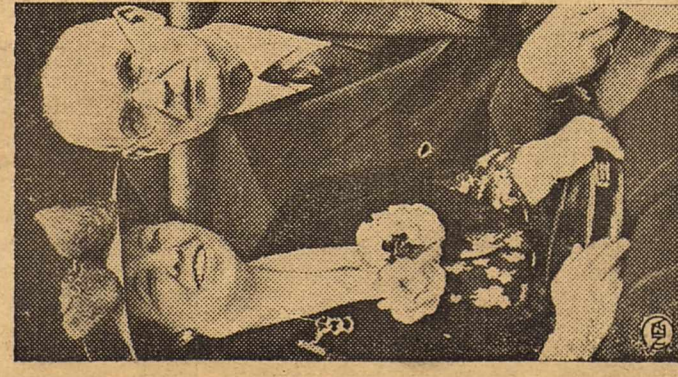

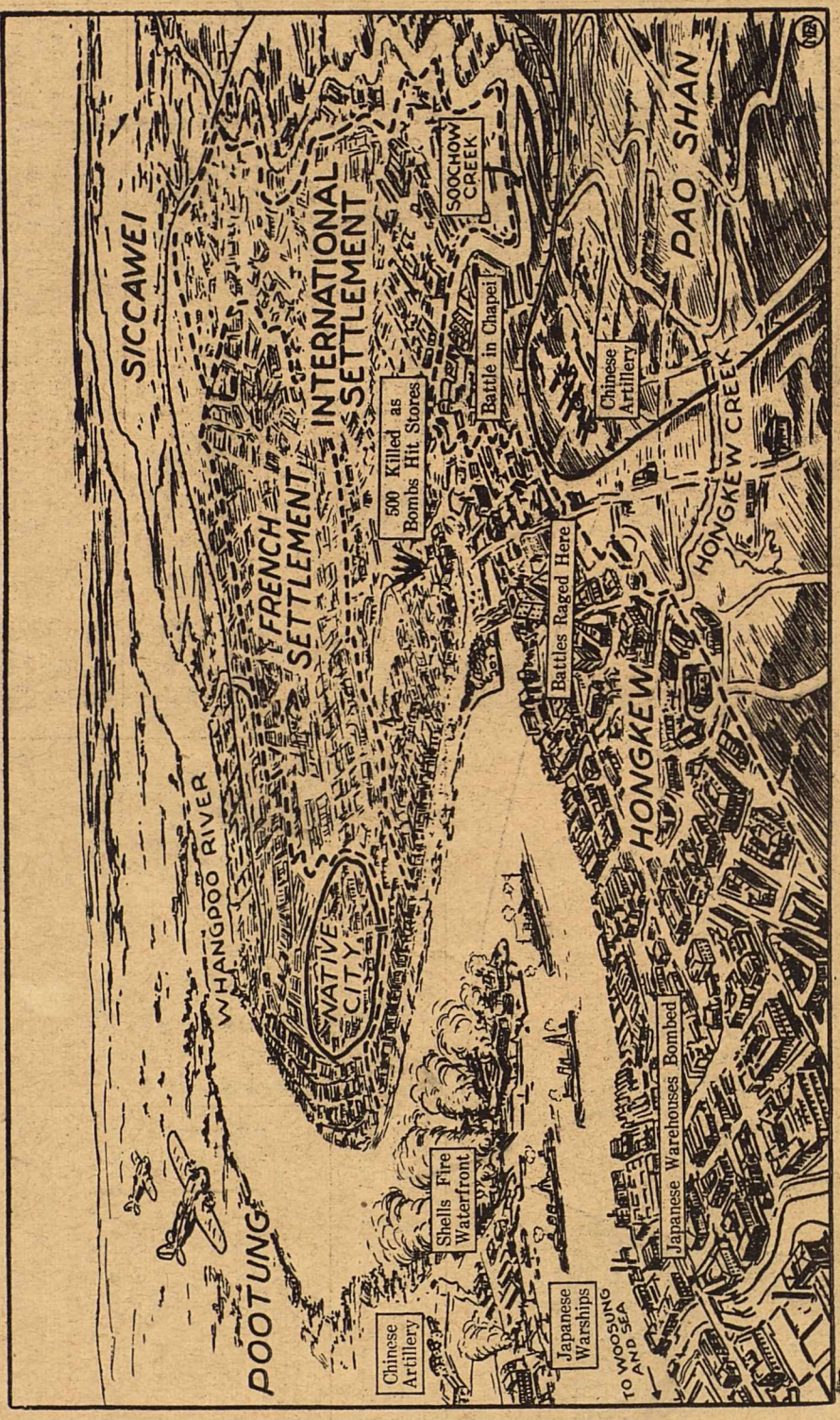

## Eyes of World on Shanghai as Far Eastern War Spreads Havoc In China, Menacing Lives of Foreigners



Pootung, native quarter, south of the river, was in flames after heavy shelling from Japanese gunboats and the Japanese air force. The city was subjected to heavy bombardment directed at the battlements of the art and from Chinese batteries located behind Pootung and in Chapel. United States Marines and troops of other nations guarded barricades at bridges across Ssoochow creek, with orders to fire on any armed Chinese or Japanese attempting to enter the International Settlement. Assisting in defense were members of the Settlement's International Volunteer army, composed of able-bodied men of all nationalities. Only paid members are White Russians, the Settlement's standing army.

## 7 CREW MEMBERS, 3 PASSENGERS HIT

SHANGHAI, Aug. 30 (AP).—Four airplanes, apparently Chinese destroyers, today bombed the Dollar liner Pont Hoover, one of a mercy fleet evacuating Americans from Shanghai. Seven of the crew were wounded, two seriously, and three passengers were shell-shocked.

Holes were knocked in the ship's hull above the water line. The liner steamed toward Japan. The American ambassador called the attention of Chinese officials, who admitted "one" of their planes accidentally bombed the liner. Dollar officials said the attack "frustrated" evacuation plans.

### "White Slavery" Raids Conducted By Hoover, Aides

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Aug. 30. —Led by J. Edgar Hoover, federal agents swept through this gay convention city and two others in Pennsylvania and New Jersey today in raids arresting more than 120 men and women.

The raids were worked on a zero hour basis, Hoover said, and in less than an hour halted operations in ten major and three minor Atlantic City spots, two others in Philadelphia and one in Washington.

### Suspect Slain by Posse of Officers

INDEPENDENCE, Kas., Aug. 30. —A posse's volley of gunfire tumbled Frank Foster, 37, dead from a mulberry tree near here Sunday night. A search for him in connection with two Kansas slayings, Foster, ten for four, was made by Charles Casey Montgomery, county undersheriff, who was wounded fatally Friday night. Casey and two other officers had gone to the farm Friday to arrest Foster in connection with the killing of H. N. Koib, 79, whose body was found near Zyle, Kas., in a shallow creek.

### Oklahoma Killed As Auto Quits Road

TEXARKANA, Aug. 30. (P) — T. R. Cannon, Oklahoma City, was killed when his automobile was struck by a highway near here today. Sheriff Henry Brooks said he believed Cannon fell asleep while driving.

