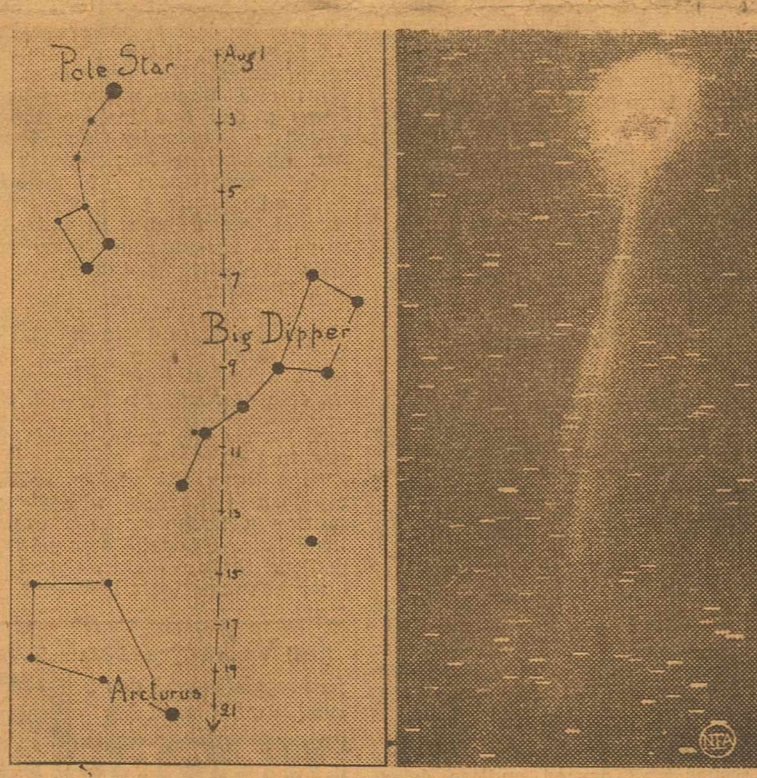

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Senate Adopts Senate Wage, Hour Bill

Vote to Substitute Measure to Speed Up Its Passage

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (P).—The house labor committee today voted to substitute the senate's wage-hour bill for the house measure, agreeing, however, to incorporate amendments previously approved.

Members said the action was designed to expedite recommendation of the bill to the house. One committee member said a proposed amendment to permit the labor standards board to fix minimum wages as high as 70 cents per hour and a 35-hour work week will not be put in the senate bill immediately.

No Longer Afraid Of Being Called "Lousy Sheep Man"

There was a time when cattlemen couldn't afford to turn sheep men. At least he couldn't afford to say anything about it. But Foy Proctor, and his associates, Leonard Proctor and Bill Elkin, feel right kindly toward their sheep after clearing about a hundred per cent per head for the past year.

Foy Proctor, in three jobs—individually, in partnership with Leonard and in partnership with Elkin, has raised or bought about 20,000 head of lambs. The bought lambs will be received about September 15, mostly from ranches between Marathon and Fort Stockton.

The boy, the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Otto Horst, was playing in a sand box on the grounds of his Northwest Side home when one of the men picked him up, fought off the resistance of Mrs. Horst, and a negro maid, and escaped with his companions in a small blue sedan.

Joseph Immel, Jr., a neighbor who witnessed the kidnaping, furnished police with the license number of the car, which they said was traced to Arthur Humberg, an automobile salesman on Cermak road.

Police Capt. Herbert H. Burns said Humberg was in custody and that an automobile with license numbers corresponding to those furnished by Immel was seized in front of his home.

Burns said Humberg said he loaned his car to an acquaintance today. "I lent him my car at the agency at his request," Humberg said in a statement. "He is a customer there and he brought in his car for greasing and brake adjustment."

Mumberg's statement said the car was brought back about 6 p. m., shortly after the kidnaping and that the instrument board showed 65 miles had been driven.

"By the time I got to the service department," the salesman's statement continued, "he got into his car and drove off without paying for the grease job."

Burns withheld the name of the acquaintance until his apprehension. He announced: "It will be only a matter of hours before we have the men who made the snatch."

