

OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 25 (AP)-Agriculturists marshalled here for a war against crop-killing wind erosion, were told Wednesday that the "dust bowl" is spreading swiftly across the southwest and creeping eastward in Oklahoma at the rate

of 30 miles a year. Before the conference was a variety of methods of combatting "black blizzards." Conferees were prepared to ask the federal government for aid because "the dust problem is too big for any

one state to handle." C. H. Hyde, Alva, Okla., farm leader, said he had made observaions that showed the area of loose, shifting top soil was marching eastward 30 or more miles annually. Declaring the dust area is spread-

How Great Britain Manages Its Own Highest Courts of Justice

British History Has Only One Parallel To Roosevelt's Proposal

LONDON, Feb. 24-In his advocacy of old age pensions, child labor nendment, and in his proposal for a widely extended civil service, President Roosevelt can find precedent and parallels in Great Britain. But when it comes to his latest proposal—that regarding a complete verhaul of the federal judiciary—there is no precedent in England. The English make very little, if any, complaint about their judges. At the same time there is considerable similarity between the English judiciary and the American federal judiciary. In the United States, federal jud-

ges are named by the president with the approval of the senate. In Britain the Law Lords and the Lords Justice of Appeal are named by the king, upon the advice of the prime minister and the advice of the prime minister always

The judges of the high courts, as they are called, and many lesser judges and magistrates are named by the king upon the advice of the Lord High Chancellor, whose advice likewise always goes.

BIG SALARY AND

PENSION In America, federal judges hold their jobs for life.

In Britain, judges hold their jobs for life-except the highest of all the judiciary—the Lord High Chan-

He is named by the king upon the dvice of the prime minister. He is a member of the premier's cabinet. He sits as member of some of the highest courts. He acts as speaker of the House of Lords and reads the king's speech if the king himself does not do so. He takes rank above all dukes, except those of

But when the cabinet goes out of office, he also goes out. As, by ong precedent, he is not supposed ver to engage again in the private practice of law, the job is made financially worth his while. He is much the highest paid

nember of the cabinet, getting \$50,-000 a year. When he goes out of office, he draws a pension for life of \$20,000 per annum.

In America a judge can not be orced to retire and can be ousted from his job only by impeachment. In England a judge can be re-moved only if a resolution to that effect passes both houses of Parliament. This would be done only for very grave reasons and has not occurred in recent times at all. In America federal judges frequently keep their jobs until they are very old men.

In England this is even more so. Recently Lord Chief Justice Hewart, who is 65, was indignant over the rumor he was going to retire. Justice Avory recently died




Nevertheless, it seems that the major league owners and managers this year, more than ever, are banking on their recruits being able to step into the breach and deliver with no further delay.








Automobile "production" begins on small scale here tomorrow with the arrival of the \$20,000 miniature model of the world's most modern auto factory, in operation in De-

The model is an exact scale reproduction of the giant Plymouth plant, where completed cars roll off the assembly lines at the rate of three per minute. Elaborate mechanical equipment shows the miniature factory running at full blast with doll-size workment at their regular posts in assembling the midget cars.
