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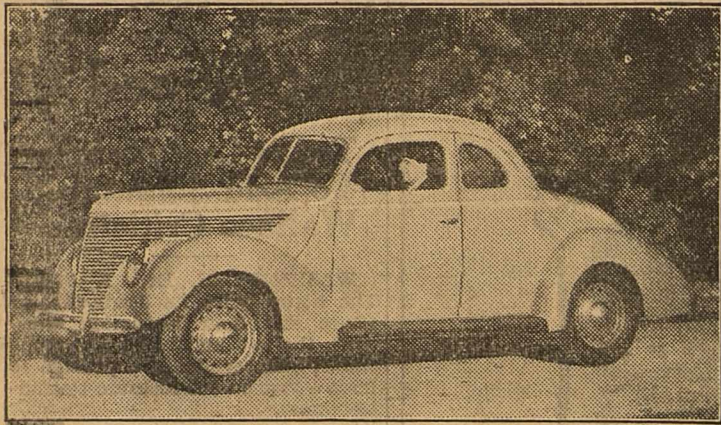
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Instead of Seeing America - - Duke and Duchess Accept Tribute of Britons in Paris

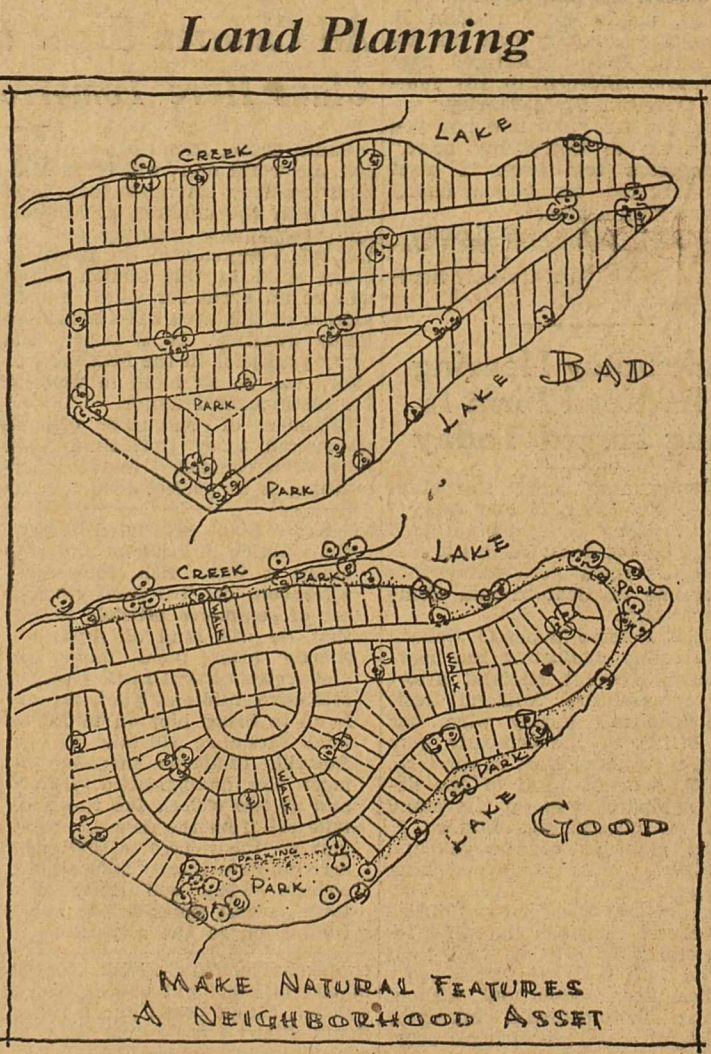

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2. — A mythical two and a half billion dollar armament program for the United States next year is the subject of Washington's most persistent recent rumor.

There are several versions of the tale, all of which insist that Roosevelt whispered to this man or that one that an armament boom was his rabbit-in-the-hat for curing the present business "recession."

The facts are that the President is a "big navy" man, that he already has decided on a policy of having an American navy second to none, that he would like to build up the navy rapidly and probably would try to do just that if there were no deterring factors.

But he and like-minded men in the administration realize that the American people won't support a huge naval program unless they feel there's imminent danger of war. So the "big navy" boys temporarily, at least, must be content with a long-time program to building up the kind of navy which they would like to see produced all at once.

believe there is going to be a big war in Europe, at least not in the near future. But he has urged Americans not to imagine that the Western hemisphere can escape in any worldwide conflagration.