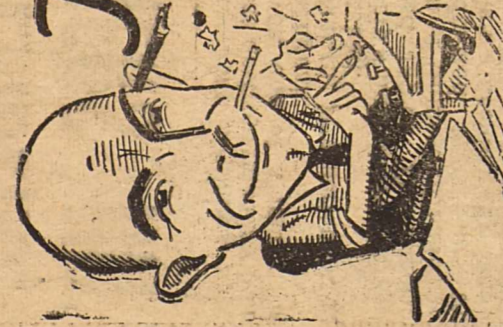

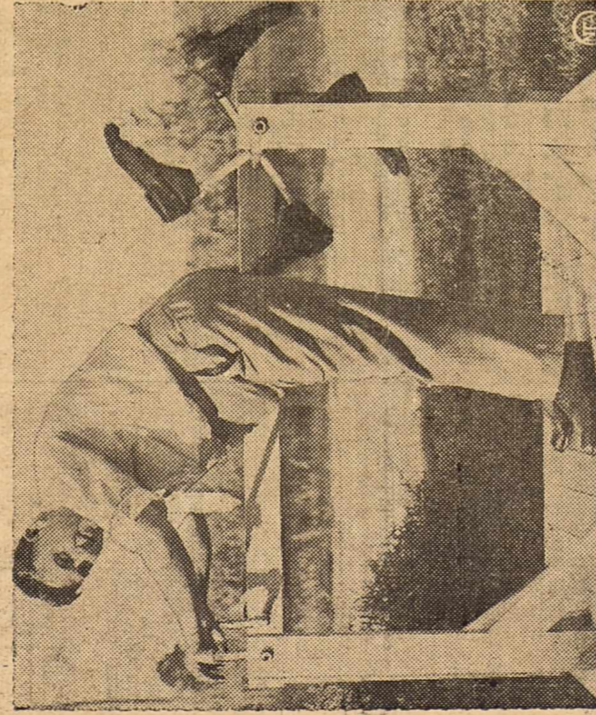

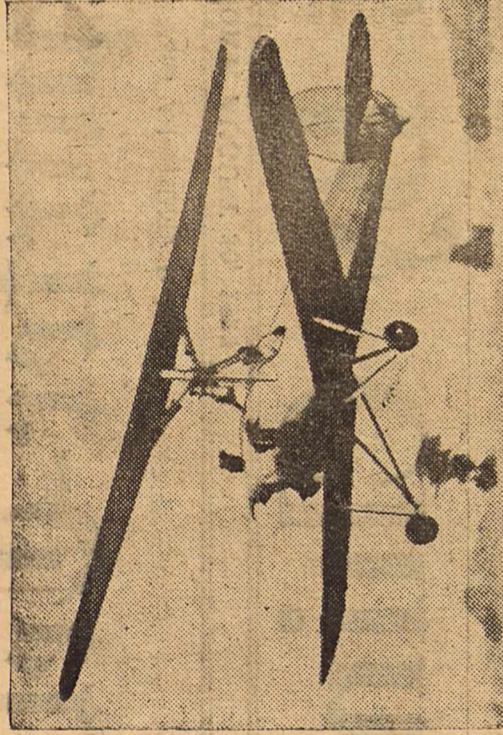

### Behind the Scenes in Washington

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—If a burst of sectional feeling—based on the idea that cotton prices were not more important than other farm prices, and the hour bill—probably will carry over to the next session. Only the continued efforts of the southern leadership kept it from tying up adjournment.

Most Washington correspondents say that your legislation, Richard says publicly, must be supplemented by a law to preserve fair competition in business and industry if the interests of labor are to be protected.

This would mean, according to those who wish Richard's NRA and labor bills, that industrialists promised to observe various wage and hour schedules in return for exemption from the anti-trust law and the right to fix prices, stifle production and otherwise restrict competition.

There is a widespread impression here that NRA, among other things, served admirably as a device to force industrialists to face out little fellows whose price competition, beneficial to consumers, had prevented monopolistic price fixing.

When the administration turned to thinking of a wage-hour law early this year, Richard fought behind the scenes for a bill that would give the President authority to fix wages and hours.

Richard loves the wrath of NRA and believes it will be a boon to government and consumers can sit down as one happy family without anybody's throat being cut. The administration, for the time being, at least, scots its theory. But Don is mighty perturbed.

