## Britain Protests Violence to Shipping

## Republic Company Says Plants to Continue In Operation

### DEFY STRIKERS' EFFORTS TO STOP ALL PRODUCTION

Declare Thousands of Men Desire To Maintain Jobs

### ORDER INQUEST

Deaths of Five Men In Chicago Is Probed

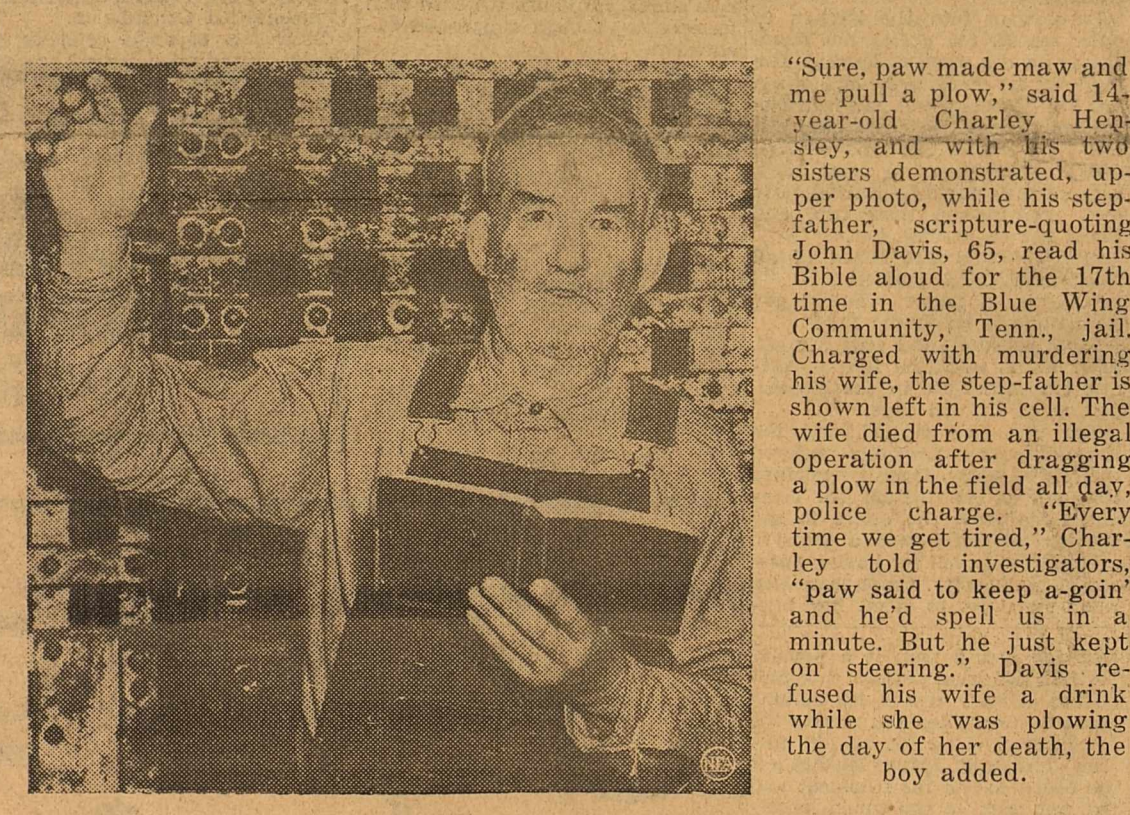
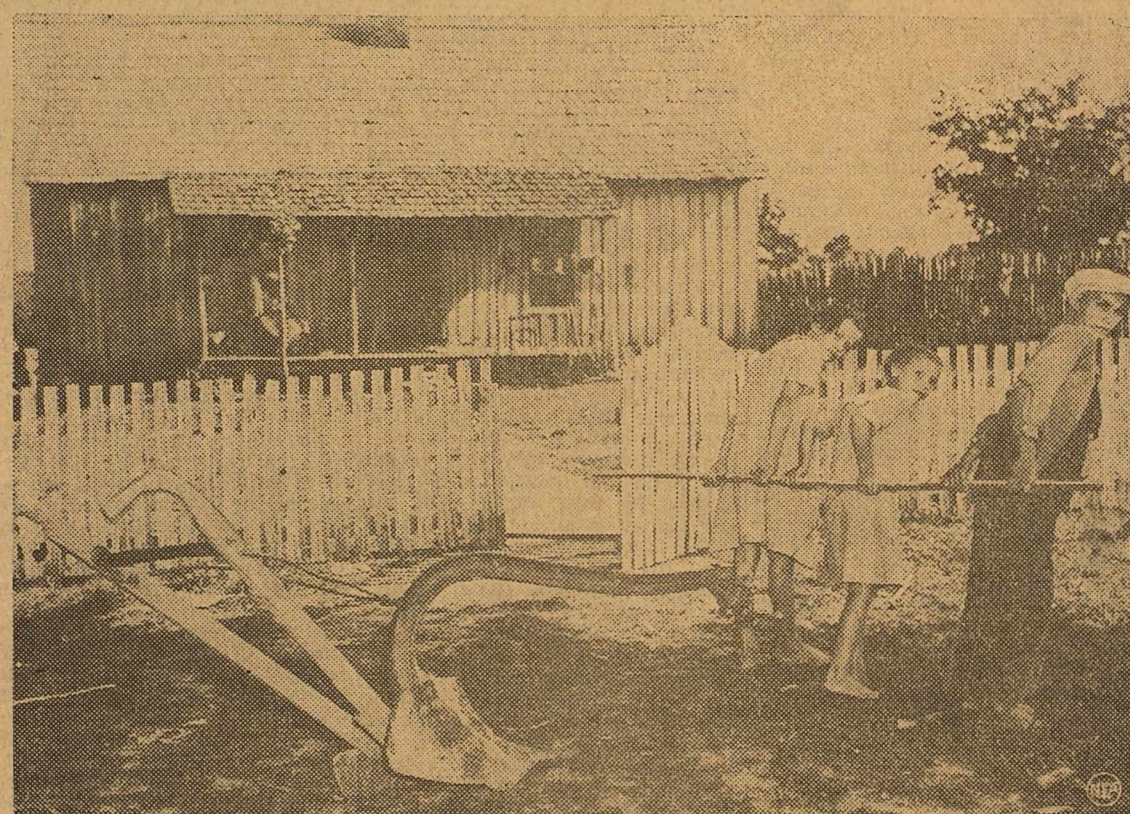
(By Associated Press)  
The Republic Steel company, defying strikers, stated today that it would continue to operate plants at Warren, Canton, and Niles, Ohio, and at Chicago and Buffalo because, they said, thousands of men want to continue their jobs.  
At Chicago, an inquest was ordered in the deaths of five persons killed in a clash between police and a crowd which surged outside the Republic company's plant. Sixty seven men held by police are accused of participation in rioting.  
Prosecutor Duncan McCrea of Wayne county demanded the Detroit Ford Motor company and Dearborn city officials cooperate with him in seeking the identity of men who assaulted UAWA representatives recently.  
A conference called by Governor Henry Horner of Illinois in an attempt to bring peace to Chicago's embattled steel district broke up shortly before midnight last night without any evidence that an agreement had been reached on major points of the dispute.

