Behind The Scenes In Washington

WASHINGTON, July 16. — Betting odds against real break between Roosevelt and John L. Lewis should be at least 20 to 1 and probably longer.

Each man butters the bread of the other and each likes butter on his bread. The chance of a bust up rests only on the possibility that Lewis isn't fully aware on which side his bread is buttered—in other words, the possibility that Lewis really is as arrogant as he sometimes seems and will continue in that attitude.

It all depends on how wily Lewis really is. He has let the word get out that leaders of the militant C. I. O. movement feel that Roosevelt has let them down and implied that the President may lose labor support. Specifically, Lewis is sore because Roosevelt didn't intervene more forcibly in the "Little Steel" strike, because Roosevelt attributed a "plague on both your houses" attitude to the public, because Roosevelt allowed Secretary Perkins publicly to deplore sitdown strikes, and Secretary Roper to criticize, C. I. O. inferentially by his references to violence.

Has Lewis Hit Top
ALL this comes to Lewis on top of an apparent defeat in the "Little Steel" strike; an aroused public antipathy to C. I. O.; a stiffening of A. F. of L. ranks, aided by decision of many employers to encourage A. F. of L. unions as against C. I.

Wanted Lewis to Win
ROOSEVELT has been making certain verbal concessions to critics of C. I. O. His "plague on both your houses" was effective notice to Lewis that the President wouldn't call the heads of independent steel companies to the White House and demand a peaceful settlement with the steel union. (One reason he decided against it was that he felt the chief result probably would be to give Tom Gidder a sounding board for loud, vitriolic attacks on C. I. O. and perhaps himself.)

The President definitely did not want to see C. I. O. lose the steel strike. He has done much behind the scenes to help Lewis win at least something out of it, and little, if anything, to handicap him. But the pressure from other groups upon which he depends for support became so strong that he decided he couldn't go the limit toward winning C. I. O.'s strike and, in fact, hand out some mild reproof.

Open Break Unlikely
THE Lewis technique is based on the theory that the best way to get the last possible ounce of administration aid is to glower, complain of mistreatment and mutter vague threats to the effect that his political machine and his followers will cut loose from the New Deal and form a farmer-labor party.

Possibly this technique will be effective. Probably it will have no effect at all. It is certain, however, that Roosevelt will not indulge in an open break with Lewis unless Lewis loses his head, although the President must also play some ball with the A. F. of L. Lewis almost certainly won't lose his head. Although the United Mine Workers and allied unions contri-

13 Millionth Car Is Built by Chevrolet

Another milestone in industry was reached Wednesday, when the 13-millionth Chevrolet rolled off the assembly line in the Flint plant of the Chevrolet division, General Motors Corporation.

In spite of interrupted production, Chevrolet's 13-millionth car was produced in a period of just two days more than 11 months, the second-shortest million-unit period in the company's history. Officials stated that the demand for the 1937 models has exceeded anything heretofore known, and that, but for the frequent interruptions of output since Jan. 1, production and workers' wages would have shattered all previous records, and the present milestone would have been reached from 60 to 90 days earlier.

Production of No. 13 million was marked by no ceremonies at the factory, but M. E. Coyle, general manager of the division, issued a brief statement from his Detroit office, officially announcing the event, which was also the occasion for an informal luncheon, attended by Mr. Coyle, Mr. Holler, and other executives of the company.

When the present management, headed by Mr. Coyle, took over the reins in October, 1935, the company had built 9,000,000 cars and trucks. The 10-millionth was produced Nov. 20, 1934, the 11-millionth Dec. 4, 1935, and the 12-millionth August 5, 1936. Records show that it took 12 years for the company to build its first million units, while the remaining 12 million have been produced in a period of only 14 years. Mr. Coyle has been a member of the Chevrolet organization throughout the production of all but 120,000 of the 13,000,000 units built to date.

Infantile Paralysis Said Summer Disease
AUSTIN, Texas, July 16. — Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, states that infantile paralysis, like typhoid fever, is largely a summer disease. Although cases may occur during any month of the year, over

The Children's Story Hour is each Saturday morning in the children's library from 10—11 a. m. half the total number come in July, August, September and October. To date, 69 cases of poliomyelitis have been reported to the State Health Department in 1937.

Direct contact between persons is regarded as being the chief factor in the spread of infantile paralysis. Because of the seasonal prevalence of the disease, flies and other insects have been suspected of conveying the virus or germ. Insect transmission has not, however, been demonstrated. Although animals are subject to paralysis, they are seemingly not susceptible to the human type of this paralytic disease. Carriers are difficult to determine; this fact makes advisable the reduction to a minimum of human contact during an outbreak.

Early symptoms of infantile paralysis comprise headache, fever, vomiting, bowel disorder, drowsiness and irritability, followed by neck or back stiffness. Prompt medical care, early recognition and reporting of cases make possible the use of valuable preventive and control measures.

After the acute state of the disease has passed and walking is finally permitted the patient, under no circumstances must the affected part be fatigued. It is thus observed that the secret of successful rehabilitation lies in continuance of professional guidance and large doses of patience.

Children under five are more susceptible to the disease and all children under 12 should be watched for suspicious symptoms. There are

important things to do when a child shows symptoms. Your family physician should be called at once and physicians should report all cases to the health authorities immediately. When the disease occurs all cases should be isolated for 21 days. All milk should be boiled unless it is pasteurized. Children should not visit homes where the disease exists or there are symptoms of it. Flies should be killed and their breeding places destroyed. Promptness in diagnosis of poliomyelitis is important in preventing spread of the disease.

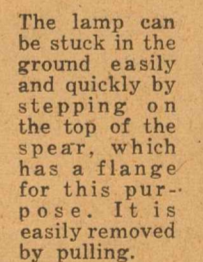

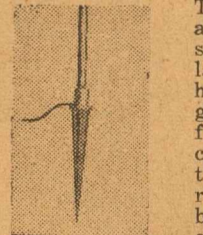

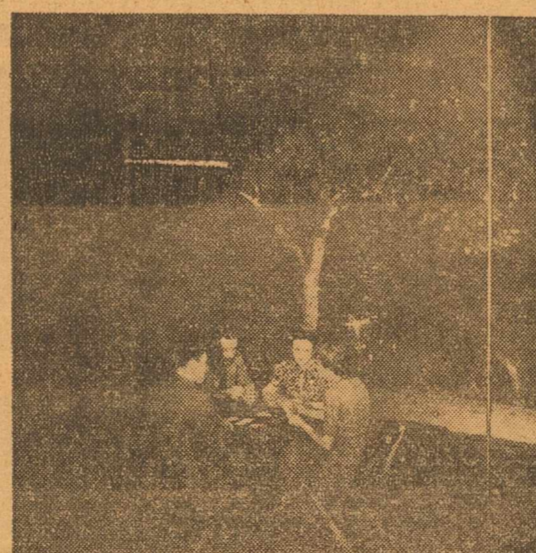