Appoint Attorney To Investigate Blanton Case

AUSTIN, Aug. 4 (P).—Attorney General William McCraw announced Tuesday that at request of Governor James V. Allred and County Judge W. E. McCharen of Wilcox county he was assigning an assistant to aid in a court of inquiry into the mysterious Blanton disappearance case.

He said Assistant Attorney General George Kirkpatrick, who has had long experience as a criminal prosecutor in Jasper county, would be in Raymondville Monday to assist Judge McCharen in questioning witnesses and running down all possible clues.

The attorney general had been advised by Colonel H. H. Carmichael, chief of the department of public safety, he said, that Ranger Bob Brest and probably another member of the ranger force would be assigned to the investigation also in compliance with a request of Judge McCharen.

McCraw made public letters of Governor Allred to himself and to Judge McCharen expressing deep concern over the Blanton case and suggesting that a court of inquiry be held with a representative of the attorney general's department attending.

The governor's letter said that if Judge McCharen would set up such a court the state would furnish one or more rangers to serve processes and that witnesses could feel free to testify without fear.

Highway Horrors Dramatized in Film "Devil Is Driving"

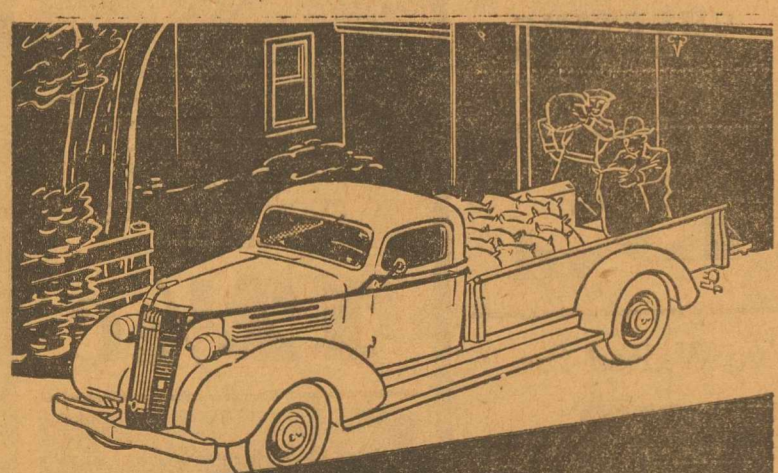

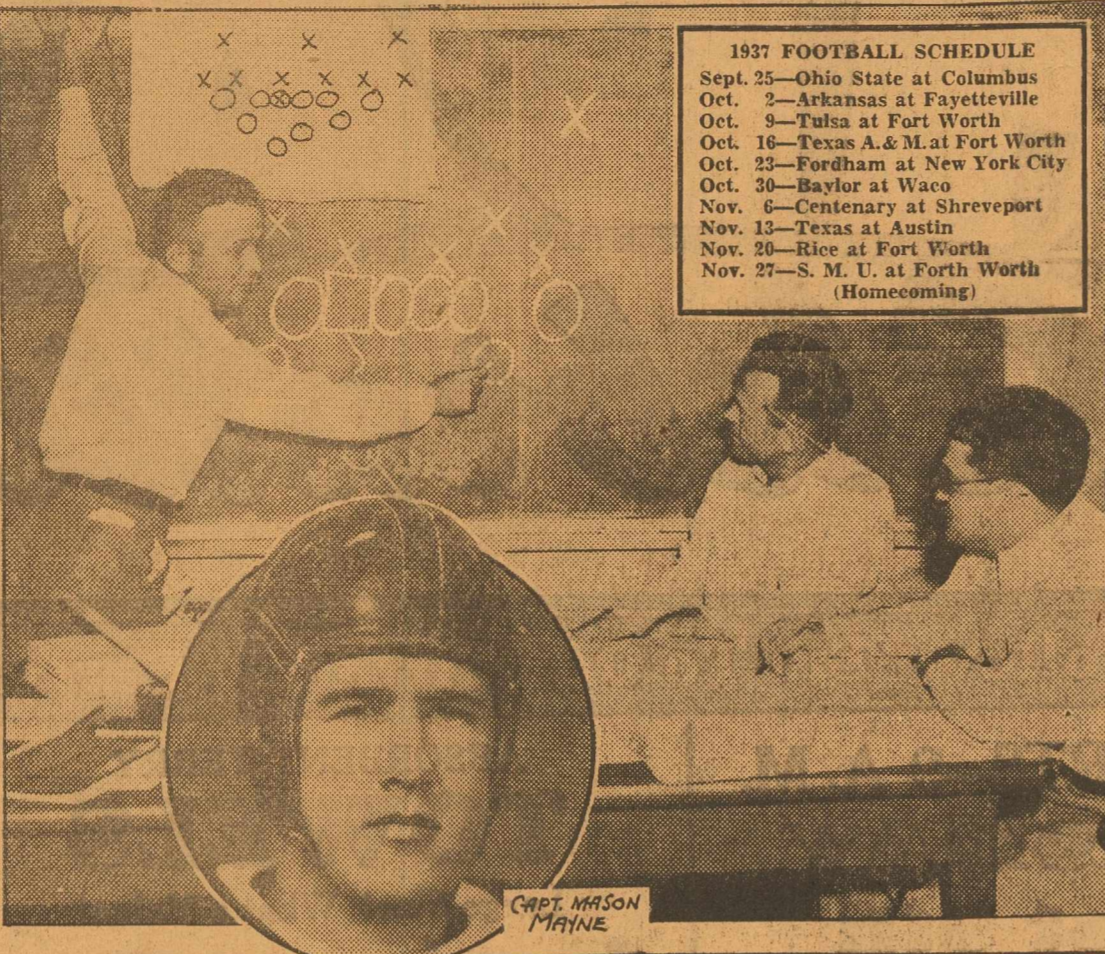

Prospective candidates for the Midland high school football team this fall will meet with Coach "Bud" Taylor tonight at 8:15 at the high school for the first session of the year.

At the meeting tonight plans will be laid for the starting of practice sessions Monday.

Taylor will start the boys getting themselves in shape next week through a series of punting, passing and other exercises daily. The hard work will not be started until the latter part of this month, possibly early in September, as the first game is not scheduled until Sept. 17. The McCamey Badgers will be the first team on the Bulldog card this year, replacing the Colorado Wolves, for many years the first opposition for the team.

Taylor, elevated to the head coach job this year after having served as assistant to Dutch Baumgarten last year, is expecting to find most of his trouble in building a backfield this year to go with almost a veteran line.

