troop and has numerous young men who would profit by securing such a post here. A cavalry troop especially would be beneficial, creating a new demand for horses produced in this section and further identifying the Midland area with the army horse business.

The National Guard is the state's first line of defense and may be mobilized for duty at command of the governor. In addition, it can be absorbed by the United States army in time of war. Texas is the only state training a complete division of guardsmen. The Texas guard includes the 36th infantry and 56th cavalry brigade. It maintains armories in 157 Texas cities towns and has in its possession more than \$5,000,000 worth of federal property.

WHOSE BUSINESS IS THIS?

Jumping on the public utilities has become a practice in all legislative bodies, and has been the popular means by which ambitious legislators have sought to popularize or publicize themselves on many occasions.

The latest attempt to mix in private and legitimate business is the bill introduced by Representative Graves in the Texas legislature to forbid those engaged in selling heat, water, gas or electricity to sell appliances which have to be employed in the use of these services.

The bill, we are informed, does not forbid municipally owned utilities to sell these appliances.

Clearly another attack on corporations, apparently for no reason at all, we see no justification for such legislation. If a company can't sell stoves, fans, faucets or lights to stimulate the use of the service it has for sale, what has become of the right of individual initiative?

Many utilities companies stock certain articles, give them an experimental try-out and then turn the dealership over to a private concern, feeling that they have found a product which will "stand up" and which will satisfy the consumer to use more of said utility company's service.

We see nothing wrong with the sale of appliances by the utilities companies, but we do see danger in the state's interference in any business institution's legitimate affairs. It smacks of legislation and practices we have heard of on other shores which have resulted in doing away with individual initiative.

STUDY PLANS FOR PRACTICAL TEST OF PROPOSED NEW INFANTRY DIVISION

FORT SAM HOUSTON, Tex. — Plans now are being drafted by Eighth Corps Area Headquarters and Second Division staff officers for a practical test in the Eighth Corps Area next summer of the proposed new infantry division, tentative organization of which already has been drafted by the War Department General Staff in Washington.

The Second Division has been selected as the nucleus of the test division, and troops from other stations in the Eighth Corps Area will be assembled to form a provisional infantry division for test purposes only.

Test of this provisional division is being carried forward on the basis of tables of organization set up, thus far only on paper, for the tentative model combat unit, with a view to producing eventually a more mobile unit, capable of taking advantage of recent developments of motorization of combat units, mechanization and increased fire-power.

Although every detail of the proposed test of the provisional division in the Eighth Corps Area is not yet completed, it is contemplated that approximately 12,800 enlisted men and 600 officers will participate in the test beginning July 1, 1937. This will provide a war strength division organized according to tables set up for newly proposed divisional organization.

It is expected that the test will be provided in three main parts, namely:

- 1. Organization (regimental) training with new equipment for a month or six weeks. Organization of smaller units will be accomplished at Fort Logan, Colorado; Fort Francis E. Warren, Wyoming; Fort Sam Houston, Texas, and Fort Bliss, Texas. 2. Training for a month to six weeks at Camp Bullis, Texas; time being devoted to the training of all components of the division as a unit and in smaller tactical problems. All units of the division to be assembled together at Camp Bullis for the period of this test. 3. For a period of a month to six weeks; marching troop movements, maneuvers in South Texas. The test will probably end about December 1, 1937.

