Liquor Bill Loses Out In Senate Today

Expect Two Houses To Get Together On New Tax Bill

AUSTIN, Oct. 25. (AP) — Proposals to legalize the sale of mixed drinks of hard liquor apparently died for the session today when an effort in the senate to bring up the house legislation bill failed by one vote. The session ends tomorrow.

The senate struck out the sale provision Friday. The governor today reiterated another special session of the legislature would not be called immediately after adjournment.

A \$3,000,000 tax bill has passed the senate and a \$5,000,000 bill has passed in the house. The two houses are expected to get together on some sort of a bill by the time the session ends.

The section of the general tax bill recently passed by the senate providing for \$4,500,000 in departmental appropriations was killed on a point of order sustained by house speaker Robert Calvert.

Special Officer In Blanton Case Taken in Custody

AUSTIN, Oct. 25. (AP) — Luis Lamadrid, special investigator of the mysterious Blanton disappearance, was taken in custody here Sunday. Director H. H. Carmichael of the Public Safety Department announced and taken to Raymondville to testify before a court of inquiry in the case.

Carmichael also announced Morris Midkiff, Austin newspaperman would be called to testify, possibly on substantial evidence of Lamadrid's claims of knowledge of facts in the mystery.

Assistant Attorney General George Kirkpatrick will go to Raymondville to assist local authorities in questioning witnesses.

Farley Enters Mayoralty Fight

NEW YORK, Oct. 25. (AP) — The New York mayoral fight entered a last bitter phase with the Democratic organization taking the extraordinary step of calling the party's national leader, James A. Farley, to the firing line.

Farley, who took a hand first only nominally, now proposes to go on the stump against the most serious second-term challenge to the New York City Democratic organization in the century and a half of its existence.

Mayor F. A. La Guardia, candidate of a powerful Fusion group including Republicans, American labor, Communist and Socialist party members, as well as dissident Democrats, threatens to do what no man has done before—break the Democratic machine's control twice in succession.

The postmaster general will make a campaign speech—a rare thing for him—Tuesday night at Jeremiah T. Mahoney, the Democratic candidate.

Sulfanilamide Blamed In Deaths of 36 In Nation

CHICAGO, Oct. 25. (AP) — A nationwide race with death, its object recovery of more than 700 bottles, mostly pints of a new liquid medicine, named elixir sulfanilamide, which has already caused 36 verified deaths, was described Sunday at the headquarters here of the American Medical Association.

Every agent of the United States Food and Drug Administration, said Dr. Morris Fishbein, spokesman of the medical association, is scouring the country to recover the bottles. By Monday, said J. O. Clarke of the Food and Drug Administration, it is hoped that all of the "outstanding" shipments will be recovered.

Valuable Otherwise.

Several men in college laboratories have been spending nights on cats watching animals which have received some of the lethal substance, in hope of a quick analysis of its deadly action.

Nothing like the present situation has happened in American medicine in many years, Dr. Fishbein said. It has never happened before in such magnitude. The trouble is that the lethal bottles are a form of the most sensational and valuable new medicine discovered in many years. In other forms this medicine has performed near miracles in treatment of streptococcal diseases and gonorrhea.

The "elixir" alone has brought reported deaths. One ounce of it killed a baby, said Dr. Paul Nicholas Leech of the council of pharmacy and chemistry of the A. M. A. There are 16 ounces in each pint. How many adults a pint can kill is unknown. An adult who took six ounces recovered. Danger lies in the fact that large dosages are customary with sulfanilamide preparations.

Like Bichloride of Mercury.

The medicine stops the kidneys. At medical association headquarters its effects were said to be like those of bichloride of mercury. No antidote is known yet, the "elixir" is made of sulphaniilamide and diethylene glycol, a near relative of auto anti-freeze fluid. The diethylene glycol is blamed for the lethal effects, although not itself classed as a poison.

The principal shipments, said Mr. Clarke, went to the South and Midwest. An unknown number of two ounce sample bottles was taken by traveling salesmen. The federal agents, Mr. Clarke said, have not succeeded in reaching all these salesmen.

As usually prepared today sulphaniilamide is a white crystalline substance, slightly bitter with no perceptible odor, but it has to be mixed with other chemicals in order to be administered.

Several mixtures have been made. Each drug manufacturer is free to choose his own combination. Dr. Leech said the food and drug act does not directly require tests on the safety of a new drug before it is put on the market.

"Elixir of sulphaniilamide," he explained, is not a trade name. The word, elixir, he said, means to doctors that the preparation is harmless and usually that it is supposed to denote a hydro-alcoholic solution.

