MENTAL MEASUREMENTS OF COLLEGE FRESHMEN

So stealthily is the burden of civilization shifted from
the aging generation onto the backs of its children, that
the change rarely is perceptible. Fortunately, there are
a few distinct mileposts along the road to the future, and
one of them—the opening of colleges and universities for
fall terms—is directly at hand for close observation.

If every adult properly fulfilled his duty to posterity,
he would interest himself in the processes by which thou-
sands of high school graduates are permitted to proceed
with higher courses of training for service as leaders in
the arts, professions, trades and sciences.

Along with the thrilling experience of actually see-
ing the wheel of time and circumstance start a new revo-
lution, the observer would get an eye full of just how much
progress we are not making in teaching boys and girls
how to live and make a living.

There is, for instance, the report of an eastern col-
lege after its study of about 500 applications for admis-
sion. The 1937 model male freshman, the report says,
will be 18 years and six months old, five feet, 10 inches
tall, and will weigh about 152 pounds.

These figures, showing an increase in physical pro-
portions over freshmen of previous years, will be great
news for the athletic coaching staff. But their significance
for the rest of the faculty, for the student himself, and
for civilization in general is negligible.

Beyond listing the physical measurements, and see-
ing that high school grades meet certain standards, the
registrars' figures usually leave the freshman an unknown
quantity as far as his affinity for building bridges, re-
searching in botany or mastering constitutional law is
concerned.

And the likelihood is that he will remain an unknown
quantity until he muddles through one or more years of
his course, or until he blunders onto his "chosen" field or
is led to it by the rare teacher who regards his job as
somehow more than a daily 50-minute lecture to each
class.

State To Vote Meaningless Wet-Dry Poll

NASHVILLE, Tenn., (AP)—Tenn.-ians to spend \$60,000 September 27 to elect a referendum on a legal election which will have 10 remaining commonwealths where beer is the only legal alcoholic beverage, has no hopes of repealing the state's 28 year old prohibition laws, best the referendum is but a straw vote.


Recently, the authorities decided to raise the price of a bath from 50 cents to 80 cents. But the water is still just as hot.

New Deal in Clothes Seen for U. S. Army

FORT SAM HOUSTON.—The test of the proposed new infantry division now being conducted at Fort Sam Houston may produce more than a new "stream-lined" division for Uncle Sam's army—it may bring a "new Deal" in field clothing for soldiers.

During and since the World War, officers and soldiers alike while on service in the field have worn the field uniform of the day. The field uniform of the field uniform, essentially the same as that of the infantry, has been light, through the knees and laced tightly on the leg for the infantryman, leggings for the cavalryman and boots for the artilleryman. Officers not mounted wear the same as the enlisted men.

In order to determine the suitability of ordinary trousers for field service the War Department has directed that all troops of the Eighth Corps Area participating in the division tests be issued trousers and members of other branches who ordinarily walk when in the field will wear the canvas leggings with breeches. Troops transported in motor vehicles will wear the trousers without leggings.

The Quartermaster at Fort Sam Houston already has issued more than 100,000 pairs of canvas leggings and breeches and will wear the new item of clothing.

War Fleets Mass as History Again Marks Mediterranean a Corridor to the Future


This is the first of four articles in this series which deal with the international rivalry which recently culminated in formation of the "anti-pirate" submarine patrol.

LONDON, Sept. 18. — Once again, history seems to be repeating to use the land-locked Mediterranean Sea as a corridor to the future.

Today the war fleets are massing in the Mediterranean. England, Russia, Italy, and France are all there, and around this inland sea. Now and again it has been said that the Atlantic or the Pacific, is the sea of the future, but in the end it is the Mediterranean which provides the stage for the showdown. Europe, Asia, and Africa, meet because they meet there — giving sure dominion to the nation which can control that long, irregularly shaped bit of water — the past and the future meet there too; the past, with its grim record of bloody battles and momentous vicissitudes; the future, with its ominous hints of pending trouble.

down the coast of Africa, Egypt, northward to the British Isles. In-land Rome was overawed by Carthage's sea power and it was Carthage's boat that the Roman dared so much to wash his hands in the Mediterranean unless Carthage gave him leave.

So, but the Romans developed fleets of their own. They fought a series of wars with the Carthaginians — and, finally, 146 years before Christ, destroyed the proud city utterly, plowing up its site and sowing the ground with salt, so that nothing might ever grow there again; the sea, with utter truth they called it "mare nostrum"—Our Sea.


The years passed, and still the Mediterranean was the highway of destiny. When Octavius and Mark Anthony fought for dominion, it was the naval battle of Actium that settled the contest for European civilization to develop along European, not Oriental lines.

When Rome fell before the barbarian hordes from the north and east, the Mediterranean was once more the main theater of the conflict. Empire of Islam grew up along the southern and eastern shores of the sea. At the Straits of Gibraltar is crossed to Europe, to hold the Spanish peninsula for long centuries; at the other end of the sea it hampered at the gates of Constantinople for generations, receiving in return the hand at last leaped the Bosphorus and Constantinople a Moslem city.

