

## Bull Town Bulletins By Bill Ellis



IF YOU ARE A fan of the Dallas Cowboys, then you thoroughly enjoyed the inaugural (excuse that) Monday night game this week, in which the Cowboys prevailed, 17-3 over their rivals, the Washington Redskins.

It was a nice feeling to see the Cowboys win even though Roger Staubach had retired--the team isn't ready for the junk heap just yet, thank you.

Cowboy fans who take the weekly Dallas Cowboy Weekly newspaper should have especially savored the win, if they read the feature article in the current issue on "Why the Redskins Hate the Cowboys" or "Mamas, don't let your babies grow up to be Redskins...they'll die of broken hearts at Cowboy games."

The article was written by William Gildea, a Washington Post writer, who went into great detail to explain how the Washington-Dallas feud has developed to the point that it practically is the most heated in the NFL today.

Gildea pointed out that practically every time the 'Skins have had a chance to get into the NFL playoffs, the Cowboys manage one of their unbelievable come-from-behind wins, which dashes Washington's hopes.

The most recent example of this came in the last regular season game of 1979, after Washington had a 13-point lead late in the game, only to have Staubach engineer one of his patented comebacks which resulted in a 35-34 Dallas win, and the Redskins had to pack away their uniforms.

He quoted Redskin coach Jack Pardee as saying "That was the most disappointing loss I've ever had as a player or a coach."

But as bad as last season's last-minute loss was, Redskin fans still remember Thanksgiving Day of 1974, when their team was 35 seconds away from victory and a spot in the playoffs.

Roger Staubach had been injured, and was replaced by a little-known rookie from Abilene Christian, Clint Longley. ("What's a Clint Longley?" someone asked in jest.)

That particular day, Longley was a hero. He cranked up on a 50-yard scoring toss to (who else) Drew Pearson, and the Cowboys won, 24-23. Washington again had to forget about any post-season activity.

Gildea points out what many Cowboy fans probably had forgotten: In Dallas' first year of professional football, 1960, the team didn't win a game, but it did manage to TIE the Redskins, somewhat of a humiliation, as Washington had to share last place with Dallas in their division.

Dallas must have decided they liked to play this particular team. At one point in the 1960s they had beaten Washington six straight times.

The 'Skins hired George Allen away from Los Angeles primarily to stop this Dallas domination. And, although ole George did manage a couple of timely wins over the Cowboys and appearances in the playoffs, he didn't exactly master Tom Landry's team, and Allen's seven-year contract was not renewed after 1977.

These writers and media people in Washington apparently have blown this anti-Dallas sentiment into extraordinary proportions. "Honest to God, the only thing I hate in this world is the Dallas Cowboys football team," an otherwise sweet Washington housewife was quoted as saying. Those die-hard fans all rose up with one voice after last year's heartbreaker: "Wait 'till next year," they said.

And, sure enough, "next year" arrived for them this past Monday night, but unfortunately for all the Cowboy-haters, the results were the same.

Kenneth Wyatt's Art Display that was to be held at the First State Bank, Friday, September 12 has been canceled.