Fast-Growing Harper Pool Spread Over Mile West By Turner

Twenty-seven hundred feet of oil in the hole as drilling progressed to 4,140 feet proved today that Fred Turner, Jr. No. 1-A J. E. Parker had successfully lengthened the Harper pool in Ector county by more than a mile. Gas had been struck at 4,094, and when tools were pulled at 4,112, line showed 900 feet of oil in the hole. Oil rose to the 2,700-foot level in about 24 hours.

The Turner find is located 330 feet from the south, 2,310 feet from the west line of section 16, block 44, township 2 south, T. & P. survey, one mile plus a location west of Carter-Naylor No. 1 Parker, hitherto most northwesterly well in the field, which flowed 608 barrels daily upon completion. Productive boundaries of the pool now show it to be over four miles in length and a mile wide, axis being on the prevailing northwest-southeast trend.

Shell Petroleum Corporation No. 4 University, in the Penn-Judkins district of southern Ector, pumped 135 barrels of oil on 24-hour production gauge, bottomed at 3,665 feet in line.

Franco In Drive to End War Before Winter; Kai Shek's Forces Halt Japanese Offensive

Battle In Tazang Is Continued

British Troopers Told to Fire on Attacking Force

By Associated Press.

In China, Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's forces today halted the Japanese offensive after five days of heavy fighting on the Shanghai front.

A furious battle continued around Tazang, key center five miles north of Shanghai.

The British, as an aftermath of the slaying of a British soldier by a Japanese warplane yesterday, ordered defense posts to fire without hesitation in self defense.

Protests were lodged with the Japanese, who said an inquiry would determine the responsibility and that they might punish the pilot.

A British soldier was killed and five Americans and about a score of other foreigners were endangered gravely when a Japanese warplane, with machine guns blazing, swooped five times over groups near the western edge of Shanghai's International Settlement.

United States Consul General Clarence F. Gauss protested to the Japanese consulate-general.

A British sentry at the scene said British soldiers returned the Japanese airman's fire with automatic rifles. British army authorities officially branded the affair "a deliberate attack." Japanese naval and civilian officers quickly expressed regret to the British.

British army officers disclosed that three British outposts in the Keswick road area were sprayed by the Japanese airman's bullets and that a second British soldier escaped serious injury when a cigarette stopped a bullet which pierced his uniform.

Troops on Duty as C.I.O. Seized Oil Wells

Eden Tries To Localize Civil War

Little Likelihood Of Success Seen In His Efforts

Insurgent Generalissimo Franco prepared today for a new and gigantic offensive to end the civil war in Spain before winter.

French authorities, seeking to determine the nationality of the seaplane which yesterday attacked and sank a French freighter in the Mediterranean, reported the plane was marked with a black cross.

British foreign secretary Eden sought, with little likelihood of success, to get nations to agree on the number of fighters to be withdrawn from Spain.

Authoritative fascist publications declared refusal of the non-intervention committee to accept Italy's figure of 40,000 as the number of Italian volunteers in Spain would mean collapse of negotiations for their withdrawal.

Virgino Gayda, often a government spokesman, writing in *La Voce d'Italia*, asserted Italy, having informed Britain and France that there were 40,000 Italians in Spain, would insist her figure be accepted and would "admit of no argument on the subject."

A communique of the official Stefani news agency yesterday announced that Italy's ambassadors had been instructed to inform the French and British governments that number of Italians were fighting in the Spanish civil war.

May Limit New Laws At Special Session To the Farm Program

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25. (AP) — Administration leaders may propose limiting legislation in the special session of congress to the president's five-point program, informed persons said today.

This would require adoption of the resolution by the house and the senate. The idea is prevalent enactment of the program might be completed in the six-week session beginning Nov. 15 if all other subjects are held over for the regular session in January.

The program embraces crop control, wage-hour regulations, government reorganization, regional planning, anti-trust law revision.

RA to Accept Bids On Ropesville Jobs

AMARILLO, Oct. 25. — Invitations for bids for the construction of 48 houses and outbuildings on the Farm Security Administration's resettlement project at Ropesville, Tex., near Lubbock, will be received by 3 p. m. today at Dallas, Ralph R. Will, assistant regional director in Region XII, with headquarters at Amarillo, announced this week.

These houses, Will said, will be constructed on farms averaging 236 acres each, of which only 180 acres will be crop land for a five-year lease to the farmer with an option to purchase at the end of the rental period. The new farms at Ropesville will be in addition to 33 which were developed two years ago.

Construction work on each of the 48 units will include a house, barn, poultry house, milk house, toilet, drilled well, windmill, and a storage tank. Ten of the houses will be five rooms each. The remainder will be four rooms each.

Contractors may obtain specifications and drawings from Thomas D. Broad, Room 810 Farm Security Administration, 3221 Commerce Street, Dallas, Texas. There will be a deposit of \$25 for each set of plans to insure their return.

Bids for breaking sod, land clearing and terracing the new land will be received soon, Will said, adding that this phase of the work will be handled out of the Amarillo office.