The entire group of backs that carried the Bulldogs to their first regional championship finished last year, but several of the linemen,

including Adams and English, both all-conference picks, are back. The guard slots will also be filled by lettermen, but the center and end positions must be filled from the ranks of subs last year and new comers this year.

Taylor is expecting to gain some help from members of the freshman class as several boys who finished junior high school this year boast weight and ability enough to make it tough to keep them from playing regular.

The prize graduate of the junior high ranks is little Jay Francis, 145-pound speed merchant, who will probably be placed at the quarterback post and will have most of the offensive work thrown on his shoulders.

The coach will have no one who will carry the weight and all around ability of big Dave Wafford, and he is expected to stress a wider open offense to take care of the lack of weight in the backfield. Passes, long and short, and end runs are likely to be used far more often than last year when Wafford could literally blast his way through any line he opposed.

DIMAGGIO PERFECT COPYHOOK HITTER, SAYS CRONIN, POINTING OUT VARIATIONS IN BATTING STYLES OF OTHER HITTERS

TAKE it from a fellow who lurc up the batsman's copybook in desperation, Joe DiMaggio is the perfect copyhook hitter.

"DiMaggio," Manager Joe Cronin was saying the other day after the young Italian slugger of the New York Yankees had belabored his Red Sox pitchers, "is my idea of the perfect hitter. He has the ideal form."

DiMaggio, leading both major league in runs scored, hitting close to .370, and a sure bet to clout 400 home runs this season, does everything in the most approved Emily Post manner at the dish, according to Cronin, who admits that he himself does everything wrong.

"Wrong, that is," says Joe, "for anybody else but me. I tried to follow the copybook after a fashion, but it didn't do any good. Then I resorted to the stance I use now and it helped my hitting plenty."

"That's why I never try to tell a rookie how to hit unless he asks my advice. I wouldn't even suggest that anybody who has been playing the game a long while should imitate DiMaggio."