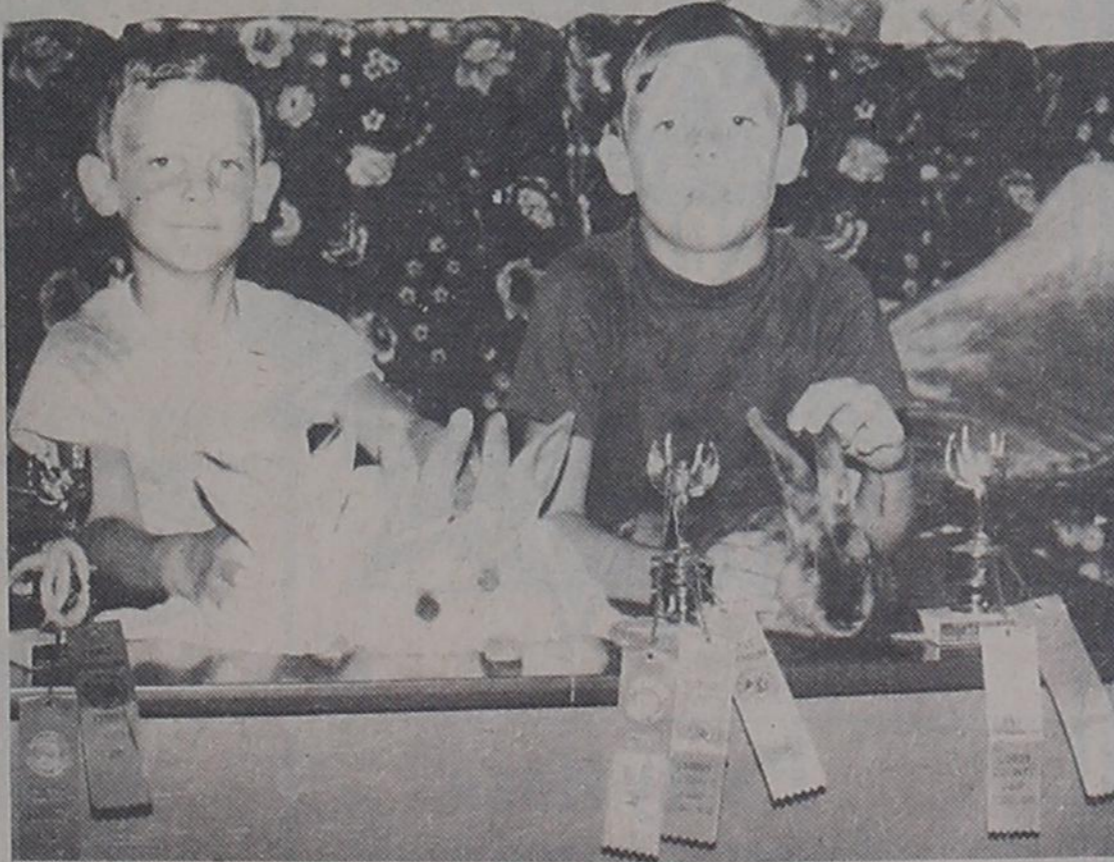
Kenneth Wyatt is a well known artist and writer. He sells directly out of his home in Tulia. Hopefully the display will be scheduled at a later date.

## Deadline Extended For Family Stories

There is still time to submit your family history for the Parmer County History Book, according to word from the Parmer County Historical Commission.

"By request of many who have been on vacation or otherwise occupied, we have extended the deadline for accepting histories to October 15," says Otho Whitefield.

Whitefield says this will be the last deadline extension. "We are grateful for the over 600 who have sent in their family history, but if we are to have a first-class book, we would like to have at least 1,200 histories. Please keep them coming. Call your neighbor and remind them," Whitefield said.

The county history buff also reminded residents of the availability of memorial and tribute pages in the history book.

"Memorials should remind people that most of us have lost loved ones who lived and worked a lifetime and all we have been able to do after losing these family members is to put a marker at their graves with their birth date, name, and date of death.

"The other traditional opportunity available to people may be to provide funds for a memorial building or structure. All of these conventional methods do not allow you the opportunity to express feelings about a loved one with photos and copy

written by you. Thousands of people will now have an opportunity to read about and see your loved one for decades to come as the books are passed down from generation to generation, plus those in libraries and public places.

"Memorial pages are available for a full page, a half page, or a quarter page.

"Tribute pages can be written about any living relative or friend. You will want to express your feelings about this person, tell about the person's accomplishments, and tell why this person is special to you or of special importance in your family's history. These pages are an excellent way to surprise your mother and father, or a sister or brother by writing tribute to them, and sharing with others how your loved ones have influenced your life. So seldom do we slow down enough in day to day living to say "I love you" and share with our living loved ones how very deeply we feel for them. This is your chance to tell others who read the story now and in the future about this person.

"A good tribute example would be a church congregation paying tribute to their pastor by purchasing a 2 or 3 page spread in the tribute section. With 50 or 60 people contributing, the cost would be minimal for each person and would be a very nice tribute. A classroom of students could surprise a favorite teacher in the same manner.

