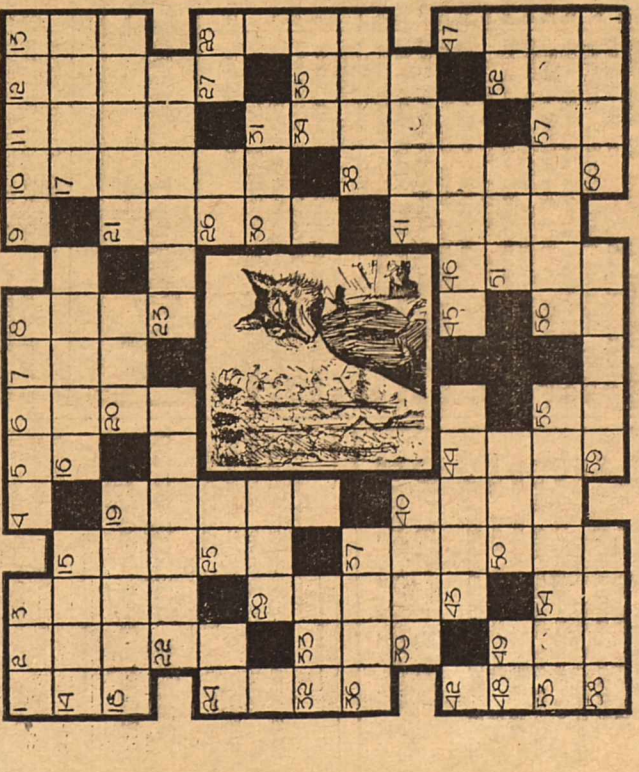

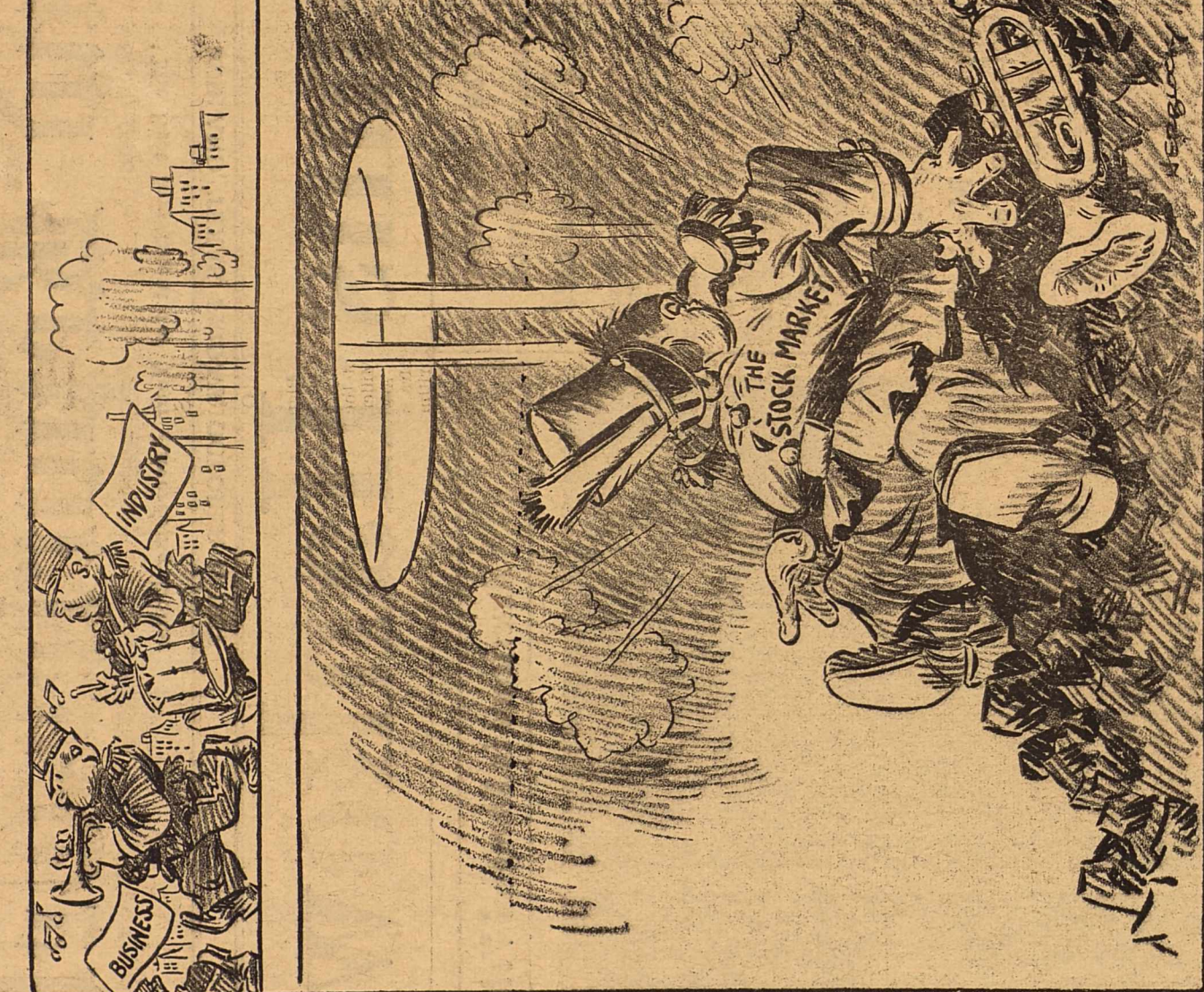
WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—(AP)—A group of four to five to four to invalidate the vote of the Supreme Court in the case of *Ex parte Davis*, a Negro and alien, was held in a hearing in the Supreme Court today. The group, which included Chief Justice Charles E. Hughes, Justice Brandeis, Justice Stone, and Justice Cardozo, heard the case and held the Georgia law unconstitutional. The case involves the "duress" clause, Herndon's conviction, the majority said, was based on no evidence of any clear and present danger to the state. In 1925 the court ruled against the Klan-supported Oregon parochial school law, which struck all Roman Catholics, by barring all private schools. No state, the court said, had power to standardize its children by forcing them to attend school from public teachers only. Although the supreme bench had approved refusal of the Democratic party in Texas to allow Negroes to vote in its primaries, it set aside the convictions of two Scottsboro defendants in 1935 on the ground that Negroes had been barred from the jury. Last year, it overturned the conviction of a Negro on the ground that their confessions had been obtained by torture. There are only a few of the outstanding recent cases. In previous years its record as to civil liberties and minorities has been rather spotty.