WHERE MONKS GUARD BUDDHISTS FOOTPRINT

PICTURESQUE mecca of millions is towering Adam's Peak in Ceylon, Britain's premier crown colony, occupying an area of 24,000 square miles in the Indian ocean.

To this eminence come great throngs of Ceylon's 4,000,000 and likewise thousands of pilgrims from many places in the east. But neither is the mountain's height more than 7000 feet) nor its scenic beauty the central attraction.

Near the mountain's summit, in a sacred rock, is an impression resembling a footprint. This, the Buddhists of Ceylon claim, is the footprint of Buddha. The Mohammedans, however, believe it to be the footprint of Adam. Hence elaborate care has been taken by the Buddhists, nevertheless, to guard this hallowed ground, a duty delegated to Buddhist priests from their ancient monastery near the peak.

Adam's Peak is portrayed on the 1935 issue of Ceylon pictorials which also carries King George V's portrait.

## Army to Test 'Iron' Cavalry In Maneuvers

FORT SAM HOUSTON, Texas. — The vanguard of troops from 15 other posts and stations in the 4th and 8th Cavalry Areas coming to Fort Sam Houston for the test of the proposed new infantry division are scheduled to arrive here on September 1.

The first group to arrive will be approximately 15 officers and 150 enlisted men from the first Cavalry Division, Fort Bliss, Texas, who will be in the vanguard of the division.

Approximately 6000 officers and men from other posts coupled with the 6000 at Fort Sam Houston will form a force of nearly 12,000 to participate in the combined tests scheduled to being on September 15 and continue through September 25.

Men from the Second Engineers at Fort Logan, Colorado and the 8th Engineers at Fort McIntosh, Texas, will arrive here about Sept. 8.

The Sixth Infantry of Jefferson Barracks, Mo., a force of approximately 800 is scheduled to arrive about Sept. 8. On the same date the 7th Infantry, Oklahoma and 440 men from Fort McKelhan, Ala., will arrive.

Arriving on Sept. 9 will be 600 men from the 77th Field Artillery, Fort D. A. Russell, Texas; 575 from the 82nd Field Artillery, Fort Bliss, Texas; 1000 from the 1st Cavalry, Fort Bliss, Texas; and one Quartermaster Service Co. composed of 125 men from Fort Bliss.