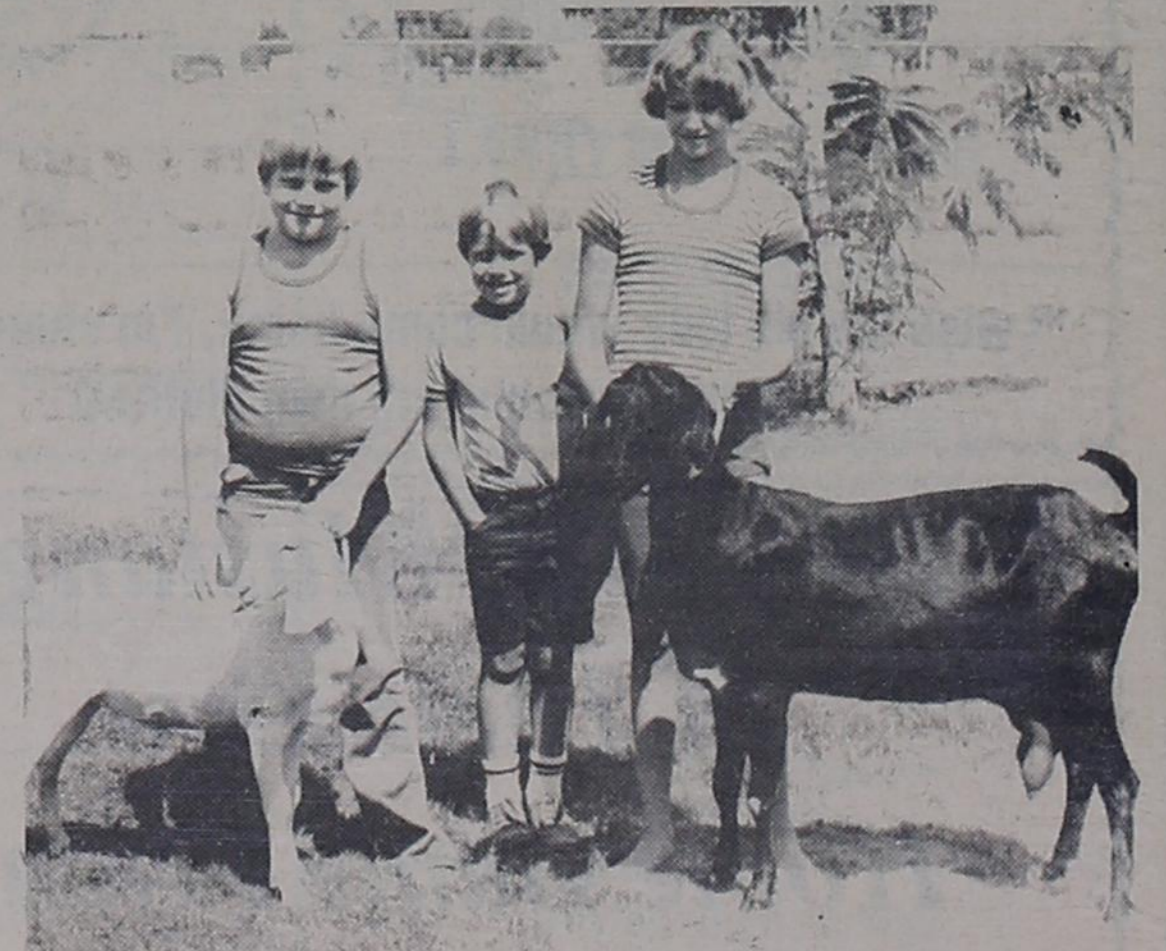

## Program Set On Electric Safety Here

Farm Bureau will present a program on electric shock for Bovina High School at 1 p.m. Wednesday, September 10 in the auditorium, according to Safety Director Joe L. Smetana. The Bovina FFA is the sponsor.

Most people do not fully understand the life-or-death facts of electricity. The average modern home has 120-volt or 240-volt, 60-cycle alternating household electrical current with a capacity of over 100 amperes. Most homes have a number of 15, 20, 30 and 40 ampere circuits, protected with either plug-type fuses or circuit breakers for fire prevention. Fuses or circuit breakers will not prevent electric shock.