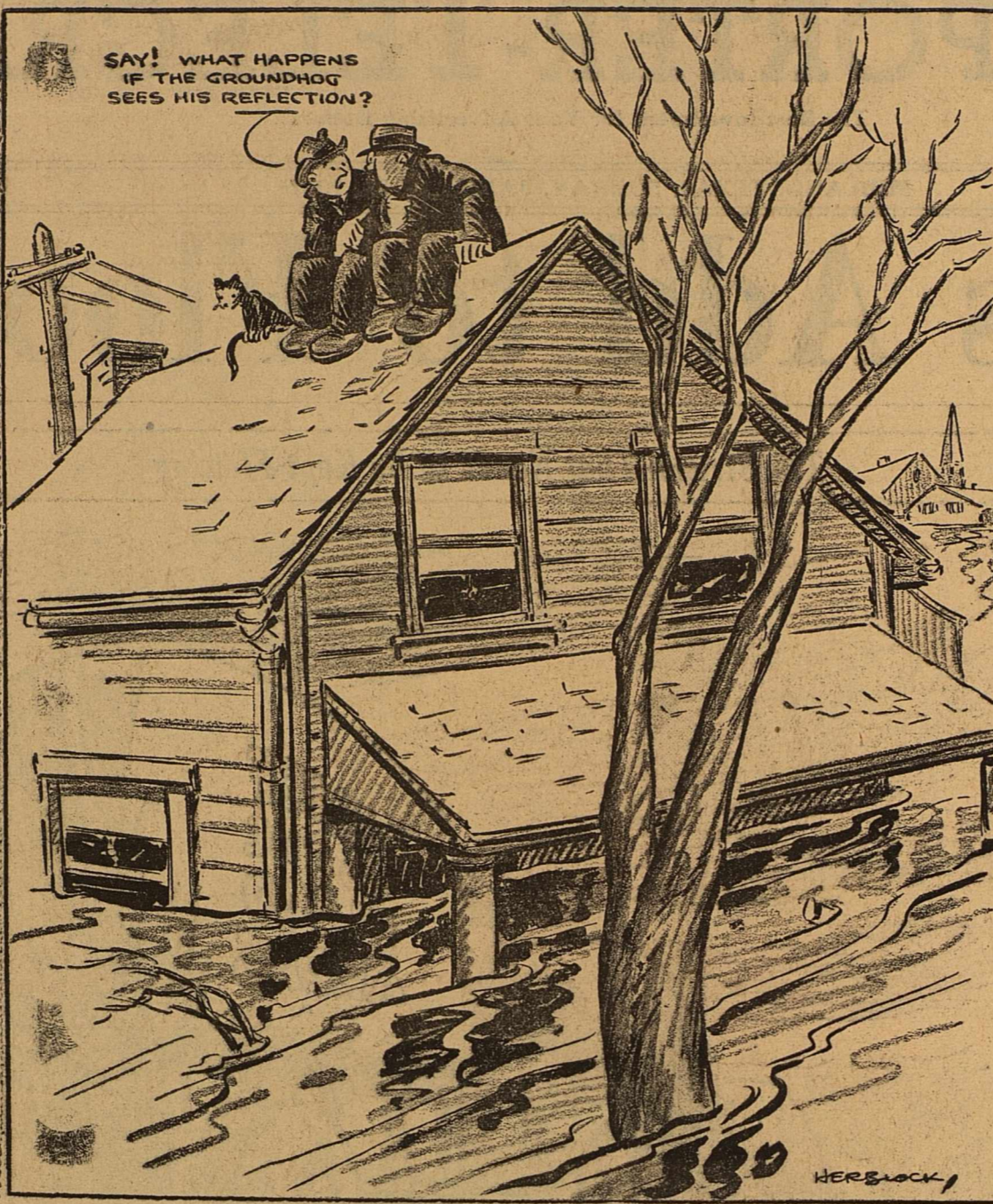
To accomplish the divisional test enlisted personnel will be drawn from the following stations in the Eighth Corps Area: Fort Sam Houston, 6000; Fort Logan, Colorado, and Fort Francis E. Warren, Wyoming, 3800; Fort Bliss, Texas, 600 from the 82nd Field Artillery; from various border posts, 200 cavalrymen to form a reconnaissance detachment, these to be drawn from the First Cavalry detachment, and 600 additional personnel from the First Cavalry Division now stationed at border posts.

In connection with the provisional division test will be included also tests of an anti-mechanized battalion of field artillery; and anti-aircraft battalion and an observation group, these groups to be attached to the division.

To accomplish tests of attached units it is planned to utilize the 69th Coast Artillery (anti-aircraft) from Fort Crockett, Texas, to form the anti-aircraft machine gun battalion; the 77th Field Artillery, Fort D. A. Russell to comprise Corps Artillery and the 12th Observation Group, Brooks Field, to furnish the observation squadron.

