Wink Woman and Daughter Lose Lives in Stanton Wreck

FOUR OTHERS ARE INJURED WHEN TWO CARS MEET HEAD-ON

Midland Man Taken To Hospital Here After Crash
3 IN BIG SPRING
Serious Injuries Are Avoided by Two In Death Car

Mrs. Brooks Rice and daughter, LaVoy Rice, 10, of Wink were killed and four others were injured in the collision of two automobiles a mile west of Stanton at sunrise today. Those injured were Marshall Barrier, employe of the Flynt-Hubbard Motor Co., Midland; Mrs. C. F. Johnson; her son, Bailey Johnson, 14, and Velt Rice, son of Mrs. Brooks Rice, all of Wink.

The bodies of Mrs. Rice and daughter were taken to Big Spring. Mrs. Johnson and the injured boys were rushed to a Big Spring hospital, and Barrier was brought to a hospital here. Barrier sustained a severe head injury, with a deep laceration, but it was not known at noon whether or not he had suffered a concussion.

Worst injured of the Wink victims was the Johnson youth. Big Spring hospital reports said he sustained a deep laceration and contusion wound in the left hip, with possibility of internal injuries. Mrs. Johnson and the Rice boy received lacerations but were not regarded as seriously hurt. Also in the Wink car was another boy, F. D. Prater, reported from Big Spring as being hurt but not registered at the hospital.

Brooks Rice, employe of the Humble Pipe Line Co., Wink, and Superintendent Lee Johnson of the Wink public schools came through here this morning, en route to Big Spring upon receipt of news of the death of Mrs. Rice and daughter.

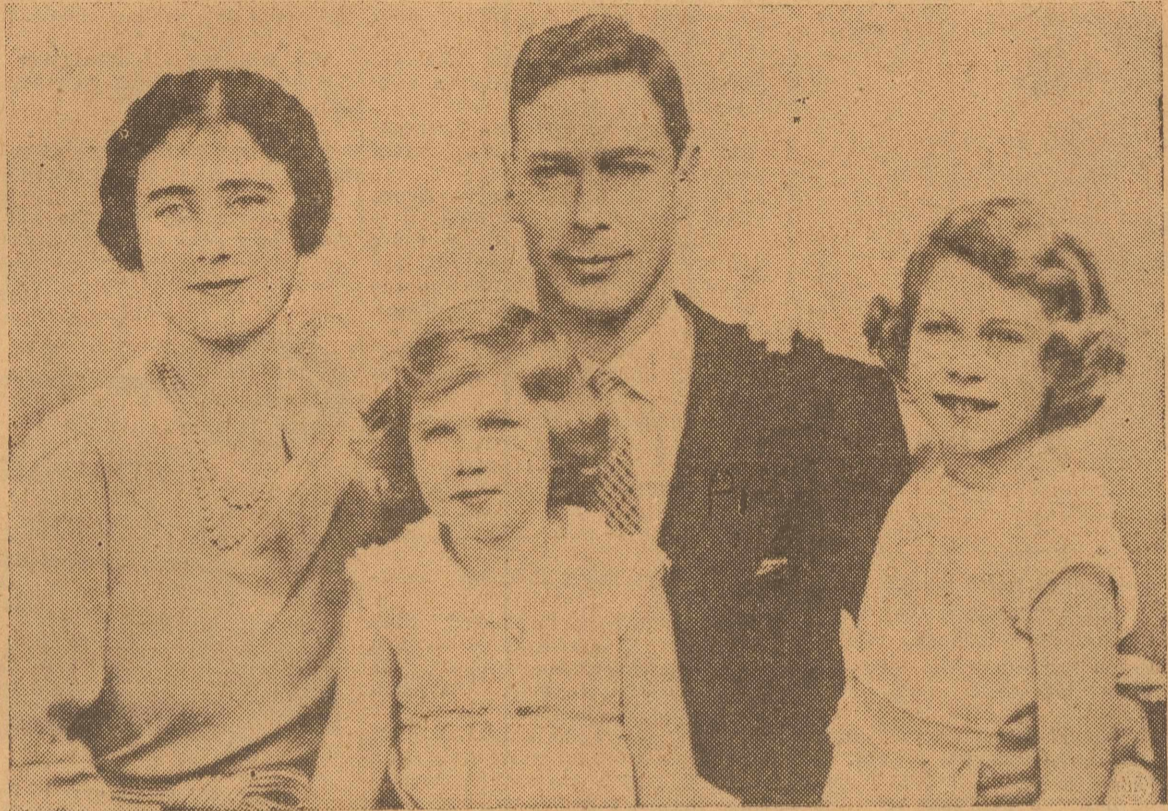
The Wink party, going east, was followed by two school bus loads of Wink high school band members. All were en route to Oklahoma City where the band was to compete in the National Band Contest. It was not known whether they would continue the trip or would turn back from Big Spring, after the accident occurred.