Meanwhile, America can't afford to take chances in his view, because no one really can tell what's going to happen in the international field. F. D. R. and many others here are impressed by the spectacle of England, who found herself insufficiently armed to keep the Fascist powers from showing her around. The lesson, as seen here in high places, is that this has become a world wherein only nations which are prepared to be tough can protect their interests.

Nazi and Fascist penetration into South America, especially in Brazil, has given Roosevelt and Secretary Hull a real headache and enters into considerations as to naval building.

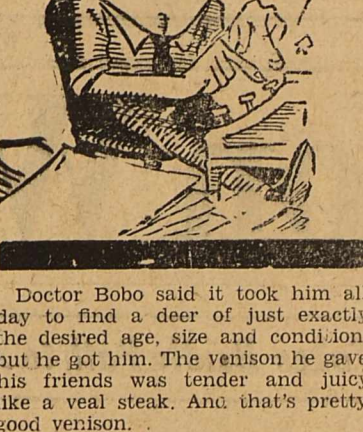
British Hold Key.

At the time of Roosevelt's Chicago speech it had been decided that this country ought to go almost any distance in co-operation with England and France to curb Japanese aggression in China, short of war. This attitude has been toned down considerably as a result, first, of an unenthusiastic reaction to the President's speech in this country, and second, discovery at Brussels that Britain felt in a conciliatory mood toward Japan.

The British position is still the key to the international situation and British unwillingness to act sternly anywhere should have been no surprise to the State Department.

Word was quietly conveyed to the State Department long ago that his majesty's government would only take no strong role on the international stage until it felt re-

Basketball Prepares for Fastest Season; Elimination of Center Jump Injects Speed

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—Although one of the craziest of football campaigns now is a part of the record book, the winter sports fan doesn't have to worry about suffering a let-down in his sporting entertainment. The 1937-38 hoop season, soon to be off to an impatient start, should be the fastest and sharpest ever placed on the hardwoods.

This prediction is based principally on the elimination of the center jump.

Coaches, critics, and combatants the nation over agree that this most radical rule change in years will do more toward speeding up what already was a very fast game than anything else ever attempted.

The premium on height no longer will be as great. The worry connected with controlling the tip-off very conveniently has been erased, since the toss-up will be used only at the beginning of the game and at the start of the second half.

Height, of course, still will be a desirable factor for rebound work off the bankboards and in working the ball down-court. There's no getting away from that. But the smaller, speedy sharpshooters nevertheless will get their big break.

Where coaches formerly kept a pint-sized player on the bench—albeit regretfully—in order to use a center just two sizes smaller than a horse, they now can slip someone into the lineup with proportions more befitting the species homo sapiens.

The Cardinal star, fully recovered from an appendectomy early this fall, is expected to have his greatest season and reign as Pacific Coast scoring champion for the third consecutive year.

Number two choice for nationwide recognition is Notre Dame. The Irish undertake a 23-game schedule, meeting the toughest competition in the midwest, but the presence of eagle-eyed Johnny Moir in the lineup, backed up by Paul Novak, star center, is enough nucleus for another really great team.

It's full steam ahead from now until the middle of March and many an official who got along in fine shape a year ago, is wondering if he'll have the speed to keep up with the game in 1937-38.

Horned Toads Declared Not Native Texans

DALLAS, Tex. (U.P.)—The horned toad, hopping along through rocks and cacti, is accepted by most Texans as a native of the Lone Star State. But William S. Kinchloe of Washington told a woman's club here that the reptile was brought to Texas from Mexico to rid a farm of red ants.

Dr. Gideon Linecum, great-grandfather of Kinchloe, owned some land in Texas and red ants were about to take the place, Kinchloe said. Dr. Linecum while on a medical and botanical expedition into central Mexico saw the horned toads devouring ants and other crawling insects.

"The doctor gathered hundreds of the hardy toads and brought them back to Texas," Kinchloe said. "It not only solved his ant problem but those of surrounding land-owners, because the toads began multiplying and soon scattered in all directions."

Much Blindness Held Due to Stubbornness.