### Eskimo Teeth Begin to Ache

ROCKPORT, Ind. (AP)—Most primitive Eskimos have little tooth pain, according to Dr. Taylor Pyle, Bureau of Indian Affairs supervising dentist for Alaska. He said that dental cavities are rare among tribes that are isolated in Alaska while, on the other hand, the Indian who has been in the company of the Russians is constantly developing a tooth-ache. As wards of the government, Eskimos and Indians receive free dental attention, Dr. Pyle said. There are about 35 practicing dentists in Alaska, and Eskimo and Indian work is distributed among about 100 dental hospitals. Dr. Pyle personally attends the more isolated communities, reaching them by plane, boat and dog team. During four seasons in the far north, Dr. Pyle has made a study of Eskimo teeth, diet and living conditions in the isolated regions. He found that Eskimo teeth are a jolly and fun-loving person. They haven't a care in the world, he said, and there is no difficulty in persuading them to have their teeth examined, or their pictures taken, especially after their first child has been born. As for food, one of the Eskimo luxuries is tipmuk, the Alaskan equivalent of ice cream among the native tribes. It is made, Dr. Pyle said, by dumping a bunch of fish heads, fish eggs and a few berries into a pit, covering it over and permitting it to decay on, nearly a week. When ready, it is put into a skin bag and allowed to freeze. Dr. Pyle said that when twins are born the Eskimo believes there will not be enough brains for both so one is permitted to live.

### Arkansas Sea Monster Still Exists For River Folk Despite Vain Hunt

NEWPORT, Ark. (AP)—Many a river resident, particularly Negroes—still believe firmly that a sea monster exists in the White River. The publicity recently when a group of citizens complained to the state game and fish commission that the monster was gobbling up all the catfish in the river, and implored the state officials to rid the river of the beast. Officials refused, but the Newport chamber of commerce, with Negroes say they have seen the monster and describe it as a "big peed for commercializing on the river residents."

