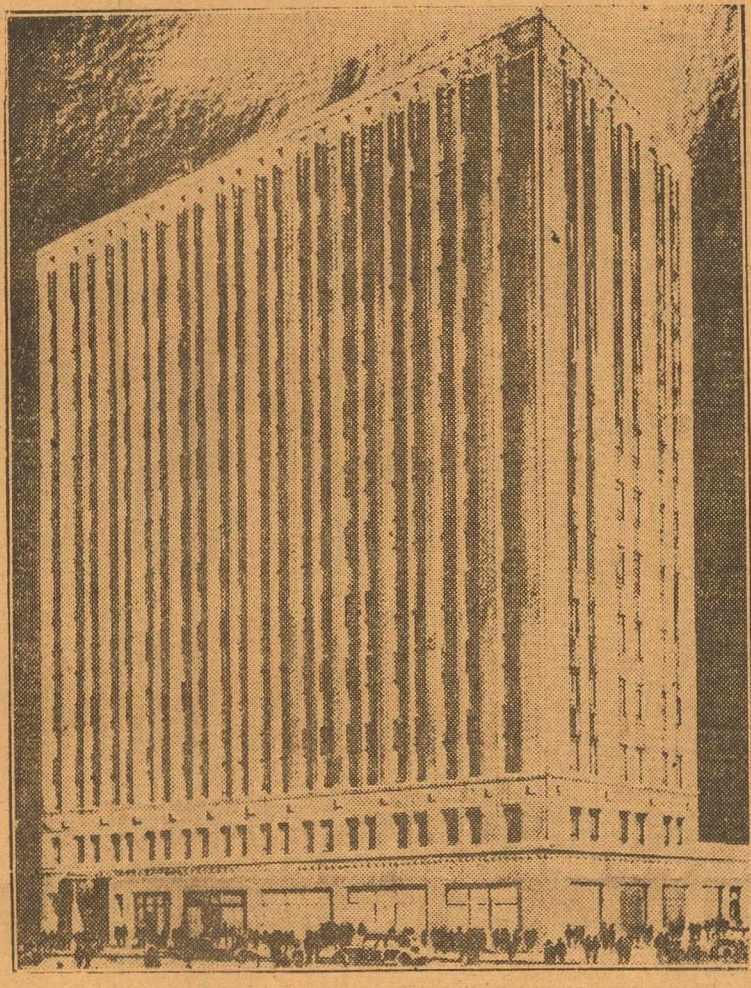

#### PLANNING WAR IN ADVANCE

M-Day, zero hour of America's mobilization for the next war, is envisioned in realistic detail by Frank C. Hanighen in the July Review of Reviews. The day war is declared, he sees American industry shifting all peacetime machinery to supply the army and navy with every kind of war material.

This parallels Germany's Schlieffen plan, drawn up in detail long before 1914. Its object was to mobilize all Germany's resources within a few hours, then with trip-hammer blows, capture Paris within a few weeks.

Just one thing went wrong with Schlieffen's time table of war. Tiny Belgium delayed it long enough for France to mobilize. An M-Day for the United States may be laudable strategy, planned with all tactical finesse. But with war always so fickle and unpredictable, it's hard not to wonder just what insignificant fly may spoil our own ointment of preparedness.

