Japan to Honor Victims of Bombing

Effort to Sidetrack Bill Beaten

Wage-Hour Measure Proposed by AFL Defeated in Vote

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (P).—Administration leaders in congress tried today to complete farm wage-hour bills, but Speaker Bankhead said there was little chance of either reaching the White House before the special session ends next week. The senate refused to substitute a domestic allotment program for the compulsory section.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (P).—An attempt to sidetrack the administration's wage-hour bill in favor of a more drastic measure sponsored by the American Federation of Labor failed in the house last night. The vote, by tellers, was 162 to 131.

The substitute, which would have imposed uniform wage-hour standards instead of the more flexible ones in the administration bill, provided the first major test of the leadership's strength on this legislation.

The federation's proposal was that minimum wages of 40 cents and maximum hours of 40 a week be specified in the law. The administration would give an administrative agency power to fix wage standards, within limits.

The A. F. of L. bitterly opposed such a grant of power because it said the functioning of another agency with broad powers, the National Labor Relations Board, had been unsatisfactory.

The senate failed in its first evening meeting of the special session to reach a long-delayed vote on the administration's farm bill.

Weary floor managers expressed disappointment over the extra effort, especially timed to wind up work on the month-old legislation, but democratic leader Barkley said it had probably cleared the way for a final roll call today.

Earlier yesterday, opponents of the administration bill tied the house into parliamentary knots.

Points of order, elaborate and time-killing explanations, and a long series of "parliamentary inquiries" filled most of the day to plague the presiding officer and tax the resourcefulness of his principal adviser, the house parliamentarian.

Foes of the measure were successful in forcing not one but two readings of the 42-page bill.

'Americans' Are Taken In Moscow

Arrest of Couple Thought Made Last Week by Soviets

MOSCOW, Dec. 16 (P).—The Izvestia, organ of the government, said today that soviets "have taken measures to seek out an arrest" a missing couple known as "Mr. and Mrs. Robinson."

This was interpreted in foreign circles to mean that the couple, who professed to be Americans, had been under arrest since their disappearance last week.

Federal agents investigating issuance of falsified passports to the couple pursued a theory that they were espionage agents for the American Communist group opposed to the present Russian regime.

Shell 1 Baumgart Swabs Mostly Drilling Fluid On First Test

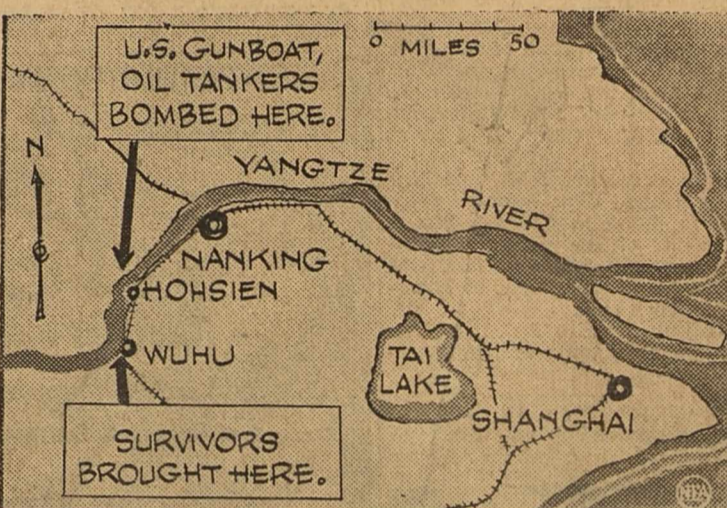
Initial swabbing test of Shell Petroleum Corporation No. 1 George Baumgart, prospective one-mile east extension of the Denver area in Yoakum county, showed yield of two barrels of fluid cut 98 percent with drilling water in six hours. Test was made after the hole had been unloaded into pits. More swabbing and testing is underway today. Total depth of No. 1 Baumgart is 5,000 feet in lime. It is reported to have drilled saturated section from casing shoe at 4,875 down to total depth. Two-inch tubing is set four feet off bottom. The shell well, located 1,320 feet from the south, is 440 feet from the west line of section 828, block D, Gibson survey.

Farther south, in the Gaines district of the Wasson-Denver area, Shell No. 1 Robertson, east outcrop, is drilling at 507 feet in sand and red beds.