Additional troops will be furnished by the 51st Signal Battalion, Fort Monmouth, New Jersey, in the number of 9 officers and 320 enlisted men to augment the Signal personnel.

In keeping with the policies outlined by President Roosevelt before the recent Pan American Peace Conference in Buenos Aires, the dominant concept of the Greater Texas and Pan American Exposition will be the promotion of good will and the strengthening of neighborly bonds between the United States and the southern republics.

The 1937 international exposition rises out of the 1936 Texas birthday celebration. To carry out the physical motif all permanent buildings of the exposition are being re-decorated in the classic Latin American decor, and the new center of interest will revolve around the Pan American building standing with the Federal Building and the Texas Hall of State at the head of the Esplanade of the Americas.

The Texas Centennial's hit show, "The Cavalcade of Texas," is being rewritten by its author, Jan I. Fortune, into "The Cavalcade of the Americas." On the largest stage in the world this panoramic spectacle will open with scenes resplendent of the grandeur that was the ancient Aztec civilization and will culminate in the recent Pan American conference in Buenos Aires.

Through the dissemination of the colorful folkways and customs of the nations of North and South America, which are to be faithfully transplanted to the 200 acre park of the international exposition, a more complete understanding among the peoples of the two continents is expected to be reached. Consular Corps Representing Twenty Republics to Be at Dallas June 12

DALLAS, Jan. 29.—International interest in the Greater Texas and Pan American Exposition to open here on June 12 has resulted in Dallas having been chosen as the third American city, outside of the national capital to be the seat of a full consular corps representing the twenty neighboring republics of the south. This announcement has been made recently by Frank L. McNeny, director general of the Exposition.

Charter names announced for the corps are Consul Adolfo G. Dominguez of Mexico and Consul Robert Burgher of Panama, with the added memberships of William K. St. Claire, honorary consul general for Nicaragua; J. Kirby McDonough, chancellor for Guatemala and John A. Prather, vice consul of Panama. Nations indicating that they will immediately appoint consuls to the corps here are Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil, Chili, Columbia, Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, Haiti, Honduras, Para-

guay, Peru, Uruguay, and Venezuela. President Franklin D. Roosevelt is expected this week to formally invite these countries to participate in the exposition. Reliable sources in the capital reveal that diplomatic interest in the international scope of the exposition has been responsible for a resolution to this effect now pending passage through congress.

Coincident with this, the state department at Washington has announced that a leave of absence will be granted to one of its ranking members to accompany a group of flying commissaries of the Greater Texas and Pan American Exposition. These officials expect to leave Dallas between the first and tenth of February for a six weeks tour