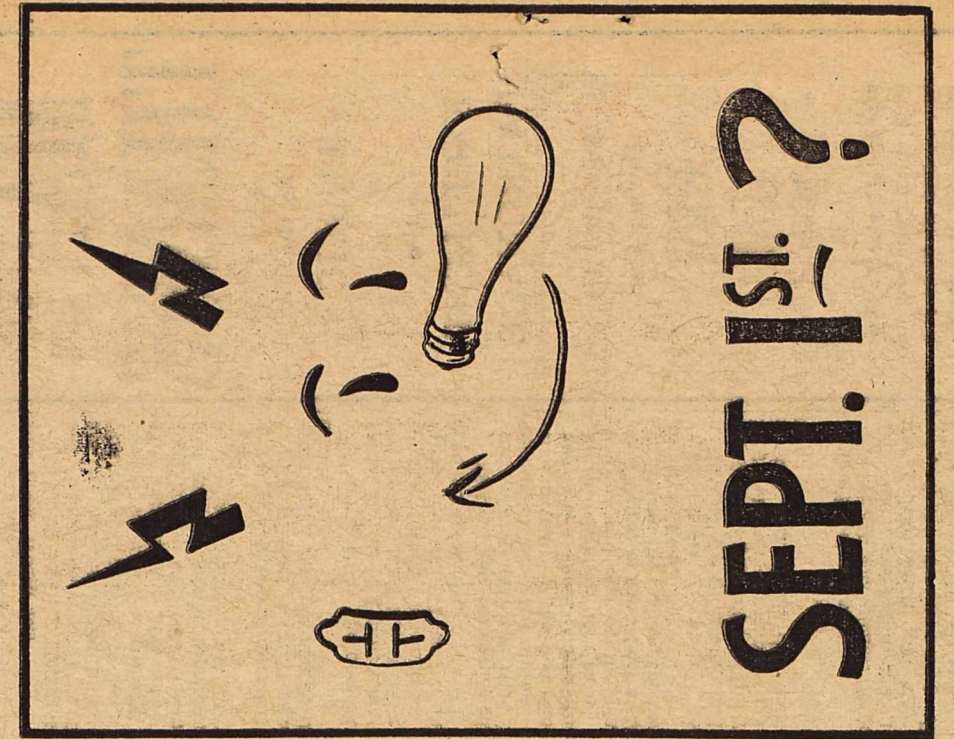