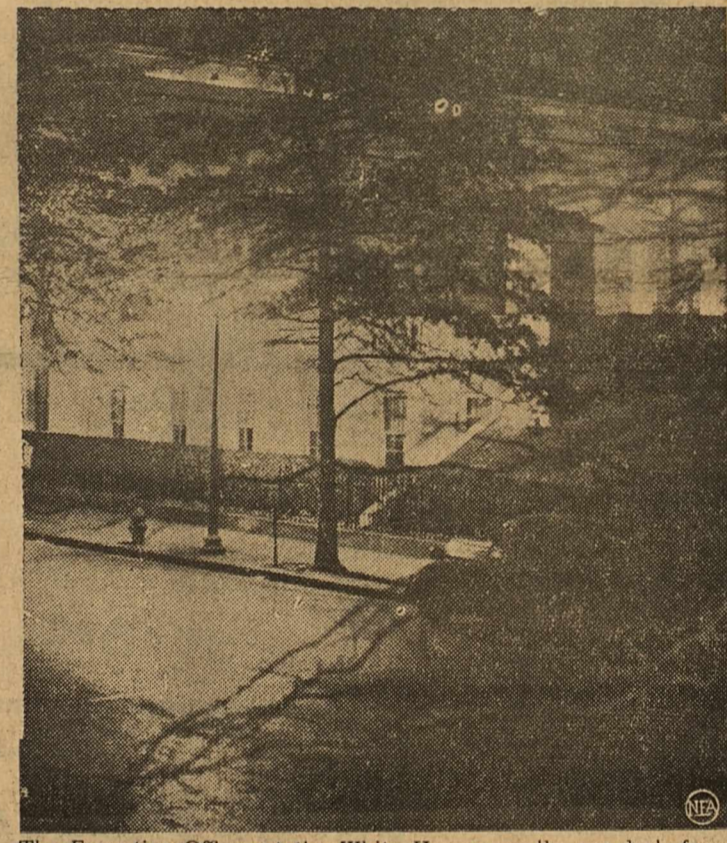
IN CRISIS OVER JAPANESE AIR ATTACK

Where Panay Sank Near Nanking



Where the U. S. gunboat Panay and three Standard Oil Company tankers were bombed, by Japanese planes, killing at least one American seaman and creating a serious international "incident" as Japanese troops closed in on Nanking, is shown on the above map. A British gunboat, speeding down the Yangtze to rescue survivors of the 65 or more Americans aboard the Panay, ran a gauntlet of shell fire to reach Hohen. Several Americans, including Lieut.-Com. J. J. Hughes of the Panay were known to have been wounded. Survivors were hurried to Wuhu.

White House Lights Burn



The Executive Offices at the White House usually are dark from early evening on, but lights blaze from the big windows above long after midnight as the wires hum with reports of the U. S. S. Panay sinking by Japanese bombers near Nanking. State and navy departments similarly were on the job.

Evans Urges Farm Tenancy Program Start in January

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (P).—C. M. Evans, regional farm director of the security administration in Texas and Oklahoma, said today that the farm tenancy program for that area should be in operation and the first farms purchased by the end of January.

Evans, here attending a conference of regional directors, said details for making loans to home owners so they could obtain seed, teams and planting equipment had been discussed.

Japanese Admiral Relieved of Post

SHANGHAI, Dec. 16 (P).—Japanese authorities today announced Rear Admiral Teizo Mitsumami, chief of Japanese aerial operations, had been relieved of his post as a result of the bombing of the United States gunboat Panay.

The government thus acted swiftly to carry out its pledge to the United States government that officers responsible for the Panay attack would be punished, said Domei, the Japanese news agency.