No information as to cause of the accident was given definitely here. Persons bringing Barrier to the hospital did not leave their names, and no eye witnesses to the crash of the two automobiles were contacted. Barrier reportedly was coming to Midland when his automobile and the east-bound car collided.

A Midland ambulance was called to the scene and assisted in taking the injured persons to Big Spring. Bodies of Mrs. Rice and daughter were at the Eberly funeral parlors there and no funeral arrangements had been announced.

Rural School Aid Act Is Acted Upon By House

AUSTIN, May 12. (P)—The senate today adopted a resolution for investigating the manner the state budget was spent during the biennium. The senate committee has already set up and will conduct a probe.

The house appropriations committee worked past midnight on an appropriation bill authorizing \$5,000,000 for rural school aid. The committee voted for the state board to administer the fund instead of the state department of education.

COURT BILL FOES SAY MEASURE SURE TO LOSE IN SENATE

Proponents Declare They Will Pass The Act

WASHINGTON, May 12. (P)—Opponents of the Roosevelt court bill today declared administration leaders had advised the president that senate approval of the plan was doubtful, but supporters said they had enough votes to pass it.

Senator Van Nuys of Indiana and Senator King of Utah urged the recall of Ambassador Dodd from Germany because of his "dictatorship" scare letter. House sentiment developed against relaxing restrictions on the export of helium. Republican house members suggested the return of relief administration to states through monetary grants.

Park Between the White Lines, The Yellows Are "Out"

New parking space lines have been painted on the pavement in downtown Midland, constituting a different angle from previous parking spaces and providing more room for automobiles, according to A. B. Cole, street superintendent. Yellow lines also have been painted, but are merely to cover up the old parking lines, Cole said. They should be disregarded by motorists pulling up to the curb. "Just park between the white lines," was his advice in simplifying the situation. The new angle and new spaces were laid out with a view to eliminating the scraping of fenders, or the bumping of doors against adjacent automobiles.

