## LOYAL BATTALION REPORTED WIPED OUT NEAR MADRID

Govt. Offensive Is Crippled by The Defeat

## STEAMER TAKEN

Dutch Ship Captured With Provisions For Reds

(By Associated Press)  
Insurgents reported annihilation of a battalion of Madrid militiamen, crippling the government offensive on the western border of the capital, today.

The besieged Oviedo insurgent garrison was reported entrenched in sewers after it had been blown from its ground fortifications.

An insurgent gunboat shelled, damaged and captured the Dutch steamer "Rambo" and seized 120 tons of war materials, consigned to loyalists.

## RUSSIA, PORTUGAL NOT TO AID IN BLOCKADE

LONDON, Feb. 26. (P)—Russia and Portugal withdrew today from a projected six-power naval patrol of Spain and left, Great Britain, France, Italy and Germany to begin a blockade from both sides on March 6.

## RUSSIA PREPARES FOR AN INVASION

MOSCOW, Feb. 26. (P)—Revised general orders command the Soviet army to meet any enemy in his own territory in the event of war, it was disclosed authoritatively today.

Soldiers were advised to attack any enemy immediately upon the event of an invasion without "awaiting special orders."

## MOST OF STATE IS COVERED BY RAIN, SLEET AND SNOW

Temperatures of 15 Degrees Felt In Panhandle

(By Associated Press)  
Rain covered most of Texas today while the Panhandle reported temperatures of 15 degrees with snow and sleet. The weather bureau promised some moderation tomorrow.

Midland missed out on the rain that had been forecast for this area but did come in for a share of the bitter cold that hit north and west Texas.

Temperatures in Midland dropped to 25 degrees last night and had climbed back up only four degrees at noon today, the mercury standing at 29.

The Dallas bureau has again forecast rain for this vicinity tonight and tomorrow. A rise in temperatures is expected tomorrow.

Mrs. J. W. Lemley, who submitted to an appendicitis operation Monday night, is reported doing nicely.

## HOUSE PASSES ACT TO PUT TEETH INTO CAR DRIVER LAWS

Almost Unanimous Vote Registered On Action

## DEMAND EXAMS

Severe Tests Must Be Passed By Those Asking License

AUSTIN, Feb. 26. (P)—The house passed a bill today putting teeth into the drivers' license law, the vote being 106 to 12.

The bill requires examination of all applicants except licenses issued without examination for three months after the effective date act for those able to prove they have driven satisfactorily for the past year.

The examinations include "eyesight, knowledge of traffic laws, ability to read highway signs, actual demonstration of ability to exercise ordinary control and operate a motor vehicle.

## DELAY HEARING ON PIPE LINE RATES OVER WEST TEXAS

Discrimination In Prices Is Being Probed

AUSTIN, Feb. 26. (P)—The railroad commission Thursday recessed indefinitely without taking testimony in its hearing to consider oil pipe-line rates, especially those from West Texas and the Yates pool at Tidewater.

West Texas producers and royalty owners have protested against the higher rate to Tidewater for transporting their oil than charged East Texans. A legislative committee also is investigating asserted discriminations in prices.

Olin Culbertson, director of the oil production and transportation division of the commission, said statements of the companies themselves showed return ranging from 5.9 per cent to 64.8 per cent; with an average for 13 pipelines serving West Texas of 12 per cent on their overall business, including interstate oil transportation.

Charles L. Black of Austin, attorney for the Illinois Pipeline company, one of those serving the Yates pool, said that until specific complaints about individual rates were made the companies were unwilling to submit answers. Lawyers of other companies adopted his statement.

Culbertson said the commission would take up with different companies specific brackets of data and subject-matter to be dealt with when the hearing was resumed. A general order for the new hearing will be issued, he said.

It was stated since present rates were approved by the commission in 1933 the Humble company had voluntarily reduced its gathering and carrying charge from West Texas to Corpus Christi from 35 to 32 1/2 cents, the same as that from West Texas common-point territory to Houston, Texas City and the Neches Sabine ports.

## RECIPROCAL PACT EXTENDED 3 YEARS

Administration Leaders Are Winners of First Major Tilt

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26. (P)—Administration leaders in the senate, winning their first major tilt of the session, sent to the White House today a measure to extend the reciprocal tariff law for three years.