For years thereafter the Turk was all-powerful on the Mediterranean, but in 1571 the great Don John of Austria broke Turkish sea power in the battle of Lepanto, and Venice was able to develop their sea-home commerce unhindered. Indeed, for a time the Venetians re-created the old Roman Venetian called the Mediterranean "our sea."

Then a new nation came to play a part in the Mediterranean drama. England entered the scene, and British ships, with their crews of Gibraltar, advanced steadily until it reached a dominant position on the Mediterranean, and it is largely because that dominance has recently been challenged that the battle fleets are once more on the sea.





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

A Book A Day

Labor Spy Technique Is Told in Clinch Calkins' Book

Those who followed carefully and in detail the revelations of the LaFollette Civil Liberties Committee will find little new in Clinch Calkins' "Spy Overhead" (Harvort, Erace and Co., \$2.50). The book is a summary of the grubbier examples of industrial espionage turned up by that committee, illuminated by Calkins' frequently acute comment.

The LaFollette slumming expeditions into the lunderdoin of industrial relations was a dramatic production directed by Senator LaFollette. Miss Calkins has collected and strung together a bunch of the more odorous morsels.

Three hundred detective agencies in the country do industrial work, Miss Calkins indicates, and the amount of the "overhead" for this kind of work may be guessed at alone was paid \$419,000 by General Motors in 31 months.

The technique of spying, of disrupting unions by detectives provocateur, of professional strike-breaking by "frinks, nobles, hookers, sappers, missionaries and blacklisting," of the manipulation of public opinion, all are discussed.

The cream of the best to Miss Calkins is found in those instances where detective agencies shamelessly mulcted the industries that employed them, by padded expenses accounts, shadowy activities with the police, and by exaggerated reports aimed quite successfully at scaring more spy-money out of jittery employers.

Miss Calkins has contrived with senatorial assistance, a thrillingly personally-conducted tour of the industrial underworld.—W. T. YUCCA



Man has also been interested in his future, but until the invention of modern science and the tools of modern science, his information has been limited to the discovery of X-rays, radium and other modern marvels. The systematic investigation of the processes through which man has progressed to reach the present stage of his development, but has also permitted observations on the trend of the present on future generations. The advances accomplished in the past thirty-five years have given us more information about ourselves than all the previous centuries combined. The character of every person is the result of two factors: his heredity and his environment. Heredity cannot be changed but the manner in which a given individual develops is profoundly influenced by his environment. Some years ago, after the microscope was invented, it was discovered that animals and plants are made up of minute units called "cells." In general terms, a cell is a small box which contains an assortment of chemicals which react with one another. The human body is a composite of millions of these microscopic units, molded into skeleton, tissue, and organs. In union they perform the functions of life. Life begins with the union of two cells known as the egg and the sperm. These have come respectively from the mother and the father and each contains a complete set of chemical packets, as it were, which will influence the development of the individual. The egg cell came from the mother and the sperm cell came from the father and tend to make the child like its father. When the two cells unite and form one cell, we say that fertilization has occurred and that the fertilized cell grows in size and then each part of it, including the chemical packets or genes, divides in half forming two cells in the place of one. These cells are identical in every way. The two cells grow and the process of division is repeated. The multiplication of cells is outward form of the cells changes to make up the various parts of the body until a complete individual is evolved. Each cell has a similar inner nature, but certain groups of cells have become specialized to perform the functions of the eyes, ears, skin, and so forth, forming the human body. From the simple beginning of the union of two cells a complex individual develops. And what of heredity during all this process? How have the genes influenced the formation of the body? You will recall that the child is endowed with two sets of genes, one from the mother, one from the father, in some respects heritance of that creature, not only in his youth but throughout his life. He may have opportunities for study and travel which will profoundly alter his character causing him to become more tolerant and a force for good wherever he is. All these are possibilities, and what the result will be depends not alone on the inherited qualities but on the experience of that creature, not only in his youth but throughout his life. 

Pipe Smokers Are Declining, Figures Show

WASHINGTON (UP)—Americans are smoking more cigarettes and cigars than ever before, according to statistics compiled by the Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

Consumption of snuff and chewing tobacco also is increasing, but the number of pipe smokers is declining. The number of pipe smokers is declining as a whole is increasing.

During the fiscal year ended last July 1, withdrawals of cigarettes from warehouses increased 12 per cent over the previous year. Cigar withdrawals increased eight per cent in the same period.

All adds up, the bureau said, to good news to tobacco growers. The price outlook for this year's crop appears "fairly good," despite an estimated 23 per cent increase in production over last year, the economists said.

The cigarette equivalent, estimated to be 1,417,015,000 pounds compared with 1,153,083,000 pounds last year and a 23 per cent increase.



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
Rural Schools




