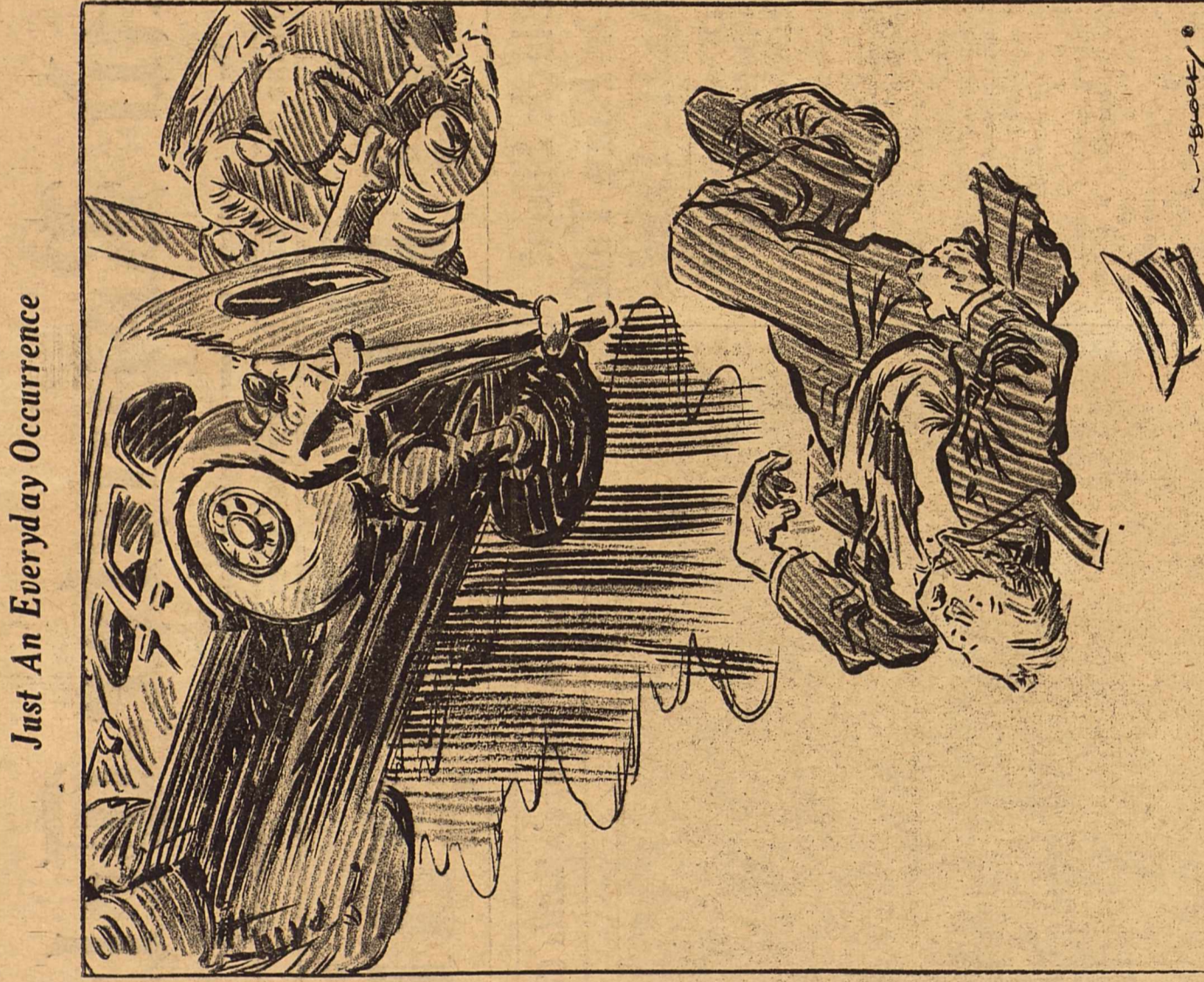

Operators are satisfied to assemble a 30-60-ton stockpile of the well. Nymbation rig is being used.