The bill passed easily, 58 to 24, but only after a sudden revolt had thrown a score into the democratic leadership. Southern and western senators, showing unexpected strength, added a modifying amendment to the bill, by a vote of 41-36.

But the leaders quickly rallied their forces and adopted a motion by Senator Harrison (D-Miss) to reconsider the amendment. On the second ballot the proposed change was rejected 42 to 39.

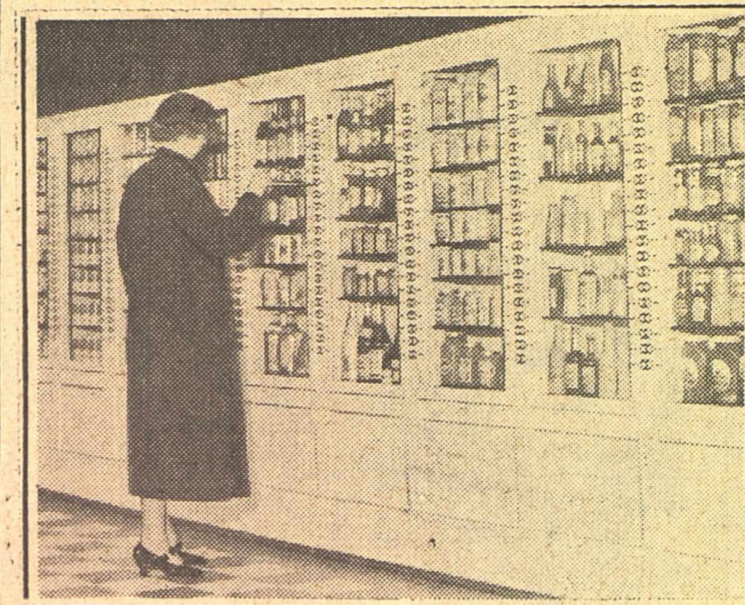
The amendment was introduced by Senator Pepper of Florida for himself and Senator Andrews of Florida and Senators Ellender and Overton of Louisiana. It would have forced the administration to keep tariffs up to a level which would offset any advantage which foreign producers of farm products gain through lower costs of production.

(The reciprocal trade act empowers the president to reduce trade barriers through reciprocal agreements with foreign nations. Such pacts are not subject to the approval of Congress).

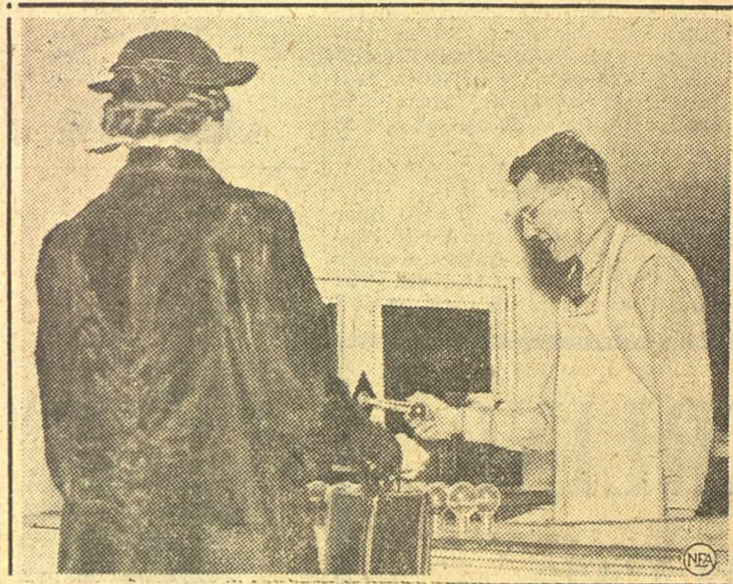

Then, at the front of the store a clerk, as shown at right, inserts the customer's key in a master keyhole and the purchases are delivered to the desk by belt conveyor, emerging from square hole at the clerk's right. At the same time, the bill is totaled automatically. Saunders, one-time Clarksville, Tenn., grocery clerk, made his first fortune with a self-serve grocery, lost it in Wall Street. Later he made and lost another fortune in the grocery business.

## OIL ALLOWABLE IN THE STATE HIKED

1,398,514 Barrels Per Day Are New Figures Set By Railroad Comm.

