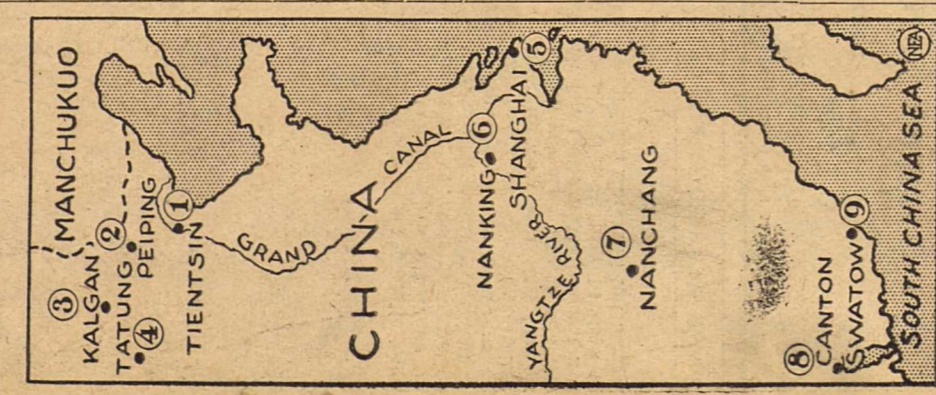

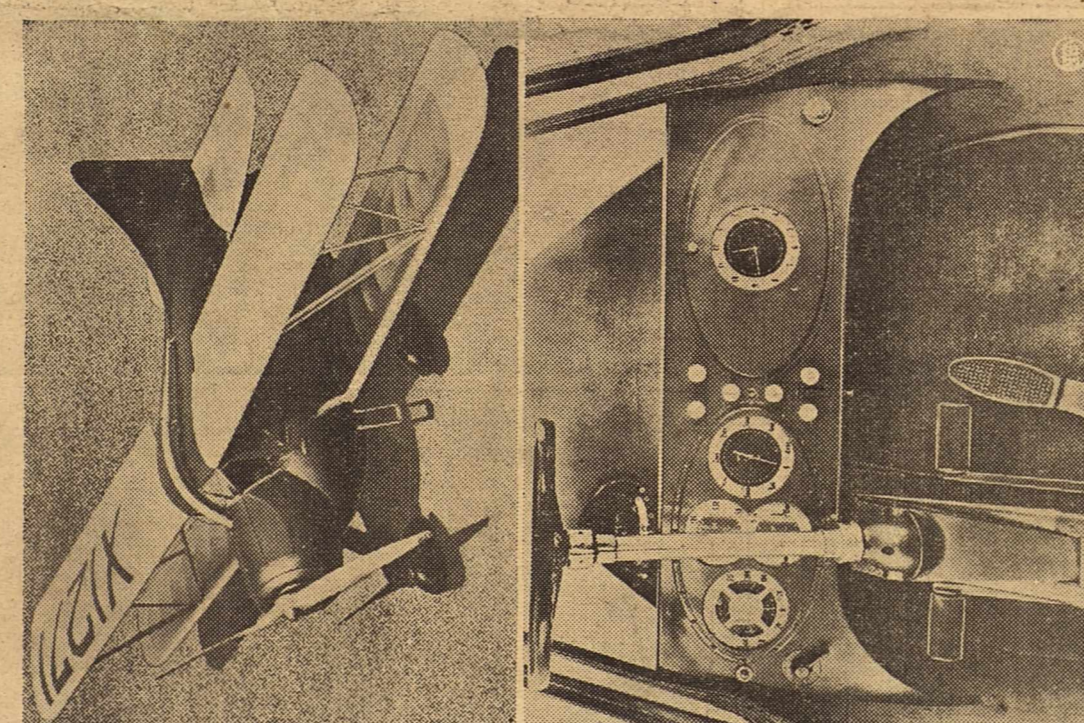

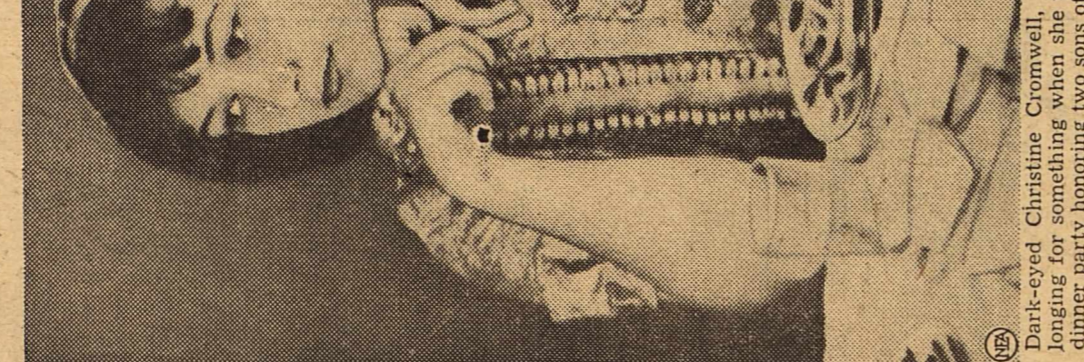
Added Taxes Upon Pipelines Hinted By Governor Today

Large Production Prospects From Duggan Northwest Extension Good

By FRANK GARDNER. Prospects of large production from Pipe Line Company will lay a