Wilcox Oil and Gas Company No. 1 McKnight, "mystery well" seeking Ordovician production in northwestern Crane county, is drilling at 5,125 feet in line, it is reliably reported today. This area of western Crane, Sinclair-Prairie et al No. 2 Tubbs community, which failed in the plenburger, lower Ordovician, when it encountered sulphur water in drilling to total depth of 6,891, is preparing to acidize the Tubbs pay zone after perforating 7-inch casing. 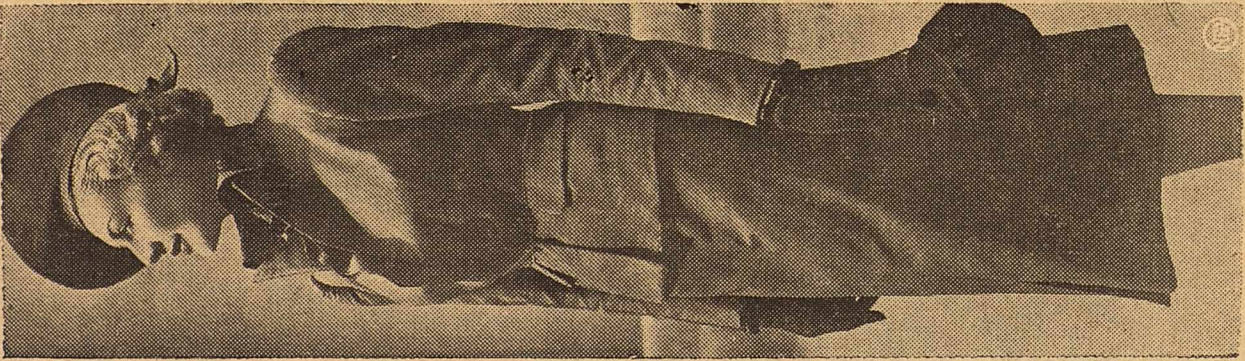
Mrs. Epps Leader of Delphian Program On "Modern Art"

