# **Deadlock on Wages-Hours Act Broken**

## **Chinese Get Planes From** The Russians

#### Attempt to Stem Advancing Japs To Be Made Soon

SHANGHAI. Dec. 2. (AP) - Chinese were reported to be assembling powerful Russian built warplanes today for a mass attempt to stem the advancing Japanese.

At Hankow one of the cities to which the Chinese moved from Nanking, informed sources said that 20 bombers had arrived from Russia and that possibly 20 more were enroute

Germany was authoritatively reported to have offered to negotiate peace

Japanese army units, meanwhile spread west and south across the Yangtze delta toward Nanking, Wuhu and Hanchow against feeble opposition. Chinese reports from Nanking said the capital's defenders had sunk new booms across the Yangtze and blown up all roads and bridges, expecting the Japanese to attack swiftly.

British Charge D' Affairs R. G. Howe planned to leave Hankow, China's temporary seat of government, Friday for Shanghai to keep in closest touch with the Shanghai situation.

After four months in Shanghai, Admiral Harry E. Yarnell, commander of the United States Aiastic fleet, prepared to sail for Manila December 14.

The United States light cruiser Marblehead, commanded by Captain W. R. Carter, will remain as station ship in Shanghai.

## **Petition to Force Bill Out Signed**

**Texas Last Member** To Add Signature; Wallace Criticizes

WASHINGTON. Dec. 2. (AP) The house broke its deadlock over wages and hour legislation today when the two hundredth and eighteenth member signed a petition to force a vote on the measure by mid-December.

Representative Mansfield (D-Tex) was the final signer.

Senator McNary, Oregon, republi can leader, asked the senate to send the farm bill back to committee for re-drafting along lines suggested by Secretary of Agriculture Wallace.

Wallace's criticism prompted majority leader Barkley to revise his predictions the measure would be enacted this week.

Increasingly irritated at the south ern opposition, which with some assistance from other sections, had thus far successfully bottled the wage-hour bill in the rules committee, the northerners threatened to sabotage the cotton provisions of the farm measure.

Belligerently opposed to the wagehour measure, on the ground that it would remove existing North-South wage differentials, to the competitive disadvantage of the South, the southern members were forlornly hopeful that a sufficient number of signatures could not be obtained

Meanwhile, the American Federa tion of Labor, which is opposed to many features of the wage-hour bill announced a meeting of its executive council for December 3 to draft proposed amendments.

While the off-the-floor conflict engrossed members of House and Senate alike, both chambers resounded to debate on the farm bill the House concluding a general dis farmer.

CHICAGO, Dec. 2 (AP). - A blunt notice that the standards of radio programs must be improved—by law, if necessary-was served upon the nation's broadcasters yesterday by Federal Communications Commissioner George Henry Payne.

"The ideals of the broadcasters must be changed, even if such changes are made at the big risk of a severe jolt to these gentlemen.
