

BHS Basketball Teams Face Probation

Two Unsigned Letters Cause Investigation

Bovina High School basketball teams face the possibility of being on probation by the University Interscholastic League for the 1971-'72 season. That possibility was revealed by a meeting of the board of trustees of Bovina Independent School District Monday night. The penalty on the basketball teams, both boys' and girls', is expected to be set in the near future by UIL officials. Last season's basketball teams were charged with playing players in more than three tournaments during the season. UIL rules say teams or players are to participate in a maximum of three tournaments. The charges, which were made in the form of two unsigned letters to the UIL headquarters, said that three players

on each team played in more than three tournaments. An investigation of school record books indicated that one boy and two girls played in more than three tournaments, according to Superintendent L. F. Jacobs. The unsigned letters were sent to UIL officials the latter part of May and early in June. The UIL then instructed the District 3-A executive committee, which is composed of superintendents of district schools, to investigate the charges. After an investigation, the committee recommended the "minimum penalty" for the boys basketball team and no penalty for the

girls basketball team. The difference, Jacobs explains, being that UIL rules say no boy is to play in more than three tournaments and in the girls' basketball section of the rules is says no team is to play in more than three tournaments. Other charges made in the unsigned letter accused the school of practicing basketball and football out of season and on Sundays and having no woman chaperone to accompany the girls' basketball team on trips. These charges were ignored by the investigating committee. One of the letters to the UIL was accompanied by clippings from this newspaper showing

that individual players participated in more than the maximum number of tournaments. The investigation of the executive committee was made by a group of three superintendents from other schools early in June, according to Jacobs. The three then reported to the other superintendents. Chairman of the District 3-A basketball executive committee is Bill Man, superintendent at Springlake-Earth. He received instructions in a letter dated May 31 from Bailey Marshall, UIL athletic director, to have the executive committee make the investigation. Dalton Morrison is coach of

both boys' and girls' basketball teams. Last year was his first to coach here. During the Monday night session, school board members drafted the formal statement which appears at the end of this news story. ***** In other business Monday night, the school trustees agreed to have a 20-foot section added to the home side of the bleachers at Mustang Field. As the remainder of the stands, the section will be constructed of metal and wood. Cost will be in the neighborhood of \$2000, Jacobs says. Kerby Welding Service will

do the metal part of the work and the wood and concrete work will be done by Sherrill Lumber Co. Mrs. Leroy (Nancy) Mayfield was named high school commercial teacher while the regular teacher, Mrs. Glenden Sudderth, is on maternity leave. Mrs. Mayfield is a certified instructor in business education. ***** The board's formal statement follows: "Complaints in the form of two unsigned letters dated May 24th and June 2nd accompanied by newspaper clippings from the Bovina Blade were made to

the Interscholastic League at Austin accusing the Athletic Department of numerous infractions of the rules. "The Interscholastic League at Austin directed an investigation of the charges. A committee consisting of the superintendents of District 3-A, made the investigation and found the charges without basis with the exception of one rule, that being playing basketball players (one boy, and two girls) in more than three tournaments. "Due to the infraction of the rules set forth by the Interscholastic League at Austin it is probable that the boys bas-

ketball team and possibly the girls basketball team of the Bovina Public Schools will be put on probation for the ensuing year, 1971-'72. The school will continue its athletic program as usual. The only difference being that the basketball teams cannot compete for district honors, if the Interscholastic League officials at Austin make such rulings. "This was an oversight of the coaching staff and not a deliberate attempt by anyone to break any of the rules or regulations governing this school as set forth by the Interscholastic League at Austin. "Even though an incident such as this is not a community effort, we feel that with the continued support of the ma-

Charlie Gray, a 45-year resident of Parmer County, is a good newspaper subscriber. When he starts taking a paper, he stays with it.

Cabbage First Crop --

Vegetable Harvesting, Processing Underway

Harvesting and processing of vegetables by Gateway Produce Co. here got underway Monday. Cabbage was the first crop to be brought to Gateway's processing shed here as harvesting on a 40-acre field began. The 40 acres are part of some 300 acres of cabbage which is expected to come off between now and November 1, according to Chas. W. Flynn, owner-manager of the vegetable processing plant in Bovina.

Harvesting of other vegetable crops is expected to begin next week, Flynn says. These include, in addition to cabbage, cucumbers, parsley, squash and red cabbage. Flynn said this week the cabbage market was "pretty good."

