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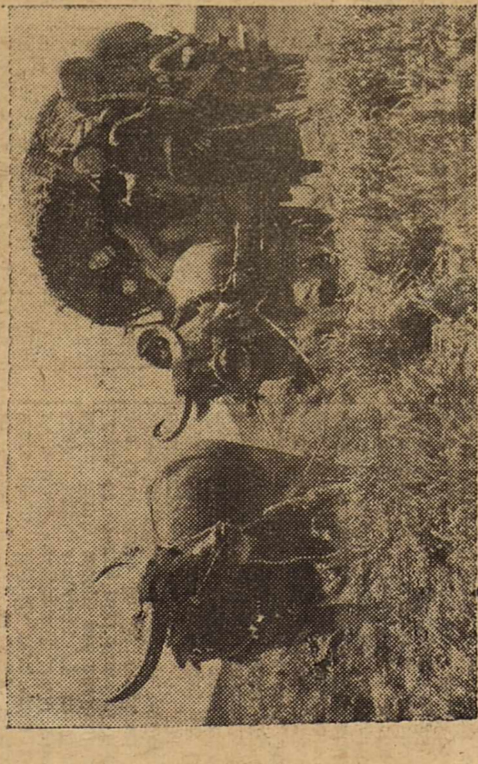

Behind the Scenes in Washington

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27. — The almost complete defeat of the Roosevelt program in the recent session of Congress still puzzles most of those who predicted confidently after the last election that the President would have an entirely free hand.

Nearly every home-going member had from one to a dozen explanations. The most common one was that the President had made a larger grab for power than the country would tolerate and that, because his method of court reform, which was certain to arouse the bitterness and antagonism in and out of Congress. Defeat on this proposal led to defeat on nearly every other important measure Roosevelt planned.

On the other hand, there is a whispered opinion general among men who helped Roosevelt in the court fight which disregards such considerations and attributes the court defeat and subsequent debacle to Roosevelt's own personal errors of judgment. This conclusion, if accepted, leads inevitably to the conclusion that Roosevelt in the matter of politics and that his own overconfidence has been his worst enemy. These points are made:

1. Presidential advisers were divided as to whether to make the first big fight of the new administration on the court or for a wage-increase for federal employees. Roosevelt in the latter case virtually had dictated the type of wage-hour law he wanted. Instead, Roosevelt decided to make his big fight on court reform.
2. Only two of the President's advisers favored the court-packing plan before it was launched. Sheer confidence plus Roosevelt's love for bold action, however, led to results, led the President to choose the packing plan.
3. With the court fight on in full fury, Roosevelt engaged in it only nonchalantly. He was so sure of himself, so sure that his presence would carry behind him. When he went breezily off to Texas for a vacation he left no organized leadership of his cause behind him and the battle on his side lost momentum while the other side made progress.
4. Roosevelt underestimated popular opinion in the Supreme Court as one of the established institutions of government.

The fact appears to stand out that Roosevelt's nonchalant self-assurance led to the great mess which was the first session of the 75th Congress. His friends hope he has learned a lesson and his enemies hope he hasn't.

Three things have some bearing on this point:

1. The court fight, according to administration plans, will continue in one form or another.

A call recently came for a southern cook from the baked-bean section of New England. It asked for a Negro mammy who didn't "sly away from black-berry pie and frying-sized chickens."