### WEST EXTENSION TO FUHRMAN POOL PUMPS 216 BBLs.

Stantex 1 Gray Is Completed At 4,480

Twenty-four hour pumping gauge on Standard Oil Company of Texas No. 1 Gray, short west extension of production in the Fuhrman pool of Andrews, showed output of 216 barrels of oil. The well, located 1,980 feet from the north and 660 feet from the east line of section 21, block A-42, public school land, was acidized with 7,500 gallons at total depth of 4,480, and later shot with 740 quarts from 4,300 to bottom.  
In southern Andrews, north of Ector's North Cowden pool, Sinclair-Prairie No. 2 Emma Cowden, section 11, block 44, township 2 north, T. & P. survey, set and cemented 7-inch casing at 3,955 with 250 sacks. Total depth is 3,962 feet in line.  
Allan Hargraves and C. Lem Peters No. 1 Jerold Riordan, wildcat a mile and a half southeast of the town of Andrews, cemented 10 3/4-inch casing at 1,549 feet with 25 sacks and will start drilling plug Thursday at 4 p. m. The well is bottomed at 1,908 feet in red rock and casing was stuck while being run. Location is 1,980 feet from the north and 660 feet from the south line of section 10, block A-44, public school land.  
Gaines Test Drilling  
A. G. Carter-Continental Oil Company No. 1 A. L. Wasson, interesting wildcat in northwestern Gaines county, this morning was drilling time at 4,672 feet. It was unchanged since encountering show of sulphur gas from 4,648-50, with increase from 4,650-55. The test is located 2,310 feet from the north and 380 feet from the west line of section 48, block AX, public school land. Carter-Conoco No. 1 Langdon, wildcat three miles to the northeast in section 44, block AX, was still shut down for repairs at 1,837 feet in red rock.  
Wentz Oil Company No. 1 P. W. Dalmont, southern Gaines Wildcat two and a half miles southwest of the Landreth No. 1 Kirk discovery, drilled four feet below old depth of 4,500, then shut down for engine repairs. It is located in section 5, block A-22, public school land. Brown lime was topped at 4,200, datum of minus 898.  
Amerada No. 1 A. H. Faskan, wildcat south of Seminole, last night was running 9 5/8-inch casing, bottomed at 3,250 feet. It topped Yates sand at 3,237, and had show of gas from 3,205-11. Location is in section 160, block G, W. T. R. survey. Four miles to the northwest, Shell No. 1 Mann stuck tubing, pulled it, and is now conditioning hole by washing to bottom at 5,060. On last 24-hour natural test, it flowed 64 barrels, five percent basic sediment.

### CLUE IS FOUND TO PLANE MISSING FOR SIX MONTHS

Letters Identified By Officials Of Airline  
ALPINE, Utah, June 1. (P)—Letters found in the Utah mountains were identified today by the Western Air Express, owners of an airliner that vanished December 15, as from the ship, and a feverish search for the wreckage by planes and mountaineers was intensified.  
An official of Alpine, picturesque village at the foot of the towering Wasatch mountains 25 miles southeast of Salt Lake City, told the Associated Press he had seen the letters last night but denied rumors the plane itself actually had been found.  
At dawn today a party comprised of GOC youths and volunteers headed up the rugged, snow-drifted slopes nearby to follow what the official called "the hottest clue yet."  
Western Air Express has posted \$1,000 reward for the finder of the plane.

