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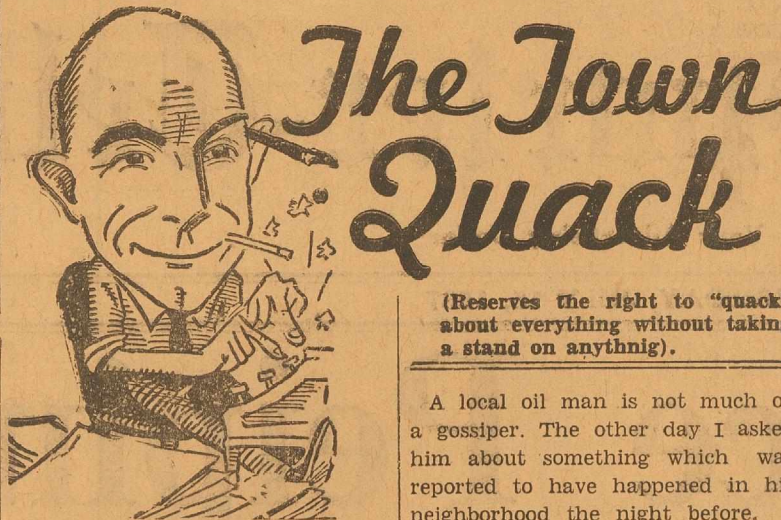
PEACETIME DEATH TOLL

A local oil man is not much of a gossip. The other day I asked him about something which was reported to have happened in his neighborhood the night before. "I don't know. I've slept since," he said.

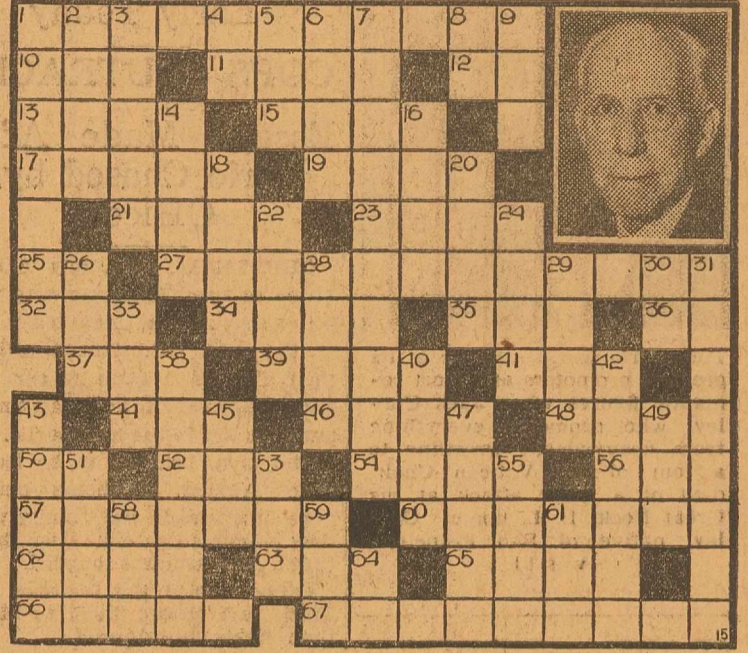

What worries them is the resurgence of a young rump leadership in the House and Senate which might well upset the old leadership and take control of Congress if Roosevelt gave it formal recognition. Maurey Maverick of Texas, Jerry Voorhis of California, and other first and second termers form a nucleus of the insurgent New Dealers in the House, and Senators Barkley, Black, Pepper, Minton, LaFollette, Schwellenbach and others are in revolt against the Senate's Democratic Old Guard. The 49 senators who beat the relief bill amendment of Majority Leader Joe Robinson the other day included 30 first term members. The leadership is predominantly southern and conservative because the one-party south is given to re-electing its entrenched favorites. But many southern members worry lest liberal opponents flying a 100 per cent Roosevelt banner may rise up to rob them of what otherwise might be lifetime jobs.

Behind The Scenes In Washington

WASHINGTON, July 15. — The war between the young New Dealers and the old is not confined to the onslaught against the conservative septuagenarians on the Supreme Court. Week by week the tension has grown between the Boss Young-New Dealer in the White House—meaning Mr. Roosevelt, who is only 55 and feels much younger—and the elderly gentlemen who make up the so-called Democratic leadership in Congress—most of whom also feel younger than they are.

Roosevelt said, in effect, that the elderly conservative justices were too old for their jobs, that they had been on the job too long and that more or less secretly, that's the way he is known to feel about most of the party leadership in Congress. He is cautious about bringing the point up publicly, partly because there is plenty of fight in the old boys—and caution doubtless is the course of wisdom—and partly because the Capitol Hill leadership hasn't given him as much trouble as the Supreme Court did. But it has come to be an unspoken belief among the Roosevelt faction in and out of Congress that most of the titular leaders and powerful committee chairmen are nowhere near as closely in touch with the current thought of the populace as the younger, more recently elected members of House and Senate. Leadership and committee chairmanships come to members through seniority based on length of service. Just a little less "co-operation" from the leaders, according to some of his advisers, and Roosevelt would be willing to try to bust the seniority system.

They'd Rather Go Home THE leadership—usually called the southern leadership—is both worried and sore. The leaders early in the session counseled Roosevelt to take it easy, to cut the spending program drastically and to rest on his oars. Roosevelt hasn't paid enough heed to this conservative advice. He popped the court plan on them without warning or consultation. Most of them have been apathetic or antagonistic ever since. They complain that he sees more of young Senator Bob LaFollette and other young liberals than of them. Most of the world like to forget about the Roosevelt program and go home.

HOUSTON, Tex. (U.P.) — Mrs. Ruth Langford, gun-totin' housewife, shares her husband's job of carrying U. S. airmail.

Postmaster J. S. Griffith believes she is the only woman in the United States so employed.

The pretty young matron, adept with both revolver and rifle, carries a regulation service revolver and belt on her daily trips from the postoffice to the municipal airport.

The couple was commissioned when airmail business reached 2,500,000 pieces during the first five months of the year, more than twice that of 1936.

Music Called Antidote For Juvenile Crime

BOSTON. (U.P.) — Music is an effective antidote for juvenile crime, says William A. Wetzel, former principal of the Trenton, N. J. high school.

"Boys who can play musical instruments seldom come into juvenile court," he says. "Music of any and all types, as long as it is good music, well directed and seriously pursued, is one of the best corrective features in an institutional program."
