FDR to Carry Court Fight to Nation

Invasion By Ger., Italy Is Charged

LONDON, Sept. 18 (AP).—Spain's civil war touched all of Europe today as the British destroyer Fearless reported it had been attacked by a bombing plane off Gijon, Spain.

Six bombs fell close to the destroyer but it was not struck. After the attack the plane flew toward Gijon, leading to the belief the plane might have been of Spanish government craft.

In Geneva, Dr. Juan Negrin, Spanish government premier, demanded the League of Nations force an end to the German-Italian "interventions" in the civil conflict. He said the civil war has become a "war of invasion by Germany and Italy."

Italians in Rome said Fascist legations are being recruited to fight for the Spanish insurgent cause.

Meanwhile, nine nations, led by Britain and France, banded together with warships to drive private attackers from the Mediterranean.

The Reuters news agency reported Spanish insurgent general headquarters had issued a communique claiming "irrefutable proof" that Russian submarines had attacked merchant shipping.

The Anglo-French patrol to keep arms and men from Spain was ended so that a full quota of warships would be available for the newly drafted war on piracy in the Mediterranean.

Dr. Negrin demanded of the league, on behalf of his government, recognition of the Spanish government, of which Spain has been the victim, be recognized.

"In consequence of this recognition that the League of Nations examine a means of putting an end to this aggression.

"3. That the Spanish government must have the right to acquire necessary material, to may consider necessary.

"4. That non-Spanish combatants be withdrawn from Spanish territory.

"5. That measures of security adopted in the Mediterranean be extended to Spain and that Spain be restored to her legitimate participation in the world.

"The fact of invasion is recognized and proclaimed with the greatest cynicism by the international highwaymen," Dr. Negrin declared, citing Premier Mussolini's and Reichfuhrer Hitler's words that they favored and upheld the cause of Franco.

Negrin then presented, for consideration, a resolution demanding that Spain's legitimate government be recognized and a political committee for study.

Americans Endangered By Bombing

Japanese Unleash Bombardment Along Front at Shainghai

SHANGHAI, Sept. 18 (AP).—Japanese artillery unleashed a bombardment in the Markham road section today bringing fresh perils to the American Legation and to the International Settlement.

Shells crashed into the area near where United States marines are stationed.

The attack was launched against Lungtan, Lotion, Kiangwan, Chapei and Footing. Chinese replied with shells and machine gun fire.

