Redskins Cop Pro Grid Championship

BAUGH PASSES TO 3 SCORES OVER CHICAGO BEARS

CHICAGO, Dec. 13 (P).—The Washington Redskins, with the sensational Sammy Baugh slinging passes with the bow and arrow accuracy of the first Americans, defeated the Chicago Bears, 20 to 21, Sunday to win the National Professional League championship.

Trailing by seven points as the second half opened, Baugh hurled three spectacular touchdown passes in a drive which had the Bears reeling. And in the closing minutes of the thrill-packed battle witnessed by 15,878 shivering fans, with gross receipts of \$32,198, Baugh played a major role in a stout secondary defense which nullified Chicago's desperate efforts to pull out with a tie score.

Baugh, who came out of Texas Christian University recognized as one of the finest collegiate passers in years, climaxed his freshman year in the pro ranks in a fashion which prompted fans to give him a tremendous ovation as he left the field in the final minutes. He completed 17 of 34 passes he tried for 352 yards and ran well the few times he rushed the ball, once breaking away for 17 yards.

Washington Grabs Lead.

With the frozen field extremely slippery, both teams resorted largely to passes when scoring chances came, although the first two touchdowns were on line smashes. Washington grabbed an early first period lead, Cliff Battles smashing left tackle for seven yards and a touchdown after one of Baugh's passes had helped set the stage. Shortly after the Bears with Bernie Masterson shooting a 52 yard pass to Ed Manske, tied the score on a 10-