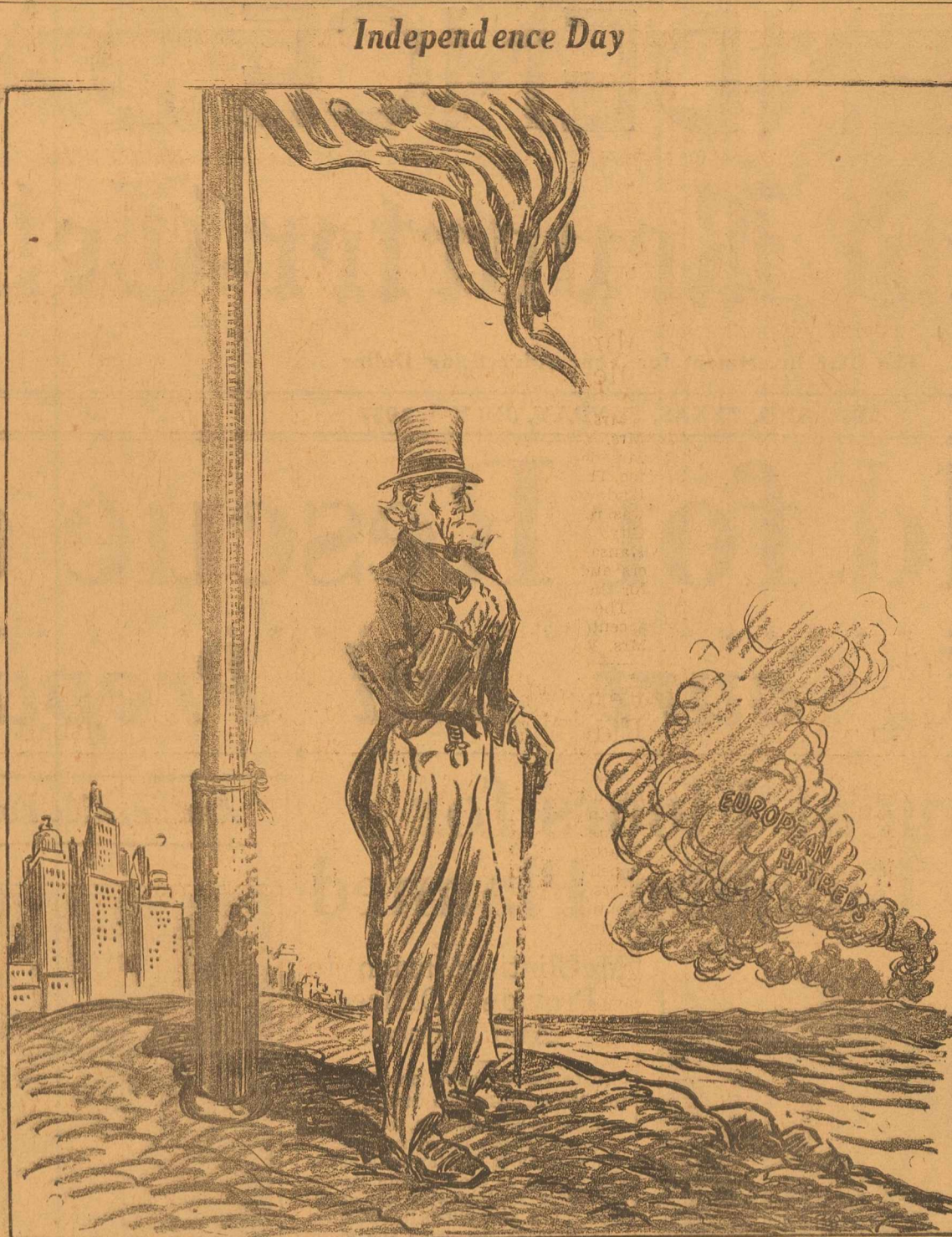

WASHINGTON, July 1. (SPL).— Wednesday morning the entire group was keyed up over an expected Mt. Vernon trip. Disappointment marked every face when it was revealed this would be put off until Saturday. Our troop was then dismissed to roam all over the Jamboree encampment.

In the afternoon, we left in buses for a trip through various government buildings, the postoffice building, a beautiful edifice, being one of them.

After an early supper we marched the three miles to the huge arena, seating about 15,000. Because there were 25,817 boys and men attending, many thousands sat on the ground.

The arena was well lighted with four groups of lights. There were four brilliant spot lights. Dr. West designated our old and faithful friend in scouting, "Uncle Daniel Beard, assisted by Ralph Hubbard, to light the campfires.

As this time Dr. West announced that we were going on the air, and with a Hammond organ (with six units) accompanied all the 25,000 scouts in "Hail, Hail, Scouting Spirit" sung to the tune of "My Hero," from the "Chocolate Soldier."

Following this Dr. James E. West was presented formally to the scouts and scouters. The reception and ovation we gave him lasted a full three minutes—until everyone

was hoarse. They could not stop us.

