CLIMAX TO LONG FIGHT FOR RIGHT

OF UNION WAGES Employes of Three Companies Walk Out on Jobs

70,000 ARE IDLE

Bargaining Rights Are Refused By Producers

(By Associated Press) Over a far-flung front mill workers picketed properties of three large independent steel producers today in a strike climaxing a year-long fight to win union collective bargaining contracts throughout the industry

Nearly 70,000 were idle after the Republic Steel, the Youngstown Sheet and Tube corporations and the Inland Steel company spurned demands of the CIO branch of UAW for written bargaining agreements Minor violence marked the start of the strikes today, a foreman being shot at Canton, Ohio; and over 20 workers were arrested in a fight with police in South Chicago, Il-

inois Three investigations were started into the beating of union leaders and members yesterday at the Ford Motor company plant in Detroit. Ford Motor company employes with swinging fists repulsed the first organizing move of the United of Dearborn when they leased the two buildings shown above for unionization headquarters. 





Insiders have been able to make security holders impotent by withholding lists of stock or bond holders and other vital information. * * *