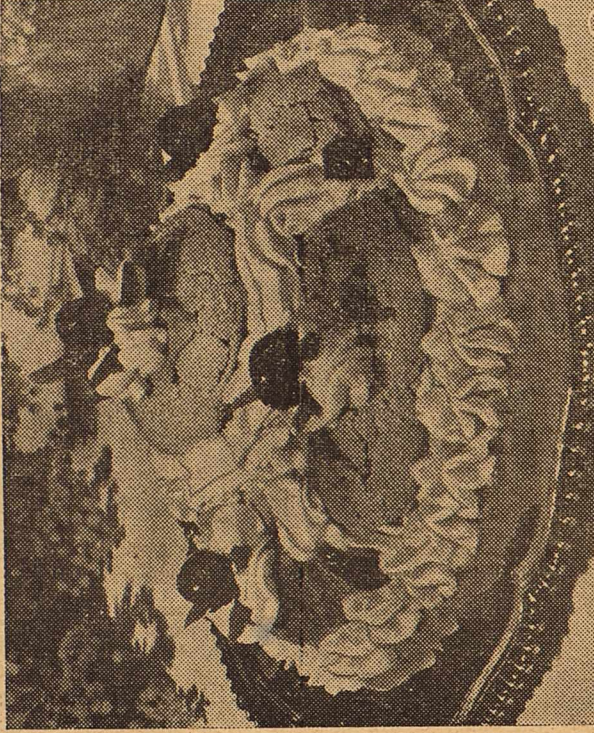

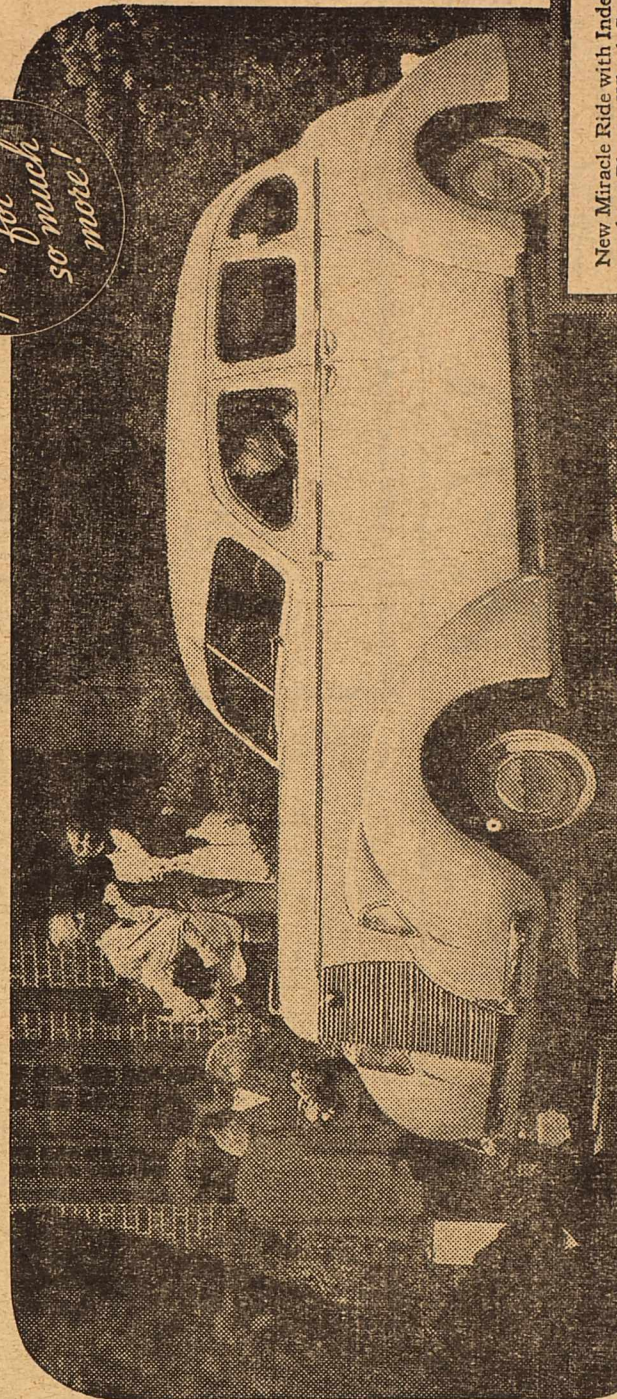

Modern Menus

- Fruit Coffee Cake.**
1 cake compressed yeast
1 1/4 cup lukewarm water
1 cup scalded milk
1/4 cup butter
1/4 cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1 egg, beaten
3 1/2 cups family flour
1 quart black cherries or 2 dozen sweet plums yeast into lukewarm water. Pour hot milk into mixing bowl, add butter, sugar and salt, and stir until butter is melted. When mixture is lukewarm, add egg and 1 cup of the flour, stirring for 10 minutes. Let stand in until frothy. Add remaining flour and cherries or plums, and stir again. Then spread remaining flour on board, turn out dough, and knead gently for about 3 minutes. Roll out to 1/2-inch thickness and transfer to 2 well-buttered shallow baking pans (10x7 inches). Brush surface generously with the beaten and sifted cherries or plums, and side down. Sprinkle generously with sugar. Let dough rise again to double its bulk; then bake in hot oven (425 degrees F.) for 10 minutes, reduce oven to 300 degrees, and bake 20 minutes longer. Makes 12 to 16 servings.

- Slices Karabou on Toast and Tomato**
1 cup finely diced cooked veal
1/2 cup thin cream
1/4 cup butter
1 tablespoon flour
3/4 cup milk
1/2 lb. sharp cheese, grated
4 large tomatoes, peeled
Put veal into cream and heat thoroughly over hot water. Melt butter, blend in flour, and add milk; stir constantly while cooking to a smooth white sauce. Add cheese and stir over hot water until cheese melts and blends smoothly with sauce. Add cream and tomato, and cook 5 minutes. Slice tomatoes on each piece of toast. Serve rarebit over tomato slices. Serves 4 to 5.