"But if a young kid, a sandlotter, came to me and asked me how he should grip a bat, set his feet, step into the pitch, and so forth, I'd tell him, 'Watch DiMaggio.'"

Copybook Comes to Life

"YOU know those books? How to Bat? That kids buy? Well, Joe is one of those books come to life."

"And he's a rarity in that respect. Hitting baseball, unlike hitting golf ball, doesn't demand a certain set form—that is, there's nothing like keeping your left arm straight, your right elbow close to your body, and so forth."

"But to all great hitters I can think of lacked the perfect form a coach would try to teach a raw youngster. Cobb, Simmons, Medwick, Manush—all of them have or had peculiar little tricks in their stance or grip or something which you wouldn't tell a youngster to imitate."

"Take Cobb. . . why no kid book on 'How to Bat' would ever suggest gripping a bat with hands inches apart. And yet Cobb, who was one of the greatest—if not the greatest—of all hitters, held a bat that way. His hands were separated on the bat handle. I asked him about it once and he told me that he found he could place-hit much better. His left hand, he said, could direct the bat better that way. I use that grip now myself once in awhile and like it."

"And like it is Cronin's modest way of saying that it has helped him become one of best place-hitters in the game."

Simmons' Bucket Foot

IF Aloysius Szymanski had had a coach when he was playing around the sandlots of Milwaukee the well-meaning tutor probably tried to break Aloysius of the habit of "putting his foot in the bucket."

Such a trick is considered among kid players as a sign of being a fraidy-cat. They scornfully think that you're afraid of being hit.

And yet when Aloysius Szymanski changed his name to Simmons and became one of the greatest hitters in baseball he hadn't changed that batting stance.

"Of course, I'd never tell a kid to stand that way," says Cronin.

LOS ANGELES (U.P.)—The little Dutch boy who saved Holland from sea inundation by sticking his finger in a leak in the dike has been matched here by a humming bird which has delayed the construction of an essential tunnel in the new metropolitan water district project.

but that 'foot in the bucket' has been one of the things that's helped Simmons become such a great hitter. It gave him a weave up there at the plate. You see, he could stride either way and could step over for outside pitches.

"Ducky Medwick bats something like Simmons—he has his foot out or position, but he weaves with the pitch. He's always able to shift to hit the ball no matter where it is. That's why a lot of people think he's a bad ball hitter—he's always able to hit the bad balls."

The other great hitters have their distinctive little flaws which haven't kept them from being dangerous. Mel Ott kicks up his right foot against all rules. Wally Berger frequently commits the cardinal sin of taking his right hand off of the bat too soon. Heinie Manush looks like he's in the throes of a St. Vitus dance. . . but Joe DiMaggio is the copybook come to life.

"Yep, he's perfect," says Cronin, "and he's on his way to becoming the greatest hitter that ever lived."