Selection of the farm families will be done by the regional selection chief, working through the county rural rehabilitation supervisors. Families selected will be those living in Region XII of the Farm Security Administration, and a few now living in Region 8, with Dallas as headquarters.

Girl Flier Makes New Flight Record

LYMPNE, England, Oct. 25. (AP) — Jean Batten, New Zealand woman flier, landed here at 3:45 p. m. Sunday, setting a new record for a solo flight from Australia to England.

She clipped fourteen hours and ten minutes from the record set by Jim Broadbent, last May. Her time from Darwin, Australia, was five days, eighteen hours and fifteen minutes.

While Miss Batten was flying the last leg of her journey from Naples, where she rested Saturday night, Broadbent was flying toward Australia in an attempt to beat her record in the opposite direction. He was meeting bad weather, however, and was forced back to Baghdad, Iraq, after a hop off for Basra.

After a short stop at Lympne, Miss Batten flew on to Croydon airfield, where a crowd of more than 10,000 roared a greeting as her little silver monoplane circled over the airport escorted by other craft.

As the plane glided to a halt on the runway, thousands broke through the police lines and surrounded Miss Batten. Her gray-haired mother, who had come especially from New Zealand to welcome Miss Batten, hurried to embrace her. A message of congratulation was presented from Viscount Swinton, the air minister.

Prisoner Pleads Not Guilty in Try To Kill His Wife

SPRINGFIELD, Ohio, Oct. 25. (AP) — Leonard Compton, 23, pleaded innocent today in court on a shooting-to-kill charge resulting from the wounding of his wife, Louise, 20, in a hospital maternity ward yesterday.

The wife, wounded in the wrist, left the hospital today. A policeman, Harry Shuman, quoted Compton as saying he asked his wife who was the father of her baby and that when she failed to reply he shot her, and that he was sorry he didn't kill her.

Appeal By Negro in Scottsboro Case Refused By Court

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25. (AP) — Haywood Patterson, one of the nine negroes involved in the Scottsboro case, lost in the supreme court today in an effort to escape a 75-year prison sentence imposed by Alabama courts for an alleged attack on a white woman.

The court said Justice Black "took no part" in the decision. That removed the possibility of a challenge to Black's position on the grounds that he is a former klan member.

Building Permits Over State Gain

AUSTIN, Oct. 25. (SpI). Building permits in Texas during September increased slightly over the like month last year, but were moderately below those of the preceding month, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research stated in its survey of the building industry. Permits granted during the entire third quarter of the year were slightly below those of the like period last year.

Postal receipts in Texas during September and during the entire third quarter of the year were well above those of the corresponding period last year, the bureau found.

Consumption of electric power in the state during the month continued the wide margin of gain over last year which has prevailed during the past several months. It was announced Commercial, industrial and residential consumption were up on an average of 18 per cent. Miscellaneous consumption increased 29.3 per cent.

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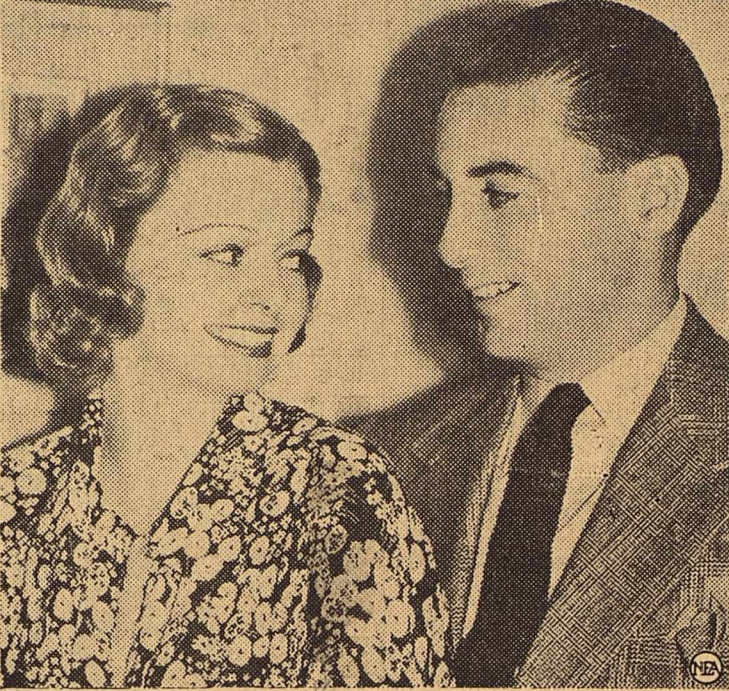

But I would still like to see Odessa get into Class-A next year and get their ears knocked down a few times. There seems to be no one in sight to take the Broncos but Wink. The two clubs meet Friday night and I am going to see the Wildcats win another victory if the Dodge will run that far. Maybe Collins will watch the Midland-Roby game for us. But I am not going to turn over my check this month to him, even if he has been doing most of my work.

