## SCS Offers New Service To Farmers

Pumping plant efficiency checks is the new type of service provided by the Soil Conservation Service. With fuel and labor costs steadily rising, this is an area of management that can no longer be overlooked. Efficiency checks show the operator if he is pumping as much water as possible for the dollars he is spending.

Efficiency checks are usually simple to run, with the farmers' help and at his request. S.C.S. personnel will meter the well then read the gas meter or electric meter to see how much fuel or electricity is being used in a certain amount of time. Then, the depth of the well plus drawdown is measured with a depth sounder. If this is not possible, a careful estimate is made. Finally, the discharge pressure and elevation difference is obtained. With these measurements, pumping plant efficiency can be figured.

How much does it cost to pump an acre-inch of water? How much does it cost to run a well an hour? How much money could be saved per year, if a well is brought up to standard efficiency? If the answers to these questions are important to you, the Soil Conservation Service would like to help you find the answers.

## Coach Lauds Ponies After 1st Scrimmage

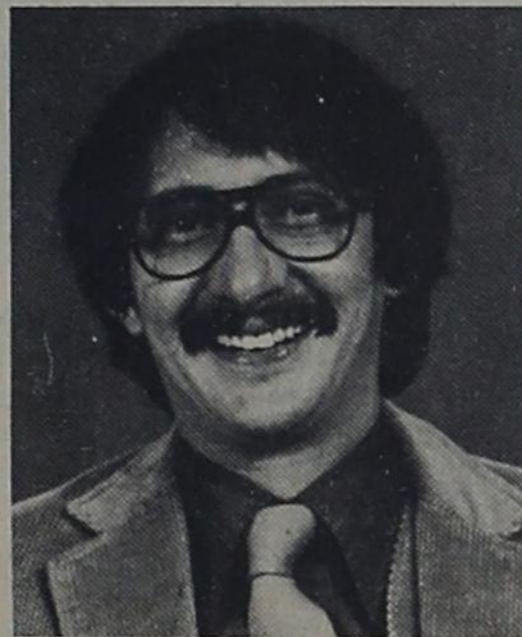
The Bovina Mustangs must have thought that football season had officially started on Friday, as they downed Friona Chiefs, 2-0 in a scrimmage.

## USDA Gives Guidelines On Lunches

The USDA has announced the new income poverty guidelines for determining eligibility for free and reduced meals for 1981-82. The scale may be seen at the local superintendent's office.

The application blanks for free or reduced meals will be available in each principal's office and can be picked up at the time of registration or at any other time of the year. Those of you who have applied for free or reduced meals in the past will note some changes in the form. The form now requires the name and social security number of all adult family members.

Adults without social security numbers must indicate that they do not have one. The school may verify, according to law, the source and amount of income as well as the household composition.

If during the school year, there are changes in your family size or substantial changes in your income, you should report such changes to the school's officials in order that appropriate eligibility adjustments can be made.

## Registration Begins For Cattle Brands

On August 30, 1971 a law was passed by the Texas legislature stating that all marks and brands registered after that date must be re-registered at subsequent ten-year intervals by the brand owner with the county clerk's office.

All marks and brands are to be recorded with the county clerk, the law states, regardless of when they were originally recorded, within six months of August 30, 1981, August 30, 1991, and August 30, 2001, etc.

Parmer County Clerk Bonnie Warren states that her office will begin the registration and re-

registration of brands and marks on September 1, and she stresses the fact that brand owners may retain their brand and mark for six months before it expires. "We cannot register it to anyone else during that six month period," she said.

Mrs. Warren said there is a \$5 fee for registering or re-registering and to do so, the brand owner must come into her office located in the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell. She said they will accept brand registering by mail, and those registering in this manner should enclose the \$5 fee.

According to Texas Attorney General Mark White, if everyone follows the registration schedule set out by the law, county clerks will have a correct, revised set of records every ten years, and there should be no dispute about the correct ownership of livestock.

## Spraying Firm Break-In Victim

Parmer County Spraying Service was the victim of a break in, in which several things were taken, including a number of important papers, for which a reward is being offered.

According to sources at the service, on Thursday night, August 20, the workers left the plant at about 8 p.m., and then on the following morning, at 6:30-7 a.m. manager Sonny Roach returned to the plant and started to slip the key into the keyhole when the door just came open. He entered the building, and saw that a burglary had taken place.

Missing were several things, including a safe which weighed about 2500 pounds.

Also missing were two calculators, several assorted hand tools and some saws and drills.

But, the most important items which were missing were the contents of the safe, which included, among other things, the incorporation papers for Parmer County Spraying Service, some stocks, titles to planes and a truck, and other miscellaneous

## SWCD Sets Field Day

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District will host an Irrigation Energy Field Day on September 3 from 10 a.m. to 12 noon. Activities will be held ¼ mile west of Hub on Highway 86 on the Phil Johnson farm.

The Parmer County S.W.C.D. and the Soil Conservation Service will demonstrate how to test efficiency of an electric irrigation pumping plant. The procedure for testing a natural gas well will also be explained. The purpose of the meeting is to familiarize local farmers of the procedures involved in testing wells and the benefits to be gained. By making a modest investment in equipment, farmers can run efficiency tests on their own wells.

In addition to figuring efficiency, the cost per hour and cost per acre inch of water, the potential annual electric cost reduction from repairs will be figured.