line to the north, Permian Basin pools, it is understood, that survive the boom in Lee County, N. 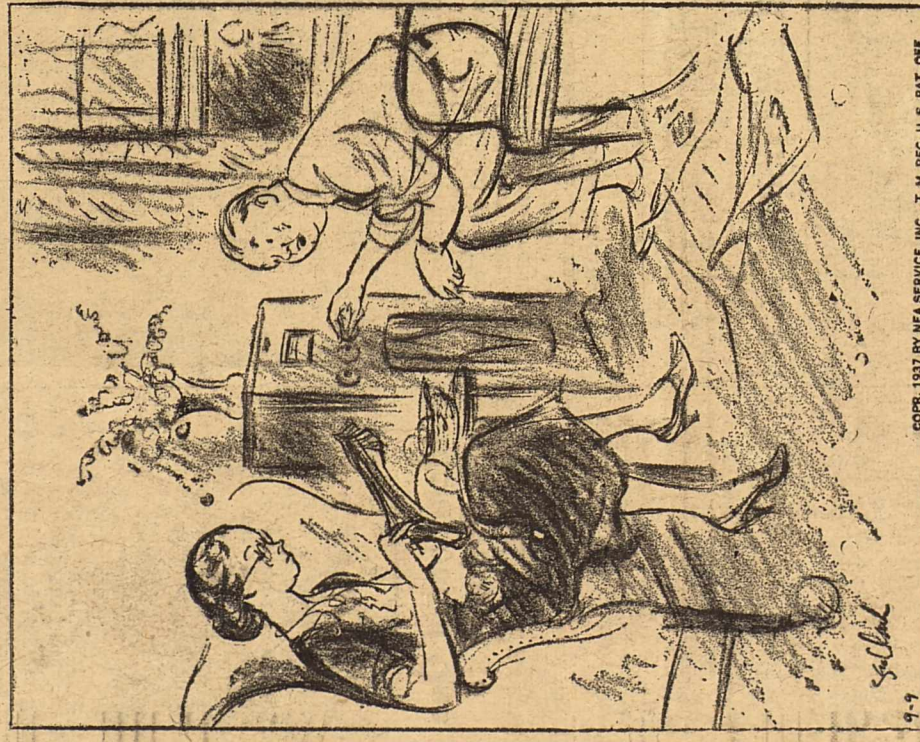
The situation poses the ancient puzzle of who has the right to kill a man, and whether the law is overstepping Biblical injunction when it executes a duly tried and convicted prisoner.