Electricity is constantly seeking "ground." Unfortunately the human body can complete the circuit to ground. Medical authorities agree that if the amount of current required to light a 15-watt bulb, which is only 1/10 of an ampere, should flow through your heart, death might result in just one second.

## On The Farm

Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum hybrids can be deadly to livestock especially during the late summer and fall, points out Seth Ralston, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

There are two times during which poisoning occurs. The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt.

The second and most immediate time of concern is during drouth stress when the plant has received a summer rain shower and begins a rapid spurt of growth.

"Either the wilted or fast growing stage of the plant can be dangerous," says Dr. John C. Reager, toxicologist for the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory. Most problems arise when hungry animals are suddenly placed in these pastures.

The actual death causing agent is hydrogen cyanide, the same chemical used in state gas chambers for executions. The poisoning is swift. Death can occur within five minutes after grazing affected plants, and almost always within twelve (12) hours.

Symptoms of acute prussic acid poisoning consists primarily of excitement and stimulation of respiration, gasping, staggering, paralysis, prostration, convulsions, coma and death.

Some cattle showing signs of prussic acid poisoning have recovered following intravenous injections of calcium gluconate. Death losses in prussic acid poisoned sheep have been prevented by feeding pellets of alfalfa containing 5 per cent dicalcium phosphate.

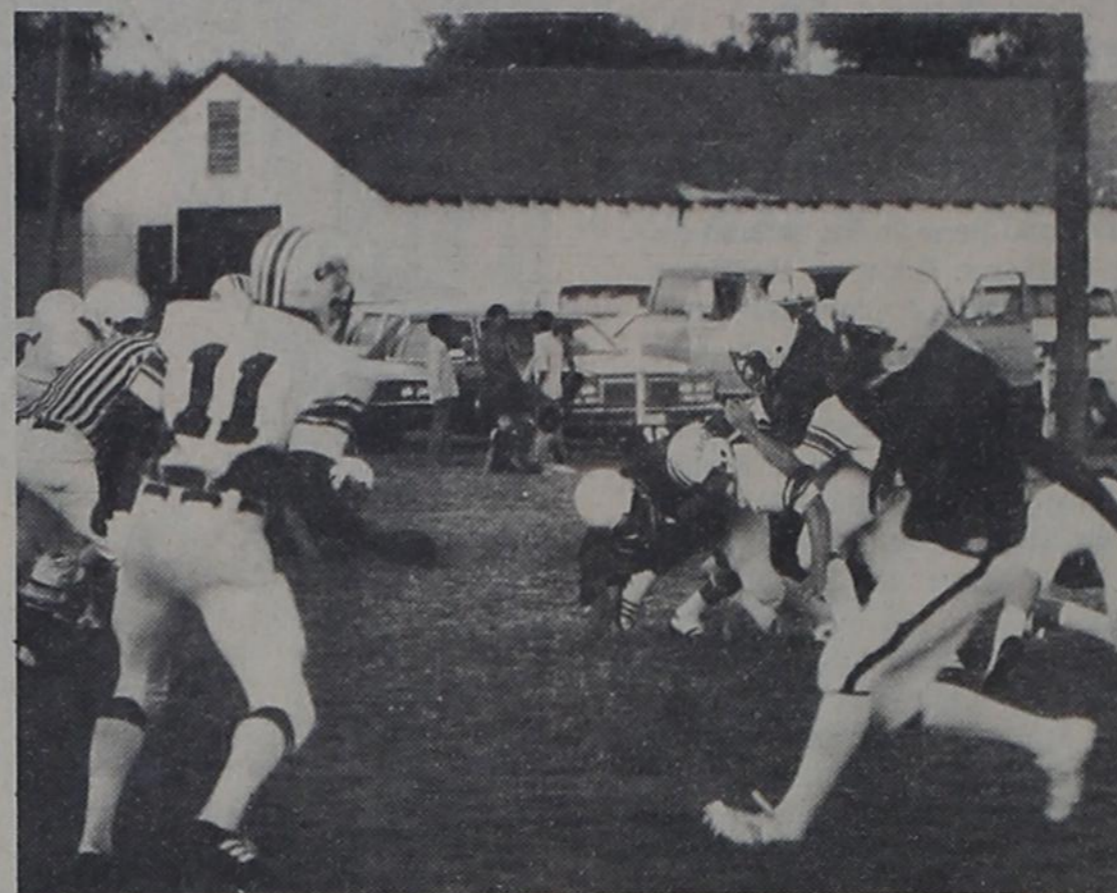

## Seeds Now Available For Texas State Bluebonnets

Now is the time to plant Bluebonnet seeds, if you can find them.