### Application for Location of State Hospital for Insane Here to be Made

Formal application for the \$817,000 state hospital for the insane which is to be located in West Texas will be filed by Midland before June 20, deadline for the filing of applications, according to Mayor M. C. Ulmer, chairman of the chamber of commerce committee in charge of the matter, who this morning stated that committee members have been working on the project for the past two months, or since the directors of the State Board of Control in committee voted to bid for the institution. Committee members besides Ulmer are James H. Goodman, Dr. J. B. Thomas and Dr. W. E. Ryan.  
A brief pointing out the numerous advantages of Midland as a possible location for the hospital which is to be located at some point west of the 100th meridian, is being prepared and will be filed with the application. Ideal and healthful climate and central location easily accessible to inhabitants of West Texas will be shown in the brief.  
Midland, in order to compete with other strong contenders for the asylum, must provide 300 acres of fertile land, efforts being made at this time to secure an option on excellent farm land picked as a possible site by the local committee. It is said that the state will perhaps purchase an additional 1,000 acres of land adjacent to the donated site. It will be necessary to raise funds

### Eight Hailed Into Court for Traffic Violation in City

Eight persons were hailed into city court this morning after being given red tickets Monday by city patrolman Coons for violations of the new city traffic laws. Most of the eight were given the tickets for over-parking in the two-hour zones.  
All were released without penalty by city judge Knowles after being warned by him that their second time before him would cost them a fine. A lenient policy toward first offenders has been announced by the judge, but second offenders will be forced to pay at least the minimum fine of one dollar. More serious offenses, speeding, reckless driving and disregard of traffic safeguards will be penalized heavier.  
Attention of boys and girls who ride bicycles has been called by Police Chief A. J. Norwood to the fact that there is an ordinance against riding the wheels on sidewalks in the downtown district.  
Saturday afternoon, a seven-year-old boy, riding a bicycle on Midland's busiest sidewalk, crashed into Mrs. E. P. Cowden, causing her to fall and fracture her arm. The boy, almost too small to ride a bicycle alone, was "pumping" another child on the wheel and was unable to keep his balance while threatening the pedestrian traffic.  
Parents were asked to see that their children do not violate this ordinance, the riding of bicycles on downtown sidewalks being a menace to safety.

### NAZIS APPROVE 'SAFETY ZONES'

Believe Crisis Averted Over Bombing By The Germans  
PARIS, June 1. (P)—Germany last night approved a Franco-British plan to create naval "safety zones" around Spain, informed sources said, to liquidate quickly the crisis over the Spanish bombing of the German warship Deutschland and the German reprisals at Almeria.  
Yvon Delbos, French minister of foreign affairs, in a conference with the German ambassador to Paris, told the Count Johannes von Welzsek, German envoy this was no time to abandon the European non-intervention committee if it was hoped to prevent the Spanish war from spreading to Europe.  
Officials said the ambassador replied Germany was favorable to a security plan which would satisfy her demands for guarantees against further incidents like the Deutschland bombing.  
Delbos in a talk with Luis Araquistain, Spanish government ambassador, warned against further Spanish attacks on foreign warships.  
French officials said they considered the danger of the Spanish-international incidents extending the strife averted.

### San Antonio Streets Flooded as Rain Continues Fall

7 Inches Reported In City Since Sunday  
SAN ANTONIO, June 1. (P)—Rainfall of alarming proportions slashed at San Antonio Monday, creating serious conditions in the city and its environs.  
Where the West Texas rains improved crop and range prospects, the San Antonio downpour of more than six inches brought damage estimated at \$10,000 and \$15,000.  
Creeks rose at alarming rates and motorists were warned to avoid crossing them in apparently shallow waters clogged storm sewers flooded many first floor offices and business establishments; homes in the low areas were inundated; automobiles stalled.  
Play in the women's Trans-Mississippi golf tournament, scheduled to open today, was set ahead a day when the San Antonio Country club course became a bunkered lake.  
A memorial day parade and programs were cancelled.  
Kerrville reported a six-inch fall south of there, with four and a half inches in the city. Five inches fell at San Marcos and heavy rains fell the Llano river.  
Heavy rains spotted the San Angelo territory. The western city itself had 3.06 inches; Eden 4 inches, Brady 3.5, Junction 1.90, Rowens 1.25.  
Some sheep drowned at Eden; one store was flooded and some trees in San Angelo were blown down.  
Rainfall amounting to 2.46 inches was general over Travis county the past 24 hours. Continued showers were forecast.

### PEAK PRICES FOR AGRI. THIS YEAR

Cash Income During First 6 Months is Highest Since 1930  
WASHINGTON, June 1. (P)—Government experts today predicted a possible new peak in agricultural recovery this year. They said that the cash income for the first part of the year was the largest since 1930; the ratio of prices received were the best since 1925; the demand for farm products was keeping up with advancing business and recovery.

### First Down in Strike Clash

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### COMPTROLLER OF UNIVERSITY IS NEW PRESIDENT

J. W. Calhoun Is To Assume The Post Temporarily  
GALVESTON, Texas, June 1. (P)—J. W. Calhoun, 64, who graduated from the University of Texas thirty-two years ago, was named acting president of the institution Monday.  
The handsome comptroller of the university and professor of applied mathematics, was named at a board of regents meeting to succeed the late Dr. H. Y. Benedict. Calhoun has been connected with the school about thirty years.  
A Pennsylvania native, Calhoun received his master of arts degree from Harvard in 1908, three years after finishing the University of Texas course.  
He advanced to his present position through steps as an instructor and associate professor of mathematics.  
He is a member of the American Mathematical Society and the Mathematics Association of America, the Phi Beta Kappa fraternity and is the author of several books.  
President Calhoun is married and has one daughter, Mrs. Kay Miller of Austin.

### OFFICER IS SHOT, ATHLETE IS HELD

Star of Arkansas University Grid Team Taken In Corpus Christi  
CORPUS CHRISTI, June 1. (P)—A charge of assault with intent to murder was filed Monday against H. L. Poole Jr., the University of Arkansas' football and basket ball star of last year, in connection with the shooting of Edward Herro, traffic officer, early Sunday.  
Poole, all-Southwest Conference end and captain of the university basket-ball team last season, was released on \$1,000 bond.  
Poole said he thought the officer, shot with his own gun in attempting to make a traffic case arrest, was a bandit. Herro was not in uniform at the time.  
The former athlete is employed as salesman by an oil tank company at Alice.  
Herro, shot through the right hand and the abdomen by a single bullet, was in critical condition, although improving slightly.