Dr. West then announced that the President of the United States would be unable to attend but that Attorney General Homer S. Cummings would bring his message to us.

The President of the Boy Scouts of America, Walter W. Head, was introduced and spoke to us.

He introduced Dick Frost, of England, who gave the message from Lord Baden-Powel, the chief scout of the world, and the founder of the organization.

Theodore Roosevelt, Jr. spoke; Friday, July 9th, at 8 o'Clock

Harvey Gordon and the staff of officials were presented to us; we sang "Home on the Range;" the champion scout band played; they followed a demonstration by Colorado scouts who gave an Indian dance.

After the naval "Storm Cheer" of World Brotherhood, we were dismissed and went back to camp. —Noble.

BY MARY CARTER TOOMEY Staff Correspondent of The Dallas News AUSTIN, Texas, July 3.—A State-wide program of parent education for the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs will be launched in a few weeks, the State president, Mrs. R. J. Turrentine of Denton, said Friday. The announcement followed conferences with Mrs. Florence Johnson Scott of Rio Grande City, education chairman; Mrs. Maurice Bradley and Mrs. Clark Campbell of Austin, representing the federation's child welfare division. Family adjustments, family planning, child psychology and education for the viewpoint of the child rather than the adult will be among the features. The federation will seek to provide the services of a visiting consultant teacher, an expert in psychology to serve every school in Texas.

After more than a week away from home, the Midland Cardinals today will appear before local fans in two games against the second place Wink Spudders. The last road trip has been the most disastrous that the club has gone through this year, all of the six games played away from home having been won by opposing clubs. The cellar Monahans club has been victor in four of the games and the fourth place Hobbs club won two.

Manager Davis has announced that he will 'shoot the works' today in an effort to get the Cards back into winning ways. Bud Brewer, who has four straight wins to his credit, and Davis, who has eight wins and one loss, are due to divide hurling duties for the Cardinals. Brewer getting the call in the nine inning opener and Davis drawing the seven-inning nightcap.

The Spudders are expected to entrust their chances of victory on Hays and Atkinson, two of the leading hurlers of the league. # 'Bigfoot' Blames Alcatraz Jealousy for the Stabbing of Hated Al Capone

This is the third of four stories on life "Inside Alcatraz," related by the first convict ever to be paroled from the federal prison for incorrigibles.

AL CAPONE stuck out his hand and introduced himself to me after I had been on "The Rock" 10 days. That started a friendship which will last until one of us dies—a long time, I hope. But it may not be long at that.

Al—he called me Big Dave, and I called him Al—is in constant danger on The Rock.

As Al gets "shorter"—he is due out in December, 1938—the thirst for his death among other inmates will grow worse and worse.

Just about a year ago they tried to get him and didn't miss it far. Jimmy Lucas, a Texas boy doing 30 years for bank robbery, was elected.

### Stabs Him in Back

LUCAS went down into the basement where Al did the janitor work, the grapevine said, for a monthly haircut. In the barber's chair he reached over, grabbed a pair of scissors, ran into the next room where Al was leaning over sorting laundry.

Jimmy stabbed Al in the back several times, the grapevine said. Al turned and hit Jimmy on the head with a banjo. It knocked him about half out. The guards were there by then.

"I knew before you got hurt that there was a 'rib on' to murder you," I told him. "I heard it when I got in, but I didn't hear who was to do it and, anyway, I couldn't get any word to you."

He said he appreciated it anyway.

We met the day I put in a request to see the warden about something. It happened that "Machine Gun" Kelly and Al had each done the same thing, and the three of us met outside the warden's office.

### Outsider Couldn't Understand

MACHINE GUN went in first, and Al and I talked until he came out. "I hope you won't turn out to be my enemy like about 90 per cent of the others in here have turned out to be," he told me.

And I found out it was true. The Rock swarms with enemies of Capone.

Why?

I don't think there is a single reason for it that would make sense to men and women out walking where they want to and breathing free air.

The bitter way those guys hate Al's guts shows the kind of men they are, the pressure The Rock puts on a man, the twisted way he gets to feel with years up to life stretching ahead.

I tell you that the men on The Rock don't want to see other men leave there.