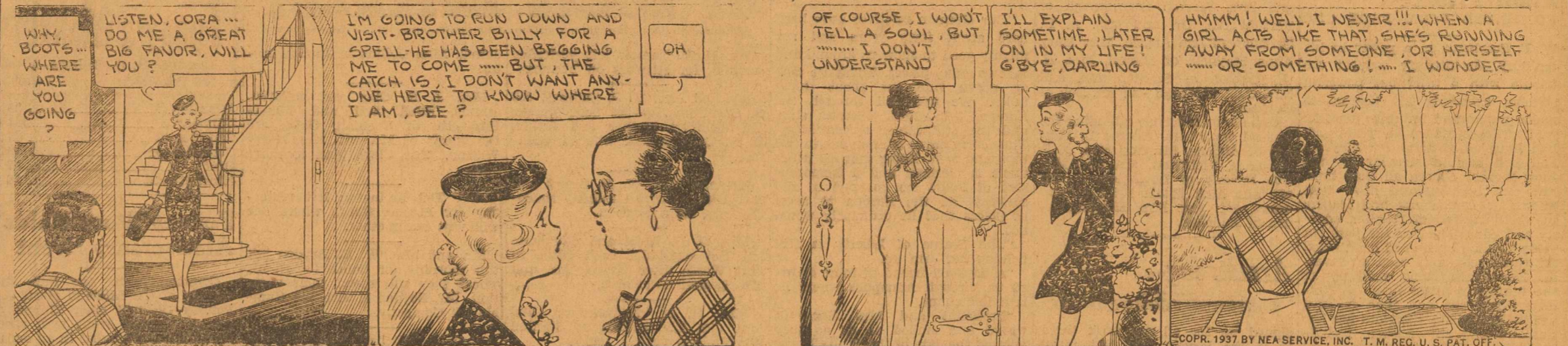

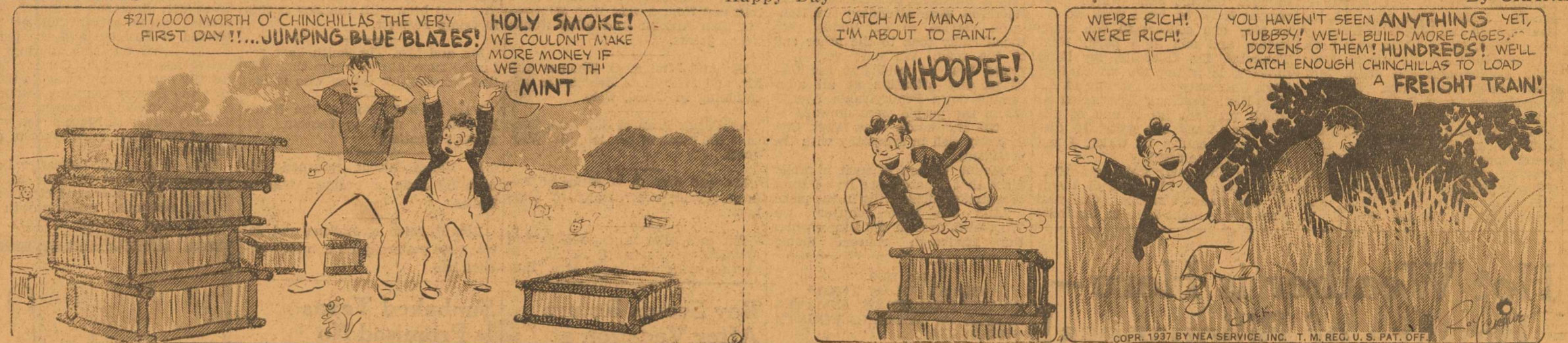

29,000 Would Gain Under Amendments

AUSTIN (P).—Approximately 28,923 children under 14 years of age

would receive state aid under a proposed constitutional amendment to be submitted Aug. 23.

The child welfare division of the Board of Control arrived at the estimate through a survey of WPA rolls in 24 counties which showed 3,989 employed women with 8,871 children less than 14. Applying this percentage to the state as a whole it estimated 12,723 mothers with 28,293 eligible children were employed.

The amendment would authorize appropriation of not more than \$1,500,000 annually for aid to destitute children, or \$8 for one child and not more than \$12 for each family. The Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers has endorsed the proposal together with another providing aid for needy blind children under 16 years of age.