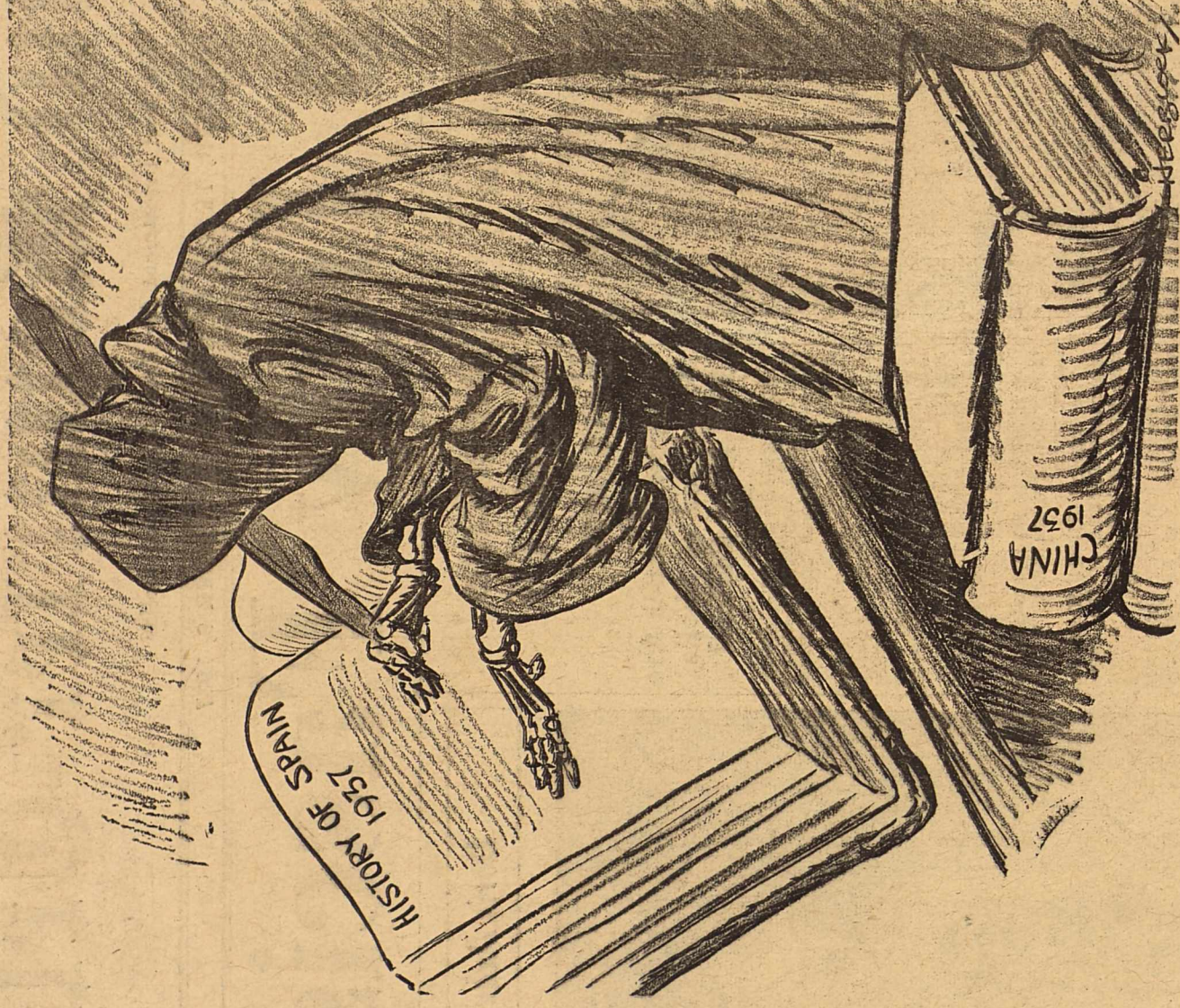

Behind the Scenes in Washington

WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE? The third of a series of six articles by national leaders in Congress on the future of America. These articles replace the "Behind the Scenes in Washington" column while Rodney Datcher is on vacation. CONGRESS MUST FOLLOW F. D. R. OR FACE A NEW PARTY, SAYS LAFOLLETTE

Written Exclusively for The Reporter-Telegram and NEA Service, Inc. BEFORE we can decide where we go from here we must take our bearings and determine just where we are. Lincoln long ago admonished us that "if we first know WHERE we are and WHITHER we are tending, we could then better judge what to do and how to do it."

