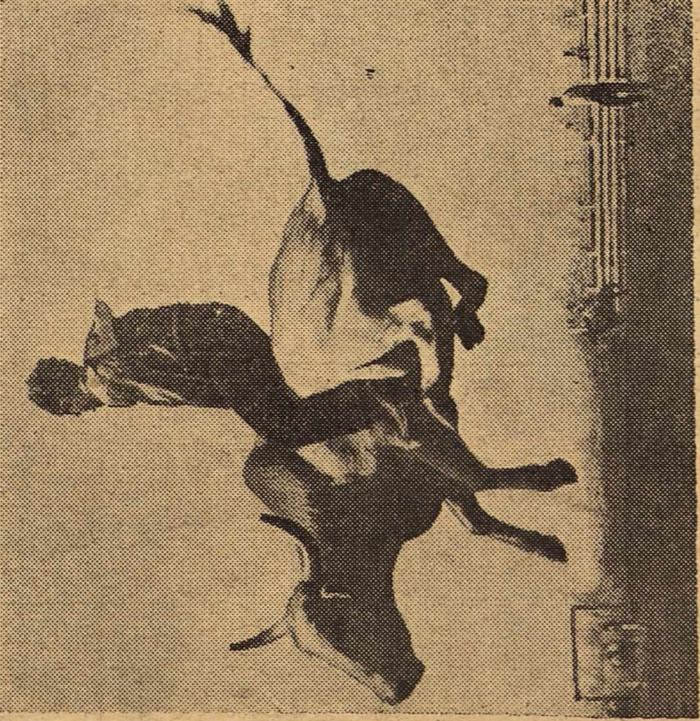

U. S. Launches Huge, Costly Plan to Build A Frankly-Subsidized Merchant Marine

"Last Call" to Private Lines, With Government Ownership as "Ace in the Hole" of Newest Program

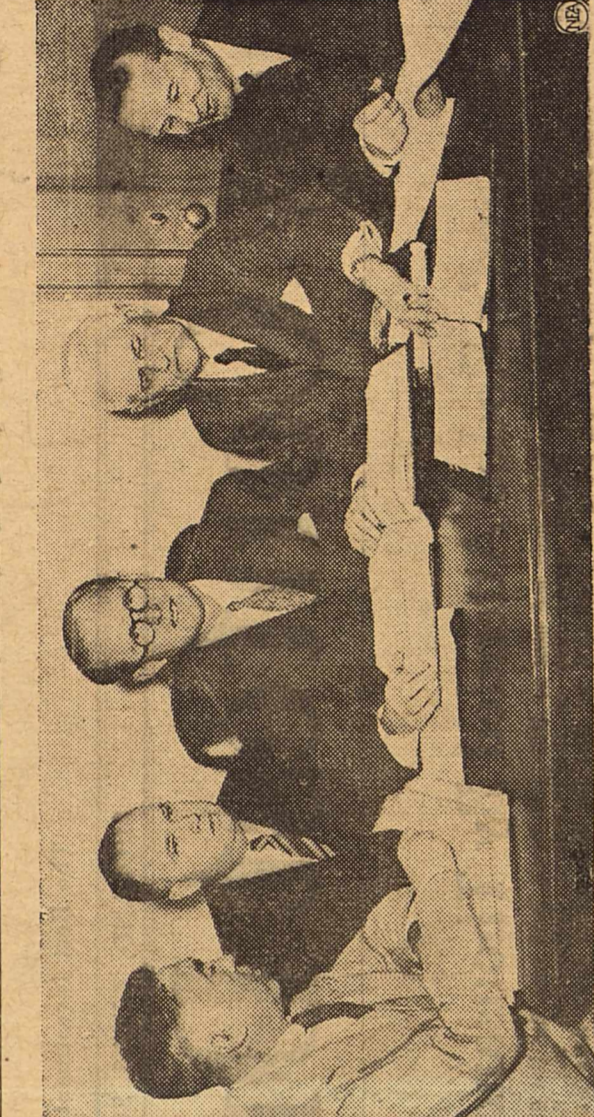

This month will be a critical one in the history of the American merchant marine, as a program gets under way to build 98 ships for foreign trade under a frank, building and operating subsidy.