AUSTIN, Feb. 26. (P)—The Railroad Commission today set the March oil allowable at 1,398,514 barrels daily, an increase of 69,036 barrels over February, and 141,914 barrels more than the federal bureau of mines estimates as market demand.

Proponents of the president's court revision proposal lost ground in The Reporter-Telegram-NEA poll today when they turned in only two ballots favoring the plan while opponents of the proposal turned in seven ballots.

The balloting now shows those favoring the proposal have 91 votes and opponents have 66.

In the national poll opponents of the proposal are leading by almost 2-1. The total vote stands: For-102,124; against-190,580.

## 10-DAY SIEGE IS ENDED AS GROUPS GIVE UP PROPERTY

Sitdowners Put Up A Hard Fight To Remain

## SEVERAL HURT

Eye Burns Suffered By 50 Before Surrender

KAUKEGAN, Ill. Feb. 26. (P)—Fifty deputies poured tear gas into two plants of the Fansteel metallurgical corporation today, ending a 10-day siege.

The sitdowners retaliated by throwing bottles of acid, tools and other missiles and used air blowers in an attempt to dissipate the gas.

Deputies employed a wooden fortress mounted truck and fired gas shells through portholes.

A stone knocked John Froelich, deputy, unconscious.

None of the strikers were reported seriously hurt though it was estimated 50 suffered eye burns.

Strike sympathizers outside the plant were routed before the attack was begun.

## 3 KILLED. 3 ARE INJURED AS CARS CRASH TOGETHER

Football Captain At Rice Institute In 1935 Is Hurt

HOUSTON, Texas, Feb. 26. (U.P)—An auto collision claimed the lives of three persons, two of them women, at a highway intersection late Thursday. Three others were hurt, one gravely.

Those killed: Miss Betty Lynn Beatty, 18, E. E. Stone and Miss Josephine McWhorter, all of Houston.

The injured: Sam Rayburn Mays, 24, captain of the 135 Rice Institute football team, severely hurt; William Sadler, 23, a teammate, condition grave, and Miss Evelyn H. Sears, 21, leg and skull fractures, severely hurt.

Stoney, a lumber company employe, and Miss McWhorter were riding in the same car. They were killed instantly.

Miss Beatty, well-known in Houston social circles, died in a hospital shortly after the accident. She was a companion of Mays, Sadler and Miss Sears in the second car.

Both autos overturned after the impact. Stone and Miss McWhorter were hurled from their machine into a ditch.

Miss Beatty was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Beatty, Miss Sears is the daughter of George Sears, Houston attorney.

## BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—The United States Senate, which will decide the fate of President Roosevelt's request for permission to liberalize the supreme court, is composed 75 per cent of lawyers.

Seventy-two of its 98 members have practiced law as an occupation and many of them still do. The other 24 are, or were, bankers, business men, school teachers, a physician, a dentist and so on.

The last time a poll was taken, the senate was almost evenly divided in three sections—those committed to the president's plan, those committed against it and those who refused to commit themselves publicly. Polls of the Senate differ because it isn't always possible to tell which of the three camps a senator is in. And there is a departure from the noncommittal group almost daily.

included 16 Democrats and 15 Republicans.

The noncommittal group was made up of 29 Democrats, two Farmer-Laborites, one Republican and one Independent. (The third group includes several who prefer a constitutional amendment to Roosevelt's expedient, but who are likely to vote for "packing" the court in the end.)

It now appears probable that more of the Senate's non-lawyers will vote against the administration bill than will vote for it. Eleven non-lawyers have declared themselves opposed, and only six in favor, with seven still undecided. That leaves 26 lawyers for it, 20 against and 26 noncommittal.

### Three Even Divisions

For purposes of an analytical breakdown of the groups and the Senate as a whole, however, a recent fairly reliable poll may be accepted. It showed 32 senators registered for the plan, 31 against and 33 not committed.

The pro-Roosevelt group consisted of 21 Democrats and one Progressive. The anti-Roosevelt group

included 16 Democrats and 15 Republicans. The noncommittal group was made up of 29 Democrats, two Farmer-Laborites, one Republican and one Independent. ### LYRE BIRD ALSO LIAR AND LURE



PROBABLY the gayest deceiver in the bird kingdom is the appropriately named lyre bird of Australia. Its tail feathers curving upward in the form of a Grecian lyre, this unusual bird is one of the most deceptive and elusive creatures on earth. As a mimic it has few equals, and as such it has lured strangers deep into the forests, when they thought they had found a way out.