### VATICAN OBJECT OF NAZI PROTEST

Failure to Disavow Talk By Mundein Blamed On Church Head  
BERLIN, June 1. (P)—The German government today formally accused the Vatican of endangering normal relations with the Reich by failure to disavow the recent critical speech of Cardinal Mundein in Chicago. The Cardinal called Adolf Hitler "an Austrian paper hanger, and a poor one at that."

### SIDES WITH ITALY, GERMANY AGAINST SPANISH ACTIONS

Protest Based Upon Attack on Ship May 26

### MAY USE FORCE

Protection Assured Countries by The Spaniards

LONDON, June 1. (P)—Great Britain joined Germany and Italy today in protesting Spanish government violence against neutral shipping.  
The British protest was based on an attack on a British warship May 26, when it was almost hit by aerial bombs.  
Authoritative sources said that Britain might face the task of proposing that the non-intervention committee guarantee by force a rule that Spaniards keep hands off foreign shipping.  
From the Spanish government, after the protest, Britain received apparent assurances of readiness to establish "safety zones" for neutral warships.  
Foreign secretary Anthony Eden urged foreign envoys to regard the need for restraint in the new Spanish-European crisis.  
Informed quarters said that while the British government deplored such attacks as the Spanish government bombing of the German cruiser Deutschland, it had no thought of condoning the Reich's retaliatory bombardment of Almeria.  
Meanwhile, fears were expressed the Spanish government's actions over the incident might lead to precipitate action endangering the peace of Europe.

### HULL HEARS PROTEST OF GERMAN REPRISAL

WASHINGTON, June 1. (P)—Spanish Ambassador Fernando De los Rios protested to Secretary Hull today the German bombardment of Almeria was "direct violation of the principles of international law."  
Secretary Hull conveyed his personal hope informally to the German Ambassador that the Reich will find some peaceable way to adjust the Spanish incident.

### HONORARY DEGREE COFERRED UPON CITY SCHOOL HEAD

Lackey Is Honored By University At Abilene

Honorary degree of Doctor of Laws was conferred upon Superintendent W. W. Lackey of the Midland public schools by Hardin-Simmons university at Abilene today. The ceremony was in connection with final graduation exercises of the university, at which 148 seniors received college degrees.  
The honorary degree conferred on the Midland educator was in recognition of his long years of service as head of the schools here and for the accomplishments made in elevating the institution to among the highest of Texas, officials of Hardin-Simmons said.  
Federal Judge W. H. Atwell of Dallas conferred the degree, also addressing the university's graduates. The commencement sermon Sunday was preached by Dr. R. C. Campbell, secretary of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

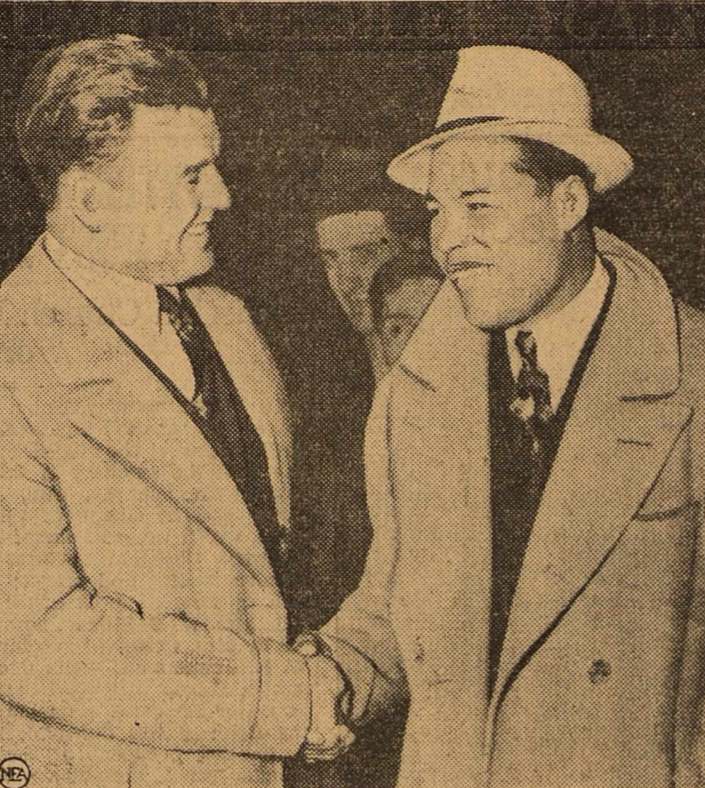

All parents of boys aged 9, 10 and 11 are urged to attend.

**The Den**

1. What is it?
  - a. Natural neighborhood play group.
  - b. Unit which meets most often, formal weekly meeting and special meetings.
  - c. Real idea is that Pack exists to stimulate and aid the Den to carry on its program, to the end that Cubs may use spare time effectively.
2. How many in a Den?
  - a. Vary in size according to the neighborhood, 2 to 6 ordinarily.
  - b. Small number makes better educational unit.
3. Where does it meet?
  - a. Formal meeting may be held in basement, attic, garage, outdoors, or home of one of the boys.
  - b. May meet at Den Mother's home.
  - c. Always meets in daytime.
  - d. Den Mother.
  - e. Chosen as representative of other mothers.
  - f. Shares with Den Chief in responsibility for Den.
  - g. Den Chief should consult with her.
4. Relation to Den varies from advisor to one who will actively help in work.
5. In most instances she looks to Den Chief to actually run meeting.

