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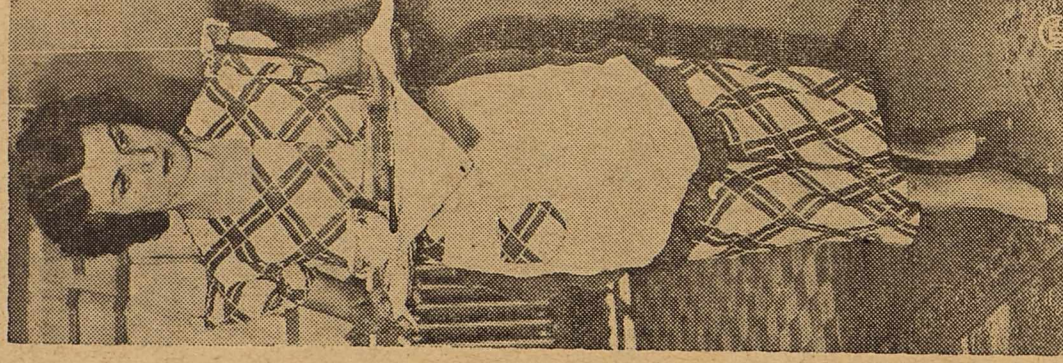

Some Facts About Infantile Paralysis

Infantile paralysis (poliomyelitis) is prevalent throughout the nation at this time of year. In order to insure the best possible chance of recovery for those afflicted, prompt recognition of the disease is essential. For this reason, we print a list of symptoms from the Bulletin of the Los Angeles County Medical Society.

Incubation period: usually 7 to 14 days.

Types of onset: usually abrupt, but occasionally insidious (cold).

Symptoms: constant headache, dizziness, vomiting, constipation.

Fever: 4 to 10 days, falls slowly as a rule, but occasionally by crisis.

Pulse: in proportion to fever.

Respiration: with pulse and temperature.

Hyperaesthesia: exaggerated sensitivity to touch in the neck, of the very important as diagnostic symptom.

Pain in neck: twitching of muscle groups.

Convulsions; rare.

Extreme drowsiness; alternating with irritability when disturbed.

Paralysis: commences a fore-runner of the disease.

If the disease can be diagnosed early enough, before paralysis has set in, treatment with serum will often prevent paralysis occurring. Even in cases where paralysis has begun, treatment with serum has been shown to bring about improvement in the patient's condition.

He listed as the most common eye "pastrightedness, astigmatism, shortsightedness, bad vision and functional disorders resulting from disease or accident."

Defects Defined.

The Joint Committee on Health Problems in Education, composed of the National Education Association and the American Medical Association, has defined these defects as follows:

Farsightedness occurs when the image is focused not on but behind the retina (the light-sensitive area at the rear of the eyeball).

Shortsightedness is caused by irregularity in the optical curve (the front of the eye).

Shortsightedness occurs when the image is formed in front of the retina.

In cases of bad fusion the child has not successfully accomplished his eyes' function in coordinating his eyes' function together as a result one eye bears most of the burden of seeing.

Disease and accidents to the eyes are the most serious defects of all because they usually leave scars, creating a condition which seldom can be corrected by glasses.

Many eye defects will be "outgrown" as the child develops, but it is well, Carris said, to observe these rules:

From a book about 14 inches from his eyes, read shaded light for reading.

Keep his head up while reading.

Be given reading matter which is printed in large type on unglazed paper.

Develop the habit of resting his eyes frequently.

Warns Schools to Watch Eyes of Pupils

NEW YORK, Sept. 7 (AP)—With 28,000,000 grade and high school children about to take up their studies again, Lewis H. Carris, managing director of the Society for the Prevention of Blindness, calls attention to a few "simple" rules for the conservation of sight.

Carris believes that blindness may be just as effectively prevented as smallpox.

Science and education persist, "the general population will decrease steadily."

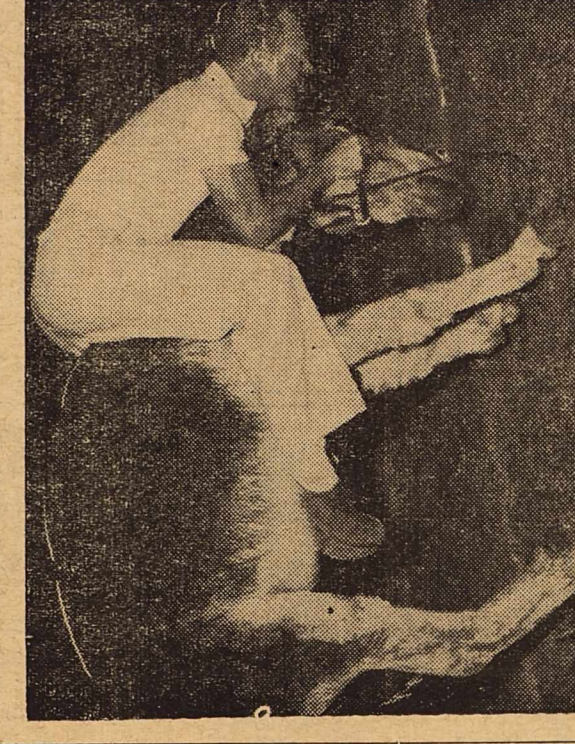