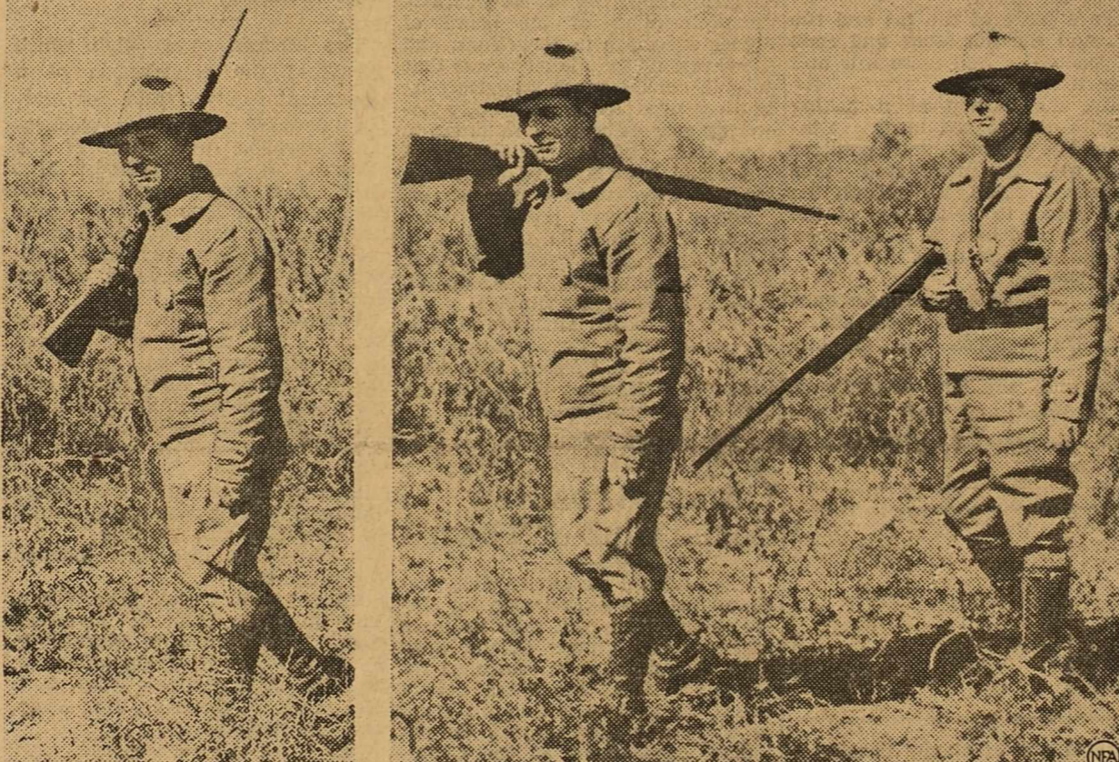

Malaya Drinks More in Flush Of Prosperity

SINGAPORE (U.P.)—In British Malaya prosperity is causing the whole country to drink more.

Consumption of wines, beers and spirits is increasing at a record rate. British Malaya, the world's leading producer of tin and rubber, is enjoying a tremendous prosperity owing to the improved world demand for these commodities and higher prices they are bringing on the leading markets. Malayan trade has increased by nearly \$180,000,000 during the past six months.

As a result there has been a corresponding increase in the liquor trade. Whiskey imports have gone up 26.8 per cent, brandy (foreign) 53.5 per cent, brandy (Empire) 46 per cent, sparkling wines 78.8 per cent, still wines 34.3 per cent, beer

40 per cent, stout 37 per cent. Empire brandy is now gaining ground and represents almost two-thirds of the total of brandy imports.

G. A. R. Post Has 8 Now; Once Largest in U. S.

School Strike 3 Months Old

COLLIER, W. Va. (U.P.)—A parents' strike against sending 52 small children to a county school near isolated Collier approached its fourth month without the glimmer of a solution.

The parents are protesting refusal of the county school board, because of lack of funds, to provide rural bus service for their 52 children as is given other sections served by the school.

Without the bus service, the children have to walk either two and one-half miles each way to their studies, or take a short-cut through a burning, fuming coal mine "gob" pile.

What did you think of the all-district team picked by the coaches, sportswriters and "blind toms?" So did I.

Leaving Francis off the first team backfield was something that can't be figured out.

Leaving him out of the first team line-up reminds me of a scrap of conversation reported the other day between Bo McMullan, Indiana University coach, and another fellow who argued that Clint Frank, Yale's great back, didn't belong on the All-America.

"He can punt, pass, block, carry the ball and catch passes; what more can be expected of a back, McMullan said."

And that sums up Francis' work with the Bulldogs this year. Webster was a better passer, Richards was a better punter, Hodgett was probably a better field general and Webb could hit a line for a short gain better than could Francis. But there was no back in the conference that could compare with Jay for all-around ability.

Other teams played Midland each week with a week of "stop Francis" noise having been poured into their ears by their coaches. In spite of that, he failed to score in only two games—Wink and Crane. He participated in only three plays against Wink because of an injury and did not play at all in the game against Crane because of the same reason. And against Crane he helped put the ball in scoring position for Taylor and McMullan. He scored 17 touchdowns for a total of 192 points, did all the punting, most of the passing and was on the receiving end of several passes.