GIRL CHAINED IN GARAGE FOR YEAR. OFFICERS ARE TOLD

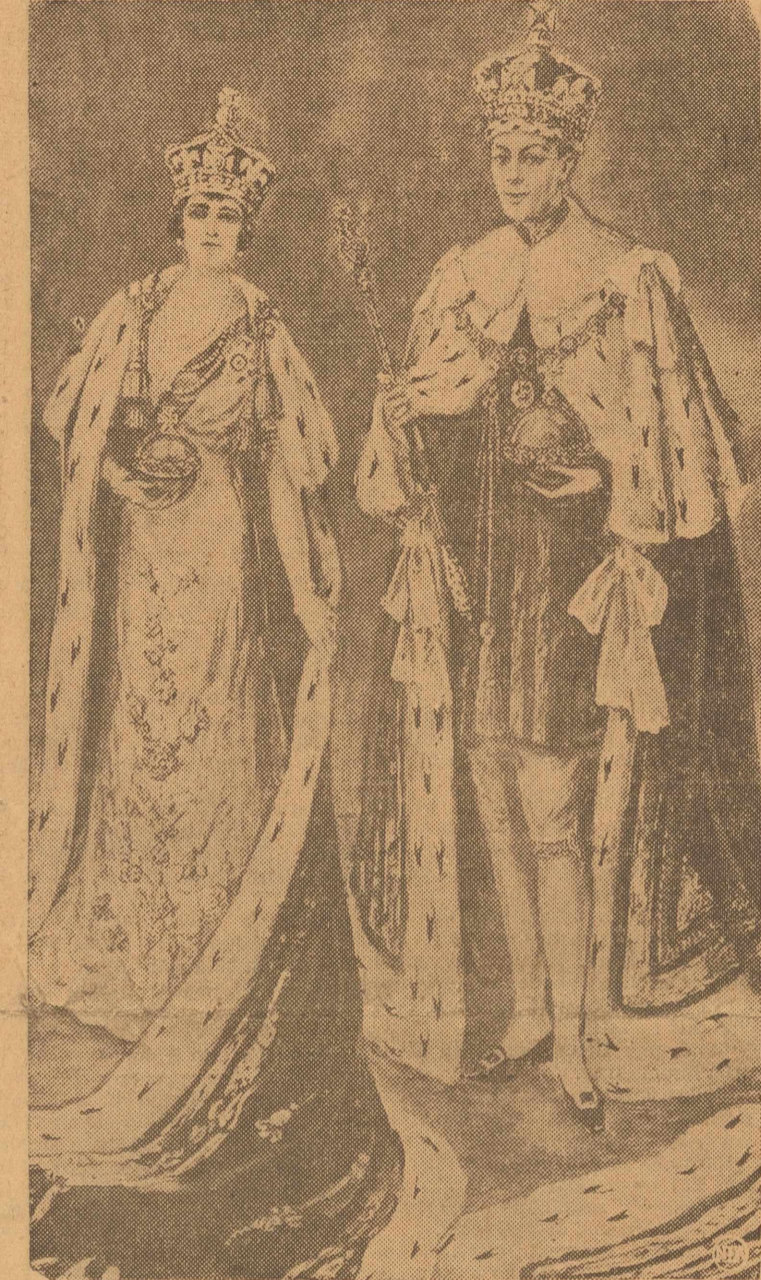
Story of Beating Is Related by The Victim

SAN ANTONIO, May 12. (P)—Police today investigated a story by Maggie Martinez, 12, that she had been chained in a chicken house and garage for more than a year and that she was taken to the mountains by a woman Tuesday, beaten and left. The girl said she walked back to the city.

The story was first told to Frances Amaya, who called police. Officers said that Maggie, who weighs only 50 pounds, was bruised on the legs, arms and neck and that the injuries might have been caused by such treatment. The girl's father denied her story.

NEW ORDOVICIAN TEST ANNOUNCED ON UNITIZED BLOCK IN CRANE DEEP AREA

Sinclair-Prairie and Other Companies Will Drill Southeast of Gulf Waddell

Announcement was made today of a new Ordovician test in the Sand Hills pool of western Crane county, the Sinclair-Prairie Oil Company at No. 2 Tubb Community. Cellar is being dug for the deep try, which was staked 2,310 feet from the south and 330 feet from the west line of section 3, block B-27, public school land, a half-mile southeast of Gulf No. 4 Waddell, first large Ordovician well in the area, which found production in the Simpson and Ellenburger and flowed 513 barrels, natural, on six-hour test through 2 1/2 inch tubing, bottomed at 6,014 feet.

The No. 2 Tubb is a unit test, with Sinclair-Prairie having a two-sevenths interest, Shell also two-sevenths, and Tide Water, Skelly and Standard of Texas one-seventh each. The same companies drilled a unit test last year in the southeast corner of section 3, the No. 1 Tubb, which made a well in the Tubb pay.

MILLIONS ACCLAIM SOVEREIGN DURING CEREMONIES TODAY

Archbishop of Canterbury Places The Crown Upon Head of Ruler; Queen Anointed and Crowned

LONDON, May 12. (AP)—Great Britain crowned George VI King, symbolic Sovereign of a quarter of the globe, amid the acclaim of millions gathered here and in British possessions abroad today.

The Archbishop of Canterbury placed the crown of St. Edward on the king's head in the coronation ceremony at Westminster Abbey at 12:30 p. m. London time. Shortly afterwards Queen Elizabeth was anointed and crowned.