**How to use Denners:**

- a. Older person acting as leader owes it to younger opportunity to gain experience.
- b. Wise adult gives boy leaders chance to lead. When there is something to do, the wise older leader gives the younger a chance to do; therefore teaching him to bear responsibility.
- c. Just so Den Chief calls on Denner to lead a game, cheer, demonstrate, help plan, instead of always leading himself.
- d. The Den meeting:
  - a. Must be planned with respect to the fact that they:
    - i. Like action rather than sitting still.
    - ii. Like doing something themselves rather than listening to someone talk.
    - iii. Like change rather than monotony.
    - iv. Curiosity... new challenges them.
  - e. Attention shifts easily and quickly.
7. Elements in Den meetings:
  - a. Boy interest throughout... in advancement as in games; this hinges largely on the Den Chief's own spirit and attitude.
  - b. Work on achievements... and on problems therein; here encouragement given Cub helps him achieve.
  - c. Indispensable fun and action games; after all, fun is seriously important.
  - d. Chances for the boy to exercise initiative, to push ahead; get him to try to do his best instead of giving him formal assignments.
  - e. Light touch of inspiration: all these tied together with happy friendliness.

The meeting itself involves: gathering, opening, body of meeting, closing.

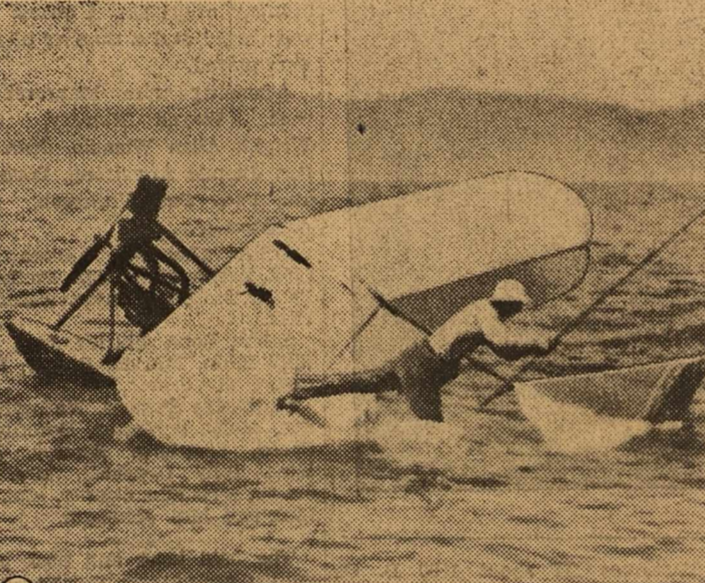
Gathering time—plan for it, be there, must not be made a rough house; answer to this is games.

Opening—may be formal or informal; in calling to order leader raises hand high above head. When boys see this, they do likewise; thus, group attention results.

Call for some formation, circle, square, line, etc. Then boys should have a chance to do something, sing a song, make Grand Howl, make Cub sign, chant, Cub Law while marching in circle around leader. Use flag in giving pledge and saluting.

Meeting starts—have brief check-up on uniforms and cleanliness.

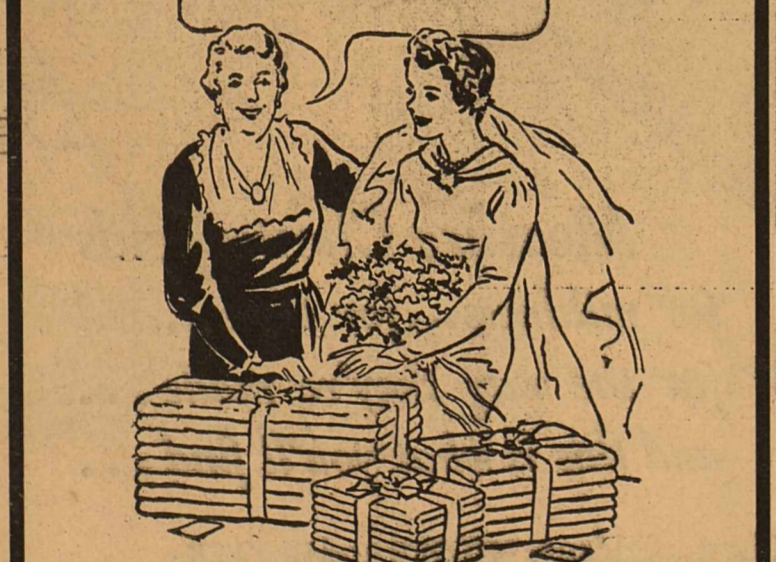

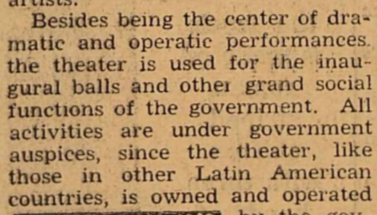


No offices, no stores or other forms of business mar the beauty of the \$2,000,000 National Theater that is the pride of Costa Rica. Built nearly 40 years ago, this magnificent building in San Jose, capital of the Central American republic, is considered one of the finest in the world.

A hard, white, marble-like stone, native to Costa Rica, covers the outside of the theater, but the walls and pillars inside are of Italian marbles, while the immense frescoes and canvasses on the walls and ceilings were painted by Italian and French artists.

Besides being the center of dramatic and operatic performances, the theater is used for the inaugural balls and other grand social functions of the government. All activities are under government auspices, since the theater, like those in other Latin American countries, is owned and operated by the government.

