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## WAR ON CANCER

More than 90 senators signed the bill of Senator Homer T. Bone, of Washington, which would authorize the federal government to spend \$1,000,000 a year on cancer research. It is hoped that this unprecedented number of signatures means that the bill will promptly become a law.

Although cancer has been growing in importance until now it outranks tuberculosis as a cause of death, the money spent annually for research in the United States, Senator Bone asserts, is "less than the cost of building a few big guns." With a million a year at its disposal, the Public Health Service could do much to correlate and advance medical science's long fight to get this disease under control.

Since we seem able to spend half a billion on our navy without batting an eye, we certainly ought to be able to spare one five-hundredths of that sum for the war on cancer.

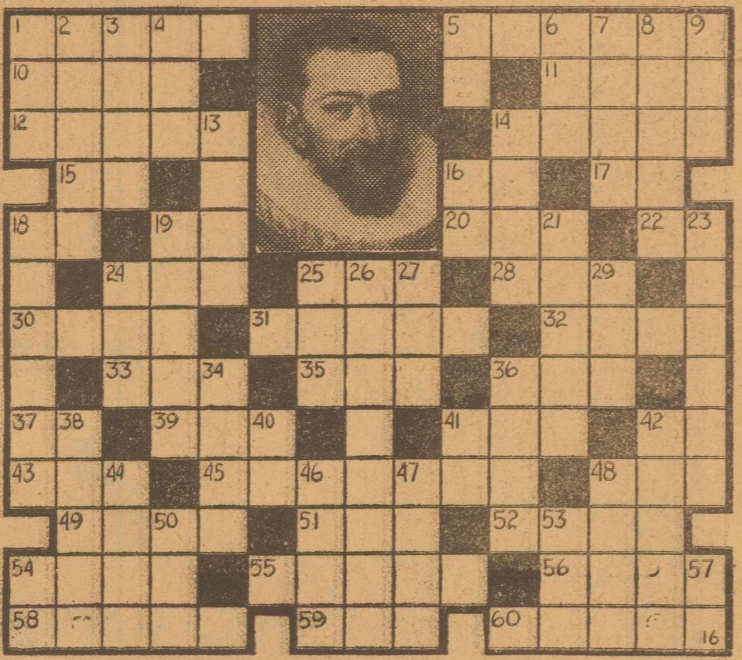

## BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, April 16.—The administration's increasing concern over high prices and excessive profits must be giving a good deal of quiet satisfaction to Prof. Oliver Mitchell Sprague.

Sprague was the Harvard teacher who quit a job as adviser to the Bank of England and became financial and economic adviser in the Treasury Department very early in the New Deal.

Roosevelt then became charmed by the recovery theories of Professor Warren, James H. Rand and the monetary inflationists. By the end of 1933 Sprague had quit with a roar of protest. Ray Moley, Hugh Johnson and other New Dealers of that day scoffed at him.

The fruition of Sprague's prophecies of doom has been somewhat delayed. The breakdown of government credit and unrestrained inflation which he feared have not arrived. But Roosevelt, who was so strongly bent on raising prices three years ago, is now worried by fear that high prices may bring another crash.

He now has come to believe in maximum production at low prices. And it is interesting to recall some of the things which Sprague, who once taught economics to Roosevelt at Harvard, was saying and writing in December, 1933.

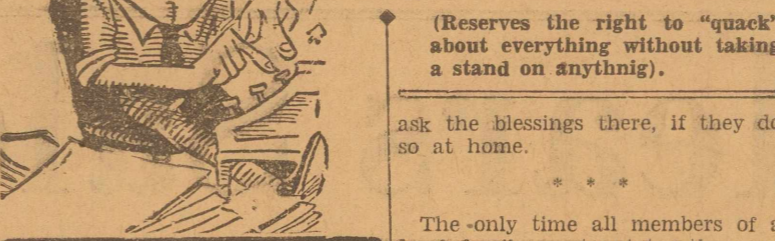
"The fundamental question that presents itself in examining trade recovery policies, whether they be those of business men or the government," Sprague wrote, "is this: can be anticipated if relative prices are reduced."

And, in view of Roosevelt's promise to cut down government expenditures flowing into durable goods as a means of discouraging price inflation, it seems interesting to remember that Sprague said:

"If the primary direction of labor and capital is to be found in the production of durable goods, such as housing, then a government policy of public works that increases the cost of that sort of goods works against recovery. Recovery should be based on low production and transportation costs."

"The fundamental question that presents itself in examining trade recovery policies, whether they be those of business men or the government," Sprague wrote, "is this: can be anticipated if relative prices are reduced."

