# Senate Opponents of Court **Revision Predict Victory**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 (AP)-Objections by Senators King of Utah and McNary of Oregon today blocked senate action on legislation to permit supreme court justices to retire voluntarily at the age of 70 on full

WASHINGTON. Feb. 24. (AP)-Senate opponents of the president's court revision program said today after Senator Tydings of Maryland had joined their ranks, that "en-ough votes to defeat the measure have been sighted."

Administration forces contend they had enough votes to pass the bill but centered immediate attention on enacting the voluntary retirement measure of the supreme

court judges. (The Sumners bill.) Passage is generally predicted for numerous Senators who have announced unvielding opposition to President Roosevelt's proposal for revamping the Supreme Court are ready to vote for the retirement bill. It already has the approval of the House.

The president has proposed that a new Justice be appointed for each Justice past 70 who declined to retire. The membership of the Supreme Court might be raised from nine to fifteen under his program. The Sumners' bill, introduced before the White House legislation, simply gives Justices assurance that if they guit the bench they will receive full pay. At present Judges who wish to leave the bench must resign and take the chances that Congress will continue their salaries.

Leaders on both sides of the greatgeneral program privately expressed might encourage the retirement of some present members of the court and thereby facilitate a compromise on the President's plan.

Spanish insurgents reported 2,500 government attackers had been slain at Voiedo today while other government forces pushed widespread counter offensives.

General Francisco Franco termed

### WORKING ON THE WRONG END

Various legislators at Austin have submitted bills to curb certain forms of advertising.

Some would make it illegal for newspapers, magazines or radio stations of Texas to carry advertising of liquor. Others would include beer, cigarettes and tobacco. Other legislators would make it illegal for dentists to

The legislators are working on the wrong end, if they seek to curb the sale of liquor, beer and tobacco, or to reduce the practice of the advertising dentist.

If the people of Texas make it legal to sell liquor, beer or tobacco, certainly the newspapers, radios and magazines of the state should not be denied what revenue they can get from the advertising of such products.

If an advertising dentist meets the state's medical requirements sufficiently to get his license and operate legally, why should the "ethical" dentists take it out on the newspapers by seeking to cut them out of any possible revenue from the profession?

The Reporter-Telegram believes that liquor should be voted out, if it is too harmful to be advertised. It belives that the advertising dentists should not be licensed or allowed to practice, if they are not efficient enough to

advertise their work. Newspapers and magazines from outside the state would continue to get the liquor and tobacco revenue, as would the larger radio stations heard by the people of Texas. Nobody would be helped, but the Texas newspapers, radio stations and magazines would be hurt.

We acknowledge the compliment to the power of the press which prompts legislators to prohibit certain forms of advertising, but we believe the lawmakers should seek to curb the product and not the exploitation of it, if they find such product to be harmful to the people of the state.

And, to the "ethical" dentists, perhaps a consistent advertising campaign on their part would be the best way to inform people as to the superiority of their work over that of the "advertising" dentist.
