# **JACKSON ASSERTS** SUPREME COURT IS 'PREJUDICED

'Hostility Counted On to Defeat New Legislation'

WASHINGTON, Mar. 11. (P) Assistant attorney general Robert Jackson asserted before the senate judiciary committee today that a majority of the supreme court had demonstrated "great objectives" to the Roosevelt administration to defend their deep convictions.

He said "this frank hostility is openly counted on by interested groups to defeat much important legislation. The serious split leaves the nation governed by "blind fate instead of reason," he said. He further said that acts of congress were clouded by legal doubt.

# 83-YEAR-OLD GEOLOGIST ADDRESSES **SOUTHWESTERN GEOLOGICAL SOCIETY**



Simonds, 83-year-old for nearly a half century professor of geology at the university. It was in the form of a nautobiographical sketch entitled "I become a Geologist." Following his graduation the op-

portunity to spend a season at Woods Hole, Mass., as an assistant of the late Professor Hyatt of the Museum of the Boston Society of Natural History, came to him. His experience there was lifelong in its effect, he declared. The expanded view from the study of shore lines and of marine funa enabled him to better visualize the formation of sedimentary rocks with their fossil contents. Returning to Cornell he began his teaching career as a instructor in geology and paleontology. Later, 1877 to 1881, he filled the chair of geology and natural history in the University of North Carolina. This was followed by a sojourn of five years in California with the opportunity to study Pacific Coast conditions. Returning to the East Dr. Simonds became successively lecturer on economic geology at Cornell, professor of geo-logy and biology at the University of Arkansas, and in 1890 he began his professional work at the University of Texas.

Dr. Simonds termed himself a 'teaching geologist," but he has filled temporarily other positions. As a special agent of the United States tenth census he collected the data and reported on the mica industry of North Carolina, which gave him ome acquaintance with the Southern Appalachian region. Off and on for several years he was an assistant geologist on the Arkansas Geological Survey under the late Dr. J. C. Branner, and, for a brief period he served as a consulting geoogist for the United States Geological Survey.

Dr. Simonds in his travels has rossed the North American coninent, by different routes, from east to west a number of times and in his European travels he made special observations of glacial phenomean in Switzerland. Of his publications, besides various papers and reports, are two books, one of which, "The Geography of Texas: Physical and Political," has had a vide circulation. Among the scientific organizations which have honored him with life fellowships are the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the Geological Society of America and the Texas Academy of Science. He is also a member of Sigma Xi, honorary science fraternity, and Phi Beta Kappa, honor academic society. Dr. Simonds' career, in the South and the Southwest, has been largely that of a pioneer professor whose chief endeavor has been to promote the study of the natural sciences, espe-

FRANCE and Turkey are at loggerheads over permanent control of the Syrian district of Alexandretta, whose chief port of that name once was the starting point of extensive caravans to Persia and India. From the time of Alexander the Great's victory over the Persians in the fourth century, B. C., to the building of the Suez Canal in 1869, Alexandretta thrived as port of transfer from ship to camel, and even now it is an important seaport and rail terminus.

# Cowboys, Cowgirls Drifting Into Fort Worth for Big Show

FORT WORTH. Mar. 11.- Cowcially geology. The large number of boys and cowgirls from many states persons who have profited from his are drifting into Fort Worth. There's about 500 head of rodeo livestock in the corrals. The new \$200,000 livestock building will be filled to the stall with purebreds in just a few days. The new Rainbeau Garden is all dressed up and is ready for the pretty floor show girls. It's stock show time in Ft. Worth. Stock show time means that Friday

night at 7 o'clock the gates of the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show will swing wide open for ten nights and nine days of fun and pleasure.

Before the start it looks like several records may be broken by the approaching show. Livestock enries already have set new high figures in a dozen divisions.

Never before has there been such an array of livestock assembled for the World Championship Rodeo. More than 135 "outlaw" horses have been brought here by Verne Elliott of Johnstown, Colo., and Eddie Mc-Carty of Chugwater, Wyo., for the saddle bronc and bareback bronc riding contests.

The horse string includes 65 critters that were found on ranches of Montana and Wyoming and have never been bucked in the South. Out from the rodeo chutes will come some of the most vicious Brahma steers that have ever been taken to any rodeo. A scout visited many ranches before the right kind of animals were chosen.

From Mexico came the bulldogging steers. Eighty of them are ready for the rodeo "rasslin".

Probably the most spectacular lowntown parade the exposition has ever held will be Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. There will be a section for old time buggies and carriages, another for latest models of automobiles and another in which more than 150 rodeo contestants and officials will ride horseback. Girls from Kathryn Duffy's Internationale Revue, the attraction from Rain-Beau Garden, will ride in open automobiles, dressed in one of their floor show costumes

Several bands will take part in the parade. Among them will be the famous Texas Christian University horned frog group with its "swing" music, the North Agricultural College Band of Arlington, the Gladewater High School Band the Fort Worth High School cadet band which will lead 1,200 marching cadets, the 100-piece Future Farmers band and the official Southwestern Exposition band.