How Red Army Marched 7,000 Miles After Trouncing Chiang's Soldiers Five Times

Though They Fight Japan for Government Now Communist Stragglers Once Were Nabbed and Boiled Alive in Oil

SHANGHAI, Sept. 28.—When a ragged, half-starved handful of Chinese Communists inured themselves on unpalatable Chingkaishan mountain, in the fall of 1927, Chinese Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek might have been pardoned for supposing that he had just about heard the last of them.

He could hardly have imagined that for the next 10 years they would constitute his greatest single problem, forcing him to undertake a whole series of disastrous military campaigns and costing his Nanking government thousands of lives and millions upon millions of dollars.

And he was even less likely to foresee that they would eventually come to his aid in the darkest hour of his and China's greatest need.

Yet both of these things came to pass.

Mao Tze-tung, leader of the little band, somehow kept it together, in 1929 they fell, strong enough to come down from their mountain retreat to the rich plain country of Kiangsi province. There they found the suffering peasants more than ready to listen to them.

Absentee landlordism is the curse of the Chinese countryside, to be hated and stricken by poverty and a tax-collecting machine beyond the comprehension of the western world. The Communist doctrine sounded good.

The peasants had not the faintest notion of what Communism really meant, but they could understand the proposition that the land and the tools should be divided among the poor tillers of the soil.

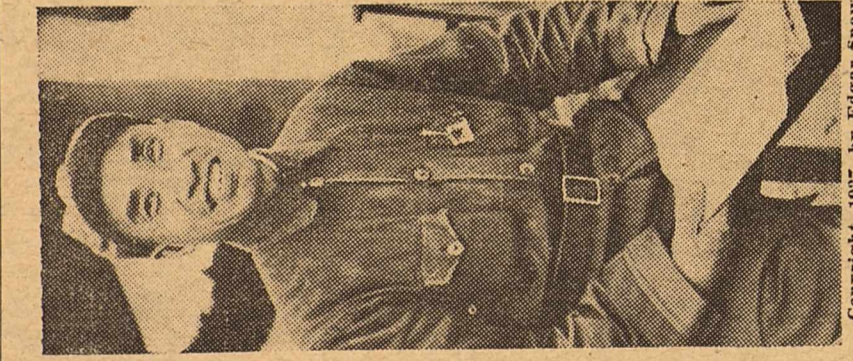
They also noticed that these Communists taxed with a far lighter hand than the local war lords, and that when they captured a town they did not burn or pillage any houses except those of the wealthy.

As a result, the Communists began to spread out over a wide area. Up in Nanking, Chiang looked down with alarm and indignation. Uttering proclamations, he dispatched a government army against the Reds.

The army met with a defeat. So did another, sent in its place. So, all in all, in the course of several years, did five government armies. The Communists seemed irresistible.

Sometimes they whipped the government troops in open fight. Sometimes their propagandists got into the rear of the government army, and the troops to desert. Sometimes the wily Communists simply bought off the government army commanders. And always the Communists came out of a campaign with fine new equipment—guns, uniforms, ammunition and other supplies taken from Chinese men.

Some three years ago Chiang mustered all his resources for a final overwhelming push. He said to his army: "The Communists are divisions into the drive. More important, he now had large numbers of airplanes, with which the



