



### PLANNING WAR IN ADVANCE

M-Day, zero hour of America's mobilization for the next war, is visioned in realistic detail by Frank C. Hanighen in the July Review of Reviews. The day war is declared, he sees American industry shifting all peacetime machinery to supply the army and navy with every kind of war material.

This parallels Germany's Schlieffen plan, drawn up in detail long before 1914. Its object was to mobilize all Germany's resources within a few hours, then with triphammer blows, capture Paris within a few weeks.

Just one thing went wrong with Schlieffen's time table of war. Tiny Belgium delayed it long enough for France to mobilize. An M-Day for the United States may be laudable strategy, planned with all tactical finesse. But with war always so fickle and unpredictable, it's hard not to wonder just what insignificant fly may spoil our own ointment of preparedness.





The federation will seek to provide the services of a visiting consultant teacher, an expert in psychology to serve every school in Texas..


