Although Homer Martin, president of the United Automobile Workers, called on unionists from Michigan, Indiana and Ohio to attend to a protest of rioting by strik-ing steel workers' pickets at Monroe, the governor said that Martin had promised he would "discourage" attendance of members from outside Michigan.

Non-striking workers at the Cambria plant of the Bethelehem Steel Corporation returned to their jobs today unmolested by pickets. Basques Report The 'Maginot' Line Is Holding

HENDAYE, France, June 12 (A).-A combined aerial and artillery combardment today ignited houses insurgent offensive was reported to have cracked the outer lines of the city's "last stand defenses."

An aerial attack was concentrated on the waterfront, militiamen's observers reported seeing flames rising from several houses along the Nervion river.

Thirty-nine insurgent bombers flew for 12 hours over Amurrio and other communities near Bilbao, raining bombs on machine gunning defense positions. Insurgent head-quarters said that the attacking orces had occupied the entire front line of the Basque's steel-concrete 'Maginot" line.

Basque authorities insisted the 'iron ring" around Bilbao was unbroken at any point.