"I can't leave, why should he?" is the way they think.

Hard to believe, but gospel truth. When anybody, just anybody, gets short—I felt it myself later—you can almost feel and touch the jealousy and bitter envy when they look at you.

### Al Is Getting Shorter

THAT day in December, 1933, that Al has ringed on the calendar is not too far away now.

Add to that these things which stick in the men's craws:

Al has a fortune to return to, a home, a wife, a 19-year-old son, a mother.

He's better off than they are, and how they hate it.

Al's known the world over.

The men on The Rock, some of them, think if they could kill him they would become famous.

And a few nutty ones are probably so publicity crazy that they would risk a life stretch to get their names in headlines again.

### Liked to Play Tough

ILL say this for the warden, he does the best he can.

Nobody who is an enemy to Al is put on the job near him.

When Jimmy Lucas made his try, Jimmy disappeared for 90 days. When he showed up he claimed to have spent 30 days in the dark hole and 60 days in solitary.

But he liked to play tough, and we never knew if that was right or not.

Al, the man people used to think of as going around in the middle of a bunch of men with violin cases under their arms, has learned to play real violins.

A smart guy, he learns quick. He couldn't play a note when he went in, he told me.

Al liked to talk best about the

### They Live on Hope

JUST like everybody outside, the men on The Rock live on hope. They call it the Island of Lost Hope, but that isn't true.

The only fight I got into at Alcatraz was over Bailey.

A big Negro who was going crazy only he didn't know it then, walked up to Bailey in the yard during one of the six hours of recreation per week we were allowed.

The Negro jumped Bailey for trying to poison him at the steam table. Bailey, afraid it would hurt his record to get into a fight, hit the colored boy threaten to beat and stomp him to death.

A Texas boy named Walter and I talked about this and a week later decided the Negro ought to apologize to Bailey. He said he would, and I was turning away when I saw him swing on Walter and knock him out.

I got to the Negro in time for one lick which had him groggy. But the guards were right on top of this play too.

Walter and I weren't punished. The colored boy had been making too much trouble talk.

He was put in solitary. He proved he was crazy but cutting his wrists and nearly bleeding to death. He was adjudged insane and was transferred.

### Meets Other Kidnapers

MACHINE GUN introduced me to George Bates, a tall slim stooped blond, quiet, doing life for the Ur-schel snatch. Machine Gun told me George had more nerve than he did.