### Top Soil Temperature Of 175 Degrees Marked

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Think of the poor, lowly earthworm when it becomes hot this summer! Temperatures reach 175 degrees a few inches beneath the earth's surface, it was revealed in the annual report of Dr. Raphael Zon, director of the Lakes states forest experiment station at University of Minnesota farm.

The information was obtained from thermometers buried in the surface soil last summer. The difference between the above-and-below temperatures was due to the earth's capacity for storing heat, Dr. Zon explained.

"Many plants do not die from lack of moisture during a drought, as is generally believed," he said. "They are simply cooked to death."

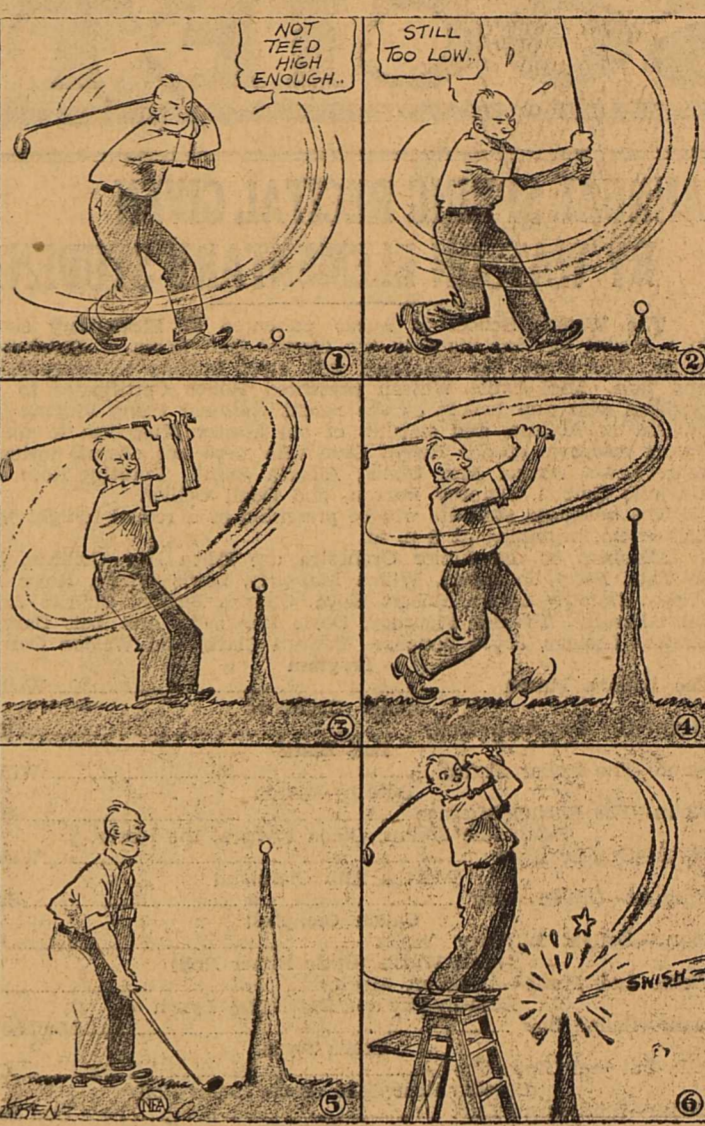

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### Local Dealers Now Operate All Conoco Stations

NEW YORK, May 31.—Recent abandonment of direct operation of service stations by Continental Oil Company, in favor of selling its products through local independent dealers, has been a development of major importance both to the consumer and the company, it was said here today by Dan Moran, Continental's president.

"In line with this new policy," said Moran, "all Conoco gasoline, oils and greases are now sold only through independent dealers and jobbers, in business for themselves who operate their stations under ownership or lease.

"Under this plan the place of the former service station salesman has been taken by men engaged in a business they own and control, of the same standing as the local jeweler, hardware merchant or furniture dealer. He becomes a permanent resident of the community, takes his place among other merchants, and is more inclined to get out and hustle for the additional business that will give him a profit above that he earned as a company employee.

"Major operators who were somewhat skeptical about the outcome of this policy that wiped out the company-owned and operated stations are fast becoming convinced of its value in good will and public approval," concluded Moran. "Our experience indicates that the industry will find it has lost the administrative headaches of roadside retailing, and has gained the support of thousands of new mileage merchants who will take care of the oil company's interest in taking care of their own."

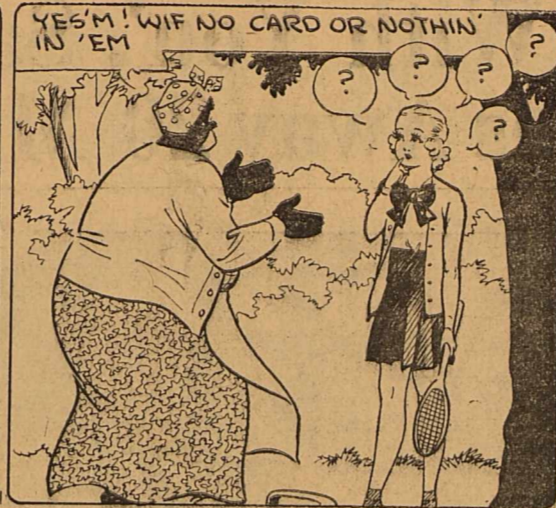

### Plan to Annex Canada In 1869 is Related

PEMBINA, N. D. (U.P.)—A plan to annex the Canadian northwest to the United States in which a Minnesota governor allegedly figured in 1869 is revealed in an old account found here.

The article, based on reminiscences related by Hyacinthe Villeneuve, a pioneer North Dakota farmer, records that a party led by Gov. William R. Marshall made a trip from St. Paul to Winnipeg, Man., then to Fort Garry, while the Manitoba rebellion instigated by the mixed blood, Louis Riel, was in progress.