The essential of determining where we are is to understand that the economic crisis through which we are passing is not a mere phase of the business cycle. It is the end of an economic era dominated by the physical expansion of the frontier. In the throes of our greatest depression we are becoming conscious for the first time of great changes which have already occurred and are continuing to occur in the economic life of our nation.

Immigration has stopped. Natural population growth is slowing down. Economic nationalism is closing economic opportunity in foreign trade. All these things have resulted in a curtailment of individual economic opportunity which presents fundamental problems for solution.

Spending continues to increase. But from the beginning I have believed in the importance of the government's role in the distribution of income and public employment. The creation and distribution of income is public employment expanded or contracted as other factors in the business cycle operate and thus act as a governor in hand with this adjustable employment should go a free use of the tax mechanism to drain off the economic power over the life, property, and labor of a once free people.

Two Major Objectives. It seems perfectly clear to me that we must have a program in the near future—(1) to increase the national income, and (2) to secure a more equitable distribution of it as it is produced from year to year.

The Roosevelt administration has its supporters who are in the general direction of these objectives. What the country is now going through from a political standpoint is a decision whether the administration and its supporters are going to take measures to the full attainment of these objectives.

The Supreme Court fight, in my judgment, was just one of many such measures—but a very necessary one because upon its substitution of a democracy to face forward its goals. Beneath a surface fight over the reorganization of courts lay a deeper issue of whether today and tomorrow the

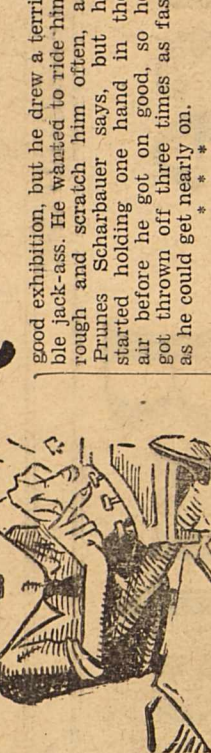
will of the people. THE last election gave a clear mandate to President Roosevelt and a supporter back to the forward election was not mere approval of what had been done, but was a demand to go further in an attempt to meet these two major objectives. The economic royalists have wanted to obstruct the fulfillment of the 1936 election pledges. One of two things is going to happen. Either this mandate will be carried out by the ad-

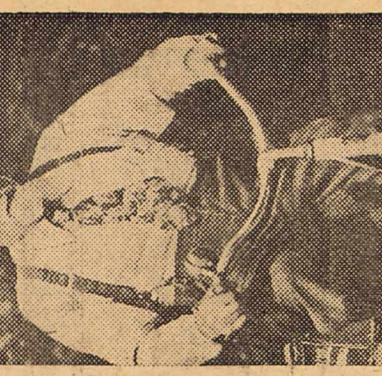

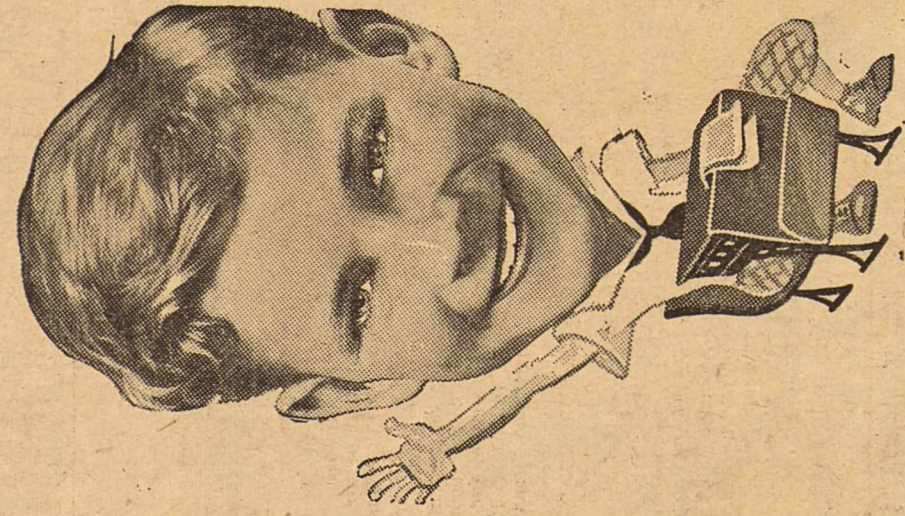

Some of the riders put on shows that would have put to shame the circus. The burros were never able to get on the mules.

