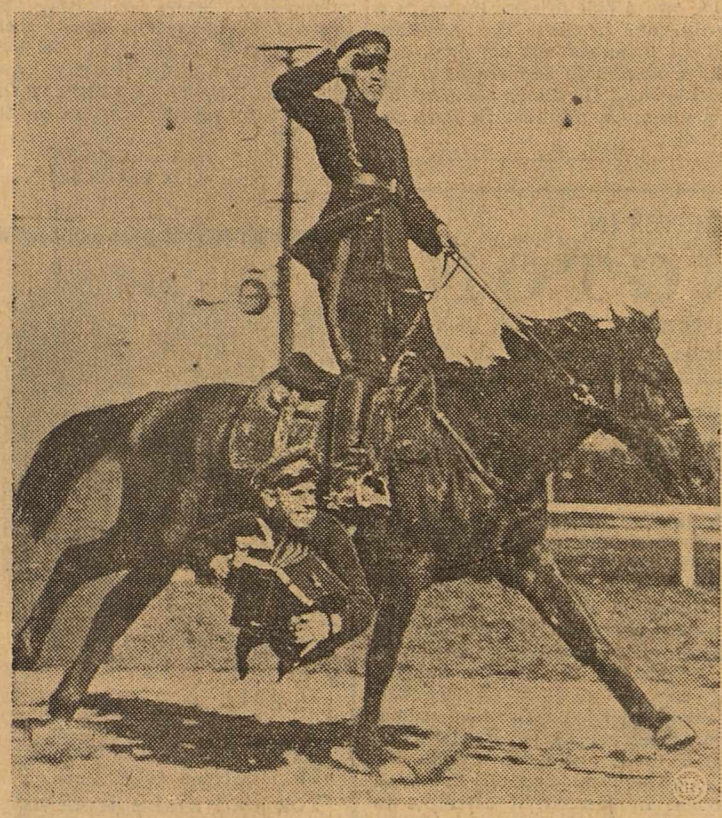

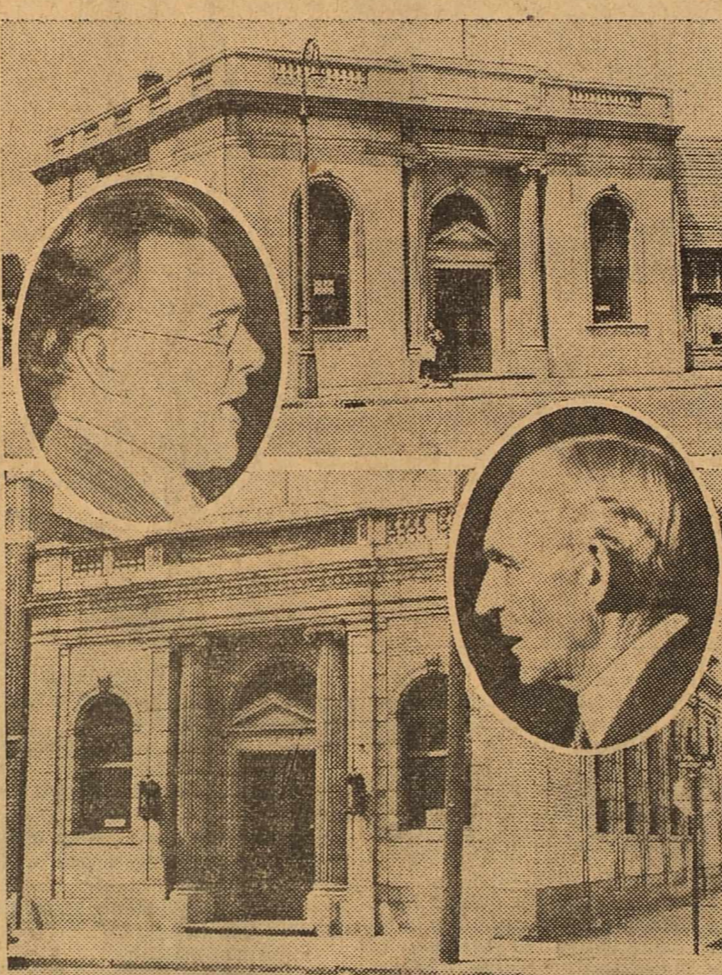

CLIMAX TO LONG FIGHT FOR RIGHT OF UNION WAGES

Employees of Three Companies Walk Out on Jobs
70,000 ARE IDLE.
Bargaining Rights Are Refused by Producers

(By Associated Press)
Over a far-flung front mill workers picketed properties of three large independent steel producers today in a strike climaxing a year-long fight to win union collective bargaining contracts throughout the industry.
Nearly 70,000 were idle after the Republic Steel, the Youngstown Sheet and Tube corporations and the Inland Steel company spurned demands of the CIO branch of UAW for written bargaining agreements.
Minor violence marked the start of the strikes today, a foreman being shot at Canton, Ohio; and over 20 workers were arrested in a fight with police in South Chicago, Illinois.
Three investigations were started into the beating of union leaders and members yesterday at the Ford Motor company plant in Detroit.