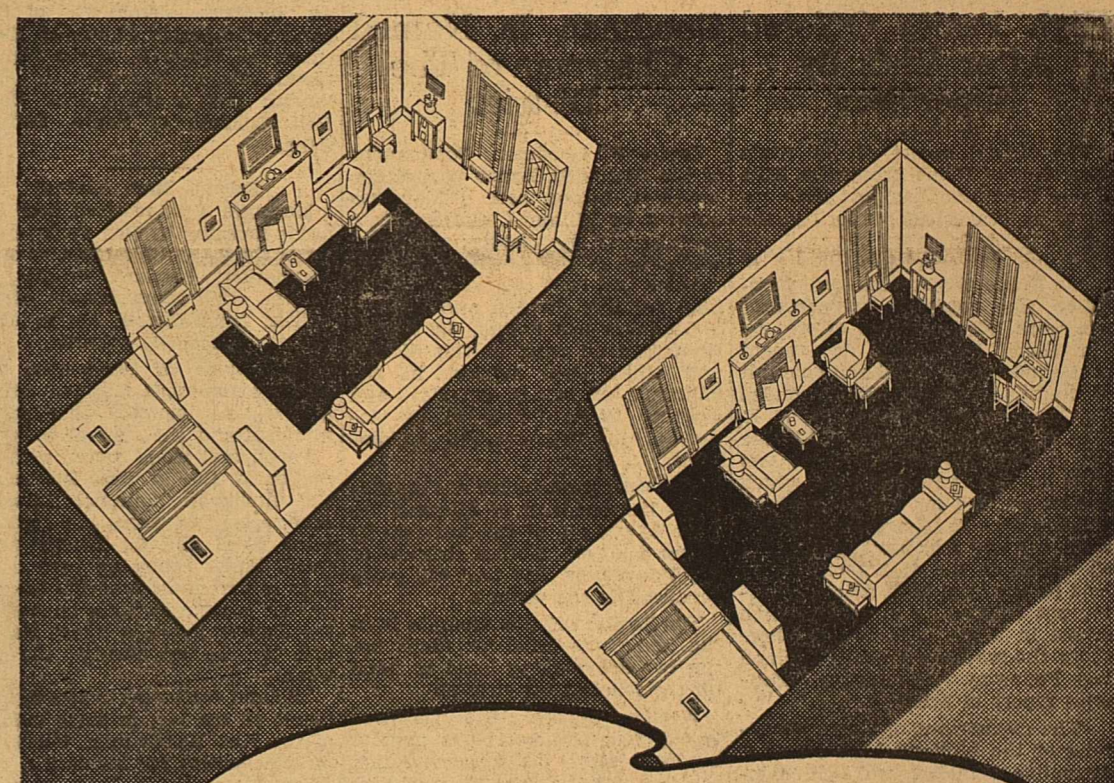

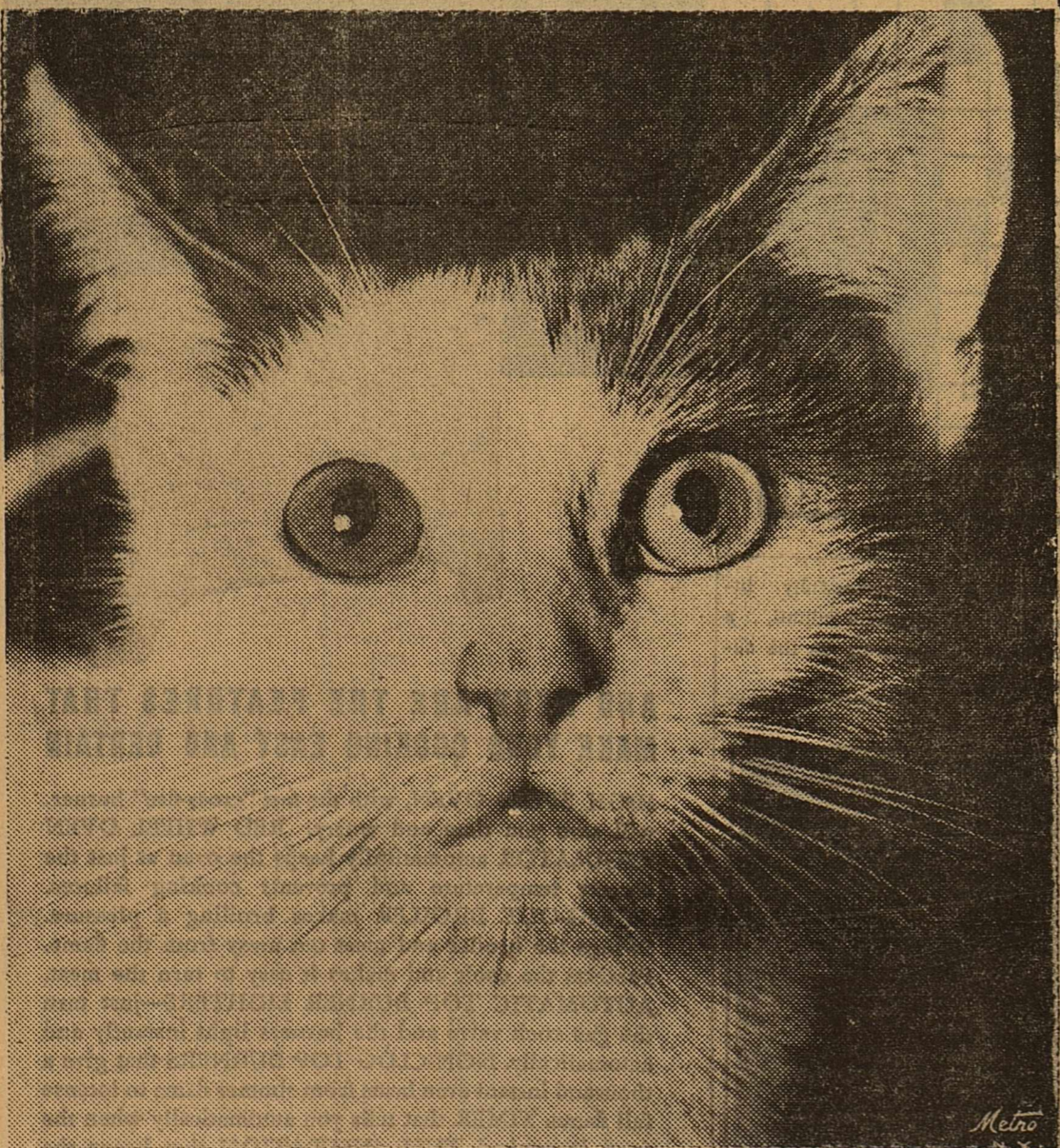

Whichone's Collapse and Defeat By Gallant Fox Broke Heart of His Owner, Harry Payne Whitney

No. Other Similar Case is Known in History of Turf

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—The Travers of 1930 was a heartbreaking race. It literally broke the heart of Harry Payne Whitney, and it broke Whichone so that he never went to the post again. Trainer Jim Healy believes that it was a primary cause in the death of the famous sportsman, which came two months later from heart failure. Healy was for scratching Whichone, but Whitney had too long dreamed of beating Gallant Fox.

It was while grieving over Whichone's loss that Whitney relegated a youngster named Equipoise to his second string, not knowing that in him he had a true champion and the best he had ever bred. Nor did he live long enough to find it out. Whichone was a fragile colt and his failure came in his inability to carry his terrific speed without cracking up.