To get back to the Odessa-Wink game, I don't want to run off any of the crowd that would attend the game here, but the game in the Winkler capital is likely to be the best in this area this year. All other clubs within a 100-mile radius of here are of about the same caliber.

And Odessa must be conceded a chance—and a darn good one—to beat Wink. Completion by Midland of a half-dozen or so passes against the Wildcats indicate they might not be too strong on pass defense. The Bulldog passing offensive is undoubtedly the weakest in the district and when they can complete almost one-half their attempts, it bodes no good for the Wildcats when they face the best passing attack in this area.

The Webster to Callon attack of Odessa has been the crusher that has put the Broncos through on top in every game to date. Those who have seen Odessa play say Webster can truly "thread a needle" with the pigskin. And Callon is without an equal at dragging them in. Rangely, awkward appearing and not particularly fast, Callon quits the line of scrimmage like a sprinter and gets into the clear a lot of times before opposing halfbacks are prepared for it. Callon has made from one to three scores in each game this year and the odds are that he will get loose at least once against

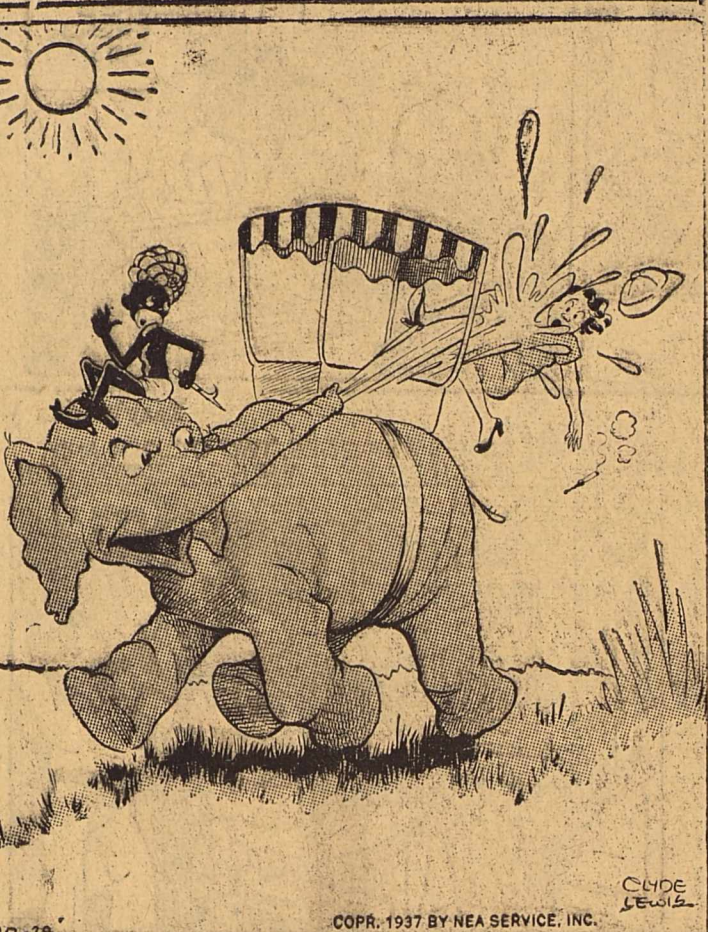

LITTLE ROCK, Oct. 25 (Special).—Home loans aggregating \$1,437,310 were made during September by the 114 insured savings and loan associations in Texas, according to figures just compiled by the Federal Home Loan Bank of Little Rock.

Texans Warned to Beware of Colds

AUSTIN, Oct. 25.—"Beware of the common cold," Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, cautions the people of Texas. "This is the season of the year when colds are most prevalent, and their consequences more far reaching. The organism causing the disease is not known, but every individual is acquainted with its effects."

"Not a little of the susceptibility of catching colds can be overcome by a gradual acclimating to lowering temperatures and inclement outdoor weather. This hardening should begin now, and consist of regular exercise—walking is good—to be continued throughout the winter in weather of every kind. One should be careful to avoid wet stockings drying on the feet, over-heavy clothing and over-heated rooms."

"There are two broad principles to observe in the treatment and prevention of colds. The first says: 'Let every person with a cold consider it seriously. Every cold should be regarded as the possible beginning of a serious illness. That means seeking a physician's advice and explicitly following his directions. If he orders bed, then bed it should be. Complete rest is a fine way to overcome a cold in short order.'"

"One's resistance to many districts in September were \$1,401,262."

This year's exports of Australian scrap iron to Japan are already nearly twice the exports for the whole of last year.