"We're getting \$2 to \$2.25 for a 50 pound sack of cabbage

and that's an increase over last year," he says. This year's vegetable market is "more promising" than last year, which was considered a poor one from a price standpoint. Some 1400 acres of vegetables will be processed through Flynn's plant here this summer and fall.

Frank Hemke Rites Friday

Frank C. Hemke, 65, a resident of the Bovina area for the past 12 years, died about 5:50 a.m. Wednesday of last week at Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona. Mr. Hemke was found about 8 p.m. Tuesday in the back yard of his home three miles west of Bovina, a gunshot wound in his head. Parmer County Deputy Sheriff Henry Minter said he was clutching a .22 caliber rifle.

According to Minter, the wound was apparently self-inflicted. No justice of the peace was summoned to conduct an inquest. Graveside rites were held Friday morning in Bovina Cemetery with Cecil Bunch, minister of Bovina Church of Christ, officiating. Claborn Funeral Home of Friona was in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Hemke, a native of Murdock, Neb., came to Bovina in 1959. He farmed about nine miles west of Bovina in the Pleasant Hill Community. He was a member of the Lutheran Church in Murdock.

Survivors include his wife, Hazel; two sons, Jim Hemke of Ashland, Neb., and Charles Hemke of Clovis, N.M.; two brothers, Harold Hemke of Lincoln, Neb., and Raymond Hemke of Arlington; six grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Serving as pallbearers were Robert Free, Pearl Singleterry, Tony Jahne, A. M. Wilson, Bob Servatius, Von Hukill, Don Spring and Paul Jones.

Honorary pallbearers included Howard Looney, Reagan Looney, D. P. C. Hickman, Lester Rhinehart, Dolph Moten and Neal Mager.

West Of Bovina --

Pickup Strikes, Kills Man, 19, Saturday

Santos G. Leos, 19, of Bovina was killed two miles west of Bovina on FM Road 2290 early Saturday morning after

being struck by a pickup driven by Michael Curtis (Mike) McMeans, also of Bovina. Leos was pronounced dead

the scene about 5:45 a.m. by Wilbur Charles, Parmer County Justice of Peace. Henry Minter, Parmer Co-

unity deputy sheriff, said Leos was lying in the westbound traffic lane of the road when he was struck by McMeans, who was driving a pickup belonging to American Duster Company, where he is employed.

Minter said the body was dragged some 60 feet from point of impact before the vehicle stopped. David Dixon was riding with McMeans at the time of the accident.

According to Minter, two youths Leos had previously ridden with, Johnnie Martinez and Reenee Rubio, both of Bovina, were parked in the ditch south of the eastbound traffic lane, in a car belonging to Rafael Leos, father of the victim. Minter said they were apparently asleep and had no idea why Leos was in the roadway.

Rodney Murphy, an employee of Agri-Sprayers, reported to investigating officers that he had seen Leos earlier, on his way to work. He was reportedly on the roadway at that time.

No charges have been filed in the incident as of early this week, according to Minter.

Leos, who resided in the Eastview Addition, had moved to Bovina about two months ago from Amherst and was employed at Missouri Beef Packing Plant at Friona.

Funeral services for Leos were conducted at St. Ann's Catholic Church in Bovina Monday morning under direction of Claborn Funeral Home of Friona.

Council Discusses Horses, Street Lights

stables and area per horse be established along the lines which are now being used in other cities.

1 T. salt
1 T. honey
1/2 c. white sugar
1 c. vinegar
2/3 c. salad oil

Pour while very hot over vegetables, cover and let stand in refrigerator several hours before serving. This salad will keep for 10 days.

HAMBURGER DELUXE
(Serves 12 to 15)

1 to 1 1/2 lb. hamburger
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can spaghetti with cheese sauce
1 can Spanish rice
Brown hamburger in 2 T. oil. Mix all ingredients together and put in baking dish. Grate cheese and cover top. Bake at 350 degrees until cheese is melted.

PECAN PIE

1/2 c. oleo
1 c. sugar
1 c. white corn syrup
3 eggs
3/4 c. pecans
2 T. coconut (optional)
1 t. vanilla

Melt oleo, add sugar and corn syrup. Beat eggs lightly (do not beat until foamy) and add to first mixture. Add pecans, coconut and vanilla. Pour into unbaked pie shell and bake about 45 minutes at 350 degrees. This makes one large pie. Double recipe and you have enough for three small pies.