The Minnesota governor sought to have Riel "give himself up to the United States" in a plan whereby this country would annex the northwest territory and establish Riel as "governor of Manitoba," according to Villeneuve, who drove Marshall to Canada.

'You Can't Take It With You', Says Manufacturer, Gives Away 20 Million

By WILLIS THORNTON NEA Service Staff Correspondent BINGHAMPTON, N. Y., May 26—Fifteen years ago George F. Johnson found that he had made \$7,000,000 out of his shoe business. Today, if he had operated in the usual manner, he might well have \$20,000,000.

But he hasn't. He doubts that his personal fortune would assay more than \$2,000,000. "And I'm ashamed that it should be as big as that," he says, swaying about on the old office chair before the battered and old-fashioned roll-top desk that has served him as long as anybody can remember.

His office is small, bare-floored, undecorated, with huge windows opening into the main office and giving him all the privacy of a goldfish. "I see no reason for piling up money. I haven't noticed any of these people taking it with them when they cross the Jordan. It doesn't bring security. I suppose if I took all my money and invested it, it might bring me security, if I knew just where to invest it and how to get a return on it.

But there's more security in working at a job that you know. I still get a salary (Note: It is about \$50,000 a year) but I give most of it away. It doesn't cost me much to live, and with the income from my stock I have much more than I need. But I don't pile it up. I use it." (He means: "I give it away.")

Not more than 20 per cent of the Endicott-Johnson Shoe Co. stock is now in his family, Johnson says. 8,000 holders of common, and 1700 holders of preferred stock. Thus he hasn't even legal control. But that doesn't worry him. Nobody tries to buy the control, or change it. The stockholders seem satisfied with the present status. But that refers to legal ownership. Morally—

"The stockholders don't really own the business," Johnson believes, "just because they have advanced money to it. The real owners are the community, the working people, the customers, and then the stockholders. We just run it for them. And we'll work for them as long as they want us to, and then we'll get out."

Johnson's views of capital are strange for a capitalist. "Capital is a brainless thing," he says. "Money in itself hasn't any brains. Some people, of course, have both, but it is the brains that do the business and earn the reward.

Financiers Not All Wise "When we incorporated this business, I came in contact with a lot of big Wall Street men, and I didn't

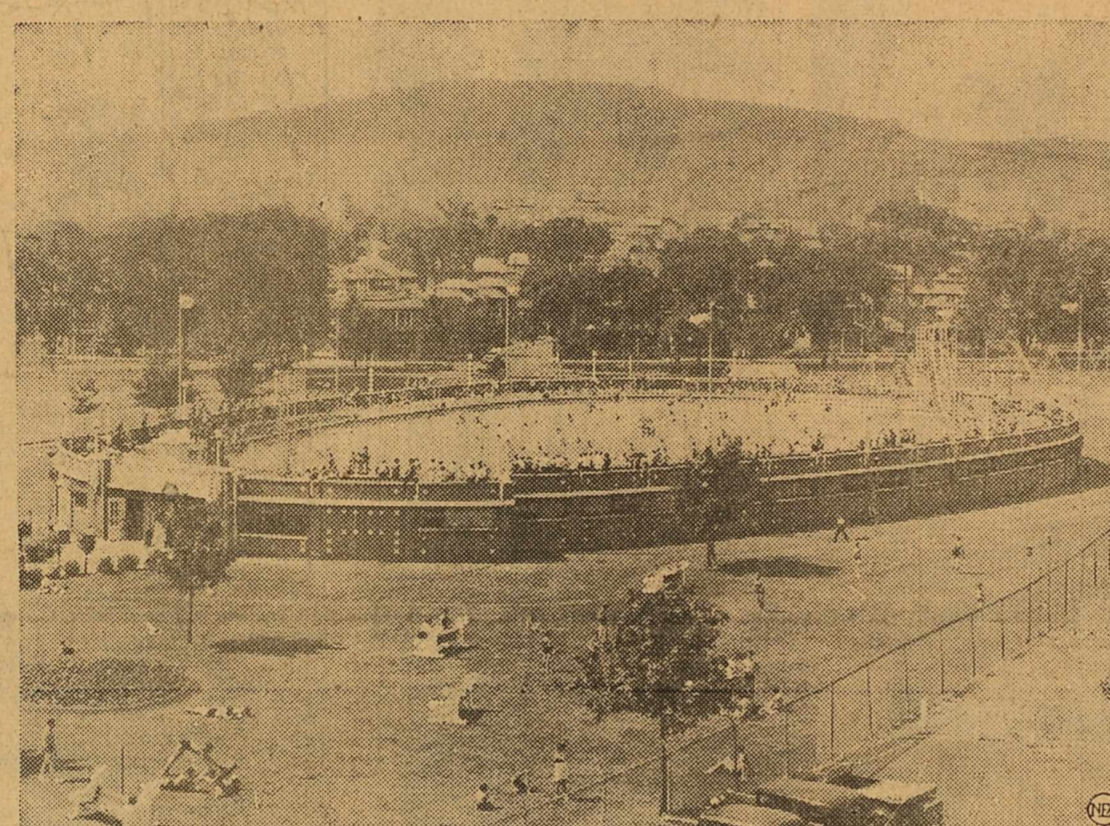

The pool makes its contribution to the employers' singular content with their positions. In the background are grouped some of the company homes—also built out of the company's system of reserves for that purpose.

Without labor there is no capital. And the plain fact is that capital has been getting more than it's entitled to get, and labor less. "We went to work here on the basis of the greatest good for the greatest number, and that happens to be the working people."