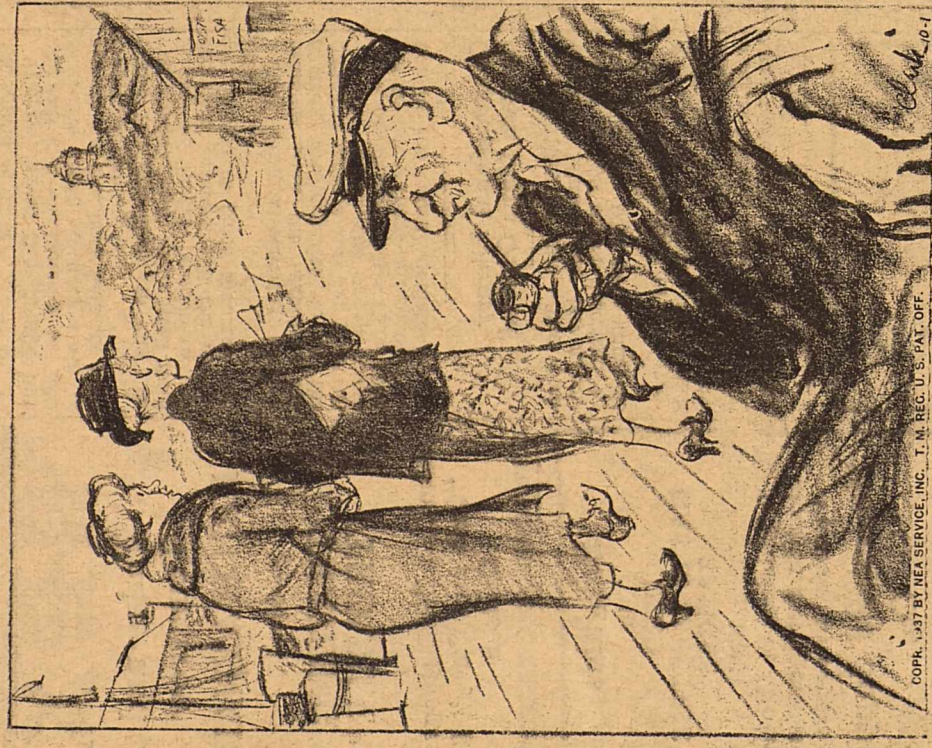

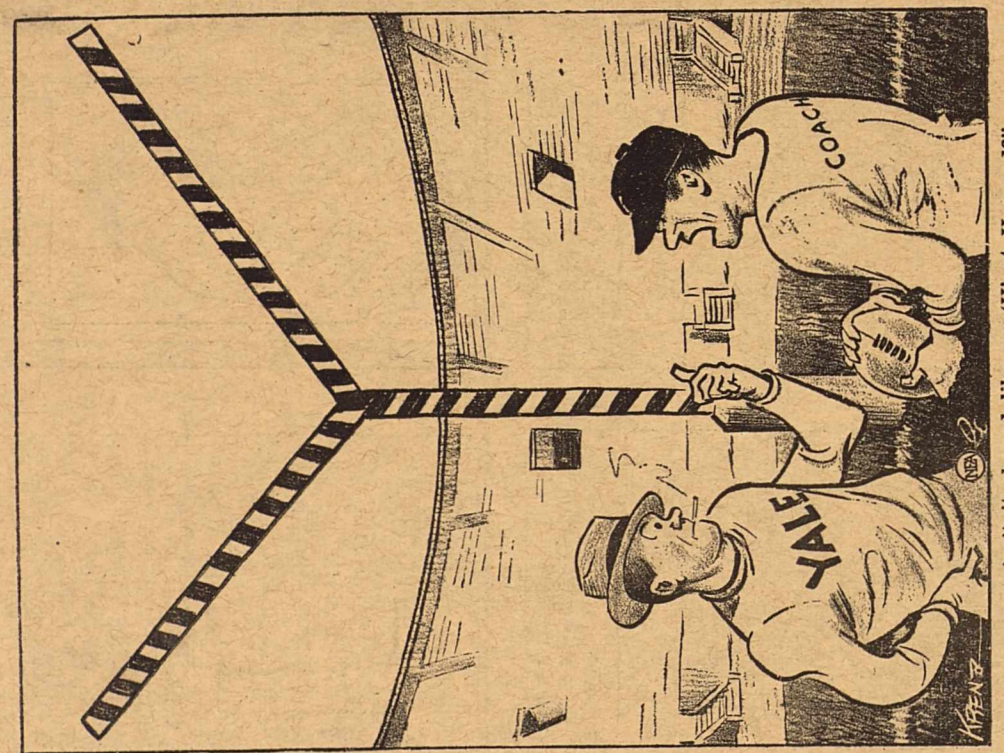

## Railroad Nears Scrap Iron Pile

VIRGINIA, Ill. (UP)—A tiny branch railway of Midwest pioneer days, which carried farm products to markets before armies clashed in the Civil War, goes on the auction block here Oct. 4, bowing before the competition of stronger rivals. The road is the Jacksonville & Havana, a 41-mile branch running through Virginia from Jacksonville to Havana. Part of it was built by the Illinois River Railroad company organized in 1853, and the construction was completed in 1899. The road is a remnant of the Chicago, Peoria & St. Louis railroad, which battled through a 13-year receivership and finally broke into four branches in 1926. A group of men formed the Jacksonville & Havana company, and the road carried freight and passengers until competition on a new line through Jacksonville ousted it for only two freight trains a week. The other three parts of the road are still alive, the branch between East St. Louis and Granton being operated by the Illinois Terminal, the one from Springfield to

Robin by the Chicago & Illinois Midland road that from Springfield to St. Louis. The line continued to run its two freight trains each week until operating expenses and the revenue sale decided to place the road on junk dealers, enjoying swollen demands from the munitions industries, are expected to be the principal bidders for the property. Eleven villages, the largest boasting a population of less than 1,000, will be left without rail transportation by the road's liquidation.