The reason for that is the bird's mimicry of such common sounds as the bark of a dog, an ax cutting into a tree, a train whistle, the sawing of wood, and the calls of other birds. In addition, the bird is an accomplished actor. It will stand on a mound of earth and wait until all is quiet, then begin to dance. It will alternate its dancing with imitations of other birds, and various sounds, and at no time will it permit a person to come near it.

There is only one case of its ever being tamed.

The three undecided are Hughes of Delaware, Lewis of Illinois and Norris of Nebraska.

Among senators of 60 years or more, 13 have declared for the Roosevelt plan, 15 say they oppose it and 12 are undecided.

**Support From South**  
Looking at the list from a geographical standpoint you find the heaviest concentration of strength against Roosevelt among senators from the northeastern states. Southern states are giving him his chief support. The breakdown goes like this:

Northeast: 3 for, 11 against, 6 undecided. Lake states: 4 for, 2 against, 6 undecided. Border states: 5 for, 2 against, 5 undecided. South: 8 for, 5 against, 5 undecided. Pacific Coast: 3 for, 3 against, 3 undecided. Mountain states: 4 for, 3 against, 3 undecided. Farm states: 2 for, 4 against, 4 undecided. Southwest: 3 for, 1 against, 4 undecided.

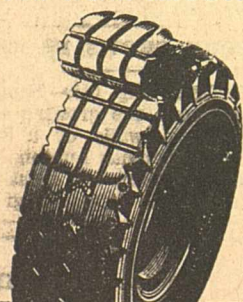

Spiced tea, or as the ski-clubs over this ski-mad land now call it, "ski-ball," is a new hot beverage made with tea that's strong and clear, spiced, and poured into specially designed glasses which can withstand the aromatic heat.

**Ski-Ball**  
(1 serving)  
One slice lemon, studded with whole cloves, 1 teaspoon granulated sugar, 1 stick cinnamon and strong, clear hot tea.

Place the sugar and clove studded lemon slice in special ski-ball glass. Pour in hot tea. Use a cinnamon stick as a muddler. Quite a lot of fun to it.

Snow sports and the March winds combine to make other hot beverages popular. Try this somewhat similar drink when you've stood your skis in the corner and unwound your woolen muffler.

**Russian Tea**  
(12 servings)  
One and one-quarter teaspoon tea, 1 cup boiling water, 1 whole clove, 1/2 slice orange, 1 sliver of preserved ginger and a small piece of stick cinnamon.

Make tea. Pour into hot tea cup containing all the other ingredients. You may prefer to pass the condiments on a tray. If you serve other things with the tea, better not make them very sweet.

**Spanish Chocolate**  
(12 servings)  
Four ounces (4 squares) unsweetened chocolate, 2 cups water, 1/8 teaspoon salt, 5 tablespoons sugar, 6 cups milk, 1/8 shake nutmeg, 1 shake cinnamon, 1/8 teaspoon vanilla extract.

Cut chocolate into pieces. Place in double boiler with water over hot water. When melted, add sugar, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. Place over direct heat, stirring constantly