The crippling drought has reduced the Bluebonnet seed harvest to a fraction of the usual production.

Carroll Abbott of Kerrville, the state's only fulltime wildflower seed and plant collector, usually sells tons of Bluebonnet seeds each season, but he is now limiting his customers to a maximum of 50 pounds each.

The short supply of seed, however, have an extremely high rate of germination.

"It seems like Mother Nature wanted every seed which was produced to grow," Abbott says.

"Our germination rate was tested at the State Seed Laboratory and came out to an amazing 94 per cent."

Despite the shortage, Abbott's mail-order seed firm, Green Horizons, still sells the smaller packages at former prices. A thousand seed, for example, costs \$2.35, including tax and postage. With each order, Abbott sends along cultural notes on how to grow Bluebonnets successfully and a list of nearly 60 other wildflowers which should be planted now.

His address is 500 Thompson Drive, Kerrville, Texas, 78028. Bluebonnets are easy to grow, if

you follow a few simple rules, Abbott explains.

Prepare the seed by soaking three or four days in baby-bottle-warm water, changing the water daily, to dissolve the lacquer-like coating on the seeds. Plant the seeds in late summer or early fall and cover them up with soil. Tamp the seed bed to make it firm—even walk over it lightly. And then water thoroughly.

The seeds will begin sprouting in 7 to 10 days and for weeks afterwards, Abbott says.

Sowbugs especially love Bluebonnet seedlings and an all-purpose insecticide should be used, he says.

"I'm really pleased with the performance of our sophomore quarterback, Dale Gilbreath, he kept his composure real well," commented Topliff.

