Barrentine, a hill farmer from Carroll county, Miss., if he didn't believe that "an English syndicate operating a large plantation in the delta and processing their cotton in England shouldn't have a heavier restriction than the little fellow who lives on his farm?"

Barrentine said he would be better off working as a sharecropper for Oscar Johnston, an administration cotton advisor, than to try to hold his farm "under the program as it has been working."

Johnston, manager of the Delta and Pine Land Co., plantation at Scott, Miss., heard the discussion and in the afternoon session "cor-rected" a remark by Senator Thomas quoting him as saying 10 cents a pound was a satisfactory price

in 1931 and again in 1933. He was arrested in Kilgore in 1934 for car theft and sentenced to three years

in the penitentiary.

Following his release, he was arrested in Talco on a charge of driving while drunk. An investigation by officers showed him to be driv-

ing a car stolen from the Flynt-Hubbard motor company here. He was returned here for trial but managed to escape from officers here by leaping from a window of the sheriff's office. He stole a car belonging to Mayor M. C. Ulmer, and was captured a few days later in

A district court jury found him guilty of car theft on two counts during this session and was sentenced to the state penitentiary for two years on two counts. He went under aliases of Wilson and Williamson during his crime career.

Code of Practice for Brewers Is Adopted To Protect Industry

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 29 (Special). -Following is the code of practice adopted at the first annual convention of the United Brewers In-dustrial Foundation at Pittsburgh Thursday night.

The brewing industry of the United States, custodian of an art and science practiced since the beginnings of recorded history, supplies a mild beverage to the major part of our population. Beer is the bulwark of moderation and sobriety The industry recognizes its direct responsibility to itself and to the nation to conduct its operations in accord with the desires and conscience of the American public Members of the United Brewers Industrial Foundation, in convention assembled, representing nearly half the production of beer and ale in the United States, mutually and individually pledge themselves to the ollowing codes of practice:

We pledge ourselves, as citizens and as business men, to conduct our business in conformity with established laws in cooperation with the authorities.

We pledge ourselves as scientific brewers to maintain exacting high standards in the brewing and packaging of beer and ale.

We pledge ourselves, with all thoughtful citizens, to the promo-

tion of practical moderation and We pledge our support to the duly constituted authorities for the elimination of anti-social conditions

wherever they may surround the sale of beer to the consumer. pledge ourselves morally to support and encourage the great body of retailers who sell beer as law-abiding citizens and who operate legal, respectable premises.