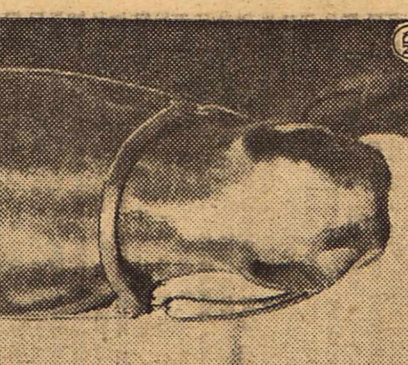
Two things will happen, both likely to have a lasting effect on America's future at sea.

One of them is expected bidding by American shipyards on the building of a new Atlantic passenger ship like the Manhattan and the Washington to replace the abandoned Leviathan. The number and kinds of bids received on this job will give a hint as to how the Merchant Marine Act of 1936 is going to work.

The other September happening will be completion by Chairman Joseph P. Kennedy of the U. S. Maritime Commission of a complete study of the position of the American merchant marine in the national economy; that is, a study of its financial, economic, industrial and labor troubles, its value to the country, commercial, social and defensive. And finally, what it would cost to improve it, and whether it is worth the cost.

Airplane week-ends and circle airplane tours covering long distances during a week's vacation are an important part of the present travel season.

In the second article it was set forth that 32 towns in Texas had swimming pools. It was pointed out that the modern towns considered a family park a necessary part of their city plan. It was pointed out that when Big Spring voted as to whether or not it should spend money for a park, the measure was carried by the largest majority ever given by the voters of Big Spring and Sweetwater indicated that the investment of \$35,000 in the above towns for swimming pools had been a financial success, judging from net returns. 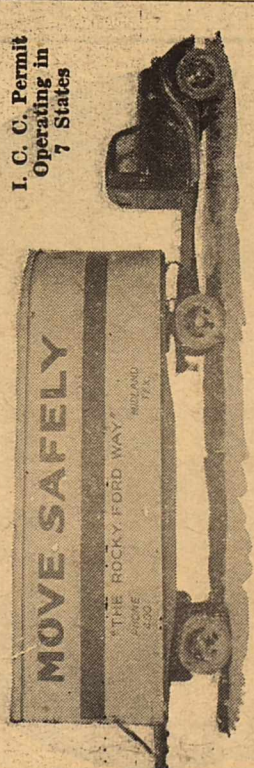

Rural Schools

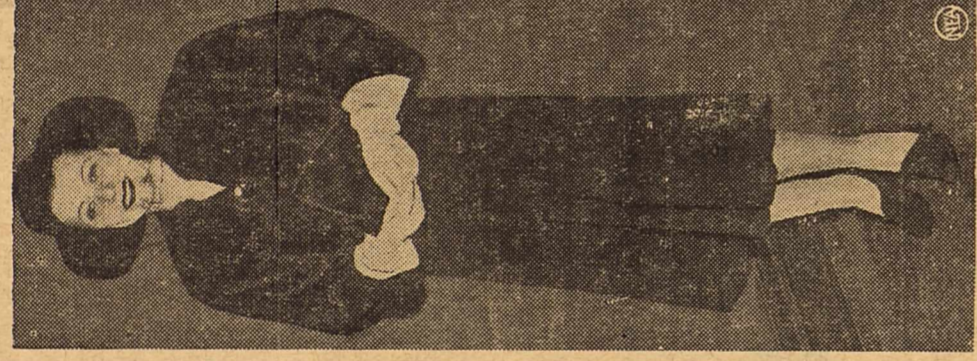