Bates seldom if ever talks about

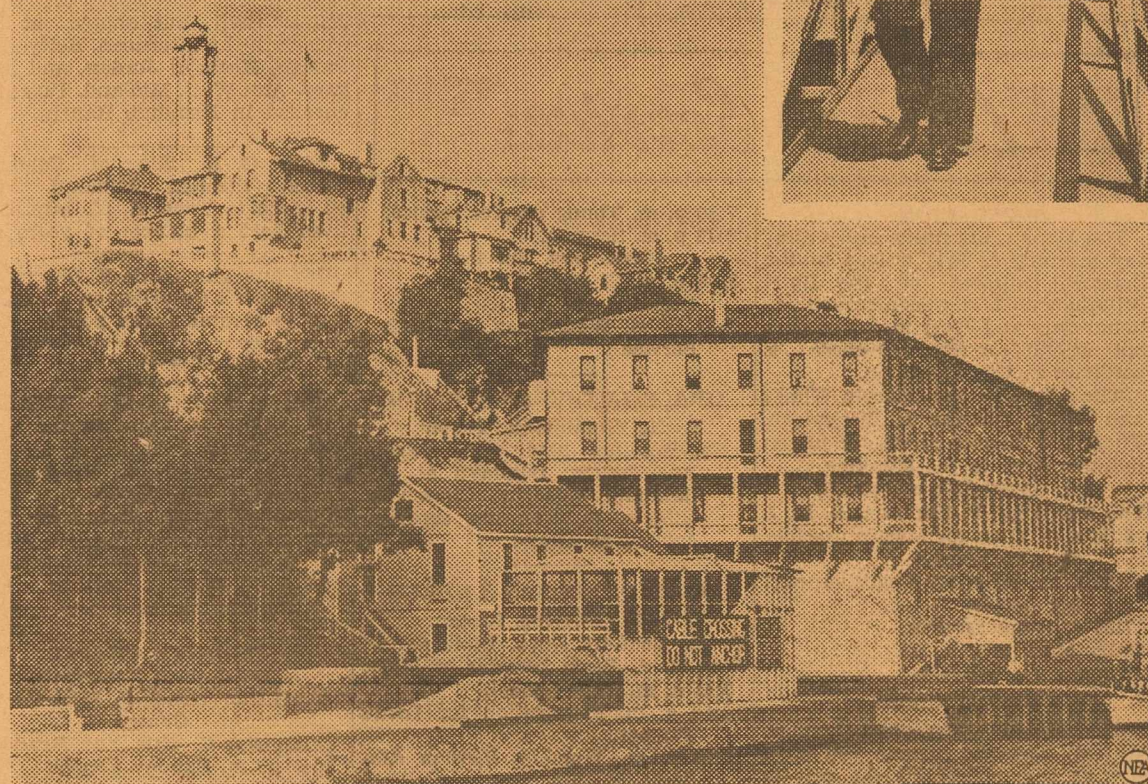
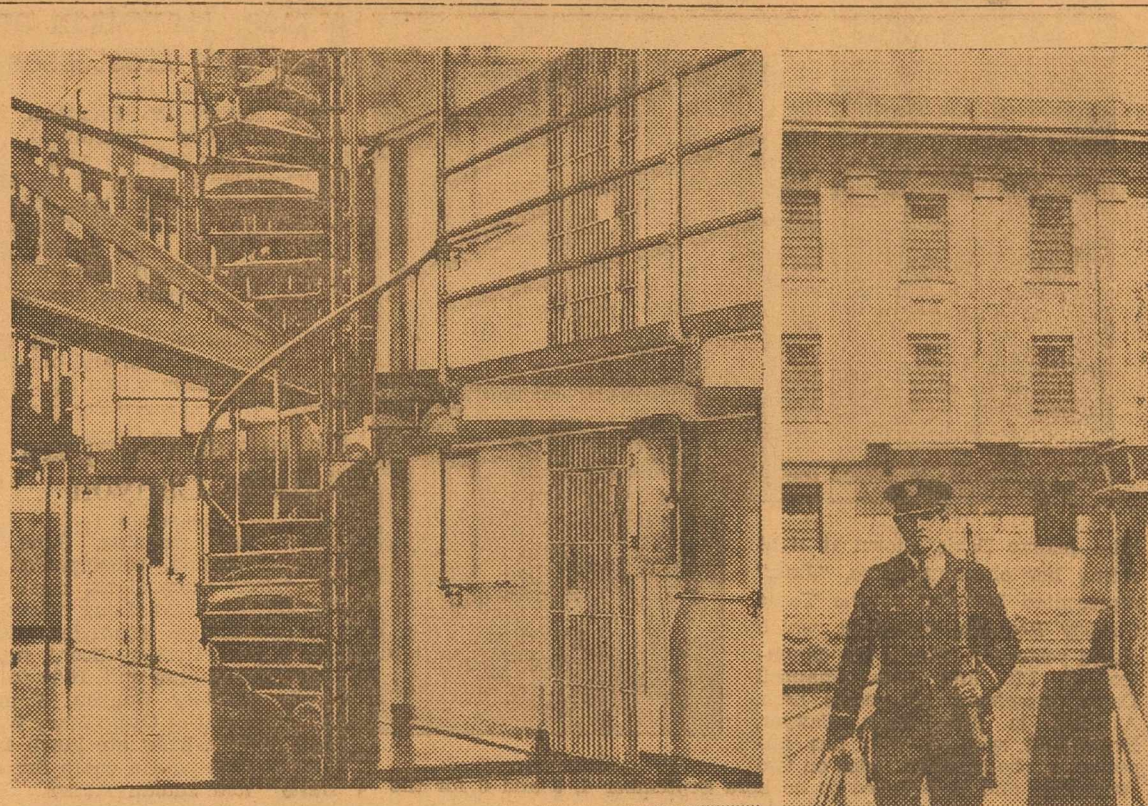

THE funniest pair of pals I saw there was Vick Miller, the international con man who hopes he will be deported, and Sam Seaman of San Francisco.