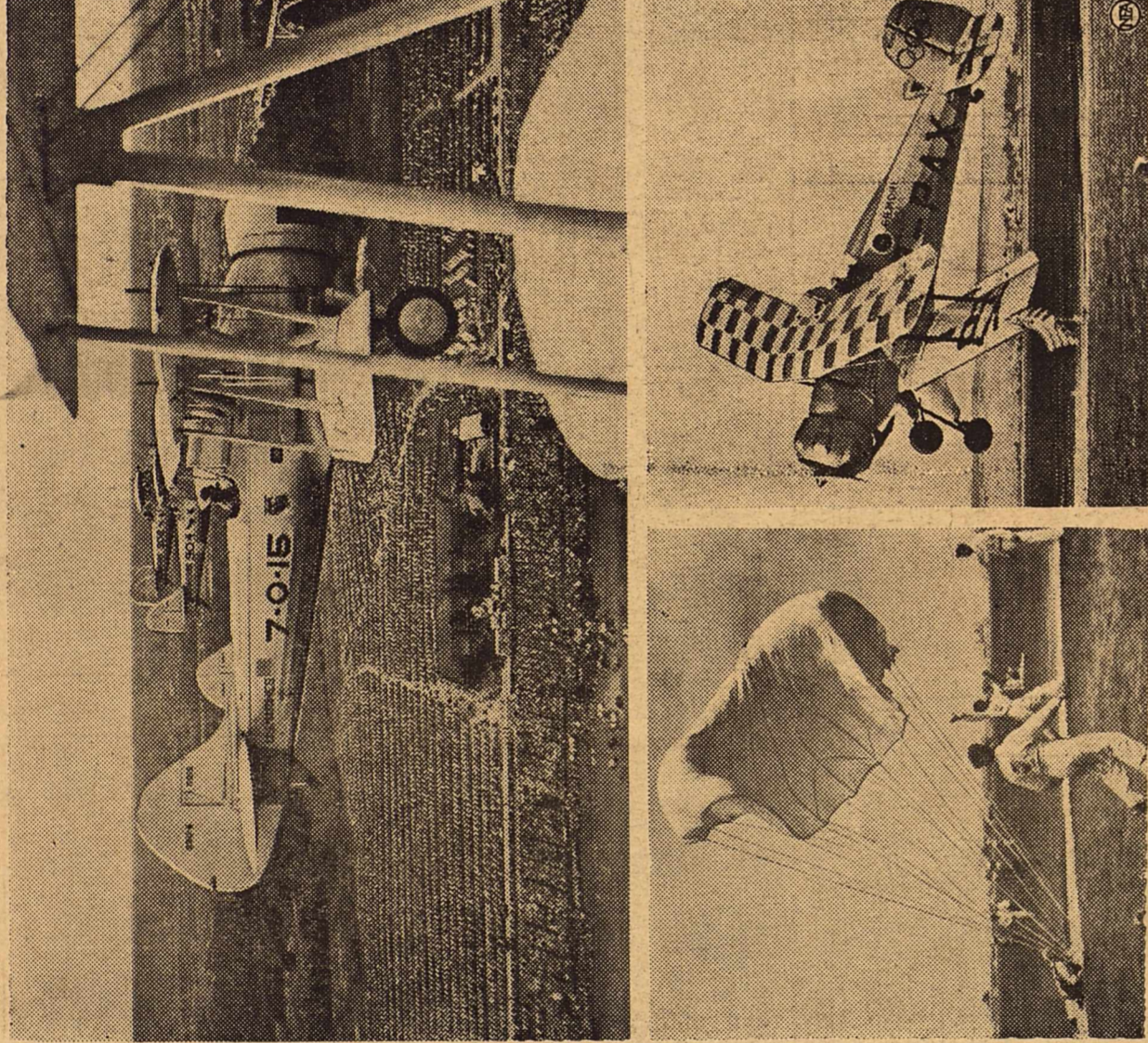

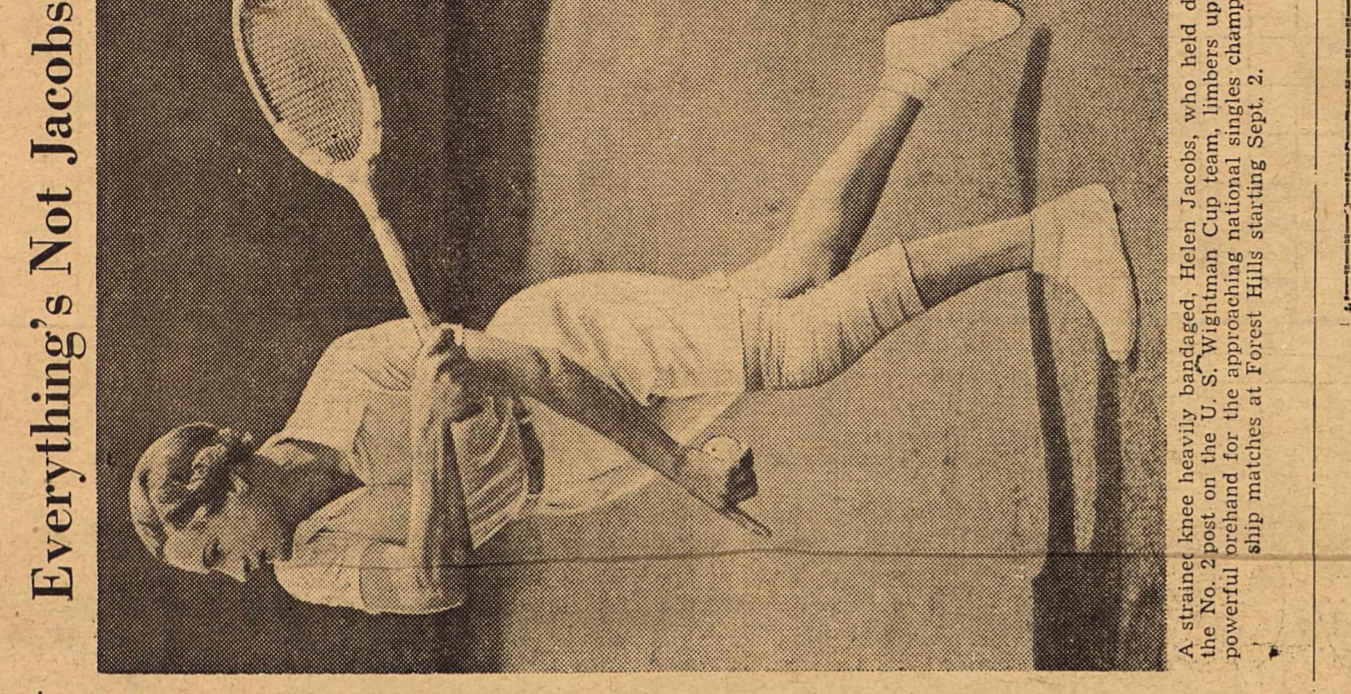