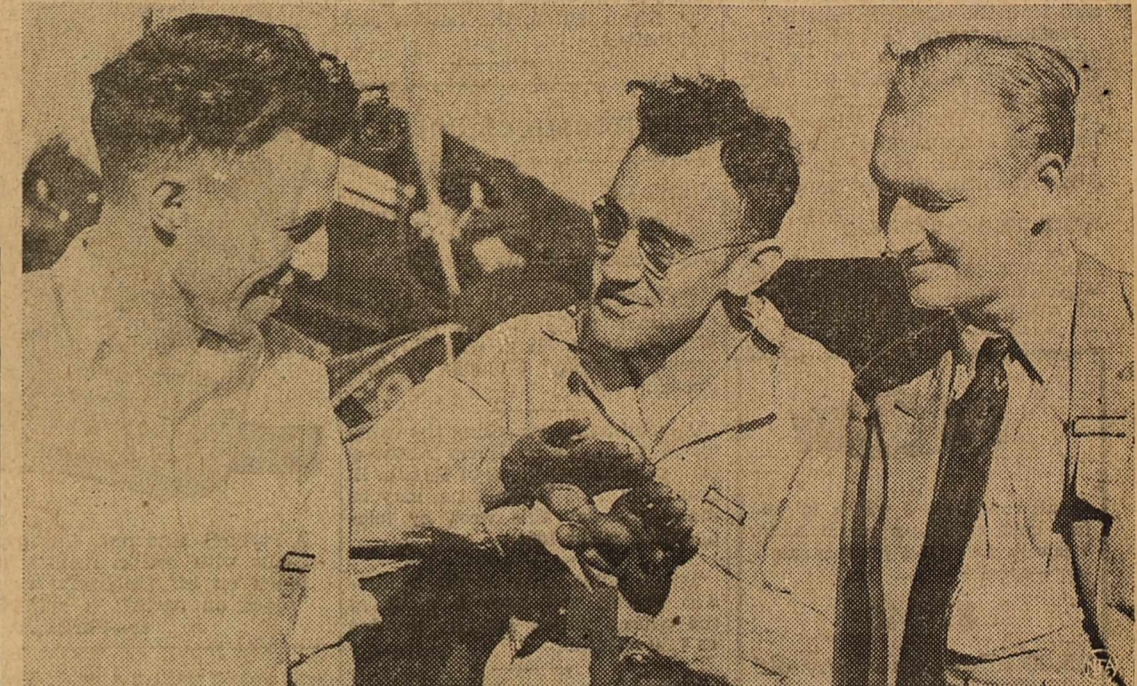

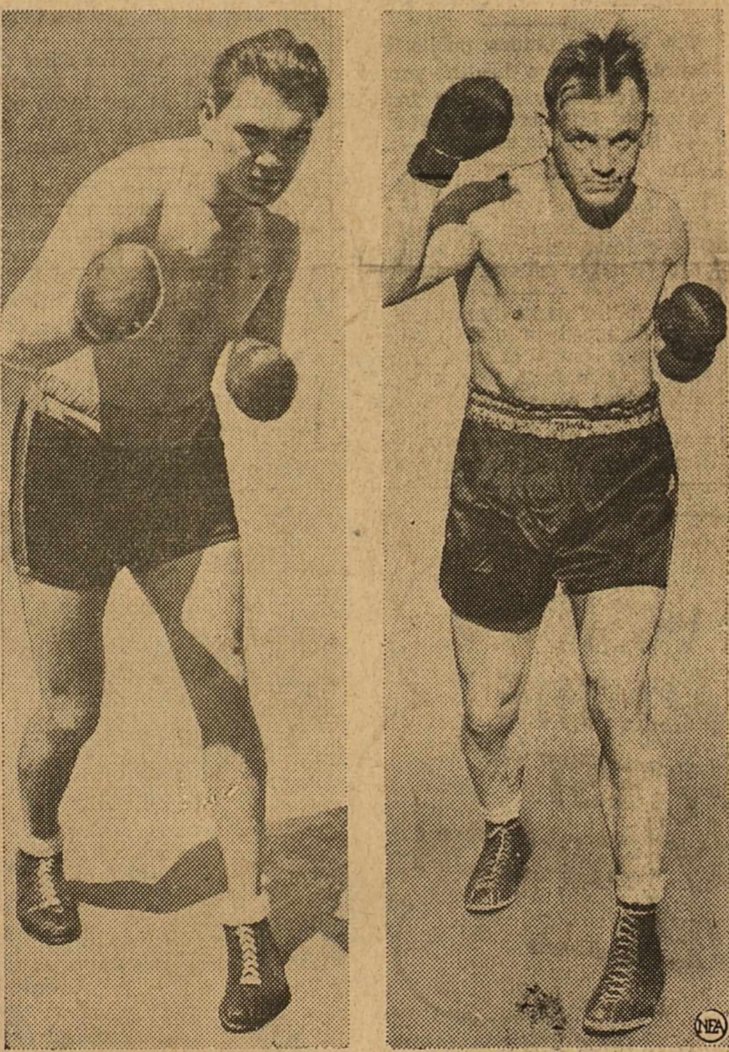
yard plunge by Jack Manders. Then the aerial bombardment really began. The Bears came driving back in the closing minutes of the opening stanza, after Wilson intercepted one of Baugh's overheads at mid-field. Manders took a 13 yard pass from Masterson and ran 25 yards to score.

Then Baugh, after a comparatively dull second period, went to work. The Redskins, after receiving the third period kickoff, worked the ball to their own 45. Baugh shot a 20 yard pass to Wayne Millner, end, and the former Notre Dame star raced 35 yards to score. Riley Smith, who converted all extra points, as Manders did for the Bears, booted the ball through the uprights to tie the score at 14-14.

Bears Drive 78 Yards. The Bears then drove 78 yards to go in front again, Masterson passing three yards to Manske for a touchdown. Seconds later, on the first play after the kickoff, Baugh lined another pass to Millner, who ran 50 yards to score. In the final seconds of the third period, Baugh faded back and passed 20 yards to Ed Justice, reserve Washington back, who ran 15 yards for the touchdown that gave the Redskins victory.

The Bears, who won the western title with nine wins, one loss and one tie to Washington's regular season record of eight wins and three defeats, were shaded in first down, 15 to 11. They gained 140 yards, net, by rushing to 76 for Washington, however, and displayed an aerial attack which gained 208 yards to Washington's total overhead gain of 388. SCHMELING RETURNS TO BOXING WARS WITH HENRY THOMAS AS FOE TONIGHT

By EDDIE BRITZ. NEW YORK, Dec. 13 (P).—Herr Max Schmeling, the man who showed them Joe Louis could be whipped, returns to the boxing wars tonight in a 15-round engagement with Harry Thomas, hard-hitting Chicago heavy, in Madison Square Garden.

For Schmeling this is merely the first of several warm up bouts to gear him for a June title struggle with Louis, whom Max kayoed last year, but it may prove a stiffer test than a lit of people (Schmeling included) figure. Thomas is not the best heavyweight in the world, but neither is he anybody's pushover.

He is a rugged young man who has won 51 of his 56 professional fights. Most of them were against second and third-raters but Harry won 43 of them via the knockout route. He has never been knocked down, and he is dead game and socks hard with either fist.

Although Thomas has been the recipient of the most elaborate build-up given a fighter in recent years, not many rate him better than an outside chance to trim Max. There is always a possibility he may find a vulnerable spot with his Sunday punch, but it is hardly more than that.

Schmeling is a notoriously slow starter. Usually he requires five or six rounds to warm up. If he can escape Thomas' right that long.