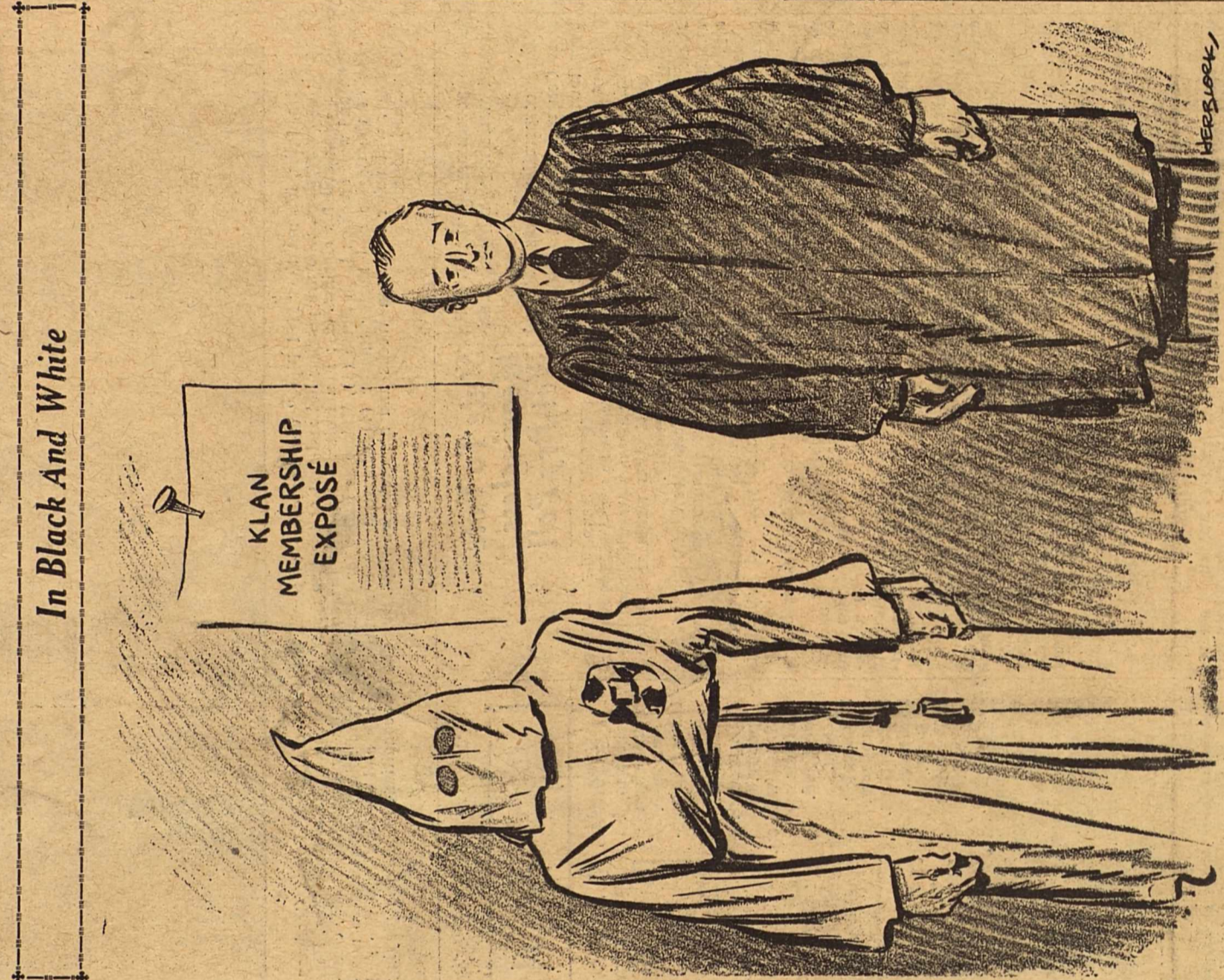
Heavy Chinese casualties were reported in the counter-attacks when forces permitted the advancing troops to open a withering machine gun fire that halted the Chinese.

Japanese officials disclosed Chinese civilians who were crouched within the shattered walls of Paoshan, on the Yangtze about 15 miles north of Shanghai, when Japanese captured the city a week ago, had been permitted to form their own autonomous government.

Some observers interpreted this Japanese move as an attempt to create a puppet government to create similar autonomous regimes in Chinese cities under Japan's patronage.

Activity In Denver Area Of Southwest Yoakum Feature

New Deal in Clothes Seen for U. S. Army

FORT SAM HOUSTON.—The test of the proposed new infantry division now being conducted at Fort Sam Houston may produce more than a new "stream-lined" division for Uncle Sam's army—it may bring a "new Deal" in field clothing for soldiers.

During and since the World War, officers and soldiers alike while on service in the field have worn the field uniform of the day. The field uniform of the field uniform, essentially the same as that of the infantry, has been light through the knees and laced tightly on the legs for the infantryman, leggings for the cavalryman and boots for the artilleryman. Officers not mounted wear the same as other branches.

In order to determine the suitability of ordinary trousers for use in the field, the War Department has directed that all troops of the Eighth Corps Area participating in the division tests be issued trousers and members of other branches who ordinarily walk when in the field will wear the canvas leggings with breeches. Troops transported in motor vehicles will wear the trousers without leggings.

The Quartermaster at Fort Sam Houston already has issued more than 100,000 pairs of canvas leggings and breeches and will wear the new item of clothing.