All interested persons are invited to attend.

There was no money in the safe, which is what the employees figure the thieves were after.

Also interestingly enough, there were no chemicals taken and they had access to these.

Sheriff Bill Morgan and Deputy Jerry Atchley investigated the incident and got tire tread tracks for further reference.

The plant, which is located three miles west of Bovina, has been vandalized in the past few months, as has several of the other spraying services in the area.

Sources at the service say they feel that it took at least one grown man, or more possibly two men, to take the safe from the premises.

Employees of the service are still in hopes that the papers may turn up. They feel that maybe after the waters in the area go down and the weeds die the papers may be recovered. They are afraid, however, that the thieves may have dumped the papers into a lake or some other body of water, never to be found.

There is a reward offered for the return of the papers, and the thieves or anyone knowing information regarding this break in do not have to identify themselves.

## 25 YEARS AGO—AUGUST 22, 1956

## 20 YEARS AGO—AUGUST 23, 1961

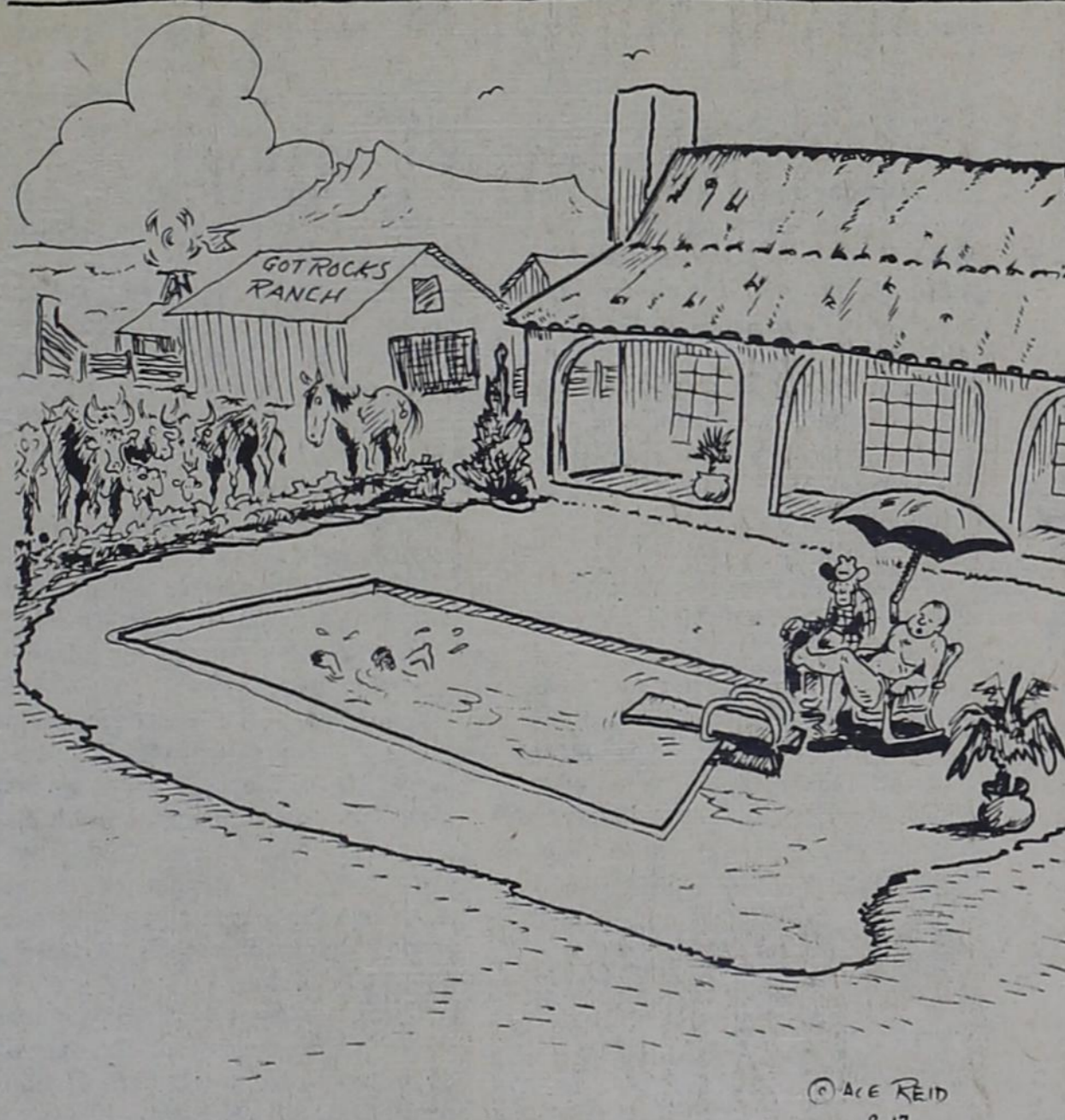

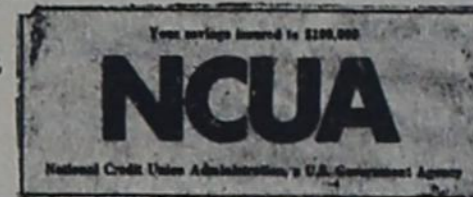
Chisolm was the winner in the youth activities pole bending contest, and also won the youth activities barrel racing contest.