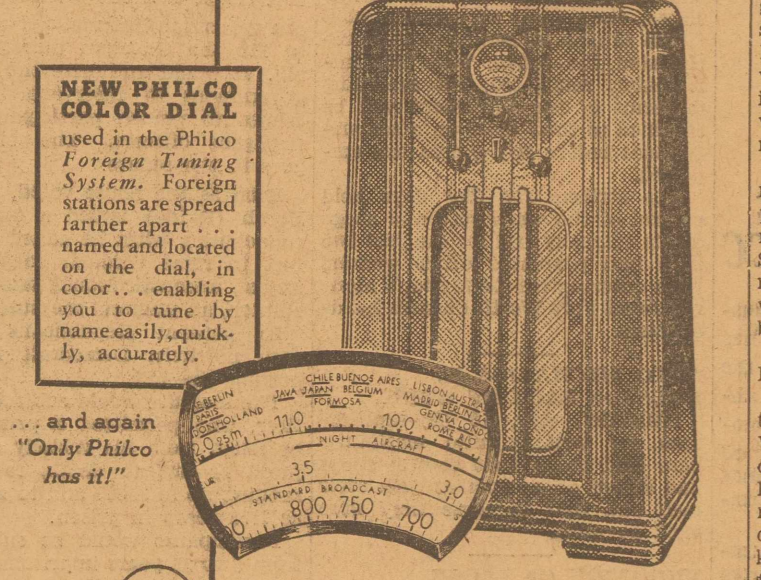



## State and District Agents Make Visit Here Yesterday

Miss Kate Adele Hill, district agent of the Home Demonstration club, and Miss Mildred Horton, vice-director and state agent, made official visits to Midland yesterday. They are both from the Extension Service Department at College Station, and visited Mrs. Lura Hollingsworth, Midland county home demonstration agent, here.

Thursday morning a visit was made to the home of a member of the North Midland club, Mrs. J. A. Hundle, and Miss Horton stated that the local organizations were to be commended for the supply and quality of canned fruit. The canning was done two years ago and was sufficient for a two year supply.

Wednesday night Miss Hill made a talk to the demonstration club council on the responsibility of demonstration clubs of the home food supply, and the giving of information on the production of foods to every farm and ranch woman of Midland county toward the result that every family would have an adequate food supply. She stressed the Good Neighbor policy.

Mrs. Hollingsworth is one of 192 home demonstration agents in 170 counties of the state of Texas. These agents supervise the work of 58,000 women and 25,000 girls. Each county has a home demonstration council that functions as does the one here.

The State Agent, Miss Horton, said, "I am pleased with what I am finding in Midland county."

This work is carried on through the cooperation of the County Commissioners Courts and the State and Federal governments.

## Unemployed Rolls In Texas Reduced

SAN ANTONIO, Apr. 16.—Combined placements by the National Reemployment Service and the State Employment Service in Texas during the month of February, reduced the total of unemployed by 24,226, according to information received by H. P. Drought, state director for the national emergency council.

Of this number, 16,379 persons were absorbed by private industry, which figure was a gain of 223 per cent over the total for the previous month and in excess of the number being given public employment. For the first time since the existence of the National Reemployment Service the national total of persons receiving positions in private employment exceeds the total of public replacements and assignments on relief work. Despite the short month, 250,249 placements were made, of which 158,013 were in private employment. The gain noted in February over the same period of last year was 223.8 per cent.

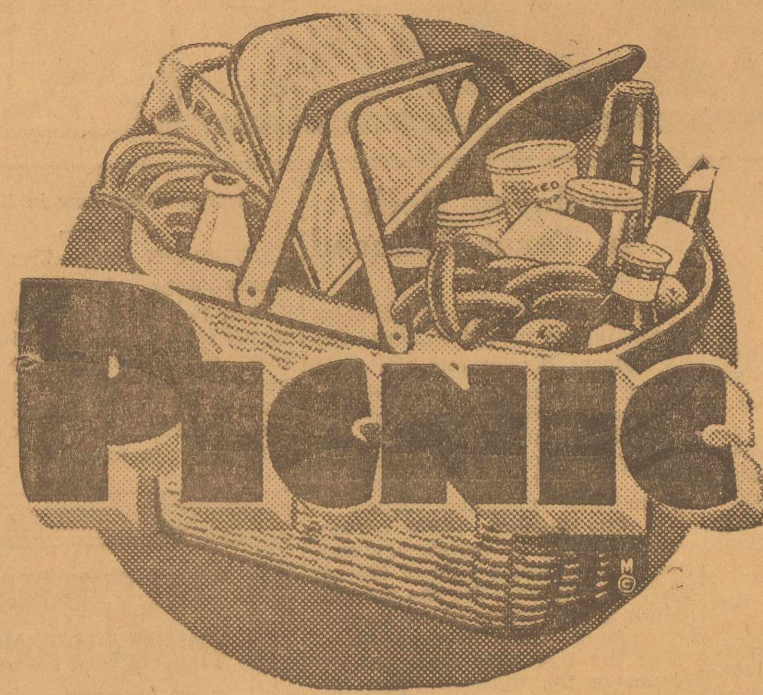
## Average Wage Low in Britain
