

For something like 30 years a crusade for a "safe and sane Fourth" was carried on in this country. When it started, each Independence Day celebration saw scores ally and cause you to laugh uproarupon scores of people—usually children—killed or maim- lously. Some of the old jokes are ed by fireworks. So effectively was the campaign pushed that this year's Fourth found only four names on its list of fireworks death casualties.

But just how far ahead are we? Our fireworks killed only four people this year—but our autos, over the Independence Day double holiday, took 247. And 104 people met death by drowning while swimming or boating.

After many years, we did manage to learn to be careful with fireworks. If we can just learn to be careful in other ways, we may yet be able to celebrate our nation's birthday without rolling up a casualty list that looks like that of the Battle of Bull Run.