The son of Chicla (he was out of the American mare, Lady Hamburg II) out of Flying Which was half of a scintillating duo of two-year-olds which made its bow in the Whitney colors in 1929. Boojum, a world record holder, formed the other and lesser half.

Considered Whichone Best
During the year of the great crash, Whichone won the Saratoga Special, beating Pansy Walker and Sarazen II. He was defeated by Boojum in the Hopeful, but won the Belmont Futurity, repelling Hi Jack and Gallant Fox in that order, and repulsed Gone Away and Boojum in the Champagne Stakes.

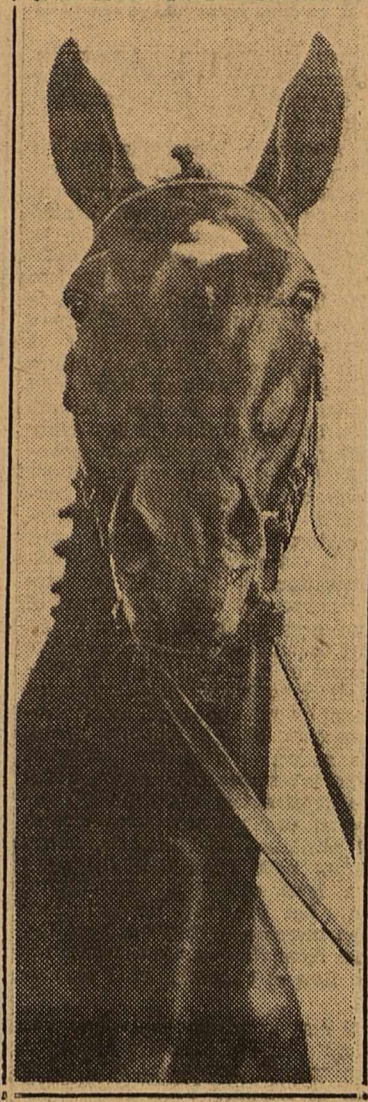
In the Belmont Futurity, Whichone became the first two-year-old to win more than \$100,000 in a single race. It netted \$105,730, the richest prize in its long history. Horses bred by Whitney earned \$825,374 in 1929, a world record.

Whichone was as fast as lightning and there were few to claim that he was not the year's outstanding juvenile. Those few believed Boojum was the finest. But Whitney had no doubt about the matter. To him, Whichone was the grandest horse he had ever bred.