SPECIAL SESSION HEARS ADDRESS BY GOVERNOR TODAY

"Uphold Integrity of State" He Tells Solons
WILL OF PEOPLE
Declares They Have Indicated What They Desire

AUSTIN, May 27 (P)—Governor Allred called upon the legislature, now in special session today to outlaw legalized gambling on horse racing in Texas not only to meet a "great and economic need" but to preserve "integrity of and respect for the government itself."
In a personal message to a joint meeting of the house and senate, he reviewed the history of the long racing controversy.
He said that the people had clearly indicated they wanted the law repealed; that he had spoken during the last two gubernatorial primaries when he was elected; and that demands for repeal had been written into the past two state democratic platforms and he repeated that he had made a recommendation for repeal of wagering prior to the past session.
He declared there was an almost complete breakdown in enforcement of other gambling laws since the passage of the race track betting law, and said that he will submit legislation to tighten the laws against bookies and prohibit dog race betting.

JAL AREA WELL FLOWS OVER 75 BARRELS HOURLY

Gulf No. 1 Shahan Is Now Shut in For Storage

Flowing at an average rate of over 75 barrels hourly, Gulf Oil Corporation No. 1 George W. Shahan, semi-wildcat south of the Jal sand pool and east of the Jal lime pool in Lea county, New Mexico, dominated today's oil developments. No. 1 Shahan is producing from the lime. Bottomed at 3,280 feet, it flowed 125 barrels in 12 hours, natural, through 2-inch tubing set at 3,273. After acidization with 1,000 gallons, the well flowed 75 barrels the first hour and 75 barrels the second hour, filling storage. It has been shut in until more storage has been cleared. Location of the strike is in the center of the northeast of section 33-25S-37E.

MONOPLANE FALLS IN SPIN; FOUR ARE INSTANTLY KILLED

Plane Stalls After Take-Off, Falls In Flames

SANTA MARIA, Calif., May 27 (P)—A chartered monoplane, faltering on a take-off, killed four persons in a crash in an alfalfa field near Santa Monica airport last night.
The victims were Mrs. C. W. Whitney, Mrs. D. B. Fauntleroy, both of Carmel, California; Harry F. Emme, Los Angeles oil operator; Rod Kennan, pilot, Burbank, Calif.
L. Ball, eyewitness to the crash, said the plane stalled about 100 feet up, slipping off on one wing, burst into flames and exploded when it struck the ground.
The bodies were burned beyond recognition.

INDICT OFFICIAL IN DOPE SEIZURE

Nevada Narcotic Agent Is Indicted By Grand Jury

CARSON CITY, Nev., May 27 (P)—Grand jury indictments charging Chris Hansen, 58, suspended federal narcotics agent, and A. V. McAvoy, 36, Nevada WPA photographer, with various violations of the federal narcotics laws, were returned in Federal District Court Wednesday.
Hansen and McAvoy together were named in one indictment charging them with conspiring with three Reno Chinese to violate the federal narcotics act, and with two counts each of selling, transporting and concealing morphine.
In a separate indictment Hansen alone was charged with six offenses, including failure to perform his duties as a federal narcotic officer; failure to report in writing to his superior that he had knowledge of Woo Sing, Reno Chinese, possessed and concealed morphine; failure to arrest Woo Sing; failure to seize drugs in Woo Sing's possession, and conspiracy with McAvoy, Woo Sing and others to facilitate the concealment, transportation and sale of morphine.