And he made the second team. Phooey!

Little is to be said about Adams being placed on the first team. If there is a better tackle in any high school in Texas than Adams he can

pick out his own college and get what he asks.

And someone made a big bust when they failed to place Parker, Stanton end, on either the first or second team. In the two games I saw him play he was the best in the conference. He looked far better against Crane and Midland than did either Callon or Pugh when Odessa or Wink played. Add busts: Harty of Monahans and Webster of Odessa left out entirely.

The team has been picked and there is nothing that can be done about it, but next year I'll pick one that is the best, and the coaches and officials won't need to. In fact, I think I'll get Johnny Smith and Jim Kelly to help me and we won't put anybody on the team except Midland, Monahans and Stanton players.

Coaches Taylor and Myer are working out a bunch of boys daily in basketball but so far quantity seems to overshadow quality. There is about 40 boys out for the team, but they show very little amount of ability. As was the case during the football season, the greatest problem facing the coaches is replacing Wafford. He was a center, and a hell of a good one, and someone will have to come forward fast to replace him. It will be remembered that the Bulldogs won district titles in both football and basketball with the big boy in there. They couldn't win in football without him—it remains to be seen if they can repeat in basketball.

The coaches took all the boys who had not had previous basketball experience to Stokes yesterday afternoon and watched them come out on the short end of a 43-12 score. They came back with the report that Klatt got more tackles than he did all during the football season. Some of the other boys showed some swell blocking ability.

Venerable Pine Felled for \$20

HATTIESBURG, Miss. (U.P.)—Two hundred five years of American history were matched by the growing rings of a huge loblobly pine tree felled in south Mississippi.

The ancient pine was felled at the forks of Flint and Red Creeks in Stone county. The forest monarch 119 feet high was a lone survivor of the once virgin forests of the region. Because of its inaccessibility in the swamps and because of its 5-foot diameter, it escaped wood cutters for two centuries.

First limb of the tree was 75 feet long. The pine yielded 5,000 feet of lumber. And the tree brought \$20.

U. S. Forest Service officials set the age at 205 years and placed a great slab in the Forrest county fair here for an exhibit. In its time, the tree thrived under the flags of five nations.

It was a year old in 1736 when Sieur de Bienville declared war on the Chickasaw Indians.

In 1776 when the Declaration of Independence was signed, the tree was 40 years old. It was 62 when Mississippi became U. S. territory in 1798. During the War of 1812, the pine was 76. It was 81 when Mississippi became a state in 1817.

When the Civil War began in 1861, the forest veteran was 125. In '98 during the Spanish-American War and the yellow fever epidemic, it was 162. The tree was gaining strength in 1905 when the Forestry Service was established and was celebrating its 172nd birthday in 1928 when Forrest county was organized. The CCC in 1933 found the lone pine 197 years old but the woodsman did not spare the giant.

Earhart Grove Is Planted on Howland Isle

HONOLULU (U.P.)—Hundreds of trees and shrubs supplied by the U. S. department of agriculture are being planted on barren Howland Island in mid-Pacific. Richard Black, official in the department of the interior, has announced.

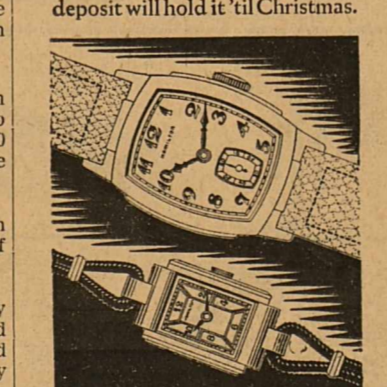
The trees and shrubs will be the nucleus of a grove to be known as the "Earhart Grove," in honor of Amelia Earhart and Fred Noonan, round-the-world fliers who were lost in the Pacific somewhere between New Guinea and Howland.

Black declared search for traces of the plane flown by Miss Earhart had not been abandoned by the federal government. He and coast guard officers believe that chances of finding any wreckage of the big plane are remote, however. They plan to station double lookouts aboard coast guard ship while cruising in the areas surrounding Howland Island.

Heavens Found To Glow With Invisible Rays

MT. LOCKE OBSERVATORY, Fort Davis, Tex. (U.P.)—Dr Otto Struve, joint director of the Mt. Locke Observatory in the Davis Mountains and the Yerkes Observatory of the University of Chicago, discovered that the midnight sky is lighted up with infra-red rays that dim the stars. The only trouble is that the human eye can't see the infra-red.