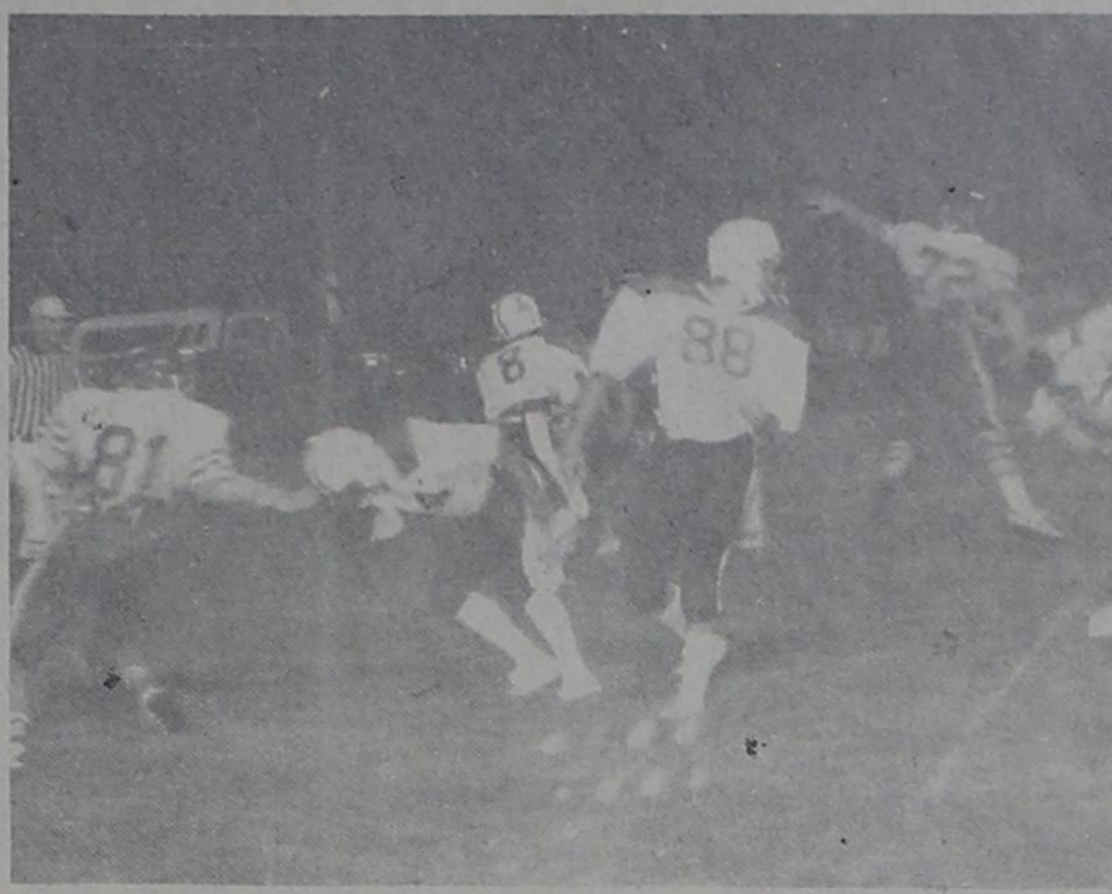

## Carlsbad Caverns Schedule Given

cover the portion of the Cavern seen on the second half of the complete tour, will be offered from 8 a.m. until 3:15 p.m. The complete tour is three miles in length and takes about three hours.

Lantern tours through New Cave will be offered on weekends only, with two tours scheduled each Saturday and Sunday at 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. Reservations are required for the lantern tours and may be made by calling the park visitor center at (505) 785-2233.

For the month of September, while the bats are still flying, the visitor center will remain open late and evening programs at the Cavern entrance will continue to be offered. The evening talks start at about sunset, which usually occurs between 6:30 and 6:45 p.m. at this season of the year.

New fall and winter hours went into effect at Carlsbad Caverns National Park September 2.

Under the new schedule, which will remain in effect

until mid-May 1981, the park visitor center will open at 7:30 a.m. (MT) and complete walk-in tours will be offered from 8 a.m. until 2 p.m. daily. Big Room trips, which According to park officials, some of the best bat flights of the year occur in the fall as young bats born during the summer join the colony in flight and as bats from other caves stop at Carlsbad Cavern on their annual migration to Mexico.

Concession facilities operated by The Cavern Supply Company at the park will also go to a similar schedule on September 2, with food service opening at 8 a.m. and closing at 4 p.m., the drink counter closing at 4:15 p.m., and the nursery, kennel, and gift shop opening at 8 a.m. and closing at 4:30 p.m.

The park entrance fee is \$3 per carload daily for private non-commercial vehicles, \$1 per person for commercial bus passengers, or an annual Golden Eagle or Golden Age Passport.

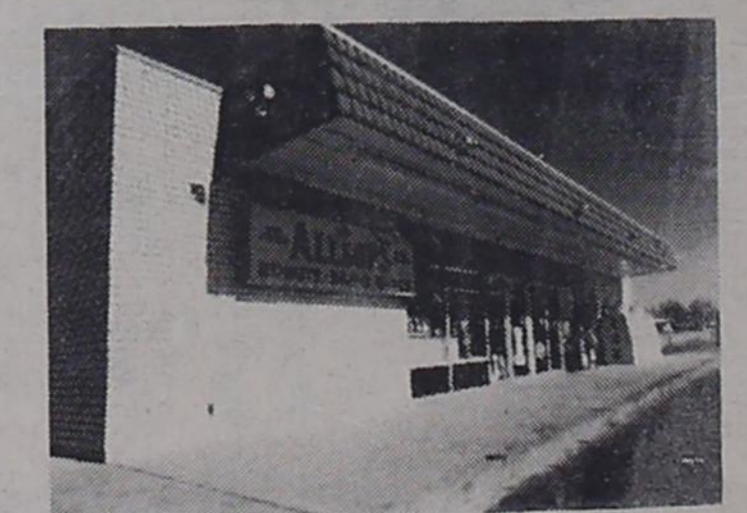