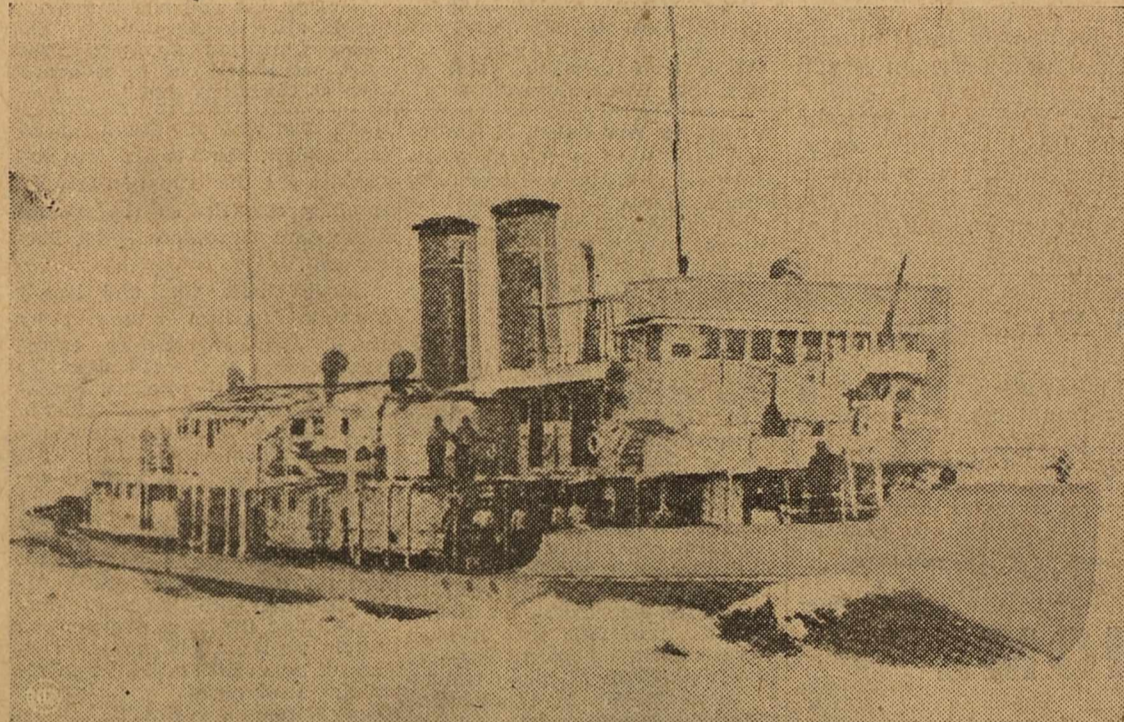
Mitsumami was recalled since most air bombing in China have been carried out by naval planes.

Tokyo dispatches at the same time announced Emperor Hiro-hito had received the Japanese naval minister, Admiral Mitsumasa Yonai, in audience.

U. S. Gunboat Sunk by Bombs



Most critical international incident of the Sino-Japanese war resulted when the U. S. gunboat Panay was bombed and sunk in the Yangtze river, where it is pictured above, by diving Japanese war planes. American authorities, striving to find and aid survivors, feared many had been killed. One seaman was known dead, and the commander and executive officer were wounded. Several U. S. embassy officials were aboard the boat. Three U. S. merchant vessels, owned by Standard Oil Company, also were bombed. One was missing and believed sunk, one was burning, and the third was beached. Japanese accepted responsibility for the incident.

Salute for Panay Dead To Be Fired

Every Concession Offered by Chiefs

SHANGHAI, Dec. 16 (P).—The Japanese, making every concession toward a satisfactory settlement of the Panay incident, augmented their efforts today by voluntarily detailing a company of Bluejackets to honor formally victims of the aerial bombardment.

The Bluejackets will render a formal naval salute at the point where the vessel was sunk, causing the death of three foreigners.

Japanese authorities said they regarded the tribute the highest possible voluntary gesture from one nation to another.

As a disciplinary measure, the Japanese aerial chief has been relieved of his post.

Japanese troops continued to batter Chinese defenders beyond Nanking, and mopping up operations were renewed relentlessly in conquered territory.

An official earlier said Japan was prepared to go "even further if necessary" than yesterday's apology, offer of indemnification and pledge of safeguards.

A government spokesman said, however, that "Japan believes the fundamentals were covered" in yesterday's Japanese note to the United States which was presented to Ambassador Joseph C. Grew a few hours before he delivered the American note.

(In Washington, responsible persons emphasized the United States demand for a guarantee of no further "unlawful interference" with American rights in China.)

Japanese officials recognized that the American note was "very firm" but declared the foreign office was preparing an earlier answer which, he said, "I am certain will be a satisfactory reply."

"Japan did not deny responsibility (for the Yangtze river incident). We already have apologized and already have promised indemnifications."