A new camera installed at the observatory here was responsible for the discovery. The camera has a spherical mirror and a thin lens of ultra-violet glass.

"Dr. C. E. Elvey and I used this instrument for photographing the sky with infra-red plates sensitive to radiations intermediate between the reddest visible rays and the heat rays," Dr. Struve said. "We found to our surprise that the night sky is constantly luminous in infra-red light so that if our eyes were sensitive to these radiations they would see the sky as a luminous surface upon which the stars would appear relatively pale."

Alaskan Film Of Wild Life Made by U. S.

SEATTLE, Dec. 2 (U.P.)—Frizzy-thatched Joseph Yolo, "Martin Johnson of the North," returned from Alaska's forested ranges with more than a mile of travel for every one of the 12,000-odd feet of 35-millimeter film he shot of wild animals, birds and fish.

Yolo was going home to Yakima, Wash. His "shots" were taken for the Alaska Game Commission and the Forest Service. After the film was edited and descriptive matter completed, it was divided for "shorts" and educational features.

Last May, after he had photographed Rainier National Park and Mount Olympus for the Forest Service, he was given 10 days' notice that he was to go to Alaska Trip Cost \$10,000.

He went, and in the ensuing six months endured innumerable hardships. Bad weather limited his "shooting" time. He scaled high peaks for unusual shots and made four trips across the Gulf of Alaska. The trip cost \$10,000.

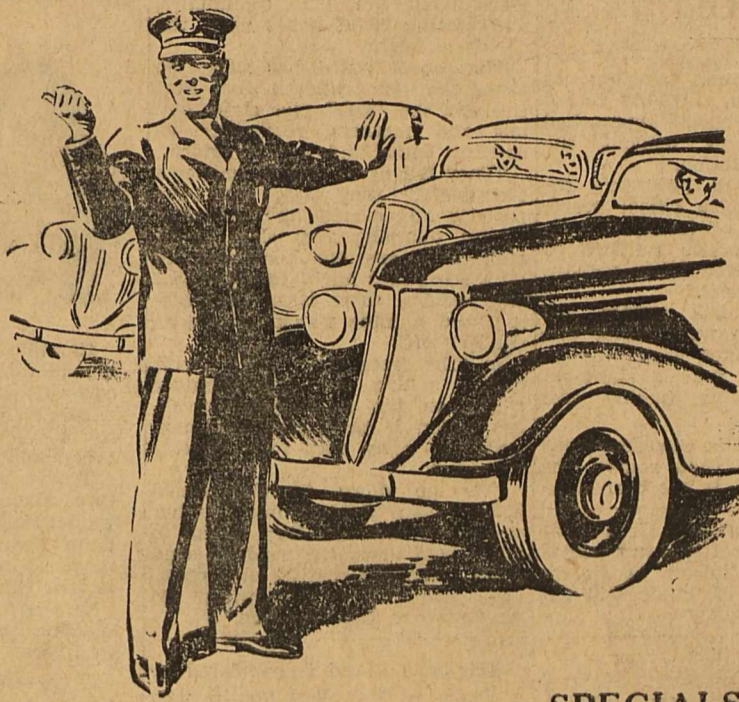

Moravian Faith Lingers in Iowa

WASHINGTON, Ia. (AP) — An 83-year-old Moravian church — the only one in Iowa — continues to flourish near here in the Grace Hill community. Two charter members are numbered in its congregation of 30 families. Amos Miksch and his bride came

to Washington county from Ohio in 1854. He entered 220 acres of land for himself and another 300 acres adjoining his farm, which he turned over to the church he founded in the same year.

The Provincial Elders' conference of the Moravian church at Bethlehem, Pa., lent Miksch most of the money for the section to be used to support the church.

The congregation was organized at the Miksch home and in 1868 the church building was dedicated. Income from the 300 acres in good years has been sufficient to support the church and activities of a community building dedicated in 1918. The Rev. Lewis Clewell was the first pastor.

The two charter members still living are Mrs. Olive Strohm, 83, and Mrs. Joe Engle, 87, Brighton. Another early member still active in church work is Mrs. Clara Engle of Grace Hill community.

Each year the children of the congregation are treated to the novelty of watching Mrs. Engle mold candles for the Christmas program with her old-fashioned wax molds. Although many of the older customs of the Moravian religion have been discontinued, their evidences still are visible. A cemetery near the church has many graves marked with headstones lying flat on the ground in conformity to the church's belief that after death all persons are equal. Recently this practice was abolished.

Another older belief of the Moravian church is revealed in the cemetery where a section is marked off for married men, another for married women, and sections for single men and women and for boys and girls.
