



AN UNFAIR BILL

The so-called anti-advertising law for dentists, now awaiting action in the Senate, strikes directly at two principles that always have been deemed indispensable to proper conduct of democratic government. One is that the law shall not be permitted to be used for private purposes; the other is that innocence before the law shall be presumed until guilt is proved.

The proposed new law, amending the dental practice act, would offend in both respects. It would lend the law to the enforcement of a private professional code. It would allow the State Dental Board to take away a dentist's license without proving anything against him, leaving it to him in a later hearing to establish his innocence and reinstate himself.

The anti-advertising section of the proposed new law is by no means the principal change it would introduce. A far more serious alteration from the public viewpoint is the virtual permission it would give to dentists' organizations to fix prices to be charged the public and to exclude from practice dentists of whom they do not approve. It would make possible the denial of the right to practice to a dentist who in every way might be qualified, whose work was of the best, whose patients were entirely satisfied, and who himself was officially licensed by the

It should be borne in mind that under the existing law any dentist, whether he advertises or not, who is guilty of fradulent claims, or malpractice of any sort may be excluded from practice-after his guilt is proved. The proposed new law would not require proof before exclusion. Texas does not need such a law. If all that "ethical" dentists can prove against a practitioner is that he is saving his patients money and getting more patients than if he charged "regular" prices, they should not be granted the use of the law to protect their pocketbook against fair competition. Stratosphere Pictures

PHILADELPHIA. (U.R) - Photographs taken from a height of about 14 miles above the earth's surface and showing objects 330 miles away will be exhibited in Philadelphia.

The photographs were taken by Capt. Alfred W. Stephens, commander of the stratosphere balloon flights over South Dakota sponsored by the National Geographic Society and the United States Army Air Corps. They dearly demonstrate the earth's curvature.

Photographs taken cover an area straight down of 105 square miles. The views were obtained with the aid of infra red rays.