The idea of wearing trousers with leggings is not new. It was done in the Army before the World War. During the war the majority of the fighting powers uniformed their feet with leggings and breeches which were wrapped the spiral or wrap puttee.

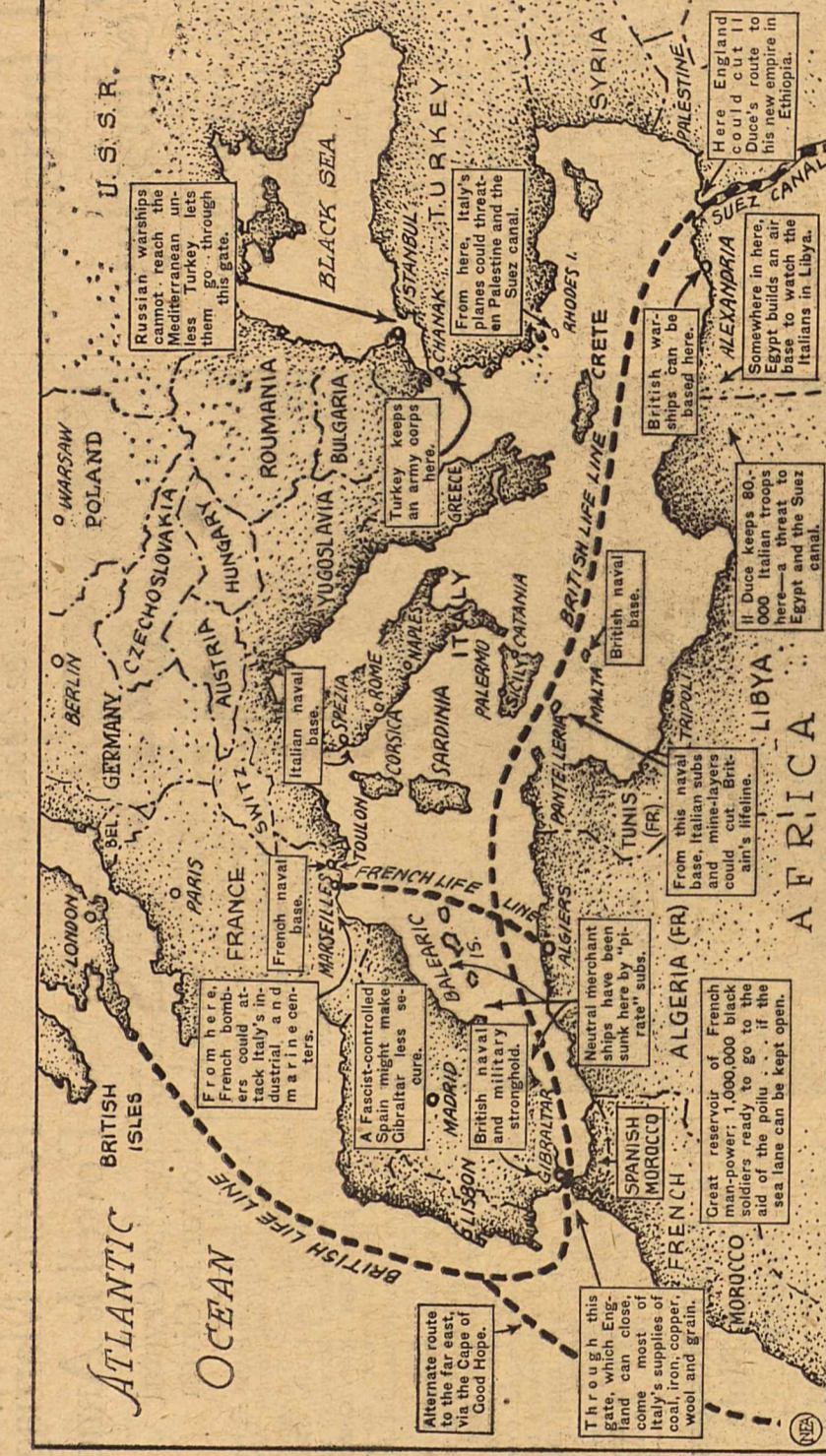

LONDON, Sept. 18. — Once again, history seems to be preparing to use the land-locked Mediterranean Sea as a corridor to the future.