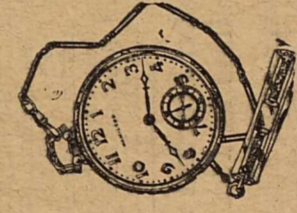

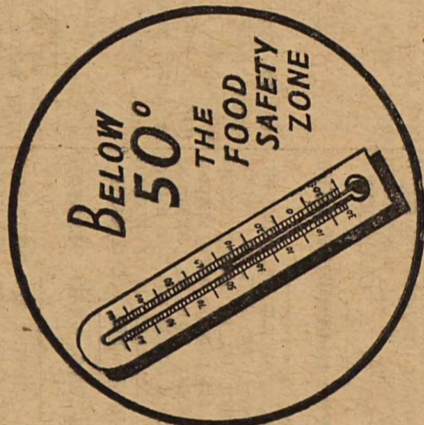

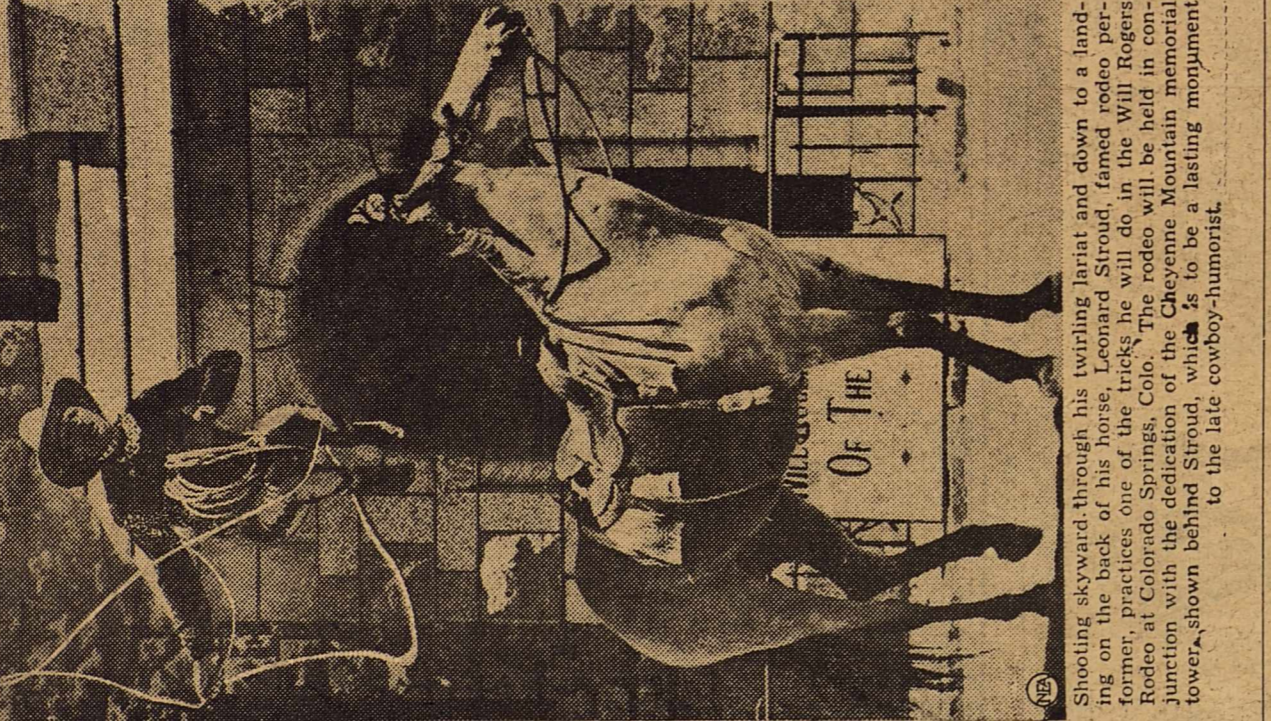

Midget Autos Draw Greater Racing Crowds

LOS ANGELES, (UP)—Midget automobile racing, conceived by a handful of mechanically minded newsmen in 1933, celebrated its 4th birthday recently by becoming the second largest sports attraction in Southern California.

The comparatively new fad, born on a vacant lot in the south side of Los Angeles, has spread to almost every major city in the United States. In one stadium here Thursday night and in the next, it is expected to play to a half-million customers. To date it has surpassed everything locally save football.

The cars originally were homemade "bugs," fashioned of motor-cycle engines and baling wire, at a cost of \$100. Today they are sleek, \$4,000 vehicles, capable of tremendous acceleration and a speed of 75 miles an hour around the tiny saucer tracks.

Two factors greatly benefitted the sport in its infancy. One was automobile competition in the pint-sized cars and rapidly expanded their speed and power. Secondly, full-size racing at Asolo after the death of Al Gordin.

The first professional race was held in 1933. The sport hobbled along at a slow pace until the promoters talked their way into Gilmore stadium, a large arena in the Hollywood area. There it became hot business, and one evening last year the stadium was filled an hour before gas was run.

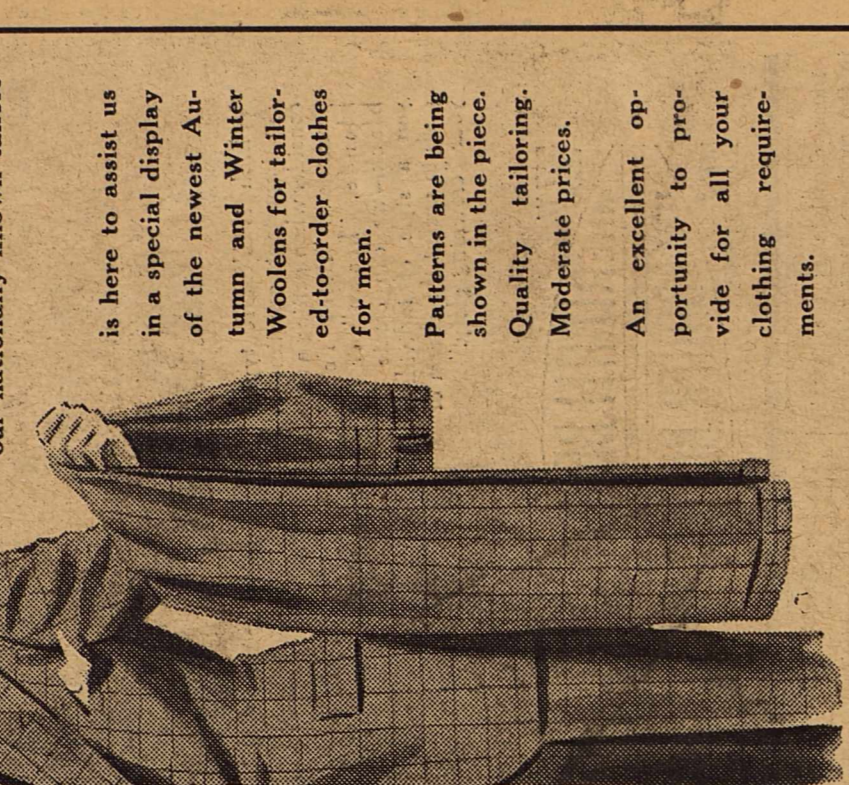