Vick clipped Sam for 36 grand. Both of them told me about it. But here they were, laughing and joking like the best of friends.

Sometimes I wondered if Sam would smile like that if they were out and he had Vick in a dark alley.

Thirty-five grand is folding money.

I was disgusted to hear Waley say one day about his wife, who is in prison: "I'm glad she got 20 years. At least I'll know where she is for a while."

### Karpis A Loud Talker

THE grapevine, by the way, said William Mahan was sent to McNeil Island in the Weyerhaeuser case and went nuts.

Alvin Karpis came in a while after I was there. He worked in the laundry close to me.

A long-necked, slim, stooped-shouldered guy, scars over his ears where he said his face was lifted, bolterous, loud-mouthed.

He bragged about dodging the G-men as long as he did.

Karpis isn't a bad fellow, just doesn't know what it is all about. He needs a high chair, not an electric chair.

I met John Paul Chase, with "Babyface" Nelson when the two G-Men were killed. Chase is quiet, says "yes" or "no" when you speak

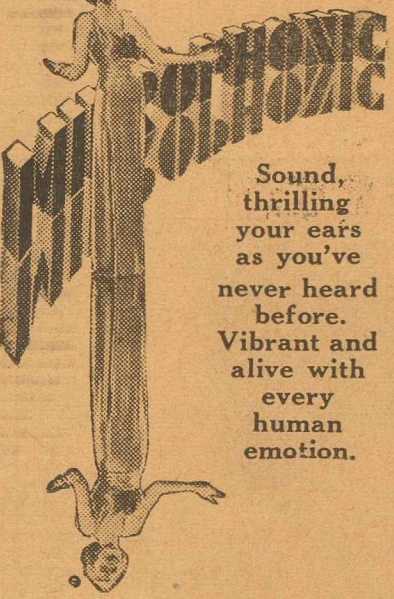
ter-Conoco No. 1 A. L. Wasson, recent discovery of the area. No. 1 Jones continued to drill at 4,797 feet in lime. It is located 1,980 feet from the north and 660 feet from the east line of section 22, block A-7, public school land. Four miles to the north, Argo No. 1 Jones, center of the northeast quarter of section 2, block A-7, is drilling red beds at 2,940.

The Wasson discovery late in the week flowed 155 barrels of oil in 24 hours through 35/64-inch choke on tubing, with an estimated four million cubic feet of gas. Its production is natural, and total depth is 4,959 feet in lime. Three miles to the northeast, Carter-Conoco No. 1 Moore-Langdon, 330 feet from the south and 2,310 feet from the west line of section 44, block AX, public school land, is drilling anhydrite at 4,035 feet.

Phillips and I. T. O. No. 1 Brand, test in section 55, a mile and a half northwest of the Wasson, cemented 12 1/2-inch casing at 276 and is standing. Total depth is 333 in red rock. Amerada No. 1 Matthews, a mile and a quarter southwest of No. 1 Wasson is drilling plug from 9 5/8-inch pipe cemented at 2,934, six feet off bottom, while the company's No. 1 Armstrong, four miles farther west, is rigging up rotary.

Drilling Lime Amerada No. 1 A. H. Fasken, test four miles southeast of the Seminole pool in Gaines, is drilling at 4,998 feet in light brown lime. Formation was reported softer, but no shows of oil or gas had been logged. Location of the test is 660 feet out of the northwest corner of section 160, block G, W. T. R. R. survey. Two ballers of water in six hours were encountered from 4,843-48 by Wentz No. 1 P. W. Dalmont, southern Gaines wildcat in section 5, block A-22. It was drilling ahead at 4,860 feet in lime.

In extreme southwest Gaines, Sloan & Blevins No. 1 W. W. Barber, section 19, block A-28, public school land, is drilling at 4,379 feet, with oil stains evident in samples from 4,338-59. Earlier, the well had logged a slight oil show from 4,290-93, and samples from 4,275-4,338