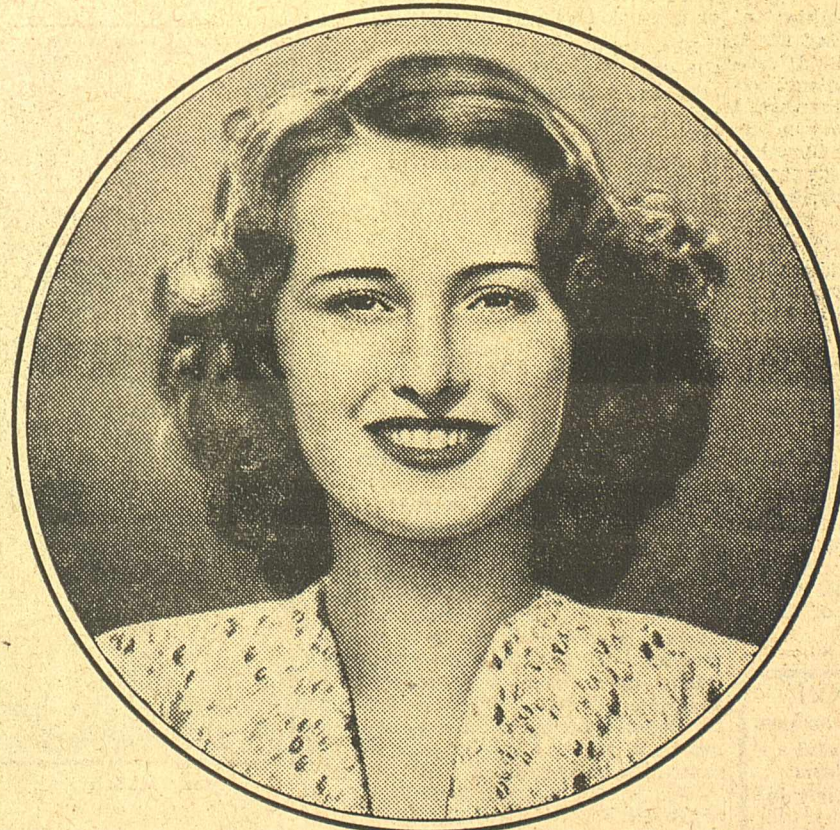

HIJALEAH PARK, Fla. Feb. 26.—Mrs. John Hay Whitney and Mrs. Isabel Dodge Sicane won the Flamingo Stakes when it was the Florida Derby.

W. Parrish's Deltor in a mile and an eighth tune-up, Feb. 20, but is regarded as one of the best of his age in training at Joseph E. Widener's pretentious course.

### No Sir Shattered Pompoon's Streak

No Sir wound up the last summer season with quite a reputation, for at Saratoga in August he broke the winning streak of J. H. Louchheim's Pompoon, which later won the Futurity and wound up the campaign the leading juvenile money winner. No Sir placed behind Col. Edward Riley Bradley's Brooklyn in the Waldon Handicap at Pimlico.

Miss Hirsch is the daughter of Max Hirsch, who trained last May's Kentucky Derby victor, Bold Venture. She holds the contract on young Ira Hanford, who was aboard the son of St. Germans and on his initial trip around the Churchill Downs strip became the first apprentice to win the famous Louisville fixture. Jack Westrope rides No Sir, however.

## Witness to Hickok Slaying Directed Filming of Scrape

The man who saw "Wild Bill" Hickok shot by "Broken Nose" Jack McCall in the Bella Union Saloon, Deadwood, South Dakota, on August 2nd, 1876, supervised the motion picture sequences of the famous shooting in "Teh Plainsmen," Cecil B. DeMille's great saga of the West, which comes to the Yucca Theater preview Saturday night, Sunday, Monday and Tuesday.

He is Captain Jim Moore, and it was from his description that a replica of the saloon was made, and Gary Cooper, who plays "Wild Bill" in the film and Porter Hall, who plays "Broken Nose," were put thru their paces.

The shooting occurred when Hickok, who had been sent into the West to find out who was selling rifles to the Indians, in violation of a government order, found that McCall and others were the guilty ones. He rounded them up in the saloon and engaged them in a poker game pending the arrival of army authorities. The cowardly McCall slipped away from the table and fired into the unsuspecting Hickok's back.

It was recalled by Moore that Hickok held aces and eights in his hand when he fell, a fact which is responsible for the term "dead man's hand," still used in poker for such a hand. It was also McCall, Moore said, who introduced cigarettes to the West.

The romance between Hickok and the beautiful, hard-boiled "Calamity Jane," played in the film by blonde Jean Arthur, forms the basis for DeMille's latest epic. Also in the cast are Jimmy Ellison as "Buffalo Bill," Helen Burgess, his wife, John Miljan as General Custer, and a host of others including 2,000 Cheyenne Indians and 250 cavalrymen, provided by the government and the State of Wyoming.

## Many Students Are Entering Greater Texas Contest Race

DALLAS, Feb. 26 (Special)—Schools in 103 of the state's 254 counties are already represented in the Greater Texas Essay Contest, with the pupils competing for 48 free trips to the Greater Texas and Pan American Exposition and for 336 cash prizes.