GAIN CONCEDED TO PHILIPPINES IN SUGAR PACT; AGREEMENT IS WAIVED

LONDON, May 27 (U.P.)—The new world sugar agreement, which devoted more space to details of the Philippine position than that of any other country with the exception of the United States, drew several fine points which may have an important effect in future sugar trade between the Philippines and the United States.
The document referred to shipments of Philippine sugar to the American market as supplies instead of exports, both in the statement of the United States position and definitions.
As it is framed the United States may fill any increased sugar consumption with shipments from the Philippines if it desires, without going to foreign markets.
Quota Unlikely to Be Cut
On the other hand, should the Philippine quota for shipment to the United States be reduced, the United States is required to fill the amount of the reduction from the foreign market, while the Philippines obtains a quota in the foreign market equivalent to the quota reduction in the United States. This circumstance leaves little motive for sugar interests in the United States or abroad to seek a reduction in the Philippine quota in the American market.
The highly important point for the Philippines involved in the waiving of signatories of their most favored nation privileges insofar as Philippine sugar is concerned, in anticipation of special trade relations between the Philippines and the United States after independence, was included in the final draft after being rewritten several times and omitted from various tentative drafts.
This point was considered important for the Philippines despite the fact the sugar agreement is for five years and the date of independence under present law is nine years away, because of the possibility that complete independence of the Philippines may be advanced.
Independence Not Mentioned
However, no mention of independence was made in the document. This was a technicality which the drafters were insistent upon. As a result, the paragraph was reframed to carry the waiver in event of any future tariff changes affecting Philippines-American sugar trade, which was interpreted as having the same meaning.
This particular paragraph was rewritten once more on the eve of the signing of the agreement. The final draft read as follows:

Honor guests at the luncheon were five boys who are participating in the Four-H club calf feeding project in the county, which is sponsored by the Rotary club. The boys were Clarence Scharbauer Jr., A. L. Stewart, Jr., A. W. Jones, David Bizzell Jr., and Elmer Bizzell Jr. Paul Wilson of Debnam's office also was a guest.
Debnam's address outlined achievements and goals of the modern agricultural program and gave government statistics to show that the masses on the farms live better than the great percent of city dwellers. In the calf feeding work of this area, he recognized George W. Glass, H. G. Bedford and Stanton Brunson, cattlemen who are cooperating in the movement.
Announcement was made that the meeting week after next will be a joint affair with the Lions and other civic bodies with Highway Commission Chairman R. L. Bobbitt as speaker, cooperating with the state highway patrol's safety lane campaign, and will be held on Tuesday, June 8.

HEAVIEST RAINS IN 5 YEARS HIT ALL OF DUST BOWL

Crops of Five States Helped Greatly By Precipitation

AMARILLO, May 27 (P)—The heaviest rain in five years Wednesday and today drenched an area 15,000 square miles in the heart of the five-state dust bowl.
Dalhart received precipitation totaling 2.64 inches, which sent crop prospects soaring.
Texline, also in Dallam county, reported an inch and a half.
Rehm in Hartley county recorded an inch and a half as did Stratford in Sherman county.
From Etter in Moore county to Boise City, Cimmaron county, Oklahoma, from half inch to an inch and a half of moisture fell. Guyton and Texhoma in Texas county, Oklahoma, reported an inch and a half each. Mallett, between Etter and Boise City, was deluged with three inches.
Moving east, rain totaling two inches fell at Gruber in Hansford county. Spearman, in the same county, received three quarters of an inch.
The rain is expected to prove extremely beneficial to corn and row crops in Dallam county and the nearby area. Precipitation also was believed moving further east with the possibility the fine wheat section of Ochiltree, Lipscomb, and Hemphill counties would share in the moisture.

ITALY ACCUSED IN SPANISH LETTER

"Belligerent Power" Is Used to Define Attitude

GENEVA, May 27 (P)—The Spanish government today accused Italy of the "most scandalous" violation of international principles since the world war in compilation of alleged Italian war documents presented to the League of Nations; and charged Italy was "truly a belligerent power" in the Spanish civil war.
In London, Britain virtually abandoned plans for an armistice in the Spanish civil war.
Beyond the bearing the agreement will have on Philippine-American sugar relations, the Philippines also will profit from the general improvement in the world sugar industry insofar as that affects the price within the American tariff walls, it was pointed out.

Rainfall Here Not Enough to Register

Although a slight amount of precipitation fell in Midland today, the fall was not heavy enough to register, the weather bureau station at Southern Ice and Utilities company reporting only a trace had fallen.
Cloudy skies continued to keep the days cool, bringing continued relief after the hot days recently endured. The weather forecast is partly cloudy, probably showers in the north and east parts of West Texas.