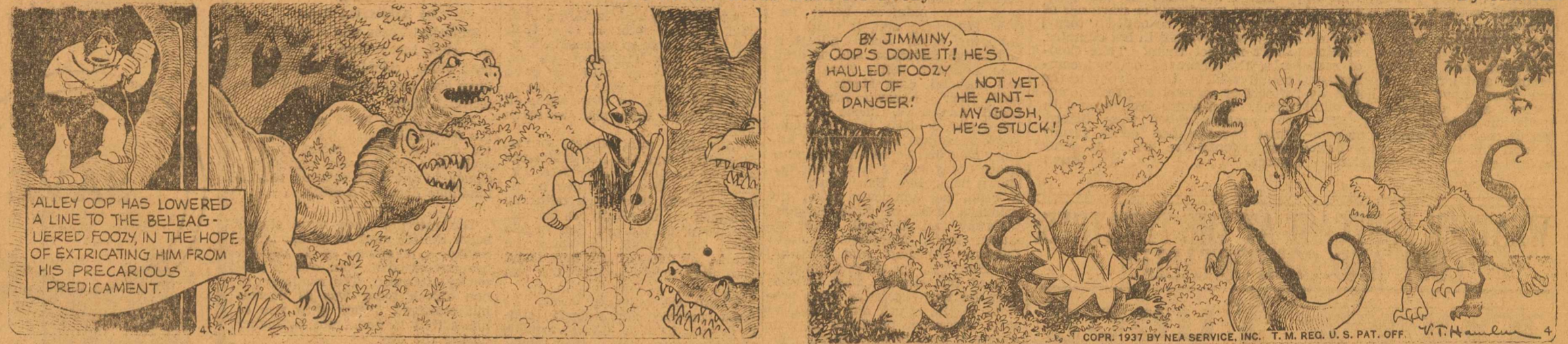

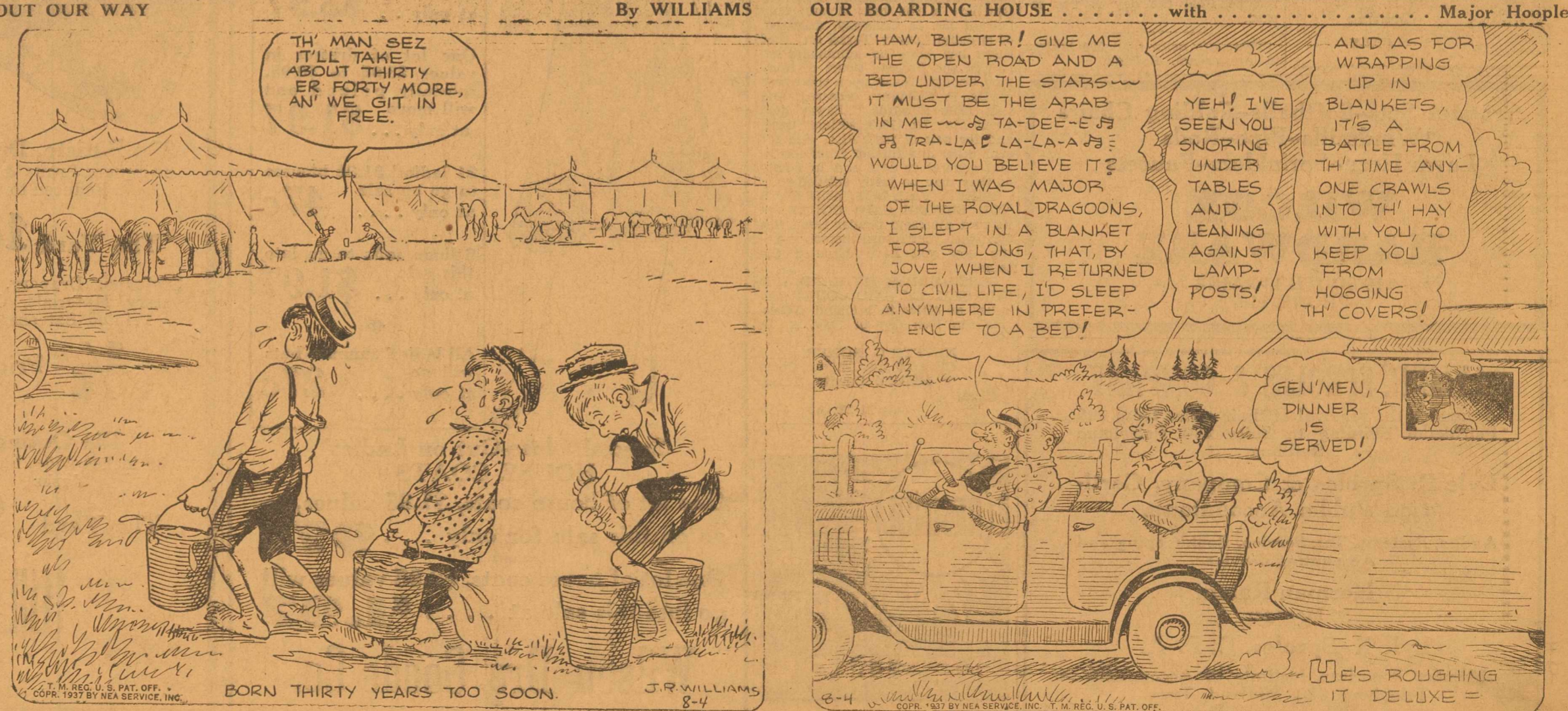