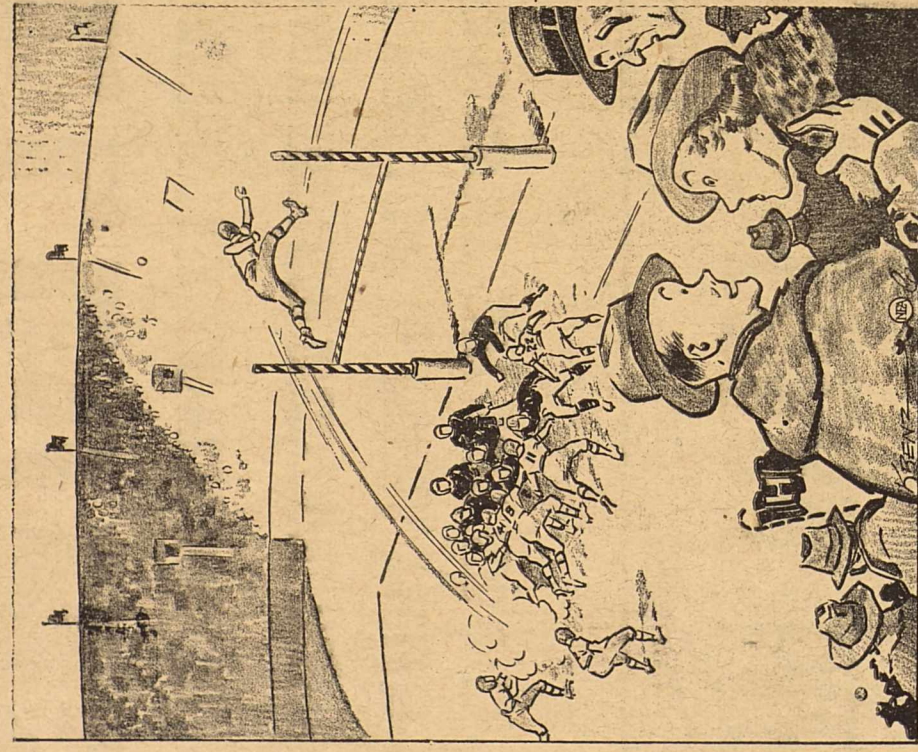

business law, business statistics, marketing or cotton investments, management and foreign trade. The student choosing this plan must confer with the dean at the beginning of his junior or not later than the beginning of his senior year, in order to work out the elective courses that will give him a curriculum including business administration with certain courses in economics and government to fit him for governmental or business fields of service.

The School of Business Administration will also offer two new courses this fall, one dealing with index numbers in interpreting business conditions, taught by Dr. John Stockton, and the other, the business administration and the other a seminar course on special business studies, in which students will work out special problems on which they will make detailed reports before professors and graduate students.

Two new staff members have been recruited to the university. Dr. W. H. Irons has been elected assistant professor and will teach short term finance, and credits and collections. Dr. Irons, a native of Georgia, holds the bachelor of arts degree from Pennsylvania State College, and the doctor of philosophy degree from the University of Pennsylvania. He has been teaching in Upper Darby High School, Philadelphia, during the last year.

Paul S. Garner, who is absent on leave from Mississippi State College, where he is assistant profes-

sor of business administration, will serve as part-time instructor with the department during the coming long semester. Teaching elementary accounting, Mr. Garner will also take graduate work in the university leading toward the doctor of philosophy degree.

NEW STUDY PLAN TO BE INAUGURATED AT TEXAS UNIVERSITY AFTER SCHOOL OPENS
