Newspapers, Wheat, Wine, Prayer Book Contained in Stone

DALLAS, Sept. 25. — Soon to see the light of day again after nearly forty-four years of being locked in stone are the contents of the cornerstone of the old St. Matthews Cathedral at South Ervay and Church. Bleak and bare since 1893, when

**Federation Board Approves City and Highway Project**

At a recent board meeting of the City-County Federation of Women's Clubs at the home of the president, Mrs. F. H. Schenck, was considered the highway beautification project for city and highway beautification. The project will be voted upon by the federation at the meeting on October 8.

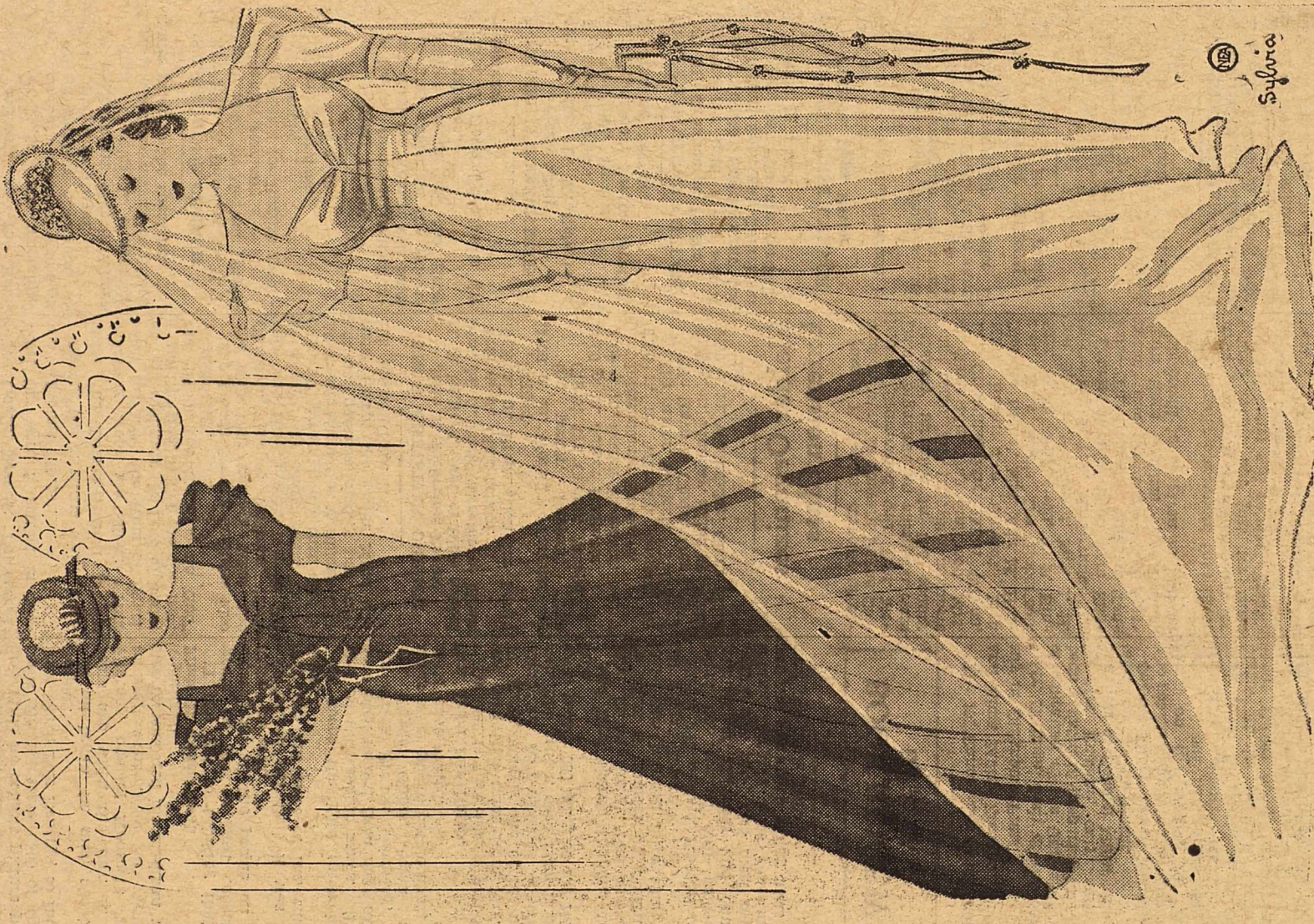
Working from the alley toward the front so as to blockade the sidewalk for as short a time as possible, the Dallas Wrecking Company will reconstruct the stone edifice.