HOUSE IN UPROAR OVER AMENDMENT TO RELIEF BILL

Maverick Calls The Bill a "Pork Barrel"

WASHINGTON, May 27 (P)—A storm of controversy broke on the house floor today over an attempt to write into the \$1,500,000 relief bill an amendment denying relief workers the right to strike. Although the proposal was shouted down, it precipitated a flood of criticism.
Representative Maury Maverick of Texas, leading the attack, also denounced previous amendments earmarking the bill for flood control, public works and other specific projects. "It's a pork barrel bill and a disgrace," he said.

GEOLOGISTS HEAR ANDERSON'S TALK

Engineer In Charge Of Helium Plant Gives Address Here

More than 50 geologists last night heard C. C. Anderson, engineer in charge of the Bureau of Mines helium plant at Amarillo address the meeting of the West Texas Geological Society at Hotel Scharbauer.
For his subject, Mr. Anderson chose "Helium and the Problem of Geologic Time." He discussed the use of the helium method in determining the geologic age of rocks.
A short business session, Al P. Loskamp, district geologist at Midland for the Barnsdall Oil Company, was elected vice-president of the Society to replace M. B. Arick, who recently went to South America.

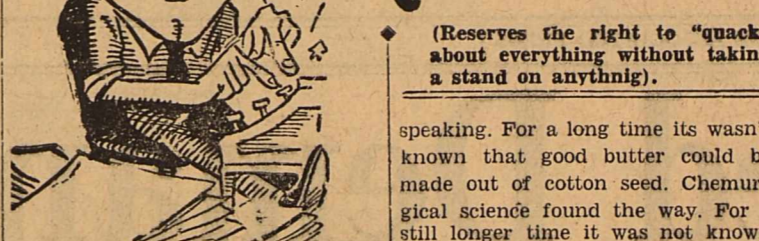

BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, May 27. — No
year seems to be quite complete
without a spectacular struggle in
Congress between the administration
and Wall Street. This year may be
an exception, but the makings of a
fracas are available and inevitably
will be dragged into the arena.
The securities act, the stock mar-
ket act and the holding company
act have come along one by one. And
last year Wall Street and the ad-
ministration were busy with the
election campaign.
In each of these four conflicts
word was spread rather vociferously
that an administrative victory would
mean an end to the fine old Amer-
ican institutions and a new form
of government, in which the worst
features of bolshevism and fascism
would be combined.
Efforts to curb financial racket-
eering are more popular than some
of the other New Deal reform ef-
forts, however, and it should not sur-
prise anyone if the Chandler bill, the
Barkley bill and the Lea bill went
shooting through rather rapidly at
this session, despite walls from the
financial district.
The Chandler bill aims to re-
form corporation reorganization
practices in the interest of the in-
vestor. The Barkley bill attempts
to make trustees of a bond issue ac-
tually an effective means of protec-
tion for bond holders. The Lea bill
undertakes to provide that protec-
tive committees functioning in cases
of receivership shall actually func-
tion for the protection of security
holders.

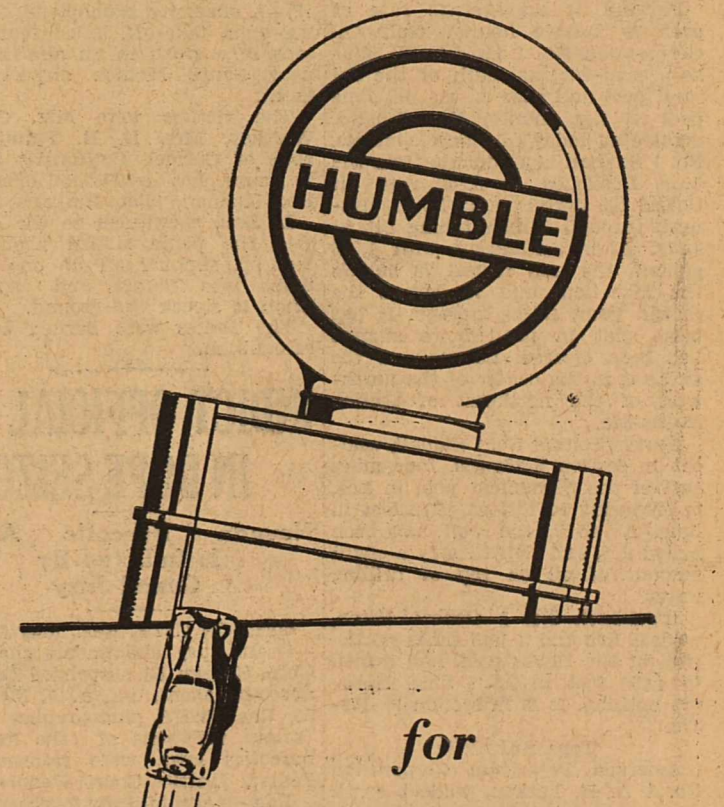

control of profits. Investors have been
unable to make security holders im-
portant by withholding lists of stock
or bond holders and other vital in-
formation.