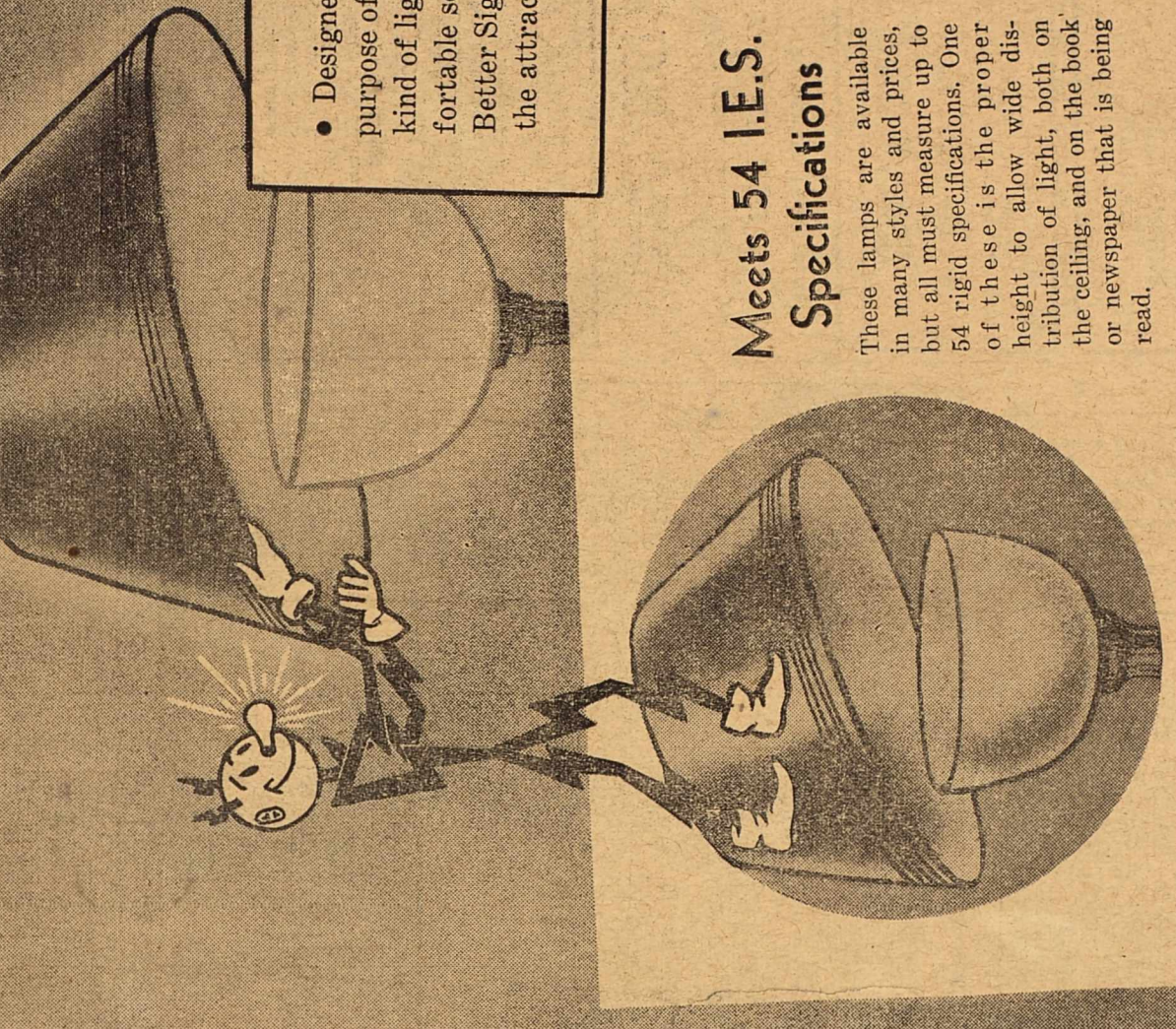