Then the royal procession wound its way back to Buckingham palace in the rain; and there the royal family was forced repeatedly to appear on the balcony to answer the vast crowd's acclaim.

The revered Queen Mother Mary departed from precedent in seeing her son crowned, but took no direct part in the ceremonies except the procession of the royal family through the abbey to the royal box. There, surrounded by her family and relatives, she looked down on a scene that undoubtedly recalled memories of her own coronation 26 years ago.

The 41-year-old George himself sounded the theme of forgetfulness of Edward VIII in replying to the loyal greetings from the empire's prime ministers at Buckingham Palace. He did not mention the brief reign of his brother but pledged himself to follow the footsteps of his father, George V.

"I stand on the threshold of a new life," he said, while his smiling queen stood at his side and listened intently. "Heavy are the responsibilities that have so suddenly and unexpectedly come upon me—but I can count on your unfailing help and affection."

"For my part I shall do my utmost to carry on my father's work for the welfare of our great empire."

The heavy rains destroyed some of the city's cheaper decorations, but did not touch the spirit of the celebration.

SLOT MACHINES TAKEN HERE; TWO PERSONS CHARGED

Rangers Seize Four Machines in Raid Early Today
Charges of operating slot machines in Midland county were filed by County Attorney Merritt Hines in Justice court this morning against Jodie Paulette of Midland and Alton Abbott of Lubbock, after state rangers seized four machines in sandwich shops and drug stores. The machines were alleged to belong to the two named in the charges. One machine was a 25 cent variety and the other three were five cent slot machines. In the charges, the court was petitioned for authority to destroy the machines. "We just want to get these slot machines stopped," one of the officers said.

Dolberry was a theatre employe at Royalty.

"Now, Miss Travis," he demanded

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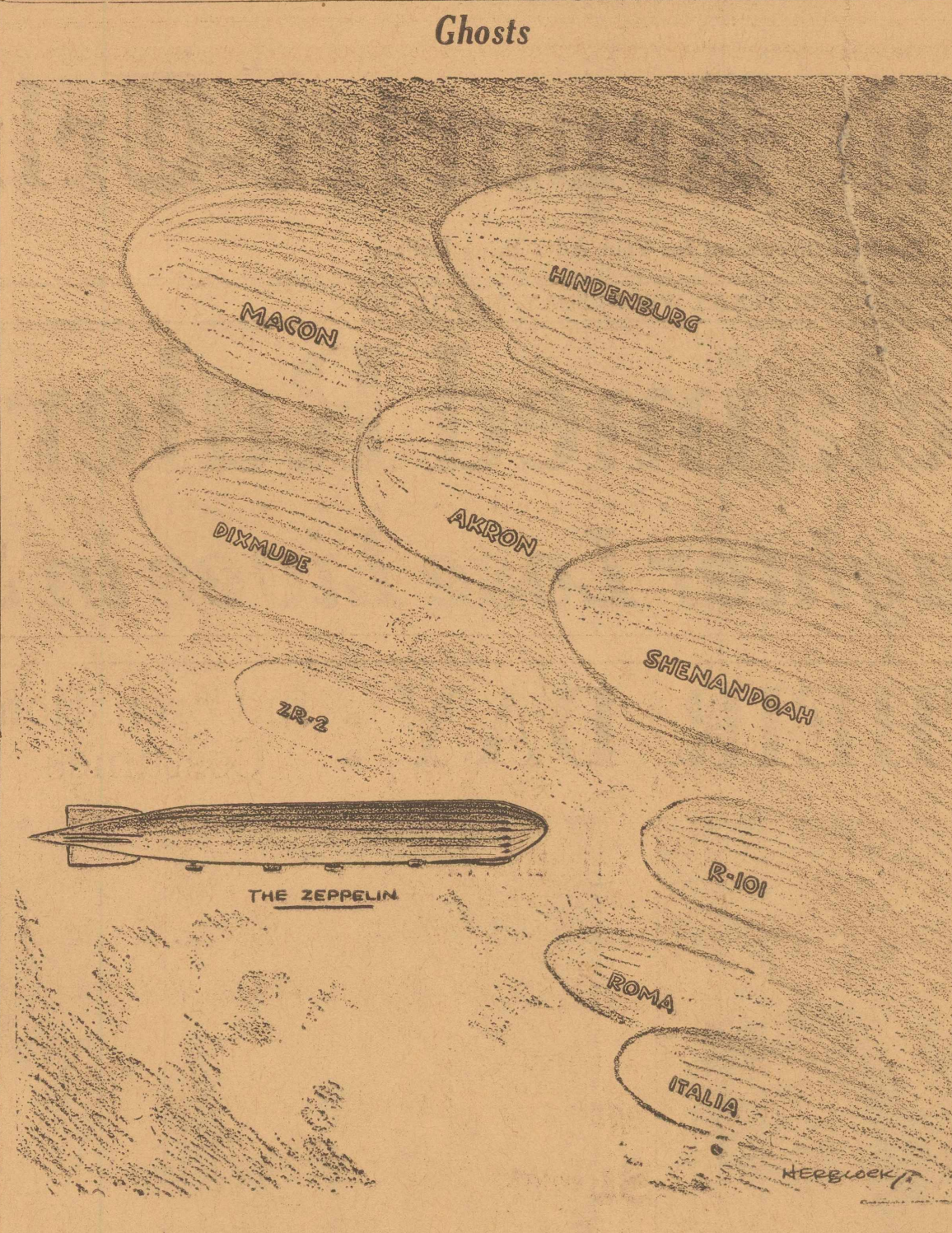
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as soon as Nina and Henri had gone upstairs to their room, "Where's my father?"