Today the war fleets are massing in the Mediterranean. England, Russia, Italy, and the United States are all there. The British fleet is the largest, and around this inland sea. Now and again it has been said that the Atlantic or the Pacific, is the sea of the future, but in the end it is the Mediterranean which provides the stage for the showdown.

Europe, Asia, and Africa, meet because they meet there — giving sure dominion to the nation which can control that long, irregularly shaped bit of water — the past and the future meet there too; the past, with its grim record of bloody battles and momentous vicissitudes; the future, with its ominous hints of pending trouble.

men in any part of Europe, Egypt, and the Mediterranean. A little later the adventurous Phoenicians from Tyre and Sidon turned the great sea into a highway for trade and adventure, sailing into every bay along its thousands of miles of shore trading posts and colonies.

The early Greeks made the sea historic, too. They built an island empire at its eastern end, developed one of the finest of all human civilizations, and made possible its continuance by defeating the Persians at Salamis and Plataea.

One of the first of the studies series of naval battles in the Mediterranean was the battle of Salamis.

Carthage, founded by the Phoenicians, grew great in the western half of the Mediterranean. Carthaginian ships and sailors went out through the Straits of Gibraltar into the Atlantic, venturing far

Empire of Islam grew up along the southern and eastern shores of the sea. At the Straits of Gibraltar is crossed to Europe, to hold the Spanish peninsula for long centuries; at the other end of the sea it hammered at the gates of Constantinople for generations, receiving in return the hand at last leaped the Bosphorus and Constantinople a Moslem city.

For years thereafter the Turk was all-powerful on the Mediterranean, but in 1571 the great Don John of Austria broke Turkish sea power in the battle of Lepanto, and Venice was able to develop their sea-home commerce unhindered. Indeed, for a time the Venetians re-created the old Roman Venetian called the Mediterranean "our sea."

Then a new nation came to play a part in the Mediterranean drama. England entered the scene, and British ships seized the stronghold of Gibraltar.

From that day on, England advanced steadily until it reached a dominant position on the Mediterranean, and it is largely because that continuance has recently been challenged that the battle fleets are once more on the sea.