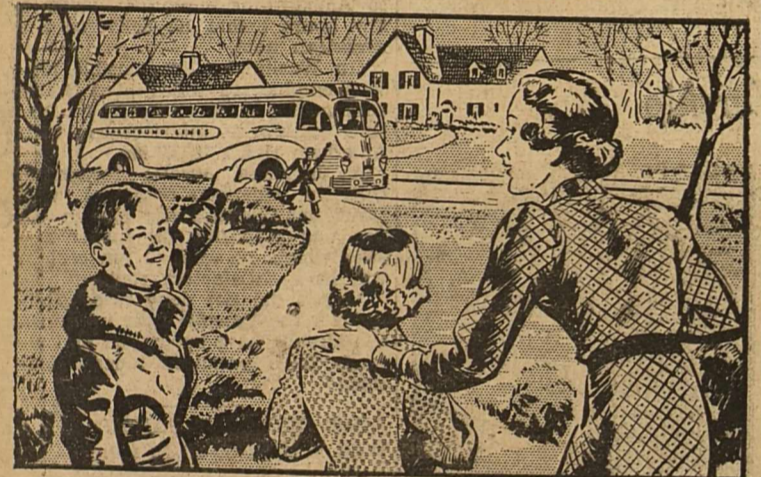

Country at Last Has Found Good 5-Cent Cigars

WASHINGTON, (U.P.) — Americans have found a good 5-cent cigar—or at least one they like at the price.

Since 1929 the sale of 5-cent cigars has increased while the sale of higher priced brands has decreased. The retail value of all 5-cent cigars exceeded the combined value of all higher priced brands.

Cigar smoking apparently is a sign of prosperity. Sale of cigars reached a peak in 1929 and fell to 35 per cent during the depression. During the past two years cigar smoking has again increased to near 1929 levels.

Pipe smoking increased some during the depression. Sale of chewing tobacco and snuff declined. The sale of cigarettes remained fairly steady and has increased at the rate of 10 per cent a year in the past three years.

Buried Silver Dimly Traced

LOCKHART, Tex. (U.P.) — Deep in the sandhills in the Southeastern part of Caldwell county, Tex., only a few miles from where oil field "roughnecks" climb steel derricks and search for liquid gold, lies the crumbling shaft and weather-beaten furnace-smelter of an old silver mine.

The old furnace, including the pot, is constructed of native stone and is said to be a masterpiece of masonry.

Close by the ruins in a hidden recess there is said to be buried a fortune in silver bars. Many tales are told of those who spent their lives protecting or searching for the riches. The most likely is one told by Harvey L. King, Caldwell county farmer.

The tale concerns King's uncle, the late A. S. Lowry, former Texas Ranger in the border country.

In 1875 a Mexican boy was killed and the murderer escaped across the Rio Grande into Old Mexico," King related. "The dead boy's father came to my uncle and told him that he would make him a rich man if he would capture the

felon. "My uncle thought that the old man's talk was merely a father's promise in order to gain vengeance on the slayer of his son. However, a few weeks later the murderer was lured across the river to a Deis y Seis (Sept. 16) celebration and captured.

"After the murderer had been tried and sentenced to life in the penitentiary, the old man came to my uncle and presented him with a crudely drawn map of the old mine with an 'X' marking the spot where the treasure was supposed to be buried."

Two Shafts Sunk. The old man is said to have told Ranger Lowry that in 1825 as a boy of 14 he was with a company of Mexican men and women who dug the shaft and erected the smelter now in ruins. The shaft, the remains of which may now be seen, showed very little signs of silver, but there was a trace of copper.

This shaft was abandoned and the party sank another on a nearby hilltop where a rich vein of silver was found.

"The old man told my uncle that Indians raided the Mexican camp after 43 bars of silver had been mined, smelted and molded," King said. "The Mexicans fearing they would be robbed, hid the bars in the hilltop shaft and covered it

up. That night the raiding Indians killed all the party except the man who gave the map to my uncle."

King said his uncle later offered to give him half interest if he would help him find the treasure. The uncle died before a search was started.

Prior Conviction Aids Guilty Thief in Texas

FORT WORTH, Tex. (U.P.) — Because he once was convicted of a capital offense, a 52-year-old Fort Worth ex-convict recently escaped a life prison sentence for stealing a cow.

Under Texas law that permits life sentence for habitual criminals, the ex-convict's plea of guilty for cow theft was enough to bring him a life sentence. Then a deputy clerk noticed that one indictment was for the capital offense. That could not be considered when declaring a man an habitual criminal.

The judge sentenced him to 10 years, maximum term for cattle stealing.

Make up several batches wrap each piece in wax paper, pack the candy in some utility box or container which will be useful throughout the year and you are more than a good cook—you are a veritable Santa Claus.

LUNCHEON: Scrambled eggs, sliced tomatoes, toasted rolls, baked apples, tea, milk.