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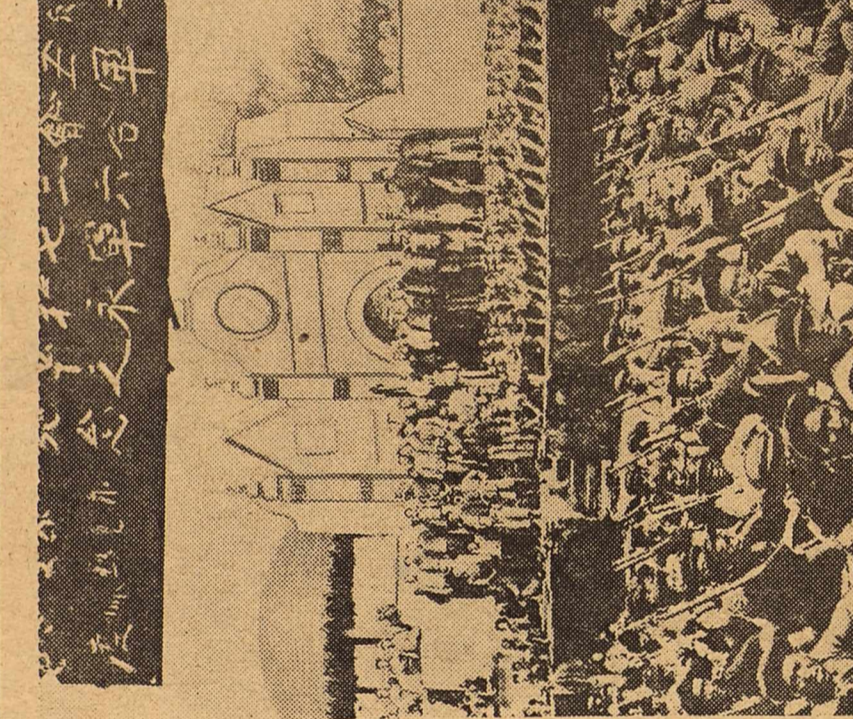

reds could not cope. Relentlessly, step by step, Chiang's "iron ring" contracted about the Communist state and its capital city, Juchin.

Had Only Courage Left.

The Communists had proclaimed their territory as the people's republic of China, the Provisional Soviet Government of China, and Chu was commander-in-chief of the "revolutionary military council of the workers and peasants' red armies," but these high sounding titles were of no help when Chiang's immensely superior force began to compress them to a tiny area.

They had no resource but their own courage and endurance.

They soon demonstrated that these had those things, in abundance. After a heroic but vain defense, an army of 100,000 men in a desperate struggle, they were driven and marched westward into Kweichow and Szechwan.

Little authentic news has ever come out about that march, but it must have been one of the most notable ones in military annals.

On every side were enemies. To all behind as well as ahead, the Communists were hated. Occasionally they diverted themselves by stuffing captured Reds into the fire boxes of locomotives—or by boiling them alive in big kettles of oil. There was little food, little money, little ammunition, little hope.

Marshal Chiang announced that he promised to make war against Japan, regain the lost territory of Manchukuo and make a harmonious "united front" agreement with the Communists.

After many days of negotiation, Chiang was released, and it was publicly stated that he had made no pledges of any kind. However, the events of the past few weeks indicate that some understanding along the lines laid down by Chiang may have been reached.

Serve Same Cause. Now, certain it is that the Japanese, every resource. And now peace has at last been made between Chiang and the Communists—and the almost legendary red leaders, Mao and Chu, are once more serving in the same cause with Chiang, as they did in the early days of the Kuomintang.

NO more momentous news than this has come out of China in years. If the agreement between the Communists and Nanking holds up, a decisive step toward the long-awaited unification of China would seem to have been taken.

Found a Refuge.

They are going — for 7,000 weary miles up into Shensi and Karsu provinces, where the Communists at last found a refuge lodge them. They were bottled up, hundreds of miles from the outside world, deserts of central Asia behind them, and the Japanese behind that had few cities, no industries and only moderately fertile land.

But there they established themselves. They set up a capital city in the low nof Pao-An. They did their best to establish industries. They tried to order life after the Russian manner, with model villages, workers' clubs, dormitories, and so on. They tried to get out of barren mountainsides. And they did keep a disciplined army in existence, equipping it by occasional forays out into Chiang's part of China.

From the beginning, one of the Communists' rallying cries had been "China to be united with the Soviet Union." Chiang and the Communists demanded that Chiang stop fighting Communism and unite all Chinese to drive out the invaders. And this cry set the stage for one of the most startling events in China's recent history—the kidnapping of Chiang Kai-shek.

Chiang is Kidnapped.

Chiang was at the time occupying Shan-tu, on the fringe of Communist- controlled territory. He had been sent there to fight the Reds, but with Shensi behind him, and with Szechwan to the north, he was made a prisoner.