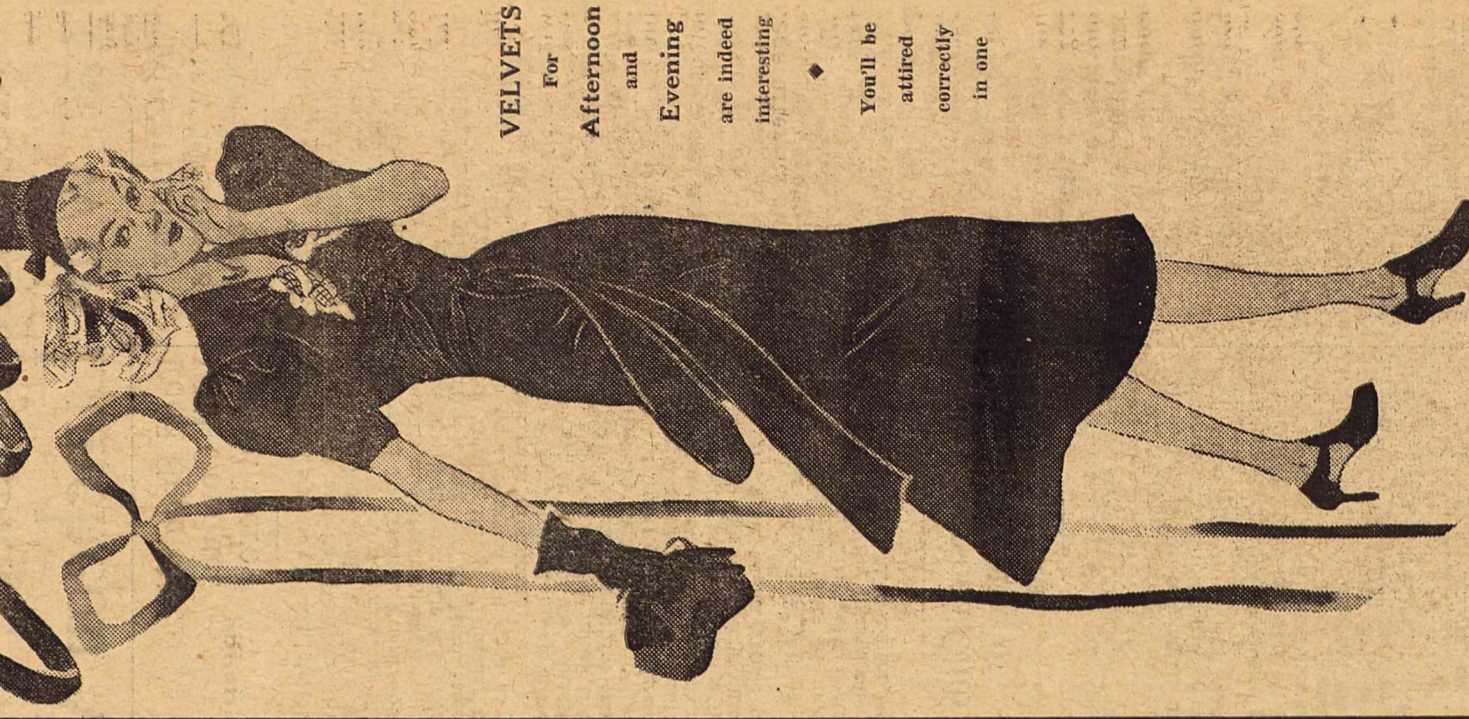
For the British, their empire expanding and growing until it became the greatest on earth, made the Mediterranean "our sea" in the eyes of the rest of the world — the Roman and the Red Sea in the east, and Gibraltar, in the west. The Mediterranean was their great highway to India and the far east. Britons spoke of it as "the life-line of the empire."

For more than a century, it has been the policy to hold unchallenged control of the Mediterranean at all costs. No serious challenge to this policy occurred until about two years ago. Then Mussolini, who looks on the ancient Roman empire, and the Caesars, saw the Mediterranean as once more a "mare nostrum" — not England's but Italy's. His new ambitions brought on a clash with England when he started his war with Ethiopia.

With Ethiopia, of Nations demanded this as an unholy war, and — at England's insistence — sanctions were imposed on Italy. Mussolini went calmly ahead with two painful bits of information — first, that they would make no go down and second, that as things then stood Mussolini was actually just about as strong in the Mediterranean as they were.

On the heels of this came other developments. Mussolini and Hitler, having little in common except convention, Hitler with an eye to continental plans, Mussolini with an eye on the Mediterranean. The

Pipe Smokers Are Declining, Figures Show

WASHINGTON (UP)—Americans are smoking more cigarettes and cigars than ever before, according to statistics compiled by the Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

Consumption of snuff and chewing tobacco also is increasing, but the number of pipe smokers is declining. The total consumption of tobacco as a whole is increasing.

During the fiscal year ended last July 1, withdrawals of cigarettes from warehouses increased 12 per cent over the previous year. Cigar withdrawals increased eight per cent in the same period.

All adds up, the bureau said, to good news to tobacco growers. The price outlook for this year's crop appears "fairly good," despite an estimated 23 per cent increase in production over last year, the economists said.

The cigarette shipment, estimated to be 1,417,015,000 pounds compared with 1,153,083,000 pounds last year and a 23 per cent increase.