They will each rope ten calves both Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

Attracting almost equal interest to the main event is a special match between Jack Sellers of Del Rio and Leo Huff of Sweetwater. They will also toss the lariat at ten calves each both days.

Following the two feature attractions will be a jack pot roping contest for other cowboys and an attempt by visiting cowboys to ride the wild Brahma bulls of the Double Heart Ranch. Billy Lewis, college boy lariat twirler of renown, is to entertain the crowds between events with trick and fancy roping.

At the close of all events Sunday afternoon, the winner of the two-day matches between Pardee and Matthews will meet the winner of the Sellers and Huff matches in a 10-calf contest for the grand championship.

Pardee has won the calf roping contests consistently at the three largest rodeos in the United States: at Cheyenne, Wyoming; Pendleton, Oregon and Fort Worth. His greatest treasure, he says, is the last trophy given by the late Will Rogers, which he won in the Tex Austin rodeo at Los Angeles, California in August 1935.

Cox is preparing to entertain the largest crowd in the history of the Double Heart Ranch as the fame of the participants is the topic of frequent conversations and tall arguments, around the chuck wagons of Texas, New Mexico, Colorado and Oklahoma. As an additional attraction, he has booked a well known radio broadcasting orchestra for dances Friday and Saturday nights.

Increase Training Projects in NYA

AUSTIN.—Garth Akridge, regional director of the National Youth Administration, outlined to the Texas staff here Saturday the plans for increasing training values in the work projects program, on which youths of relief status between the ages of 18 and 25 are given part-time employment.

"We must gear up training with a sound work program," he asserted. "The ultimate aim of our work is to get the boys and girls into private employment. If we don't do that we are not succeeding."

Akridge pointed out that the NYA and the Civilian Conservation Corps are pioneering in the field of training for jobs outside the white-collar fields. He also told the Texas staff that it must seek to increase the effectiveness of its projects' supervisory staff on job training.

"The youths we have work part time," he observed, "we must encourage them to make good use of their spare time and help provide ways and leadership for achieving this end," he declared.

J. C. Kellam, state NYA director, said Saturday that the National Youth Administration will adjust its state operation in conformity with the Works Progress Administration re-districting of the state. The 20 WPA districts will soon be reduced to 12, and since the NYA program is administered through offices in each of these districts,

the number of district NYA offices will be cut to 12. The Austin state and district office will be continued.

"This is purely an administrative change, and will not affect the aims and purposes of the program," Kellam said.

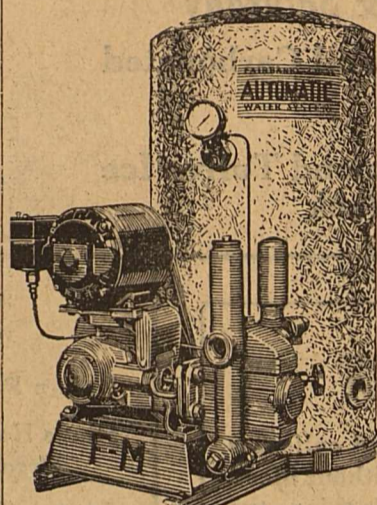

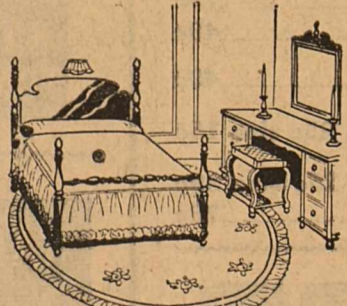

Braille Map Permits Blind to Tour City

MILWAUKEE (UP) — Blind persons may "tour" Milwaukee by going to the public library. A Braille map there enables them to find every point of interest in the city.

Miss Stella Hamilton, home teacher for the blind who helped construct the map, teaches the sightless to read it. Salt on glue indicates the city's streets. Street car lines are represented by narrow connected wooden strips. Bus lines are in raised wooden dashes.

Minute wooden squares designate the schools, while hospitals are marked by wooden crosses and churches by miniature spires.
