HOUSE VALIDATES AMENDMENT VOTE ON LAST NOVEMBER

Unemployment Aid On Insurance Basis Is Contested

SENT TO SENATE

Early Vote Expected On Validity Of The Measure

AUSTIN, Apr. 13 (AP)-The house today sent to the senate a proposed constitutional amendment validating unemployment insurance legislation, passed last fall, which has been doubted as constitutional in some

The house killed a constitutional amendment requiring the appointment of six assistant attorney generals for six year terms.

The senate kept alive a constitutional amendment permitting classification of property for taxation by voting to print on a minority report, and resumed discussion of the

two per cent sales tax proposal. The senate set a bill making the state Superintendent of Public Instruction appointive for special order Monday. The senate also re fused to allow introduction of a bill licensing real estate dealers.

Decision of Supreme Court on Wagner Act Debated

ARGUE WHO WON

Federation And CIO Declare They Are The Victors

(By Associated Press) Speaker Bankhead predicted in Washington today, that in view of the supreme court's upholding the Wagner labor law, that a presidential message on minimum wages and maximum hours and working conditions would be forthcoming soon.

With the Hershey strike settled and the Oshawa auto strike situation unchanged: outward quiet reigned during an investigation in the Kansas lead and zinc district.

Labor turned to speculation on the Wagner decision as major unionists of both the CIO and AF of L felt a victory achieved.

Homer Martin, United Automobile Workers of America head, predicted the Wagner law will force Henry Ford to recognize the union, now engaged in organization drives in the Ford plants.

The bank was closed yesterday six hours before President Thomas Spruance was found dead, a suicide, near Grand Prairie. Bank examiners said the shortage exceeded \$25,000.

GRAND PRAIRIE, April 13. (AP)-The body of Thomas Spruance, president of the First State Bank at Arlington, was found late Monday about seven miles south of here. He had been shot through the head.

A few hours earlier a state banking commission examiner, A. G. Adams, Jr., had closed the bank and taken over its books. Late tonight Zeta Gossett, state commissioner said a shortage "in excess of \$25,-000" had been found. "At every report I received this
