### BUREACRACY PROBLEM IS FAULT OF STATES

Behind much of the demand for a stronger federal government there lies the simple and unpleasant fact that people no longer trust their state governments the way they once did.

There are some things, of course, that state governments cannot do at all. But a great many things which they can do they seem utterly unable to do well; hence the growing tendency to ask Washington to do the things which ought to be done at the state capitals.

A revealing sidelight on this was provided the other day by Abraham Epstein, executive secretary of the American Association for Social Security, in an address before the association at New York.

Mr. Epstein was talking about old age pension systems, and he remarked that in too many states such systems have become "mere cogs in the state political machines."

"Grants are made frequently not on the basis of need, as the laws intend, but on the basis of political expediency," he said. "Politicians are outbidding each other with promises of bigger and better pensions in order to appease the appetite of organized selfish blocs.'

Thus there is no uniformity between pension systems in the different states. Thus there are states in which the pension bureau is an acknowledged branch of political natronage. Thus there are states in which pensions are paid, not according to need, but according to what the winning candidates for office have felt it expedient to

And as a result of all this, a great many people have come to feel that the old-age pension problem can be solved only by federal action.

Now this is typical of the situation in a great many other fields, and it is one of the most ominous signs in our whole political life. 



The large troop movement followed a preliminary reconnaissance without mishap and demonstrated the ease and speed with which large bodies of soldiers could

be shifted in wartime. All the 3rd Division is involved in the maneuvers but troops stationed at Chilkoot barracks, Alas-ka; the 3rd Battalion; 4th Infantry at Fort Lincoln, North Dakota, and the 2nd Battalion of the 76th Field Artillery, Presidio of Monterery, California.

Seventy trucks went to Salt Lake City's Fort Douglas to bring back 1,150 officers and enlisted men, making four overnight stops as the 975-mile trip was made in easy stages. The men from Fort Douglas are members of the 38th Infan-

Presidio Sends Regiment Up from the south came the 30th Infantry from the Presidio of San Francisco, utilizing its own motor equipment and that of other organ-

ization at the presidio. Troops from Fort Missoula, Mont., joined those of Fort George Wright, Wash., and proceeded here by train. The 6th Engineers of Fort Lawton, situated just north of Seattle, arrived in their own trucks. Those borrowed from Fort Lewis brought the 7th Infantry of Vancouver barracks, Washington

The 9th and 10th field artillery units and special troops, all stationed at Fort Lewis, also will par-ticipate in the maneuvers, which will include drills with airplanes and tanks.

Last week of the encampment will be taken up with pistol and rifle matches and athletic contests. The various units will return to their base in motor convoys and "shuttle marches." In making a "shuttle march" the unit is divided into two sections. One starts the day on foot and the other travels in trucks. When the trucks have gone about 50 miles, the troops unload and start marching, while the trucks return for the other section. When the convoy overtakes the advance section, the procedure is repeated.






