

ROYAL MOUNTED IS PLACED AT OSHAWA Premier Says Canada Not To Emulate This Nation **OUIETER IN U.S.**

Comparative Peace Hold Sway In Strike Zone

By Associated Press Reinforced union pickets about the General Motors plants defied rapid concentration of police today in Toronto, Canada, as a special force of Royal Mounted policemen were detailed for strike emergency.

The labor scene in the United States was comparatively peaceful with auto strikes settled. Ninet percent of the workers at the Hershey, Pa., milk plant where farmers joined employes to eject strik ers were back at work today.

Premier Mitchell Hepburn charged last night that organizers for the John L. Lewis CIO had "brought the United States almost into the state of anarchy" by a series of strikes, and warned that Ontario will permit no similar situation to develop from the General Motors strike at Oshawa.

The premier said today that his government would give General Motors all protection needed to move parts from the strike bound Oshawa plant. He said a showdown would Warned Attempt To come tomorrow or the next day when an attempt is made to move the parts.







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NORRIS CASE STRESSES TARDINESS OF JUSTICE

The supreme court did a number of things when i had that field day on decisions recently. One job which almost escaped attention in the rush of bigger things was its disposal of the case of Mr. George W. Norris, grocer, of Broken Bow, Nebraska.

The court's ruling in this case proved that it is possible, after all, to punish a man for perjury in this country-if you don't care how long it takes you or how much money it costs.

The fate of Norris as an individual is not particularly important. He was just a well-meaning man who was played for a sucker by the big boys and was left high and dry on a sandbar when the waters receded. First and foremost, it was his name that got him into trouble.

If you remember the case, you will recall that in the early summer of 1930 Nebraska's famous Senator George W. Norris was running for renomination in the republican primary. The party big-wigs, who had been keeping a rod in pickle for Senator Norris for many years, hit on one of those ultra-slick ways of beating him-too slick, as it turned out.

They hunted around until they dug up this innocent grocer, George W. Norris, and they persuaded him to file for the senate. Thus, when the voter got to the polls, he would find two George W. Norrises on the ballot, and would have no earthly way of telling which was which. In that way Senator Norris' vote would be split and the 'regular" candidate might slip in.

The people of Nebraska gagged at this bit of slickness, the state supreme court ruled George Norris off the ballot, and Senator Norris went on to renomination and reelection.

Meanwhile the senate campaign committee began in-vestigating. It held hearings in Nebraska and summoned Grocer Norris as a witness. Norris first told the committee that he received no money from anybody for offering himself as the sacrificial lamb; later, he changed his story and admitted that he had been paid \$550.

For this he was indicted for perjury by a federal grand jury in June, 1931.