E. P. Simmons, chairman of the executive board of the Greater Texas Committee, announced today that copies of the contest book, "The Tale of a City and Two Expositions" were shipped without cost Friday and Saturday to all schools which had requested them.

The committee has printed enough of the books to supply every eligible pupil who wishes to enter the contest. The contest is open to pupils of the sixth and seventh grades of the white schools competing in the elementary division, and to pupils of the white high schools competing in the high school division. In each of the 24 supervisory districts of the state, the first prize in each of the two divisions will be a free trip to the exposition, and a second prize of \$10 cash and six \$2 cash prizes will be offered. "The contest book has been planned to fit into the school curriculum," said Mr. Simmons. "It offers valuable information about Texas, as well as about the exposition, and graphically presents some of the new facts which have been developed about our state's resources. We would like for every pupil to have a copy of this book in ample time to prepare his essay in competition for one of the free vacation trips or one of the cash prizes."

Frank L. McNeny, director general of the exposition, announced that details of the prize winners' visits next summer will be worked out within the next few weeks. The exact dates will be determined after George P. Marshall, Washington sportsman and showman, has completed his plans for the exposition's new theater casino and for the Pan American Olympic games. "It is hoped," Mr. McNeny said, "that the prize winners' visits may be scheduled for a time when they will see the outstanding attractions of the exposition."

The largest single requisition for contest books has been received from County Superintendent Tom McGehee at Abilene, Taylor county. Supt. McGehee asked for 1500 copies of the book to be placed with each eligible pupil in the common school districts of Taylor county.

section 8, block A-46, public school land.

In southern Andrews, Sinclair-Prairie No. 1 Emma Cowden, two miles and a half northwest of the North Cowden pool in Ector, encountered water sand from 4,330-42, and swabbed 41 barrels of water. It is drilling ahead with 800 feet of fluid in the hole.

North of Ector's Foster pool, Sinclair-Prairie No. 2-A Johnson is cleaning out at 4,125. The well swabbed 75 barrels of oil in seven hours following second nitro shot. It is bottomed at 4,173.

In the Cummins-Goldsmith pool, Landreth No. 1-C Scharbauer flowed 45 barrels in one hour through 3/4-inch tubing choke after initial treatment with 1,000 gallons of acid. It is preparing to re-acidize with 5,000 gallons. Total depth is 4,225, with top of pay logged at 4,172.

Humble No. 2 Cowden, in the same pool, flowed 12 barrels an hour, two to four percent water, for six hours after swabbing-in. Total depth is 4,275, plugged back from 4,290 for water shut-off.

Atlantic No. 1-C Rumsey is preparing to shoot, bottomed at 4,250. It had not heaved.

## Income Tax In A Nutshell

### YOUR INCOME TAX NO. 13 DEDUCTION FOR BUSINESS EXPENSES

Deductions for business expenses form a large item in the return of many taxpayers and must have certain qualities to be allowed. Such deduction must be for an expenditure in connection with the maintenance and operation of the taxpayer's business or business properties; it must be an ordinary expense and it must be a necessary expense. In insisting upon the latter qualifications, the Bureau of Internal Revenue is upheld by the Board of Tax Appeals and the courts. Ordinary and necessary expenses are only those which are usual and essential in the case of similar taxpayers "and do not include extraordinary and nonessential expenses."

Typical business expenses of a mercantile establishment, are amounts paid for advertising, hire of clerks and other employees, rent, light, heat, water, stationary, stamps, telephone, property insurance, and delivery expenses.

The expenses of a manufacturing business include labor, supplies, repairs, light and heat, power, selling costs, administration, and other similar charges.

The farmer may deduct all amounts paid in the production, harvesting and marketing of crops, including labor, cost of seed and fertilizer used, cost of minor repairs to farm buildings (other than his dwelling), and small tools used in the course of a year or two. A taxpayer may conduct more than one business and claim the business deductions of each.

### YOUR INCOME TAX NO. 14 DEDUCTION FOR PROFESSIONAL EXPENSES

A professional man may deduct all necessary expenses incurred in the pursuit of his profession. These include the cost of supplies used in his practice, office rent, cost of light, water, fuel, and telephone in his office, the hire of office assistants, and expenses paid in the operation and repair of an automobile, based upon the proportion of