Unions Don't Concern Him Johnson keeps entirely separate the projects on which he has been giving away his private fortune and those engineered by the shoe company. As to his private benefactions he is reticent, but there is a saying hereabouts that "George F. is a member of any church" that needs painting.

Churches, American Legion clubhouses, schools, libraries, parks, all have felt the touch of the piled-up money Johnson expects largely to have given away before he dies.

Unionization has no terrors for Johnson, who insists he has never interposed any barriers to it. "If workmen are unfairly treated, they ought to organize," he insists. "But here they get all the money there is outside what is needed for taxes, insurance, reserves, and the needs of the business plus a reasonable return on the money the people have advanced to enable us to run," Johnson puts it. "There is no possible way they could get any more with any kind of organization. If they can show me any organization that will get them any more, I'll join it myself!

"We've had organizers in here from time to time, and we have some now, including Communists. But they never get anywhere. Moreover, I've never made any attacks on them like Henry Ford did recently. The future will be the future, not the past or present.

"A man would be very stupid, indeed, not to see that this is a

changing world. It will be a better world, too." Son, Nephew Are Understudies This vast Endicott-Johnson institution, this strange experiment, in capitalistic industry, depends heavily on one man and he is nearly 80 years old despite his evident vitality and restless energy. A son, George W., and a nephew, Charles F., are preparing to carry on, schooled in the Christian-capitalist principles of George F. The son is already president. They will inherit, in addition to a going concern and a goodwill built up over 40 years, a set of principles written out by George F. Johnson on July 21, 1919, and still posted prominently in his outer office. They read:

"The hope of the world lies in evolution, progress and constant improvement, and we look with confidence into that future, rapidly approaching, when all may have a more equal share in the good things of life, when the rights of humans are acknowledged to be more sacred

than the rights of dollars, when it will be the same vice, and the same crime, whether committed in broadcloth or in rags."

IDLE MEN WIN SELF-SUPPORT IN TINY COOPERATIVE MOVEMENT IN THE EAST

NEW HAVEN, Conn., June 1 (UP)—Two years ago a former officer in the Salvation Army, told by physicians that he had only a few more months in which to live, accepted the suggestion of a friend that he find something to occupy his mind. As a result, he founded an association which has fostered cooperative enterprise among a group of married men who sought a way to get off the charity rolls.

Daniel Young Stewart for 17 years was with the Salvation Army and amassed considerable experience in the order's administrative affairs. In 1921 a driver struck Stewart, who was changing a tire on his own car, and the man suffered a serious skull injury.

For two years he fought for recovery and was reasonably successful, although doctors gave him but little hope for long life. A new idea came to him. He thought of an enterprise that might occupy his mind would give him comfort and the moral stimulant that might be necessary to keep him alive.

Small Capital Needed Stewart, now 61, knowing his own capabilities in administering to the needs of the unfortunate, decided

that there were many men of 45 years or older, married and with children, who might be seeking escape from relief rolls. After considerable thought and study, he reasoned that with modest capital, a group of willing workers and the cooperation of residents of the city, these men could earn a decent living.

As a result, Stewart, with the sympathetic aid of Harris, drew his plans and founded the Eventide Home for the Aged.

When the organization began to operate, Stewart felt that the true purpose of the association was not apparent in its name and so was born the Unemployed Married Men's Social Service Association, Inc.

With 30 men now cooperating in the plan, Stewart has been able to provide for them a fairly decent living. A number of them go out with horses and wagons—the association can't afford as yet the luxury of a motorized conveyance—and pick up old newspapers, rags, and pieces of furniture.

Newspapers and rags are baled by others in the cooperative and then sold and shipped to factories to be made over into cheap paper. The articles of furniture are sold to poor families, who cannot afford to buy new pieces. Such articles are repaired or repainted by another group of the association's membership.

All profits accruing to the association, which is chartered by the state as a corporation without capital stock, are evenly apportioned among the members.

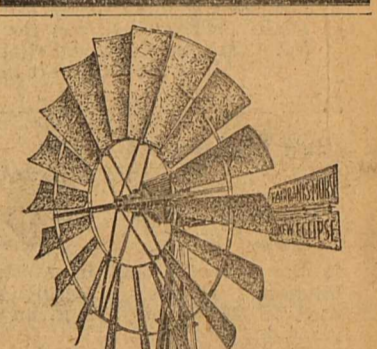

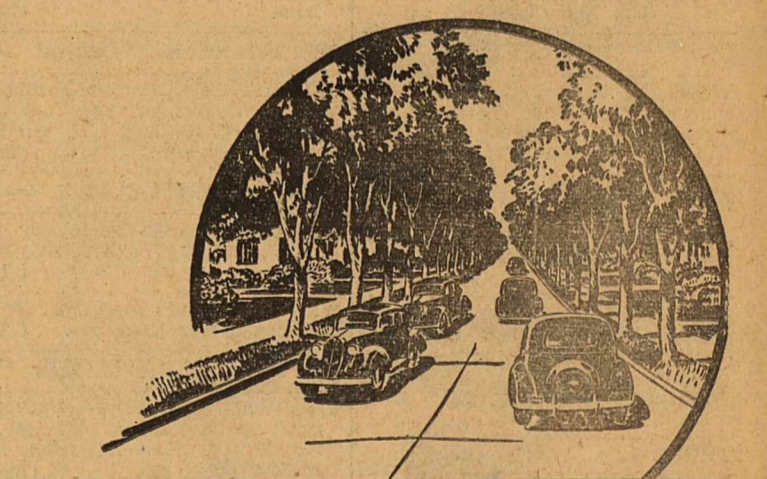