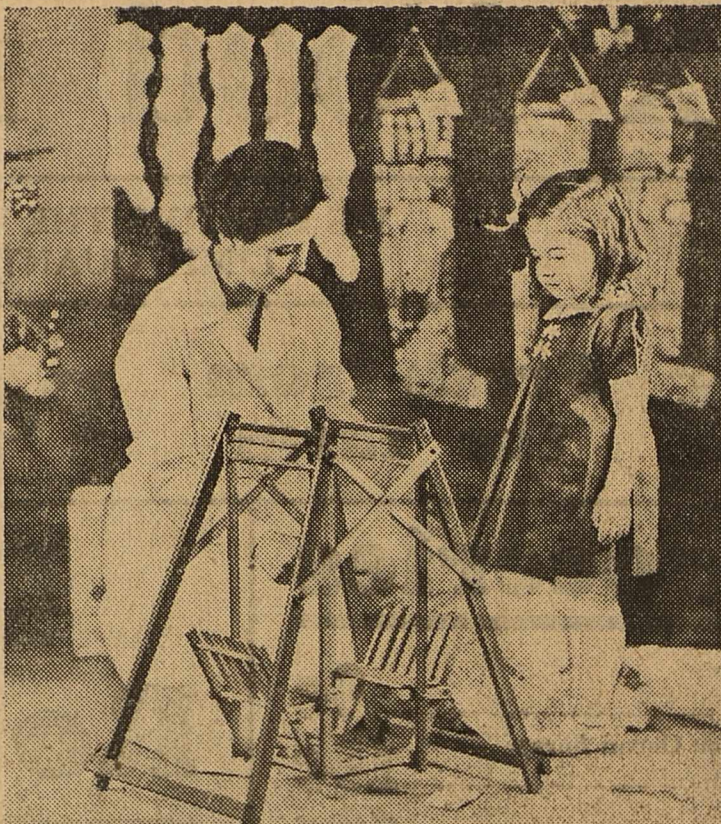

Chocolate Nut Cream. Two cups granulated sugar, 3/4 cup water, 2 squares unsweetened chocolate, 1 tablespoon corn syrup, 2 1/2 tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Mix sugar, water, chocolate and syrup in saucepan. Place over low fire and stir constantly until mixture boils to soft ball stage. If you do not use a thermometer, test for soft ball stage by drop-

ping a little of the mixture into a cup of cold water. If you can pick it up in a ball with the fingers, then it has reached the desired soft ball stage. Remove at once from fire and set in pan of cold water. Add butter and vanilla. When thoroughly cold, beat until stiff. Remove from pan of water roll into small ball and press a half nut into each ball. This is an old recipe from a wonderful cook, aged 80, and she says it has never failed.

Here's an old southern custom in the modern manner.

Pralines. (Makes about 8 very large ones).

One-half cup maple syrup, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup pecan nuts, broken in pieces, 1/4 cup sweetened condensed milk, 1/4 cup water.

Put sugar, water and sweetened condensed milk in saucepan. Heat slowly to boiling point, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Boil until mixture is at the soft ball stage (see above recipe). Remove from fire, add butter. Cool. Then beat until creamy. Place saucepan over hot water, stir until softened, add nuts and drop from a spoon on buttered tin sheet in rounds. No further cooking. Just cool, wrap and write a little card saying A Very Merry Christmas. Christmas Tree Fudge.

One cup brown sugar, 1 cup white sugar, 1/2 cup yellow corn syrup, 1/2 cup water, 2 egg whites, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/3 cup candied cherries, 1/3 cup pitted dates, 1/3 cup pecan nuts.

Cook sugar, syrup and water until it becomes brittle and breaks easily in the hand when dropped into cold water. Remove syrup from fire. Beat egg whites until absolutely stiff and dry. Pour syrup over egg whites a little at a time, beating mixture all the time. Add vanilla when nearly stiff, then add the cut up cherries, dates and nuts. When mixture is stiff, pour on a greased plate and cut in squares.

Hooded Glamor.

Shaft to Rise To Honor A. E. F. And Lafayette

BORDEAUX, (UP) — A Franco-American memorial paying tribute to Lafayette and the American Expeditionary Forces will be inaugurated soon at Verdun.

M. Maurice Damour, former French deputy and president of the committee for the monument, announces that the work has been completed and soon the memorial will be open to the public.

A granite shaft of 225 feet, the memorial joins 1778-81 with 1917-18. The site chosen has a double significance, for it was from near that spot that General Lafayette sailed for America in 1777 and is near Bordeaux where many American soldiers landed in France in 1917-18.

The base of the shaft has been made a museum of relics of Lafayette, of Gen. John J. Pershing and the A. E. F., and from its summit

one can get a splendid view of the countryside and shore line. The Marquis de Chambrun, a descendant of Lafayette; Governor General Marcel Olivier, president of the French line; and six former prime ministers of France are on the memorial committee.