Library Circulation at Texas Univ. Is 10 Percent Over The Same Month in 1936

AUSTIN, Texas, May 12. — An increase of approximately 10 per cent over the corresponding month last year was noted in the package library circulation of the Package Loan Library Bureau, an extension service of the University of Texas, for the month of April. With circulation soaring to 4,575 package libraries for the month, the increase was most marked in the number of requests from public schools. Miss LeNoir Dimmitt, director of the Package Loan Library Bureau, reported that during the month over 2,500 packages of material were sent to schools.

"Most of these schools were located in rural districts, remote from library facilities," Miss Dimmitt said. "Such rural schools are coming to depend more and more on this Bureau for such of their library needs as may be met by means of package libraries."

A recent letter received by the Package Loan Library Bureau, written by a West Texas woman, living miles from any library, asked the question, "Where do you get all that information on so many different things?" The letter then went on to tell how much she and her neighbors had been helped by the loan service.

The Package Loan Library Bureau maintains a staff of trained librarians to collect and classify

the ever increasing number of package libraries possessed by the Bureau. The material for the packages is gathered from periodicals, newspapers, pamphlets, and other publications and are arranged according to subjects; then they are stored to be sent out over the State in answer to the hundreds of requests that come to the Bureau each week.

The Package Loan Library Bureau, possessing material on thousands of subjects, finds that the greatest number of requests are on literary subjects, 1,167 packages on literature having been sent out during the month of April. The next most asked for subject were political and economic and social questions with 653 packages being sent out. Fine arts and history closely followed in demand, the list of requests going on down to one man who had been to a clinic for a medical examination and had then written to the Package Loan Library to find the meaning of the long word which had been given him as the name of his ailment.

The report for the month of April shows that the Package Loan Library Bureau sent packages to 500 towns in Texas during the month, an increase of 10 per cent over the spread of last year, showing the increasing use of the Bureau's facilities by the people of Texas.