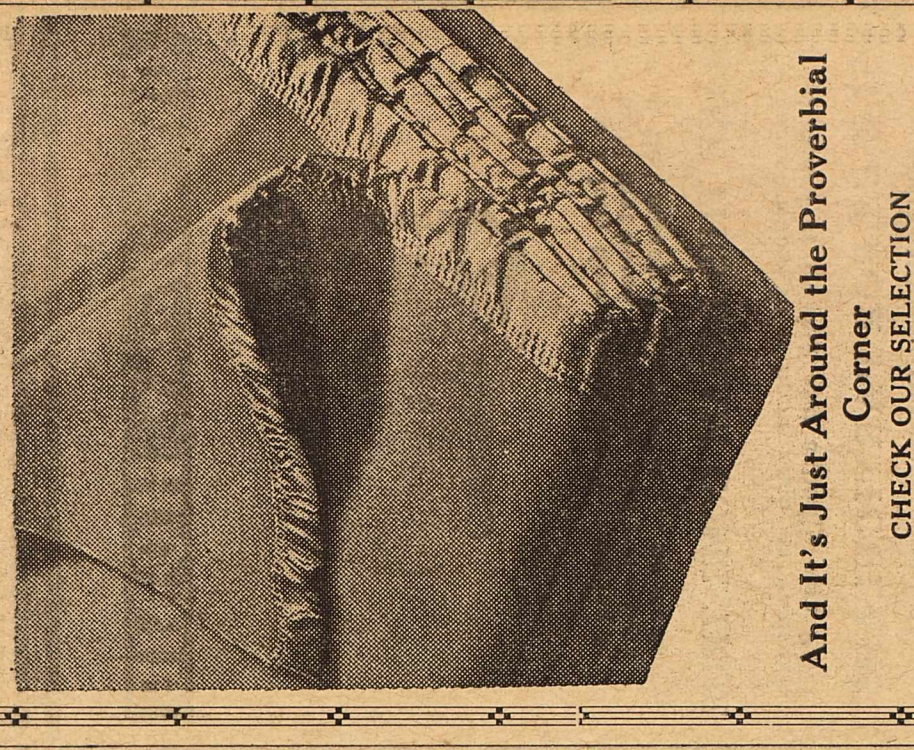

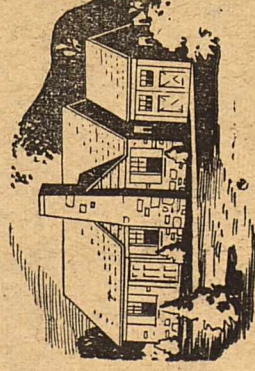

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UP)—Being a postman offers a fine opportunity for collecting postcards, but not for William J. Knoebel. Knoebel is willing to leave stamp collecting to such persons as President Roosevelt and other philatelists while he collects picture postcards. He has some 1,500 of them, from North Pole icebergs, to Indian temples. He began the hobby about 17 years ago when the Rev. A. B. Whitney, one of Knoebel's "customers," went away on vacation and remembered his mailman with a postcard.

It just got to thinking that it would be fun to start collecting picture postcards, he said. "I turned out that it was not only fun but more or less educational. He keeps the 1,500 cards bundled up with rubber bands. They have been mailed from most all of the states: France, Germany, and many other places people along his route have visited.
