CATHOLICS GIVEN RIGHT TO OPEN UP **MEXICO CHURCHES**

Demonstrations Not To'Be Allowed Governor Says

RELELLIONS END

Long Closed Church Buildings Are Broken Into

ORIZABA, Vera Cruz, Mexico. Feb. 12.(A)-A proclamation from the governor today informed Catholics of Orizaba that "some of the churches" would be permitted to reopen, but warned no new religious demonstration would be permitted.

The decision came while a Catholic rebellion against church restrictions spread throughout the state of Vera Cruz, 14,000 breaking into long closed churches at Cordoba, with similar actions in other sec-

The rebellion was begun Tuesday when Catholics forcible reopened churches here following the death of a girl worshipper during a police

ORIZABA, Vera Cruz State, Mexico, Feb. 12 (AP)-A "peaceful rebellion" against anti-religious laws last night threatened to spread through the entire state of Vera

Catholics in small towns in the vicinity of Orozaba followed the lead of residents here in reopen-

Local and state authorities said they viewed the tense situation with grave concern.

Gov. Miguel Aleman, who came from Jalapa, pleaded for prudence, but added a warning police might be 'forced to intervene, if necessary, to maintain order.

Soldiers and police, however under orders, stood back as a throng of worshippers flung open the doors of their 14 Catholic churches after they had been closed. One youth climbed the tallest

church tower and fastened to it the national flag and a banner demanding religious liberty. Exultant crowds took possession of

14 churches here, spurred by the killing Sunday of a girl worshiper in a police raid on a secret mass.

Public indignation was increased today as an unconfirmed rumor circulated that two persons understood wounded in the raid also had died. Four persons are under arrest, including the chief of the judicial police, Efrain Moredo.

FDR DECLINES TO **MAKE COMMENT ON COURT REVISION**

Tells Press He Does Not Prefer to Talk Of Developments

IS DETERMINED

Supporters Say No Compromise To Be Made

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12 (A)-Presdent Roosevelt declined today to make any direct comment on opposition attacks on suggestions for a compromise in his court reform proposals, telling a press conference e preferred not to talk about derelopments.

Persons close to the administration expressed belief the president would let labor and farm policies simmer for the present, however, concentrating on his court program.

Some of his supporters gave notice of no compromise on the most controversial of suggestions,-enlargement of the supreme court if justices over 70 do not retire.

If one will study ne will know that all of our economic difficulties have been in the past and are now due not to any defect in our government, but rather to the nullification of certain parts of our federal constitution, namely that regarding money, by certain private groups who have been able o force their will upon us through congress. Therefore, our remedy is not to change the supreme law of the land by an underhanded method of packing the supreme court and domnating the federal courts, but rather by living up to and enforcing the constitution.

Roosevelt is the most dangerous man who has ever sat in the president's chair. There is a difference in a chair and a throne, mind you



Norris Refuses To Back FDR On Court Revision

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12. (A) — President Roosevelt failed Thursday to convince his old independent ally, Senator Norris of Nebraska that naming new men to the Supreme Court is the best way to meet the tribunal's opposition to New Deal enactments. Last of a number of senator sum-

moned to the White House during



the day, Norris told reporters afterward that he would support the President's judiciary proposals only as a last resort.

He said he saw "danger" in the proposed legislation in that it would empower the Chief Executive to create a new Supreme Court over-

Norris agreed with the President that a constitutional amend-ment would take too long too meet day. Young is connected with the the present situation.

As an immediate alternative to the presidential proposals Norris said he favored an act of Congress providing that a mere majority of the high court could not declare aws unconstitutional.

He said his own state has a law requiring that five of the seven mempers of the state court must agree pefore it can hold a law unconstitutional. "We have been living under that

law quite a number of years and our liberties have not been taken away," he added.

As a long-time remedy, which he aid he would push regardless of the presidential proposals, the Nebraskan favored a constitutional amendment limiting the terms of Supreme Court justices.