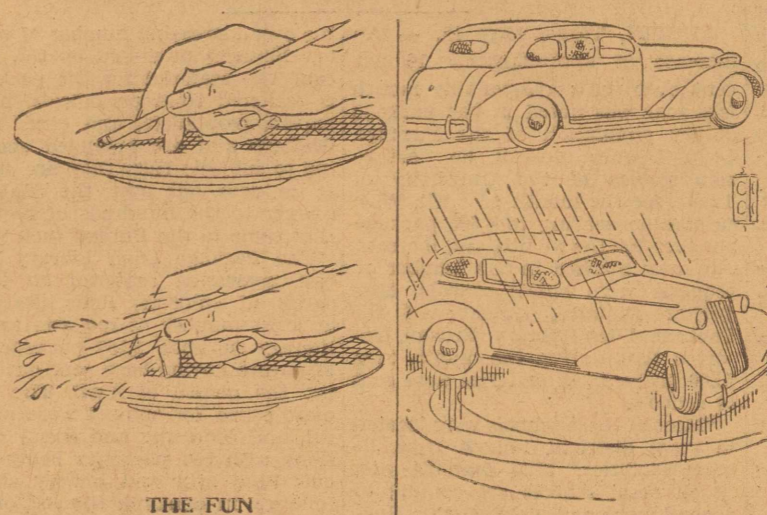

Million Miles Of Travel, No Wrecks

More than a million miles of automobile driving without an accident—that is the record of Paul Robert Merlin, French world war hero, now an American citizen and resident of Santa Monica, Calif.

Merlin credits his perfect record to obedience to traffic laws, and especially his refusal to speed. "Careless and reckless driving is so unnecessary," he said. "Speed seldom benefits any driver. I have driven my present car, a Chevrolet, for 40,000 miles, and have never missed an appointment, although I never drive at a greater rate than the law allows.

"Possibly there are many times when high speed or irregular driving seems necessary," he continued, "but in my opinion these exceptions account in large part for the staggering traffic toll America is paying. It is unfortunate that relatively few motorists should endanger the huge majority of drivers who are careful and obey the law in every way."

Merlin, who became a citizen nine years ago, was wounded by machine gun fire while carrying dispatches between the French army Sixth Division headquarters and an isolated Engineer Corps outpost in the first Battle of the Marne. After discharge from the hospital he saw active service again for the duration of the war.

His record of more than a million miles of accident-free driving was built up under circumstances ranging from ordinary to most unusual. For the past 15 years he has been employed as driver by a large Pacific Coast company; but during and after the World War, because of his driving ability, he was selected as personal driver for General Pershing, General Petain, Andre Tardieu, David Lloyd George, Venizelos of Greece and many other notables. For two years he drove throughout Europe and Northern Africa, in charge of a tour group.

Merlin, president of the Los Angeles Colonie Francaise, was decorated for bravery in action and received a citation from General Petain for valor under fire. In spite of his record of courage and physical fortitude, he fears the foolish driver.

Aggies and Longhorns Meet For The SW Conference Baseball Title Thurs.

COLLEGE STATION, Texas, May 12.—The championship of the Southwest Conference baseball race will be at stake Thursday and Friday afternoons, May 13-14, on Kyle Field here when the Texas Aggies and the University of Texas Longhorns, time-honored athletic rivals of the Southwest, will battle in a two-game series. Each game will begin at 4 o'clock.

The Aggies currently pace the Southwest Conference by a half-game margin over the Steers, having stepped to the front for the first time when they trimmed Rice 17 to 7 the past Saturday. The Aggies will end their season with the series; the Steers will have another game to go with TCU.

One of the teams must sweep the series to win the pennant. A split-series probably will throw the race into a tie.

The two games not only will bring the two leading conference teams together but also will match the two premier conference hurlers and will pit the best hitting club against the best fielding unit.

C. C. Hughson, of Texas, and Doc Plumer, of the Aggies, who have won seven and four games, respectively, against no losses, are slated to pitch the first game. Hughson, who beat the cadets 7-2 at Austin a few weeks past, also is the conference strike-out artist, having whiffed 59 batters.

The Aggies, with three men hitting

over 400, have a team swatting average of .203. The Steers lead the loop defensively with a .945 figure.

Bill Hughes of Texas and Hal Welch of the Aggies probably will do the second game's flinging. Welch has won three and lost none, and Hughes has won three and lost two. As a relief hurler the Cadets will offer Left-Handed Kyle Riddle, who has won three and lost two, and the Steers will have Henry Ramsey, who has pitched only five conference innings to date and who is credited with neither a win nor a loss. Riddle was credited with the Aggies' loss to the Steers.

Pete Dowling, Aggie captain and catcher from Houston, leads conference swatmen with a .412 average and also paces the home run hitters with five. Right fielder Foster (Blanco) Smith is hitting .407 and Shortstop Chris Flanagan is swatting .404 for the Aggies. Head man among Longhorn hitters, is Loy Rigby, right sacker who is hitting .383.