Whichone was carefully prepared during the winter. It was decided that he would not try for the Kentucky Derby and Preakness, but would be reserved for the Withers and Belmont Stakes. As it happened, this left the former two at the mercy of Gallant Fox, a colt which improved miraculously over the winter.

Gallant Fox Obtains Jump
Gallant Fox's victories in the Derby and Preakness were so easily accomplished that the racing public immediately installed him as the champion of the year, and one of the best of all time.

At the last minute when Jim Dandy was added to the field, he gave orders that Whichone should stay with the Fox, match his strides in every department, and then race him into submission.

As all now know, Jim Dandy, another cripple but right for the only time in his life, stunned the crowd by whipping both Gallant Fox and Whichone. He did it at odds of 100-to-1, turning in one of the more sensational victories of these times. But in this drama of ours, he does not count. Whichone threw down the gauntlet to Gallant Fox, and in a stirring and heart-breaking struggle, he lost.

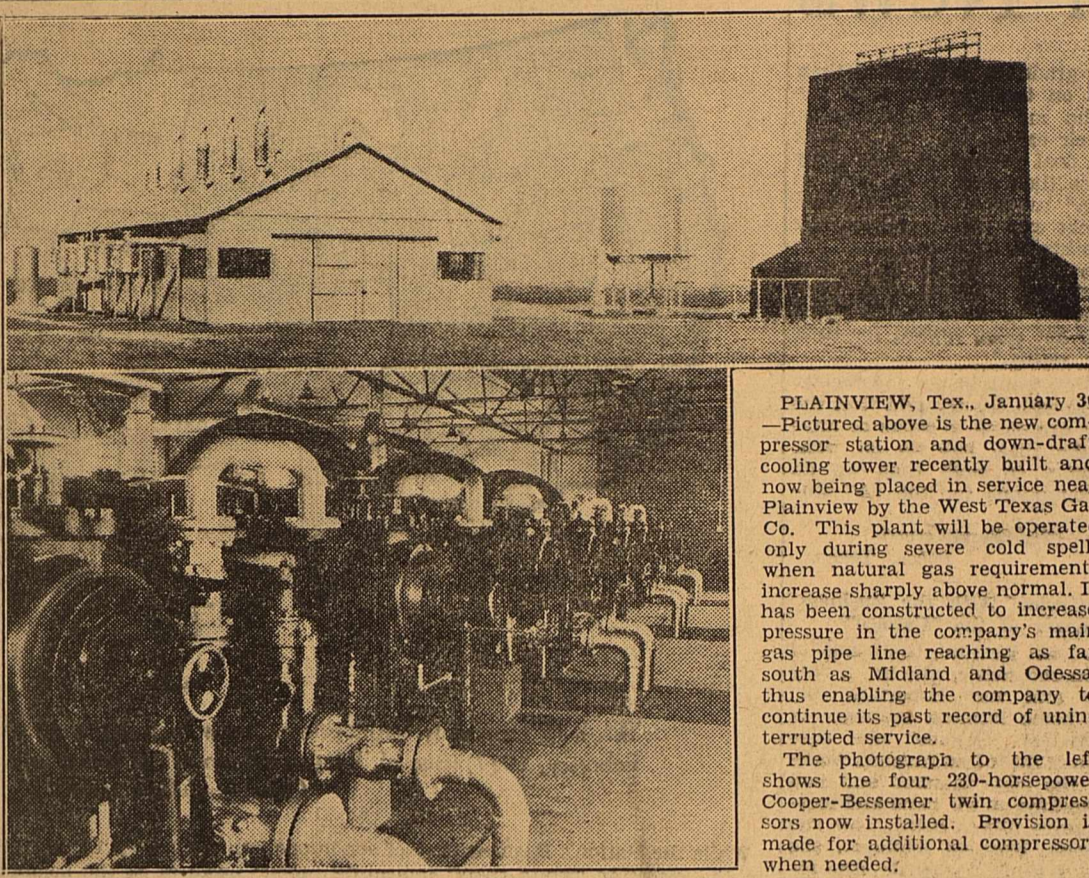