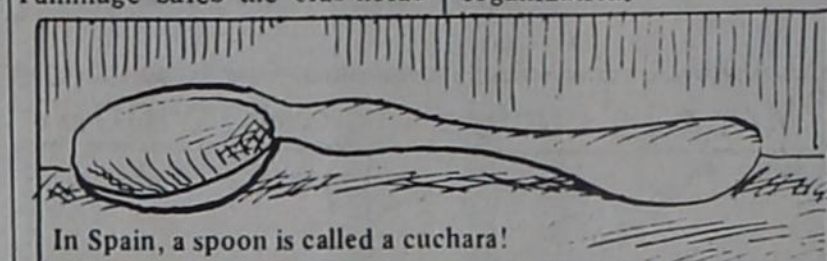
Club Sets Garage Sale This Weekend

On The Farm In Pomer County

By R. MACK HEALD
County Agent

In every part of the county the insect population seems to be on the increase. Greenbugs and corn leaf aphids have been building up for the last 30 days. Although the greenbugs are not as thick as in past years, I have found several fields with large populations of the aphids. Corn leaf aphids are heavy enough in some fields to cause

honey dew formation on the plants. Although very similar to the greenbug, the corn leaf aphid differs by not injecting toxins in the plant during feeding as does the greenbug. In many fields I have been in, there were sufficient numbers of predator insects to keep the corn leaf aphids under control. We are seeing their heaviest

buildup now in the pre-boot stage, for they usually decline during the boot stage. Control for corn leaf aphids is difficult, as you well know, because of their living habits in the whorl of the plant. Most often, spraying for corn leaf aphids completely eliminates all beneficial insects. This only opens the door for more serious insects to move in.

The most dangerous insect we may encounter this year in grain sorghum and corn is the Banks Grass Mite. Damage to plants appears as discoloration, drying and premature death of the leaves. Lodging usually occurs during the later stages. These insects were observed in spots last year. Beneficial insects controlled them

into August of last year before they had to be sprayed. These insects, however, have the ability to become resistant to all of the insecticides that we now use. This has already happened in the Trans-Pecos area and could very well happen on the High Plains. Farmers in the Trans-Pecos area have been forced to use sulfur dust to obtain a good control because of the mite's resistance to organic phosphate insecticides. Mite populations last year were heaviest where fields were sprayed more than once for corn leaf aphids and greenbugs.

With the exception of a few fields, the corn and milo is looking much better than at this time last year. Everything

could use a good general rain to help these wells along, and take some of the hot weather stress off of the plants.

Name Shelby, Stone To Senior All-Stars

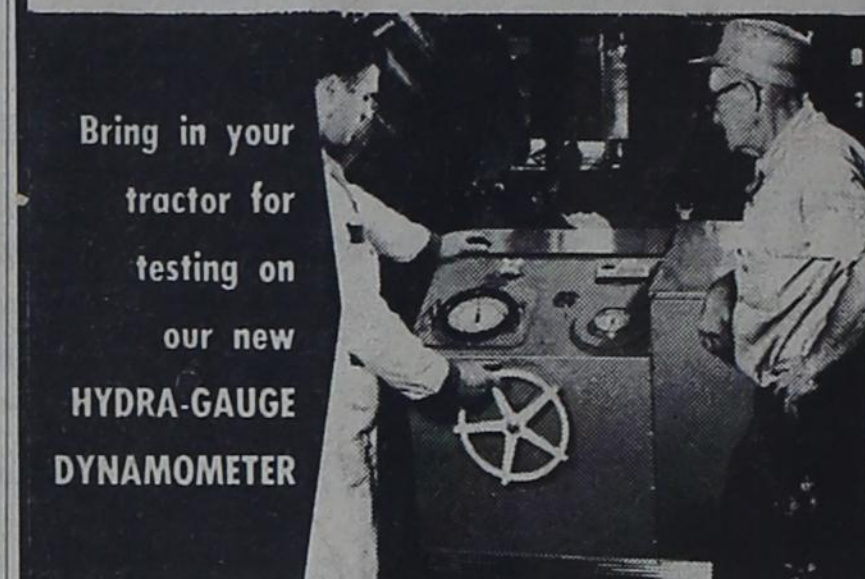