"Uncle Billy" Ditch, veteran Longhorn coach, has lost the conference pennant only four times since the Southwest Conference was organized. The Aggies won in 1931 and 1934. Baylor and Texas Christian also have won once each.

More than 5,000 fans are expected to overflow the Kyle Field baseball stands for the series.

No. 1 Kyle, south offset to Mason No. 2 Kyle, the discovery, is coring today at 3,874 feet in sand, with oil showing logged from 3,870-74. Elevation of the well is 3,009, and it topped black lime at 3,845 and Delaware sand at 3,870, reportedly higher than the discovery. Location is 2,310 feet from the south and east lines of section 20, block 55, township 1, T. & P. survey.

Mason No. 3 Kyle, west offset to the pool opener, flowed 260 barrels of oil in 19 hours through 2-inch tubing set at 3,872. Total depth is 3,902, and the well was shot with nitro last week, flowing 450 barrels the first 24 hours after cored.

R. A. Westbrook located his No. 1 Kyle 990 feet from the north and east lines of section 20, block 55, township 1, three-eighths of a mile northeast of the pool producers.

Nine miles northwest of the pool, and close to the New Mexico line, Barnett Petroleum Company will drill its No. 2 Johnson 990 feet from the south and 330 feet from the east line of section 2, block 57, township 1, T. & P. survey. It is a quarter-mile southwest of the Lewis & Slagel No. 1 Henderson in section 1, which was a small producer, and about a mile northwest of Evans No. 1 Johnson and Lockhart No. 1 Johnson, both of which showed for production. Barnett is digging cellar and pits for the new test.

Heads Oil

Moore Brothers Corporation No. 1 TXL, discovery between the Chalk and Denman pools in eastern Howard county, today is drilling lime below 2,845 feet, and will probably stop at around 2,850.

At 2,845, it headed 86 barrels of oil in two hours and ten minutes, and oil level stood 1,400 feet from bottom when crew went back in with tools. The well topped the main Denman pay at 2,813 and headed 88 barrels in two hours and a quarter shortly afterward. It is in the northeast corner of section 33, block 30, township 1 south, T. & P. survey.

Goldsmith Extension

Rogers & Rogers No. 1 TXL is a new location seeking to extend Goldsmith production in northwest Ector a mile and a half farther west. Derrick is being built for the test, which is 330 feet out of the north-

York & Harper, Inc., and Sloan & Zook Co., are digging cellar for a semi-wildcat in the Foster pool of Ector, their No. 1 Bagley, 330 feet from the south and west lines of section 17, block 42, township 2 south, T. & P. survey. It is nearly a mile south of Empire No. 1 Bagley, a large producer in process of completion, and a mile west of York & Harper et al No. 1 Buchanan, an extension test which is drilling anhydrite at 2,772.

Empire No. 1 Bagley is pulling tubing to shoot. It flowed 25 barrels hourly after second acidization, and later made 57 barrels in one hour when opened up after being shut in.

OFFICER MISSING IN PLANE CRASH

Five Sailors Hurt When Ship Forced to Land in Panama

COLON, Panama, May 12. (AP)—Lieut. Joseph William Campbell, attached to the United States Navy's air base at Coco Solo, was missing after a naval airplane crashed and sank Tuesday off the Colombian coast about 165 miles east of Colon.

The plane, carrying six men, was carrying mail to the navy's patrol vessel Nokomis, which is making a survey off the coast of Colombia. In a forced landing near the coast the plane crashed into a submerged log and sank quickly.

The survivors were Lieut. Cameron Briggs, the pilot; Cadet J. P. Sager; A. L. Odum and R. M. Manders, aviation machinists' mates, and T. P. Stafford, radioman, all of whom suffered minor cuts and bruises.

United States naval planes put out to search for Lieutenant Campbell and the wreckage of the plane, but were forced back by heavy rain. Three surface vessels continued the hunt.

Campbell's home was Pittsburgh, Pa. He had been attached to the Coco Solo base about ten months.
